REVIEW

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council:

1. Review and discuss the FY 2009-10 Proposed Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and provide concurrence with the proposed priorities or direction for new priorities for implementation of capital projects.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of the CIP is to identify needed improvements and establish long-term funding priorities. The CIP is presented to the City Council each year for review and discussion in order to affirm or provide direction for reprioritizing planned improvements for the benefit of the community.

City staff has completed a full review of all project needs through "build-out" of the City. The priorities, as proposed, are based on status and funding of existing projects, and anticipated development trends within the City.

DISCUSSION

The City uses the CIP to plan for infrastructure and facilities projects to serve the community. It identifies and projects the costs of constructing the following types of projects anticipated through build-out of the City:

- Street Improvements
- Buildings
- Electric Utility
- Parks
- Underground Utilities

- Bridges
- Drainage, Sewers, and Waterlines
- Landscaping
- Traffic Signals

Item No. 1.

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Projects have been identified as funded, partially funded, and unfunded. Projects proposed for FY 2009-10 total \$123,820,000. The cost estimate for all identified projects through build-out total approximately \$1.7 billion.

This Study Session offers an opportunity for the City Council to review the CIP and to provide commentary and concurrence or new direction on projects planned for the next five years. Should the City Council make changes in the prioritization of projects, other projects may be deferred.

Staff will bring the CIP back to the City Council for review each year to add, delete, and change priorities as needed.

<u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

- 1. Review and discuss the FY 2009-10 Proposed Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and provide concurrence with the proposed priorities or direction for new priorities for implementation of capital projects. *This alternative will allow needed improvements*.
- 2. Do not review and discuss the FY 2009-10 Proposed Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and do not provide concurrence with the proposed priorities or direction for new priorities for implementation of capital projects. *This alternative will result in the delaying of needed improvements.*

FISCAL IMPACT

The FY 2008-09 final quarter Proposition 42 (Fund 225) revenue payment of \$530,000 is anticipated from the State to the City. If the State fails to provide these funds, the Citywide Annual Pavement Rehabilitation Program would be impacted by reducing the anticipated FY 2008-09 carryover to FY 2009-10 from approximately \$1.43 million to approximately \$900,000. Due to the uncertainty of the state budget, no new Proposition 42 funds are programmed for CIP projects in FY 2009-10.

Development Impact Fee for Arterial Streets and Traffic Signals (DIF – Funds 416 and 417) savings realized by completed projects for FY 2008-09 are being reappropriated for FY 2009-10 CIP projects. No new DIF revenues for FY 2009-10 are programmed for CIP projects.

Gas Tax (Fund 121) is not programmed for CIP projects, and therefore any state-imposed Gas Tax reduction would not directly impact the CIP. It is important to recognize, however, that the Gas Tax does contribute to funding the operating budgets of both the Maintenance & Operations Division and Capital Projects Division staff.

The Financial & Administrative Services Department is in the process of implementing an indirect cost rate (ICR) that would be applied to projects in order to minimize Gas Tax operating budget cost impacts by distributing overhead costs to CIP projects.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

PUBLIC SAFETY:

Provide a safe and secure environment for people and property in the community, control the number and severity of fire and hazardous material incidents, and provide protection for citizens who live, work and visit the City of Moreno Valley.

PUBLIC FACILITIES AND CAPITAL PROJECTS:

Ensure that needed public facilities, roadway improvements, and other infrastructure improvements are constructed and maintained.

POSITIVE ENVIRONMENT:

Create a positive environment for the development of Moreno Valley's future.

COMMUNITY IMAGE, NEIGHBORHOOD PRIDE AND CLEANLINESS:

Promote a sense of community pride and foster an excellent image about our City by developing and executing programs which will result in quality development, enhanced neighborhood preservation efforts (including home rehabilitation) and neighborhood restoration.









Iris Ave Sidewalk Improvements from Indian St to Perris Blvd





BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2009-10

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council deliberate on the Proposed Operating Budget for Fiscal Year 2009-10 and provide direction to staff regarding the proposed solutions for addressing the projected General Fund deficit of \$6,286,400.

BACKGROUND

The Proposed Operating Budget is the City Manager's recommended budget and consists of projected operating revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009 and ending June 30, 2010. As such, it represents the proposed financial plan for the upcoming fiscal year and is presented for the City Council's consideration and deliberation prior to adoption.

The Proposed Operating Budget does not include capital improvements. Instead, these are compiled in a separately issued Proposed Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), which is a multi-year plan that identifies and prioritizes funding for future capital improvements such as land acquisitions, buildings, and infrastructure.

The Proposed Operating Budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2009-10 was presented to the City Council on June 9, 2009. Deliberations on the budget are scheduled for the City Council Study Session of June 16, 2009. During these deliberations, staff will be available to respond to questions regarding their departmental budget requests and also to address service level impacts that have been identified as a result of the significant budgetary reductions included in the Proposed Budget.

DISCUSSION

The City's Proposed Operating Budget for FY 2009-10 is \$187,021,200; representing all funds and special districts. The General Fund portion of the budget is \$86,875,900. Since the General Fund is the most impacted by economic conditions, the primary focus in adopting the proposed budget is how to balance the General Fund's expenditures with its diminishing revenues resulting from the current economic recession.

The Proposed Operating Budget is presented with a deficit of \$6,286,400 as shown below:

•	Projected General Fund Operating Revenues & Other Sources	\$80,589,600
•	Proposed General Fund Operating Expenditures (rounded)	<u>86,876,000</u>
•	Projected General Fund Operating Deficit	\$ 6,286,400

Proposed solutions for addressing the projected deficit have been presented for the City Council's consideration. If implemented, these solutions will allow a balanced General Fund budget to be adopted.

The schedule leading up to adoption of the FY 2009-10 Operating Budget is shown below:

•	June 16, 2009	Study Session to deliberate on proposed solutions for

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impacts of the Proposed Operating Budget for FY 2009-10 are contained within the budget document; the most significant being the proposed solutions for balancing the General Fund budget deficit of nearly \$6.3 million.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

Revenue Diversification and Preservation. Develop a variety of City revenue sources and policies to create a stable revenue base and fiscal policies to support essential City services, regardless of economic climate.

SUMMARY

The Proposed Operating Budget for FY 2009-10 was presented to the City Council on June 9, 2009. The Study Session of June 16, 2009 will provide Council with the opportunity to deliberate on the budget, ask questions regarding departmental budget requests and service level impacts resulting from budget reductions, and provide direction to staff regarding proposed solutions for balancing the projected General Fund deficit of nearly \$6.3 million. Final budget deliberations and budget adoption are scheduled for June 23, 2009; with June 30, 2009 available as a back-up City Council meeting for budget adoption if needed.
