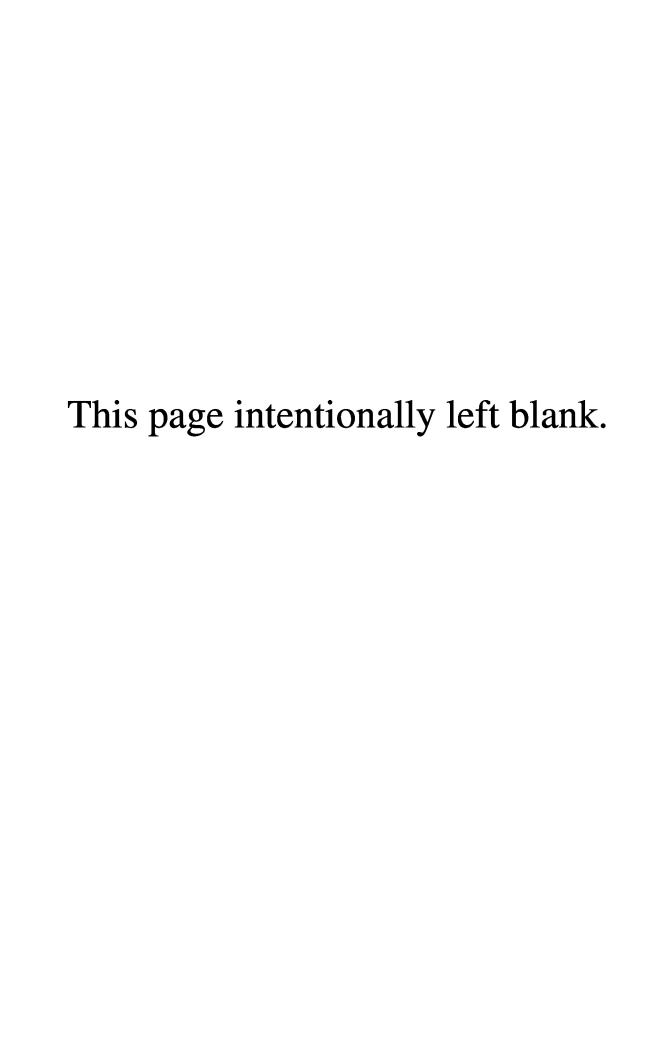

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council:

- 1. Accept the work as complete for the 2010 Pavement Resurfacing Project, constructed by Hardy & Harper, Inc., 1312 East Warner Avenue, Santa Ana, CA 92705.
- 2. Direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion within ten (10) calendar days at the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, as required by Section 3093 of the California Civil Code.
- 3. Authorize the Financial and Administrative Services Director to release the retention to Hardy & Harper, Inc., thirty-five (35) calendar days after the date of recordation of the Notice of Completion, if no claims are filed against the project.
- 4. Accept the improvements into the City's maintained road system.

BACKGROUND

On May 25, 2010, the City Council awarded the construction contract to Hardy & Harper, Inc., for the 2010 Pavement Resurfacing Project. A Purchase Order in the amount of \$1,304,600.00 (the bid amount of \$1,186,000.00 plus 10% contingency of \$118,600.00) was issued to the Contractor.

DISCUSSION

Hardy & Harper, Inc. completed the construction of the 2010 Pavement Resurfacing Project on September 3, 2010. The project improved Alessandro Boulevard (Old 215 Frontage Road to Elsworth Street), Old Lake Drive (Pigeon Pass Road to Sunnymead Ranch Parkway), Indian Street (Skyrock Drive to Manzanita Avenue), and Kitching Street (Fir Avenue to Sunnymead Boulevard) to include new asphalt concrete pavement surface and striping, and reconstruction of selected sidewalks and access ramps.

This project is part of the City's ongoing annual pavement resurfacing program. The project's purpose is to resurface the weathered streets mentioned above to provide safe and smooth driving surfaces and prolong the service life of the pavement. The resurfacing entailed placement of a rubberized asphalt concrete overlay on the existing street pavement. Preparation for new pavement overlay included removing a uniform depth of the existing pavement by grinding (on Alessandro Boulevard) and the use of "Cold-in-Place-Recycling" of the existing pavement on the remaining streets. Unsuitable subgrade materials in several areas on Old Lake Drive were discovered during the construction and were removed and replaced prior to new pavement overlay. New pavement striping, markings and markers were installed after paving has completed.

The Contractor completed the project at a total construction cost of \$1,208,538.45 inclusive of Contract Change Order Nos.1 and 2 of \$22,538.45. The final contract total cost did not exceed the approved purchase order amount of \$1,304,600. The improvements were completed ahead of schedule, within budget and in accordance with the approved contract documents.

Accept the work as complete for the 2010 Pavement Resurfacing Project, constructed by Hardy & Harper, Inc., direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion within ten (10) calendar days at the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, as required by Section 3093 of the California Civil Code, authorize the Financial and Administrative Services Director to release the retention to Hardy & Harper, Inc., thirty-five (35) calendar days after the date of recordation of the Notice of Completion, if no claims are filed against the project, and accept the improvements into the City's maintained road system. This alternative will result in payment to the Contractor and acceptance of the improvements into the City's maintained road system.
- 2. Do not accept the work as complete for the 2010 Pavement Resurfacing Project, constructed by Hardy & Harper, Inc., do not direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion within ten (10) calendar days at the Office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, as required by Section 3093 of the California Civil Code, do not authorize the Financial and Administrative Services Director to release the retention to Hardy & Harper, Inc., thirty-five (35) calendar days after the date of recordation of the Notice of Completion, if no claims are filed against the project, and do not accept the improvements into the City's maintained road system. This alternative will result in delaying payment to the Contractor, delaying acceptance of the improvements into the City's maintained road system, and incurring extra cost to the City.

FISCAL IMPACT

The construction phase of this project is included in Fiscal Year 2010-2011 Capital Improvements Project Budget and is financed by Proposition 1B (Fund 226). This fund is restricted to street rehabilitation or improvements. As the project is completed, the remaining budget will be used to rehabilitate streets that are prioritized in the approved Capital Improvement Plan. There is no impact to the General Fund.

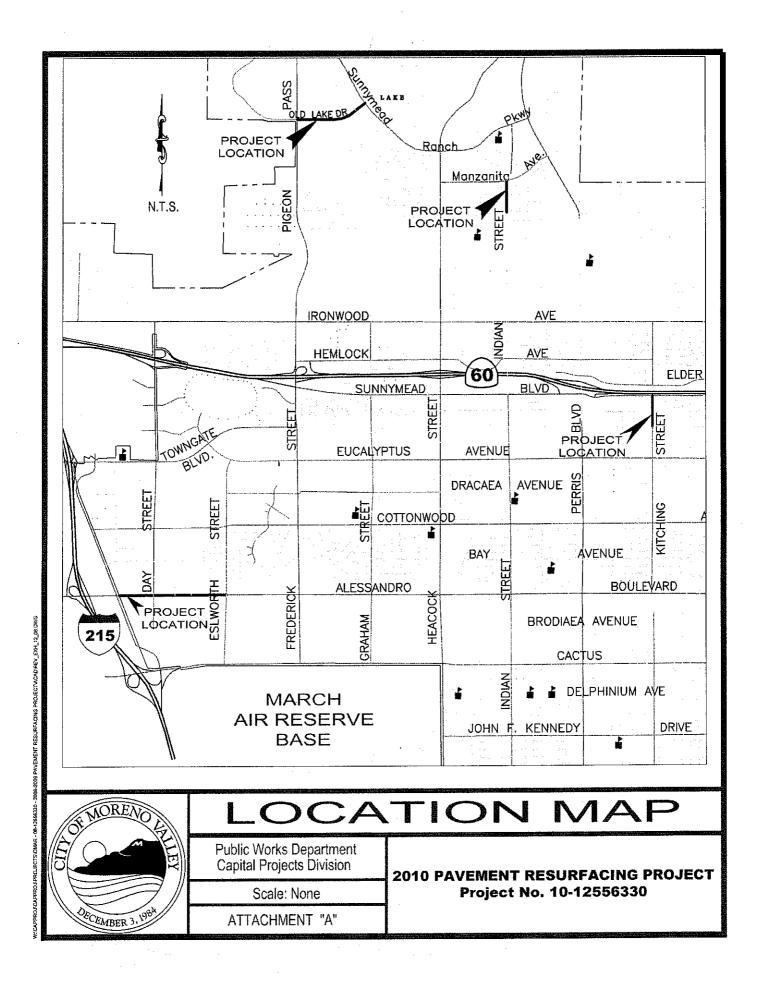

BACKGROUND

The City executed a contract for service in July 2007 with Melad and Associates for Plan Check Services to be provided for the Building & Safety Division. The term of the contract was for three years, with provisions for two one-year extensions. The initial contract was effective July 2007 through June 30, 2010.

DISCUSSION

The executed contract allows for the extension of the contract twice for one year each beyond the initial three year contracting period. This would be the first extension to the contract for a one year period to end concurrent with the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve the Amendment and Restatement Independent Contractor Agreement
- 2. Elect not to approve the Amendment and Restatement Independent Contractor Agreement which would leave the Division without a vendor for Plan Check Services.

FISCAL IMPACT

The approved budget for Fiscal Year 2010/11 includes \$220,000 for contract services. All services provided under this agreement are fully recovered from the applicant for the construction permit.

The Building & Safety Division is integral to the City Councils' Public Safety Goal as described "Public Safety. 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AMENDMENT AND RESTATEMENT INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

RECITALS:

Whereas, the City and Contractor entered into an Agreement entitled "INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT," hereinafter referred to as "Agreement," dated July 1, 2007.

Whereas, the Contractor is providing services as more specifically described in the Agreement.

Whereas, the Agreement ending date is June 30, 2010. This amendment and restatement will extend the agreement into the fourth year to June 30, 2011.

This Agreement is made by and between the City of Moreno Valley, California, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "City", and the following named independent contractor, hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor," based upon City policies and the following legal citations:

- A. Government Code Section 53060 authorizes the engagement of persons to perform special services as independent contractors; and
- B. The public interest, convenience, necessity and general welfare will be served by this Agreement.

This Agreement is made and entered into effective the date the City signs this Agreement.

2. CONTRACTOR SERVICE, FEES, AND RELEVANT DATES

- A. The Contractor's scope of service are described in Exhibit "A" (Contractor's proposal) attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.
- B. Payment terms are provided in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.
- C. The Contractor starting Date is <u>July 1, 2007</u>, and the Contractor Ending Date is <u>June 30, 2011</u>. If mutually agreeable, the City and Contractor may extend this agreement in increments of one year, not to exceed a total contract period of five (5) years. The City acknowledges that it will not unreasonably withhold approval of the Contractor's requests for extensions of time in which to complete the work required. The Contractor shall not be responsible for performance delays caused by others or delays beyond the Contractor's reasonable control (excluding delays caused by non-performance or unjustified delay by Contractor, his/her/its employees, or subcontractors), and such delays shall extend the time for performance of the work by the Contractor.

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- A. <u>Control of Work.</u> Contractor is solely responsible for the content and sequence of the work, and will not be subject to control and direction as to the details and means for accomplishing the anticipated results of services. The City will not provide any training to Contractor or his/her/its employees.
- B. <u>Intent of Parties.</u> Contractor is, and at all times shall be, an independent contractor and nothing contained herein shall be construed as making the Contractor or any individual whose compensation for services is paid by the Contractor, an agent or employee of the City, or authorizing the Contractor to create or assume any obligation or liability for or on behalf of the City, or entitling the Contractor to any right, benefit, or privilege applicable to any officer or employee of the City.
- C. <u>Subcontracting.</u> Contractor may retain or subcontract for the services of other necessary contractors with the prior written approval of the City. Payment for such services shall be the responsibility of the Contractor. Any and all subcontractors shall be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, with the exception that the City shall have no obligation to pay for any subcontractor services rendered. Contractor shall be responsible for paying prevailing wages where required by law (See California Labor Code Sections 1770 through 1777.7).
- D. <u>Legal Considerations.</u> The Contractor shall comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws in the performance of this Agreement.
- E. <u>Contractor Indemnification.</u> Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold the City, the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Moreno Valley (RDA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), their officers, agents and employees harmless from any and all claims, damages, losses, causes of action and demands, including reasonable

attorney's fees and costs, incurred in connection with or in any manner arising out of Contractor's performance of the work contemplated by this Agreement to the extent resulting from Contractor's negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct. Acceptance of this Agreement signifies that the Contractor is not covered under the City's general liability insurance, employee benefits, or worker's compensation. It further establishes that the Contractor shall be fully responsible or such coverage.

- F. <u>City Indemnification</u>. The City agrees to indemnify, defend and save the Contractor and its officers, agents and employees harmless from any and all liability, claims, damages or injuries to any person, including injury to the City's, RDA's and CSD's employees and all claims which arise from or are connected with the negligent performance or failure to perform the service or other obligations of the City under this Agreement, or are caused or claim to be caused by the negligent acts of the City, RDA and CSD, their officers, agents or employees, or its subcontractor(s) or any person acting for the City or under its control or direction; provided; however, that this indemnification and hold harmless shall not include any claims arising from the negligence or willful misconduct of the Contractor, its officers, agent, employees, or subcontractors.
- G. <u>Insurance Requirements.</u> Where determined applicable by the City, Contractor will comply with the following insurance requirements at its sole expense. Insurance companies shall be rated (A Minus: VII Admitted) or better in Best's Insurance Rating Guide and shall be legally licensed and qualified to conduct business in the State of California:
 - General Liability Insurance to protect against loss from liability imposed by law for damages on account of bodily injury, including death, and/or property damage suffered or alleged to be suffered by any person or persons whomever, resulting directly or indirectly from any act or activities of the Contractor, sub-Contractor, or any person acting for the Contractor or under its control or direction. Such insurance shall be maintained in full force and effect throughout the terms of the Agreement and any extension thereof in the minimum amounts provided below:

Bodily Injury
Property Damage

\$1,000,000 per occurrence/\$2,000,000 aggregate \$500,000 per occurrence/\$500,000 aggregate

- Professional Errors and Omission Insurance such coverage shall not be less than \$1,000,000 per claim and aggregate.
- Worker's Compensation Insurance in such amounts as will fully comply with the laws of the State of California and which shall indemnify, insure and provide legal defense for both the Contractor and the City, RDA, and CSD against any loss, claim or damage arising from any injuries or occupational diseases happening to any worker employed by the Contractor in the course of carrying out the Agreement. This coverage

may be waived if the Contractor is determined to be functioning as a sole proprietor and the City provided form "Exception to Worker's Compensation Coverage" is signed, notarized and attached to this Agreement.

- Liability and Property Damage Insurance coverage for owned and nonowned automotive equipment operated on City/CSD/RDA premises. Such coverage limits shall not be less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit.
- □ Insurance requirements waived with Risk Manager's approval.
- □ Insurance requirements modified with Risk Manager's approval and attached hereto as Exhibit "D" and incorporated herein by this reference.

A Certificate of Insurance and appropriate additional insured endorsement evidencing the above applicable insurance coverage shall be submitted to the City Risk Manager prior to the execution of this Agreement. The Certificate of Insurance or an appropriate binder shall bear an endorsement containing the following provisions:

Solely as respect to services done by or on behalf of the named insured for the City of Moreno Valley, it is agreed that the City of Moreno Valley, the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City or Moreno Valley, and the Moreno Valley Community Services District, their officers, employees and agents are included as additional insured under this policy and the coverage(s) provided shall be primary insurance and not contributing with any other insurance available to the City of Moreno Valley, the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Moreno Valley, and the Moreno Valley Community Services District, its officers, employees and agents, under any third party liability policy.

The terms of the insurance policy or policies issued to provide the above coverage shall neither be amended to reduce the required insurance limits and coverages nor shall such policies be canceled by the carrier without thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified or registered mail of amendment or cancellation to the City, except that cancellation for non-payment of premium shall require ten (10) days prior written notice by certified or registered mail. In the event the insurance is canceled, the Contractor shall, prior to the cancellation date, submit to the Risk Manager new evidence of insurance in the amounts established.

H. Intellectual Property. Any system or documents developed, produced or provided under this Agreement, including any intellectual property discovered or developed by Contractor in the course of performing or otherwise as a result of its work, shall become the sole property of the City unless explicitly stated otherwise in this Agreement. The Contractor may retain copies of any and all material, including drawings, documents, and

specifications produced by the Contractor in performance of this Agreement. The City and the Contractor agree that to the extent permitted by law, until final approval by the City, all data shall be treated as confidential and will not be released to third parties without the prior written consent of both parties.

- I. <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. There are no understandings, agreements, or representations of warranties, expressed or implied, not specified in this Agreement. This Agreement applies only to the current proposal as attached. This Agreement may be modified or amended only by a subsequent written Agreement signed by both parties. Assignment of this Agreement is prohibited without prior written consent.
- J. <u>Termination.</u> Either party may terminate this Agreement upon breach of the Agreement by the other party. In the event the City terminates the Agreement, the Contractor shall perform no further services under the Agreement unless the notice of termination authorizes such further work.
- K. Payment. Payments to the Contactor pursuant to this Agreement will be reported to Federal and State taxing authorities as required. The City will not withhold any sums from compensation payable to Contractor. Contractor is independently responsible for the payment of all applicable taxes. Where the payment terms provide for compensation on a time and materials basis, the Contractor shall maintain adequate records to permit inspection and audit of the Contactors time and materials charges under the Agreement. Upon reasonable notice, such records must be made available to the City's agent; however, nothing herein shall convert such records into public records. Such records shall be retained by the Contractor for three (3) years following completion of the services under the Agreement.
- L. <u>Restrictions on City Employees.</u> The Contractor shall not employ any City employee or official in the work performed pursuant to this Agreement. No officer or employee of the City shall have any financial interest in this Agreement in violation of federal, state or local Law.
- M. <u>Choice of Law and Venue.</u> The laws of the State of California shall govern the rights, obligations, duties, and liabilities of the parties to this Agreement, and shall govern the interpretation of this Agreement. Any legal proceeding arising from this Agreement shall be brought in the appropriate court located in Riverside County, State of California.

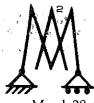

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council:

- 1. Award the construction contract for the Traffic Signal Improvements on Sunnymead Ranch Parkway at Village Road (East) Intersection to SoCal Engineers, Inc., the lowest responsible bidder.
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute a contract with SoCal Engineers, Inc. in the form attached hereto.
- 3. Authorize the issuance of a Purchase Order to SoCal Engineers, Inc. for a total amount of \$180,260 (\$207,299 base bid amount plus 15% contingency) when the contract has been signed by all parties.
- 4. Authorize the Public Works Director/City Engineer to execute any subsequent change orders to the contract with SoCal Engineers, Inc., up to but not to exceed the Purchase Order's total contingency of \$27,039, subject to the approval of the City Attorney.

BACKGROUND

The design and construction documents have been prepared by in-house staff as a cost saving solution for the City. In July 2010, the Plans and Specifications were approved by the City Engineer, and the project was advertised for construction bids.

The Planning Division of the Community Development Department determined on September 30, 2010, that this project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) as it is classified as a Class 1 Categorical Exemption under Section 15301(c) and, therefore, environmental documents are not required.

DISCUSSION

This project will provide for the installation of a new traffic signal at the intersection of Sunnymead Ranch Parkway and Village Road (east). The work will also include the removal and construction of new asphalt concrete pavement, curb and gutter, sidewalk, access ramps, and a residential driveway approach, as well as restriping of the intersection, and the installation of signage.

Formal bidding procedures have been followed in conformance with the Public Contract Code. The City Clerk opened bids at 2:00 p.m., on September 8, 2010, for the subject project. The eleven (11) valid bids received are as follows:

Staff has reviewed the bid by SoCal Engineers, Inc. and finds it to be the lowest responsible bidder in possession of a valid license and bid bond. No outstanding issues were identified through review of the references submitted by SoCal Engineers, Inc. in their bid.

The lowest responsible bidder was determined by comparing the cumulative total for all Base Bid items, as stipulated in the bid documents.

The Contractor will notify, and provide safe ingress and egress to all potentially affected property owners about the construction, as well as law enforcement, the Fire Department, Waste Management of the Inland Empire, the postal service, the school district, and other affected entities. The traffic control plan has been approved by the City Traffic Engineer.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Award the construction contract for the Traffic Signal Improvements on Sunnymead Ranch Parkway at Village Road (East) Intersection to SoCal Engineers, Inc., the lowest responsible bidder, authorize the City Manager to execute a contract with SoCal Engineers, Inc. in the form attached hereto, authorize the issuance of a Purchase Order to SoCal Engineers, Inc. for a total amount of \$180,260 (\$207,299 base bid amount plus 15% contingency) when the contract has been signed by all parties, and authorize the Public Works Director/City Engineer to execute any subsequent change orders to the contract with SoCal Engineers, Inc., up to but not to exceed the Purchase Order's total contingency of \$27,039, subject to the approval of the City Attorney. This alternative will allow for the timely construction of needed improvements.
- 2. Do not award the construction contract for the Traffic Signal Improvements on Sunnymead Ranch Parkway at Village Road (East) Intersection to SoCal Engineers, Inc., the lowest responsible bidder, do not authorize the City Manager to execute a contract with SoCal Engineers, Inc. in the form attached hereto, do not authorize the issuance of a Purchase Order to SoCal Engineers, Inc. for a total amount of \$180,260 (\$207,299 base bid amount plus 15% contingency) when the contract has been signed by all parties, and do not authorize the Public Works Director/City Engineer to execute any subsequent change orders to the contract with SoCal Engineers, Inc., up to but not to exceed the Purchase Order's total contingency of \$27,039, subject to the approval of the City Attorney. This alternative will delay the construction of these needed improvements.

FISCAL IMPACT

The construction phase of this project is included on Fiscal Year 2010/2011 Capital Improvements Project Budget and will be financed by DIF Traffic Signal Capital Projects (Fund 417). The funding for this project is restricted to traffic signal capital improvements and cannot be used for operational activities. There is no impact to the General Fund.

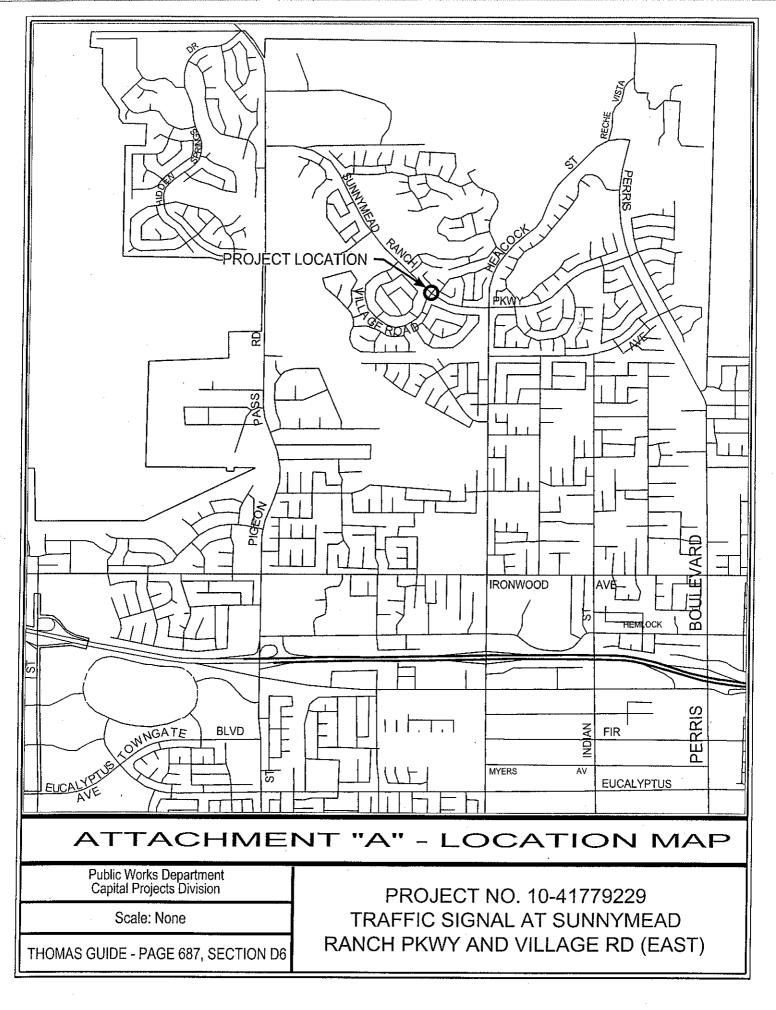

AGREEMENT

PROJECT NO. 10-41779229

TRAFFIC SIGNAL IMPROVEMENTS Sunnymead Ranch Parkway at Village Road (East) Intersection

THIS Agreement, made and entered into as of the date signed by the City Manager, by and between the City of Moreno Valley, a municipal corporation, County of Riverside, State of California, hereinafter called the "City" and SoCal Engineers, Inc. hereinafter called the "Contractor."

That the City and the Contractor for the consideration hereinafter named, agree as follows:

- 1. The written Agreement includes all of the following:
 - a. Any and all Contract Change Orders issued after execution of this Agreement
 - b. Addendum No. 1 inclusive, issued prior to the opening of the Bids
 - c. The bound Bid Documents
 - d. The Special Provisions which include the General Provisions and Technical Provisions, all of which are parts of this Agreement
 - e. The project Plans
 - f. The Standard Plans
 - g. The Standard Specifications
 - h. Reference Specifications, all of which are essential parts of this Agreement
 - i. The Bidder's Proposal which includes the Bidder's Bond and Noncollusion Affidavit

In the event of any conflict in the provisions thereof, the terms of said Bid Documents as set forth above shall control, each over the other, in the order provided. The above items are incorporated in this Agreement as though set forth in full.

- 2. The Contractor shall furnish all materials, tools, equipment and labor, except as otherwise provided in the Plans or Special Provisions, and will perform all the work which is necessary to complete in a good, workmanlike and substantial manner the above said project in accordance with the Bid Documents for this project, the Bid Documents which are hereby specifically referred to and by such reference made a part hereof.
- 3. The City will pay the Contractor and the Contractor agrees to receive and accept the prices set forth in the Bid Schedule as full compensation for the work required under the bid items awarded by the City, to wit, the Base Bid Item(s) and Additive Bid Item(s) in the sum total amount of \$180,260.00, subject to additions or reductions of the quantities of the various bid items at the unit prices bid, for furnishing all materials and for doing all the work contemplated and embraced under this Agreement; for all loss or damages arising out of the nature of the work aforesaid, or from the action of the elements, or from any unforeseen difficulties or obstructions which may arise or be encountered in the prosecution of the work, until the work is accepted by the City Council; for all expenses incurred by or in consequence of the suspension or discontinuance of work; and for well and faithfully completing the work, the whole thereof, in the manner and in accordance with the Bid Documents therefore and the requirements of the Engineer under them.
- 4. The Contractor hereby agrees to order materials pursuant to this Agreement within 7 calendar days after the date of authorization specified in the "Notice to Proceed with Order of Materials." The Contractor hereby agrees to commence work pursuant to this Agreement within 15 calendar days after the date of authorization specified in the "Notice to Proceed with Construction." The Contractor agrees to diligently prosecute the contracted work, including corrective items of work, day to day thereafter, to completion within **forty-five (45) working days** working days after said date in the "Notice to Proceed with Construction," except as adjusted by subsequent Contract Change Order(s).

Attachment "B"

5. The City and Contractor hereby agree that in case all ordering of materials and construction called for under the Agreement is not completed within the time hereinabove specified, including City caused delays or extensions, damages will be sustained by the City and that, it is and will be impracticable or extremely difficult to ascertain and determine the actual amount of damages the City will sustain in the event of, and by reason of, such delay.

It is, therefore, agreed that such damages shall be presumed to be in the amount of \$340.00 per calendar day, and that the Contractor will pay to the City, or City may retain from amounts otherwise payable to Contractor, said amount for each calendar day by which the Contractor fails to complete the work, including corrective items of work, under this Agreement within the time hereinabove specified and as adjusted by Contract Change Order(s). The Contractor will not be assessed liquidated damages for delay(s) occasioned by the failure of the City or of the owner of a utility to provide for the removal or relocation of utility facilities.

6. The Contractor shall procure and maintain, at its sole expense, and throughout the term of this Agreement, any extension thereof, and for a one (1) year warranty period, General Liability, Automobile Liability, and Workers' Compensation Insurance with such coverage limits as described in this Agreement.

The Contractor shall name as additional insured, the City of Moreno Valley, the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Moreno Valley (RDA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and shall furnish the City with a certificate of insurance evidencing liability insurance policy or policies which shall provide coverage for owned and non-owned automobiles; manufacturers and Contractor's liability; broad form property damage in any case where the Contractor has any property belonging to the City in his care, custody or control; owners and Contractor's protective liability; blanket contractual liability; products and completed operations coverage; coverage for collapse, explosion, and where any excavation, digging or trenching is done with power equipment; and shall bear an endorsement containing the following Provisions:

Solely as respect to work done by or on behalf of the named insured for the City of Moreno Valley, it is agreed that the City of Moreno Valley, the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Moreno Valley (RDA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), its officers, employees and agents, are added as additional insured under this policy and the coverage provided hereunder shall be primary insurance and not contributing with any other insurance available to the City of Moreno Valley, California, the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Moreno Valley, and the Moreno Valley Community Services District, its officers, employees and agents; under any third party liability policy.

It is further agreed that the other insurance provision(s) of the policy are amended to conform therewith.

The endorsements shall be signed by a person authorized by the insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. Insurance companies providing insurance here under shall be rated (A minus: VII - Admitted) or better in Best's Insurance Rating Guide and shall be legally licensed and qualified to conduct insurance business in the State of California.

The terms of the insurance policy or policies issued to provide the below insurance coverage(s) shall not be amended or cancelled by the carrier without thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified or registered mail of amendments or cancellation to the City, except that cancellation for non-payment of premium shall require (10) days prior written notice by certified or registered mail. In the event the said insurance is canceled, the Contractor shall, prior to the cancellation date, submit to the City Clerk new evidence of insurance in the amounts established.

All liability insurance policies shall bear an endorsement or shall have an attached rider which provides that the City of Moreno Valley will be notified by certified or registered mail at least 30 days prior to the effective date of cancellation, non-renewal, or material alteration of such policy.

All liability insurance shall cover comprehensive general liability for both bodily injury (including death) and property damage, including but not limited to aggregate products, aggregate operations, aggregate protective and aggregate contractual with the following minimum limits:

A combined single limit for Bodily Injury Liability and Property Damage Liability of \$2,000,000.00 for each occurrence will be considered equivalent to the above minimum limits for Comprehensive General Liability.

Property Damage Insurance shall cover full replacement value for damages to any property caused directly or indirectly by or from acts or activities of the Contractor or its sub-contractors or any person acting for the Contractor or under its control or direction.

The Contractor shall procure and maintain, at its sole expense, and throughout the term of this Agreement and any extension thereof, Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance coverage for owned and non-owned automotive equipment operated. Such coverage limits shall not be less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit.

Any deductibles or self-insured retention must be declared to and approved by the City. At the option of the City, either: the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retention as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers; or the contractor shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigation, claim administration, and defense expenses.

The Contractor shall also furnish the City with a certificate evidencing Worker's Compensation Insurance with limits as established by the State of California.

The Contractor shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. All coverages for subcontractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated herein.

- 7. The Contractor hereby agrees to provide and maintain in effect two (2) good and sufficient Surety Bonds for one hundred percent (100%) each of the contract price. The bonds shall be a "Faithful Performance Bond" which shall guarantee the faithful performance of all work and a "Labor and Materials Payment Bond" which shall secure the payment of the claims of labor, mechanics, or materialmen for all work under the Contract pursuant to Section 3247 of the Civil Code.
- 8. The Contractor, the Contractor's heirs, executors, administrators, successors, or assigns guarantee that all work performed under this Agreement fully meets the requirements thereof as to quality of workmanship and materials furnished. If any defects in materials or workmanship become evident within a period of one year from the date of the acceptance of the work by the City Council, the Contractor shall, at his or her own expense, make any repair(s) or replacement(s) necessary to restore the work to full compliance with the Plans and Specifications.

- 9. The Contractor and any agents or subcontractors of the Contractor shall pay the prevailing rates of per diem wages established by the California Department of Industrial Relations. The Contractor and any agents or subcontractors of the Contractor shall also adhere to the California Labor Code, Division 2, Part 7, "Public Works and Public Agencies," and the California Administrative Code, Title 8, Group 3, "Payment of Prevailing Wages upon Public Works," all of which are made a part of the Contract documents.
- 10. The Contractor agrees that he or she and its subcontractors shall maintain and keep books, payrolls, invoices of materials, records on a current basis, and recording all transactions pertaining to this Agreement in a form in accordance with generally acceptable accounting principles. Said books and records shall be made available to the City of Moreno Valley, County, the State of California, the Federal Government and to any authorized representative thereof for purposes of audit and inspection at all reasonable times and places. All such books, payrolls, invoices of materials, and records shall be retained for such periods of time as required by law, provided, however, notwithstanding any shorter period of retention, all books, records, and supporting detail shall be retained for a period of at least three years after expiration of the term of this Agreement.
- 11. Pursuant to California Public Contract Code Section 22300, the Contractor will be permitted the substitution of securities for any monies withheld by the City of Moreno Valley to ensure performance under Contract. At the request and expense of the Contractor, securities equivalent to the amount withheld shall be deposited with the City of Moreno Valley, or with a state or federally chartered bank as the escrow agent, who shall pay such monies to the Contractor. Securities eligible for substitution under this section shall include those listed in Section 16430 of the Government Code, bank or savings and loan certificates of deposit, interest-bearing demand deposit accounts, and standby letters of credit. The Contractor shall be the beneficial owner of any securities substituted for monies withheld and shall receive any dividends or interest thereon. The Contractor shall give the City written notice within thirty (30) days after the Contract is awarded that it desires to substitute securities for money that would ordinarily be withheld. If the substituted securities are deposited into an escrow, the escrow shall be governed by a written escrow Agreement in a form which is substantially similar to the Agreement set forth in Section 22300, of the Public Contract Code.
- 12. The Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend, and save the City of Moreno Valley, the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Moreno Valley (RDA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), its officers, agents, and employees harmless from any and all liability, claims, damages or injuries to any person, including injury to the Contractor's employees and all claims which arise from or are connected with the negligent performance of or failure to perform the work or other obligations of this Agreement, or are caused or claimed to be caused by the negligent acts of the Contractor its officers, agents, employees, sub-contractors or suppliers, and all expenses of investigating and defending against the same; provided, however, that this indemnification and hold harmless shall not include any claims arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City, RDA, and CSD, its officers, agents, or employees.

The obligation to indemnify, defend and hold harmless set forth herein shall include, without limitation, any and all attorney's fees incurred by the party to be indemnified, defended, or held harmless, whether in a judicial or administrative action or in arbitration, and whether the issue is between the parties or involves one or more third parties.

13. The parties do for themselves, their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns agree to the full performance of all of the provisions herein contained. The Contractor may not, either voluntarily or by action of law, assign any obligation assumed by the Contractor hereunder without prior written consent of the City.

14. Should either party bring any legal or equitable action for the purpose of protecting or enforcing its rights under this Agreement, the prevailing party in such action shall recover in addition to all other relief, its reasonable attorney's fees and court costs to be fixed by the court.

In addition to the foregoing award of attorney's fees, the prevailing party shall be entitled to its attorneys' fees incurred in any post judgment proceedings to enforce any judgments in connection with this Agreement. The Provision is separate and several and shall survive the merge of this Provision into any judgment.

- 15. By my signature hereunder, as Contractor, I certify that I am aware of the Provisions of Section 3700, of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the Provisions of that code, and I will comply with such Provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this Agreement.
- 16. The effective date of this Agreement shall be the date of the Award of Contract by the City of Moreno Valley.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

- 3. Authorize the Financial and Administrative Services Director to release the retention to C & C Grading & Paving, Inc., thirty-five (35) calendar days after the date of recordation of the Notice of Completion, if no claims are filed against the project.
- Approve and adopt Resolution No. 2010-93 accepting dedication of property for public right-of-way and accept portions of streets into the City maintained road system.
- 5. Direct the City Engineer to certify the acceptance of said dedication and cause said certification to be recorded at the office of the Recorder of the County of Riverside together with said Resolution.

BACKGROUND

The Street Improvement Program (SIP) for conversion of private streets to public streets is a multi-year Capital Improvement Program to facilitate construction of selected streets. The streets to be improved are selected from a list of streets demonstrating the need for improvement per established review criteria for public road, utility, and public service purposes.

The City Council approved the Fiscal Year 2009/2010 Capital Improvement Plan Budget with the following streets listed for improvements in the SIP: Partida Drive, from Juniper Avenue to Carillo Court; Carillo Court from west end to east end; and Kimberly Avenue, from Wilmot Street to Redlands Boulevard.

The design and construction documents were prepared by in-house staff as a cost saving solution for the City. On May 11, 2010, the City Council awarded the construction contract to C & C Grading & Paving, Inc., for the SIP for Partida Drive, Carillo Court and Kimberly Avenue. A Purchase Order in the amount of \$223,863.49 (the bid amount plus 15% contingency) was issued to the Contractor.

DISCUSSION

C & C Grading & Paving, Inc. completed the SIP for construction of Partida Drive, Carillo Court, and Kimberly Avenue in September 2010. The original contract total was \$194,663.90.

There was one Contract Change Order for this project. Contract Change Order No. 1 (Final) for \$18,386.40 was paid from the project contingency for additional concrete gutter for downstream drainage work. The new contract total, including Contract Change Order No. 1 is \$213,050.30 which is within the approved Purchase Order amount. The improvements were completed within the contract time, and within the project budget, in accordance with the approved contract documents.

The City Council is being asked to adopt the proposed Resolution accepting dedication of property for public right-of-way and accept portions of streets into the City maintained road system.

ALTERNATIVES

1. Accept the work as complete for the Street Improvement Program (SIP) for Partida Drive, Carillo Court, and Kimberly Avenue constructed by C & C Grading & Paving, Inc., 28373 Felix Valdez, Suite A-1, Temecula, CA 92593, direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion within ten (10) calendar days at the office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, as required by Section 3093 of the California Civil Code, authorize the Financial and Administrative Services Director to release the retention to C & C Grading & Paving, Inc., thirty-five (35) calendar days after the date of recordation of the Notice of Completion, if no claims are filed against the project, approve and adopt proposed Resolution accepting dedication of property for public right-of-way and accept portions of streets into the City maintained road system, and direct the City Engineer to certify the acceptance of said dedication and

cause said certification to be recorded at the office of the Recorder of the County of Riverside together with said Resolution. This alternative will result in payment to the Contractor and acceptance of the improvements into the City's maintained road system.

2. Do not accept the work as complete for the Street Improvement Program (SIP) for Partida Drive, Carillo Court, and Kimberly Avenue constructed by C & C Grading & Paving, Inc., 28373 Felix Valdez, Suite A-1, Temecula, CA 92593, do not direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion within ten (10) calendar days at the office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, as required by Section 3093 of the California Civil Code, do not authorize the Financial and Administrative Services Director to release the retention to C & C Grading & Paving, Inc., thirty-five (35) calendar days after the date of recordation of the Notice of Completion, if no claims are filed against the project, do not approve and adopt proposed Resolution accepting dedication of property for public right-of-way and accept portions of streets into the City maintained road system, and do not direct the City Engineer to certify the acceptance of said dedication and cause said certification to be recorded at the office of the Recorder of the County of Riverside together with said Resolution. This alternative will result in delaying payment to the Contractor, delaying acceptance of the improvements into the City's maintained road system, and incurring extra cost to the City.

FISCAL IMPACT

The construction phase of this project was included on the Fiscal Year 2009/2010 Capital Improvements Project Budget and was financed by Measure A funds (Fund 125). The funding for this project was restricted to capital improvements and could not be used for operational activities. There was no impact to the General Fund.

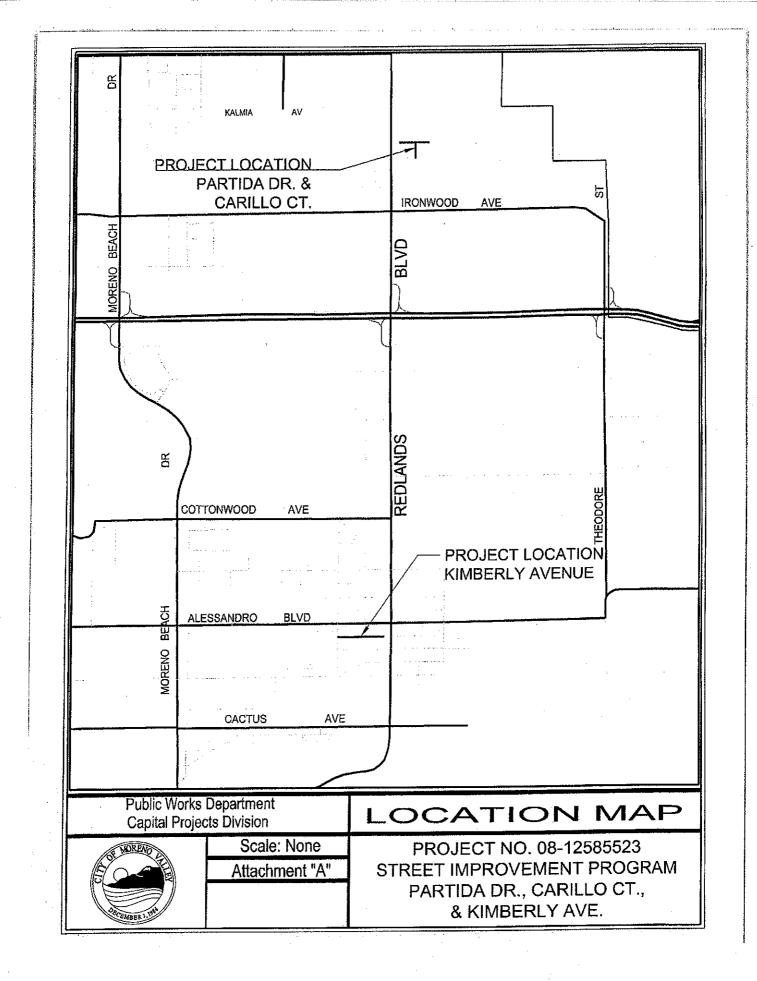

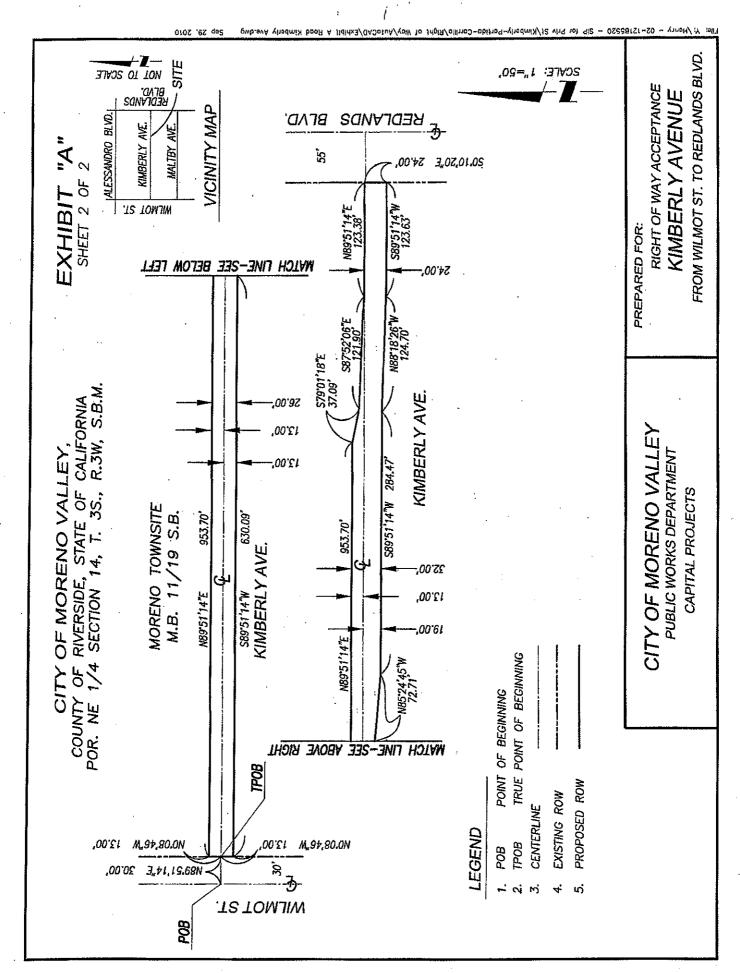

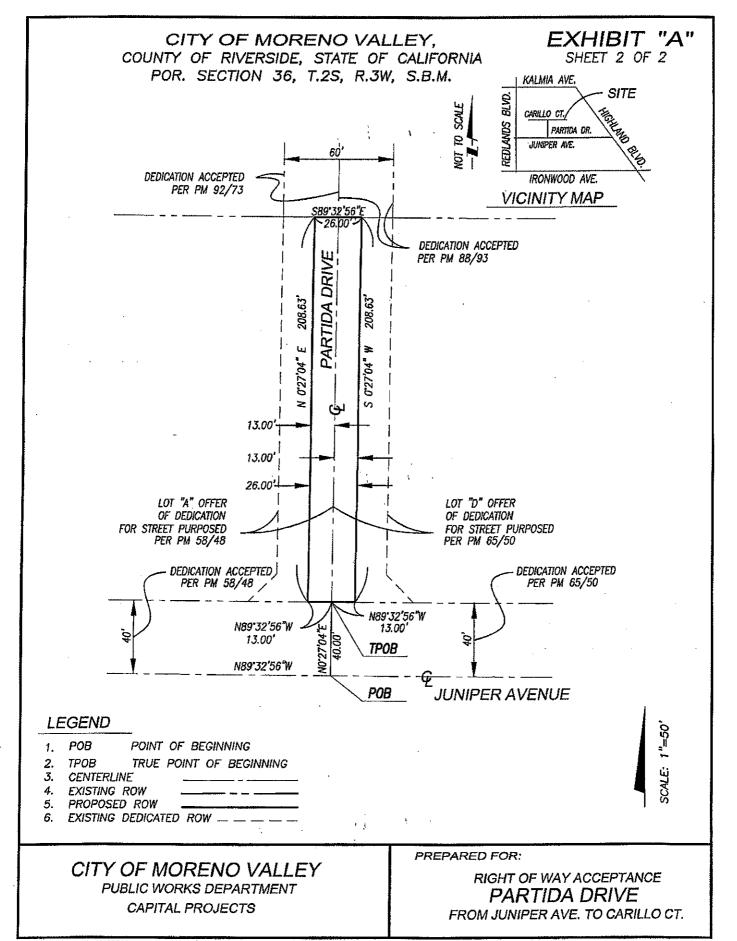

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council:

Approve Resolution No. 2010-94 amending the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility

BACKGROUND

On July 8, 2003, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2003-58 adopting the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges for the City of Moreno Valley Electric Utility, or Moreno Valley Utility (MVU). Electric Rule 12 entitled "Rates and Optional Rates" of that document states that the rates to be charged by and paid to the City's utility for electric service will be the rates legally in effect and on file with the Electric Utility Division, Department of Public Works. At its meeting on December 9, 2003, the City Council approved Ordinances 650 and 651 providing for the establishment and adjustment of electric rates by resolution.

DISCUSSION

Consistent with Ordinances 650 and 651, the resolution considered in this action amends MVU's Electric Rates. A complete copy of the proposed *Electric Rates* document is available for review in the Public Works Department, Electric Utility Division office.

The Energy Resources Surcharge Law went into effect on January 1, 1975. The surcharge is imposed on all customers in the state who consume electricity purchased from an electric utility. All electric utilities are required to collect this surcharge and remit

the funds to the State Board of Equalization on a quarterly basis. The funds are held by the State and are used for ongoing energy programs and energy projects. The surcharge rate is set in a public meeting each November by the California Energy Commission; the 2010 rate is \$0.00022 per kWh. The law does not allow this surcharge to exceed \$0.0003 per kWh. To ensure compliance with the Energy Resources Surcharge Law, it will be necessary for the City Council to approve the billing and collection of the Energy Resources Surcharge.

The impact of this surcharge will be minimal; for example, the Energy Resources Surcharge will add \$0.13 to the utility bill for a residential customer who uses 600 kWh in a month.

Both Schedule C, Large General Service, and Schedule TOU-LGS, Time of Use, Large General Service, include a charge for excess transformer capacity that is set at \$1.00 per kVa per month. Excess transformer capacity is the amount of transformer capacity requested by a customer in excess of what the City would normally advise to be installed to serve the customer's maximum demand. It is recommended that this charge be eliminated as it has been determined that the applicable investor owned utility rate schedules no longer include this charge. The elimination of this charge will impact two customers at this time.

If approved by the City Council, these changes will become effective at 12:00 a.m. on September 29, 2010.

Pursuant to Section 5 of the Professional Services Agreement by and between the City of Moreno Valley and ENCO Utility Services Moreno Valley, LLC, the City is obligated to adjust its rates from time to time so that the City's electric rates remain roughly equivalent to the otherwise applicable investor owned utility rate schedules. The City will still meet its obligation and comply with State law if the Energy Resources Surcharge and the elimination of the excess transformer capacity charge are adopted.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve proposed resolution amending the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility as on file in the Electric Utility Division, Public Works Department. The amendment of the Electric Rates will allow the City's utility to recover its costs for service, and to comply with State law.
- 2. Do not approve proposed resolution amending the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility as on file in the Electric Utility Division, Public Works Department. This would restrict the City's utility in its ability to recover utility costs, and will also put the City's utility in jeopardy of non-compliance with State law.

FISCAL IMPACT

The billing and collection of the Energy Resources Surcharge will have no fiscal impact on the City's utility, as the funds will be collected and remitted to the State Board of Equalization. However, the City will have to remit to the State the surcharge amounts for previous fiscal years, starting from Fiscal Year 2004/2005. The total estimated amount for Fiscal Year 2004/2005 through Fiscal Year 2009/2010 is \$69,335.13, excluding any interest or penalties. There are sufficient funds in the FY 10/11 operating budget for this payment, and there is no impact to the General Fund. The allocated funds below are specifically designated for activities related to power resources and no other purpose.

The elimination of the excess transformer charge will reduce the utility's annual revenue by approximately \$24,550.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

REVENUE DIVERSIFICATION AND PRESERVATION:

The municipal electric utility will generate revenues to provide funding for City programs and services over time. These revenues will help achieve important financial goals of the City.

POSITIVE ENVIRONMENT:

The proposed rate adjustments ensures timely changes to the rates of the City's utility, and helps to create a positive environment for economic development within the community. The City of Moreno Valley will offer competitive rates and will help the City create new, well paying jobs.

WHEREAS, on June 26, 2001, the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley approved Resolution No. 2001-33 and, as amended by Resolution 2002-46, authorized the formation of a municipally owned utility for the purpose of providing electrical power, storm water, telephone telecommunications, cable TV, water, natural gas, and sanitary sewer; and

WHEREAS, on July 8, 2003, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2003-58 adopting the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges document for Moreno Valley Utility which states, in part, that the rates to be charged by and paid to the City for electric service will be the rates legally in effect and on file with the City Council; and

WHEREAS, there are sections of the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges document that contain rules which define the terms and conditions under which electric service will be provided to the customer; and

WHEREAS, there are rules, fees, charges, and rates associated with providing the services identified in the document. These rules, fees, charges, and rates are deemed necessary and equitable for services rendered and are required to fund in whole or in part, all of the services required to facilitate the delivery of electric distribution pursuant to the rules; and

WHEREAS, Urgency Ordinance No. 651 was adopted by the City Council on December 9, 2003, allowing for the adoption of rates by resolution.

CREDIT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley:

- 1. Adopt Resolution 2010-95 authorizing the City's participation in Riverside County's Mortgage Credit Certificate Program, and
- 2. Authorize the Economic Development Director to certify the status of the City's Housing Element.

BACKGROUND

The City of Moreno Valley is a current participant in the County of Riverside's Mortgage Credit Certificate ("MCC Program"), which assists families with the purchase of their first home. The City of Moreno Valley has successfully participated in the MCC Program for several years. In the most recent funding cycle, eight Moreno Valley families became first-time buyers through the MCC Program.

Due to the level of demand and the success of this program in assisting first-time homebuyers, the County is applying to the California Debt Limit Allocation Committee ("CDLAC") for new Mortgage Credit Certificate bond allocation. The County of Riverside ("County") has extended an invitation to the City of Moreno Valley to continue participating in the program. As a participating city, lenders are able to make loans available to MCC-eligible low-to-moderate income, first-time homebuyers purchasing a home in Moreno Valley.

The MCC Program entitles qualified homebuyers ("borrowers") to reduce the amount of their federal income tax liability by an amount equal to a fifteen percent (15%) of the interest paid during the year on a home mortgage loan. Since the taxes paid by the

borrower(s) are reduced, their annual take-home pay is effectively increased. The tax credit allows the homebuyer to qualify for a larger mortgage loan by increasing the effective income of buyer.

Many types of ownership housing is eligible for the MCC Program including foreclosures, new and resale single-family, manufactured homes, townhomes and condominiums. The only exclusion from this program is the purchase of a property which contains more than one unit. The MCC program may be partnered with the City of Moreno Valley's Homebuyer Assistance Program. However, homebuyers can also qualify for the MCC Program on their own through their lender without the City's down payment assistance.

DISCUSSION

Pursuant to the Tax Reform Act of 1986 that established the Mortgage Credit Certificate Program and Division 31, Part 1, Chapter 3.5, Article 3.4 of the California Health and Safety Code Sections 50197 et seq., the Riverside County Board of Supervisors has authorized the County Economic Development Agency ("EDA") to apply to the California Debt Limit Allocation Committee for an allocation of Mortgage Credit Certificates.

To be included in the next funding cycle, the County must provide a resolution from the City that grants the County authority to operate the MCC Program within Moreno Valley. Adoption of the attached resolution (Attachment A) is necessary for the City to continue participation in the County's MCC Program.

ALTERNATIVES

- Adopt the proposed resolution providing for the City of Moreno Valley to remain a
 participant in the Riverside County Mortgage Credit Certificate Program and
 authorize the Economic Development Director to certify the status of the City's
 Housing Element. This will allow income-qualified first-time homebuyers to have an
 additional resource when purchasing a home in the City.
- 2. Decline to adopt the proposed resolution approving the City of Moreno Valley as a participant in the Riverside County Mortgage Credit Certificate Program and decline to authorize the Economic Development Director to certify the status of the City's Housing Element. If the proposed resolution is not adopted, mortgage lenders will be prohibited from utilizing the MCC Program for homes located in Moreno Valley.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no impact to the City's General Fund or the Community Redevelopment Agency budgets. Potential homebuyers receive the MCC directly from the County through a qualified lender.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA APPROVING PARTICIPATION IN THE RIVERSIDE COUNTY MORTGAGE CREDIT CERTIFICATE (MCC) PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the Tax Reform Act of 1986 established the Mortgage Credit Certificate Program ("MCC Program") as a means of assisting qualified individuals with the acquisition of new and existing single family housing; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Division 31, Part 1, Chapter 3.5, Article 3.4 of the California Health and Safety Code Sections 50197 et seg., local issuers are authorized to issue Mortgage Credit Certificates ("Certificates") and administer MCC Program; and

WHEREAS, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution No 87-564 on December 22, 1987 establishing a Mortgage Credit Certificate Program; and

WHEREAS, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors has authorized the Riverside County Economic Development Agency ("EDA") to administer the MCC Program pursuant to the applicable federal, state and local policies and procedures, and to enter into those agreements necessary for administration of the MCC Program; and

WHEREAS, the County of Riverside ("County") will be applying to the California Debt Limit Allocation Committee ("CDLAC") for a mortgage credit certificate allocation in January 2011; and

WHEREAS, the City of Moreno Valley ("City") wishes to participate in the MCC Program administered by the EDA in connection with mortgage loans that will be made available for the acquisition of new and existing single-family housing in Riverside County; and

WHEREAS, the adoption of this resolution is necessary to include the City of Moreno Valley as a participating unit of general government under County's MCC program; and

WHEREAS, the City agrees to cooperate with the County to undertake the MCC program within City jurisdiction to assist persons or households of limited income to purchase new and existing single family residences located in the city; and

WHEREAS, the City by adopting this Resolution, hereby gives notice of its election to participate in the Riverside County MCC Program.

TITLE: Resolution for the Abatement of Public Nuisances

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2010-96 of the City of Moreno Valley, California, confirming assessments on certain real properties as outlined in the Property Assessment List in this staff report for the abatement of nuisances.

BACKGROUND

Pursuant to the provisions of the City of Moreno Valley Municipal Code Chapter 6.04, in order to protect and preserve the health, safety, and general welfare of the public, the City Manager or his designee directs the abatement of various public nuisances and the recovery of costs associated with said abatements. Cost recovery may be achieved by recording a Notice of Special Assessment with the County Recorder's Office.

DISCUSSION

The Property Assessment List for general nuisance abatements is hereby submitted for review and consideration by the City Council. Code and Neighborhood Services staff initiated and completed abatement action of general public nuisances in various locations within the City. The City Attorney's Office also performed one (1) abatement of public nuisance conditions under judicial proceedings that are included in Exhibit 1 to Attachment C.

The County of Riverside equalized tax assessment roll was utilized to determine property ownership. A summary of each abatement is included in the statement of costs, along with the owner's name(s), property description, and the cost for the abatement action. Statement of costs were mailed to the legal owner of record for each property requiring abatement action and a copy of the letter will remain on file in the Community Development Department.

The Property Assessment List is a current listing of unpaid abatement costs incurred during 2009 and 2010. Costs approved by the City Council Resolution will result in a special assessment and will become a levy on the FY 2011/2012 tax bill if not paid directly to the City by July 1, 2011. The Notices of Special Assessment will be recorded at the Riverside County Recorder's Office following approval by the City Council.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Pursuant to Chapter 6.04.100, Council may revise, correct or modify the statement of costs as deemed appropriate.
- 2. Council may approve Staff's report, and adopt the Resolution for the Abatement of Public Nuisances.

FISCAL IMPACT

- Adoption of the resolution would facilitate cost recovery for those costs incurred by the City for public nuisance work performed as outlined in the attached Property Assessment List
- 2. Not adopting the resolution would result in costs for contract abatement work being absorbed by the City for all costs that remain unpaid by the property owners.

As detailed in Exhibit 1, the costs incurred by the City for contractual abatements are outlined below. An additional \$13.00 Special Districts Administration (S.D.A.) fixed charge will be added for each parcel at the time the assessment is placed on the County of Riverside Tax Roll for FY 11/12.

The Property Assessment List, as approved by City Council, is subject to amendment as necessary to reflect any payments subsequently received from property owners. Costs not paid in full by July 1, 2011, will be processed as special assessments and cost recovery will occur through the payment of taxes. The Statement of Costs and Notices of Code Violation Non Compliance for each property shall remain on file in the Community Development Department. If payment, or partial payment, is received from property owners, that portion of the Exhibit(s) will be revised as appropriate.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

- <u>Public Safety</u>. Provide a safe and secure environment for people and property in the community, control the number and severity of fire and hazardous material incidents, and provide protection for citizens who live, work and visit the City of Moreno Valley.
- <u>Positive Environment</u>. Create a positive environment for the development of Moreno Valley's future.
- Community Image, Neighborhood Pride and Cleanliness. Promote a sense of community pride and foster an excellent image about our City by developing and executing programs that will result in quality development, enhanced neighborhood preservation efforts, including home rehabilitation and neighborhood restoration.

SUMMARY

The Code and Neighborhood Services Division and The City Attorney's Office performed public nuisance abatements during 2009 and 2010. These abatements were to remove hazardous and other nuisance conditions from properties. After having been served with a "Notice to Abate" and given a reasonable time for compliance, the property owners failed to voluntarily abate the conditions.

Pursuant to Section 6.04.140, <u>Emergency Abatement</u> – emergency conditions may have been abated without adhering to the provisions referenced in the abatement notification procedures. Such emergencies may include the pumping and securing of accessible pools with stagnant water, securing open and accessible buildings, abating extreme fire hazard conditions, and other similar nuisance conditions that constitute an immediate danger to life or property.

Property owners were served with a Statement of Costs and billed, requesting payment for all costs associated with the City-performed abatement action, by regular mail. Staff is requesting that the City Council authorize the placement of unpaid abatement costs as a special assessment (tax lien) against the properties.

NOTIFICATION

Moreno Valley Municipal Code Section 6.04.060 – <u>Notification of Nuisance</u> provides that written notice of nuisance conditions **may** be given to property owners in the following manner:

By regular mail addressed to the owner or person in charge and control of the property; at the address shown on the last available equalized assessment roll of the County of Riverside; or as otherwise known, by posting a "Notice to Abate" on the property where the nuisance condition(s) exists thereby allowing ten days to comply.

Notification of public nuisance conditions was specifically met by:

- 1. Posting the property with a "Notice to Abate".
- 2. Mailing a "Notice to Abate" by certified and/or regular mail to the property owner.
- 3. Telephone contact with the property owner and/or mortgage company (in the case of vacant properties), when possible.

ABATEMENT OF PUBLIC NUISANCES*

Sections: 6.04.010 Purpose. 6.04.010 Purpose.

This chapter is adopted to declare what constitutes a public nuisance and to establish procedures to abate nuisances and to recover costs of such abatement. It is declared to be in the public interest to promote the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the city by providing a summary procedure for the abatement of nuisances, which abatement procedures shall be in addition to all other proceedings by this code or otherwise by law. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.020 Definitions.

Unless specifically defined in this section, words and phrases used in this chapter shall be interpreted to give them the meaning in common usage and to give this chapter its most reasonable application.

"Abandoned" (vehicle) means any vehicle which has been left on private property or public property in such inoperable or neglected condition that the owner's intention to relinquish all further rights or interests in may be reasonably concluded.

"Abandoned" (building, structure or property) means any property that is vacant and under a current notice of default, notice of trustee's sale or that has been the subject of a foreclosure sale where the title was retained by the beneficiary of a deed of trust involved in the foreclosure, or that is transferred under a deed in lieu of foreclosure or sale.

"Abatement" means the demolition, removal, repair, maintenance, construction, reconstruction, replacement or reconditioning of structures, appliances or equipment; or the removal, transportation, disposal and treatment of waste and abandoned materials and equipment capable of harboring, breeding, or attracting rodents or insects or producing odors or blight.

"Attractive nuisance" means any condition, instrumentality or machine which is unsafe and unprotected and thereby dangerous to young children by reason of their inability to appreciate the peril which exists, and which may reasonably be expected to attract young children to the premises and risk injury by playing with, in, or on it. Attractive nuisances may include, but shall not be limited to: (1) abandoned and/or broken equipment; (2) hazardous pools, ponds, culverts, excavations; and (3) neglected machinery.

"Building" means any structure, including, but not limited to, any house, garage, duplex, apartment, condominium, stock cooperative, mobilehome, or other residential, commercial

or industrial structure or any portion thereof, which is designed, built, rented or leased to be occupied or otherwise is intended for supporting or sheltering any use or occupancy, and any commercial, industrial or other establishment, warehouse, kiosk or other structures affixed to or upon real property, used for the purpose of conducting a business, storage or other activity.

"Construction material" means any discarded material from the building or destruction of structures, roads and bridges, including concrete, rocks, asphalt, plasterboard, wood and other related material.

"Enforcement officer" means the individual designated by the city manager to cause inspections and to take such actions as may be required by the provisions of this chapter for the purpose of enforcing the city's municipal code.

"Garbage" means any putrescible animal, fish, fowl, food, fruit or vegetable matter resulting from the cultivation, preparation, storage, handling, decay or consumption of the substance.

"Hazardous substance" means any chemical compound, mixture, substance or article which is identified or listed by the United States Environmental Protection Agency or appropriate agency of the State of California as a "hazardous waste," as defined in 40 C.F.R. Section 261.33, except that for the purposes of this chapter, hazardous waste also shall include "household waste," as defined in 40 C.F.R. 261.4(B)(1).

"Hearing officer" means the individual appointed by the city manager to hear the appeal on a determination of the existence of a nuisance.

"Improved surface" means a ground surface covered or paved with concrete, asphalt,

brick and mortar, stone and mortar, concrete pavers and mortar and/or such other material as has been approved for parking of vehicles by the community development director in such a manner as is designed to properly support the gross weight of the class of vehicle parked, support all wheels of the vehicle and permanently prohibit both weed growth around and under the vehicle and leakage of oil, fuel and other fluids into the ground.

"Infestation" means the presence, within or contiguous to, a structure or premises of termites, insects, vermin rodents or other pests. If the actual presence of pests cannot be confirmed, the presence of fresh droppings, larvae, eggs, recent rodent holes or other such evidence may be used to identify a current infestation.

"Inoperable vehicle" means any vehicle which cannot be legally operated on a public street because the vehicle lacks an engine, transmission wheels, tires, doors, windshield or any other part or equipment necessary to operate the vehicle safely, or is not currently registered with the California Department of . Motor Vehicles.

"Junk" means any cast-off, damaged, discarded, obsolete, salvaged, scrapped, unusable, worn-out or wrecked object, thing or material including, but not limited to, those composed in whole or in part of asphalt, brick, carbon, cement, plastic or other synthetic substance, fiber, glass, plaster, rubber, terra cotta, wool, cotton, cloth, canvas, wood, metal, sand, organic matter or other substance, crates, cartons, containers, boxes, machinery or parts thereof, scrap metal, furniture or parts thereof, trimmings from plants or trees, cans, bottles and barrels.

"Odor" means any smell, scent or fragrance.

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6.04.030 Declaration of nuisance.

It is unlawful and is declared a nuisance for any person owning, leasing, renting, occupying, charged with the management of or having charge or possession of any property in the city to maintain or fail to maintain the property in such a manner that any of the following conditions are present:

- A. To maintain property containing unsafe buildings, structures or building service equipment as defined in Section 203 of the Uniform Administrative Code as adopted and in force within the city;
- B. To maintain any building or structure in a condition such that it would constitute a "dangerous building" as defined in Section 302 of the Uniform Code for the Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, or as prepared by the International Conference of Building Officials and adopted in force within the city;
- C. To maintain any building, facility, equipment, device or structure in a manner that would constitute a substandard building or condition defined in Chapter 10 of the Uniform Housing Code;
- D. To abandon or permanently vacate, or cause to be abandoned or permanently vacated, any building or structure, so that it becomes accessible to unauthorized persons including, but not limited to, juveniles and vagrants, for unlawful or hazardous use;
- E. To maintain property containing attractive nuisances in the form of:
- 1. Abandoned, damaged or broken equipment, machinery or household items, or
- 2. Unfenced or otherwise unprotected wells, swimming pools, spas, ponds or excavations;
- F. To maintain property, including any sidewalks and parkways adjacent thereto,

containing weeds, dry grasses, dead trees, dead shrubs or any other material which bears seeds of a wingy or downy nature or which by reason of their size, manner of growth or location, constitute a fire hazard or a threat to public health, or containing weeds, vegetation, grasses, trees or shrubs, including but not limited to sagebrush, chaparral, and Russian Thistle (tumbleweed) which, when dry, will in reasonable probability constitute a fire hazard or be blown onto adjoining property by prevailing winds;

- G. To maintain property containing refuse, rubbish, broken or discarded furniture or household equipment visible from the public right-of-way or adjoining properties. This includes, but is not limited to, the keeping of or disposing of or the scattering over the property or premises of any of the following:
 - 1. Junk, trash or debris,
- 2. Abandoned or discarded objects or equipment such as automobiles, furniture, stoves, refrigerators, freezers, cans, boxes or other containers;
- H. To maintain property containing stagnant water, refuse, rubbish, garbage, offal, animal excrement or other waste materials which emit odors that are unreasonably offensive to the physical senses of a normal person(s), or which may cause or attract the migration of insects;
- I. To maintain premises with garbage or trash containers stored in front yards and visible from the public right-of-way, except when in places of collection and at times permitted by Chapter 6.02 of this code. Where the property is a corner lot, this subsection shall apply to storage of garbage and trash containers within those side-yard setbacks which are adjacent to the street;

"Owner" means any person, agent, firm or corporation having legal or equitable interest in the property.

"Person" means an individual, partnership, corporation, association or organization, or agent of any of the foregoing.

"Premises" means any lot or parcel of land upon which a building is situated, including any portion thereof improved or unimproved, and adjacent streets, sidewalks, parkways and parking areas.

"Property" means any lot or parcel of land, including any alley, sidewalk, parkway or unimproved public easement.

"Refuse" means any putrescible and nonputrescible solid waste, except sewerage, whether combustible or noncombustible and includes garbage and rubbish.

"Responsible person" means the owner of record of real property, any occupant, agent, custodian, lessee, manager, user or interested holder in property or premises, including, but not limited to, a trustee or beneficiary who holds a deed of trust to abandoned property; or any other person determined to have caused, committed, or permitted a violation of this code, or any other law, statute, regulation or rule regulating public nuisances.

"Right-of-way" means any area or parcel of property granted, deeded, dedicated to, or otherwise acquired by the city or the public at large for any public purpose including, but not limited to, roadways, alleys, streets, parkways, pedestrian ways, and sidewalks.

"Vacant" or "vacated" means real property not lawfully occupied by or with the consent of the owner or leaseholder of the property.

"Vehicle" means any device by which any person or property may be propelled, moved, or drawn upon a highway or upon water or through the air, excepting a device moved exclusively by human power.

"Weeds" means useless and troublesome plants generally accepted as having no value and frequently of uncontrolled growth. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.030 General provisions.

- A. The provisions of this chapter are applicable to all property located within the city wherein any of the conditions, uses or activities hereafter specified are found to exist.
- B. This chapter shall not apply to any condition expressly allowed or authorized by federal or state law or any other provision of this code.
- C. The list of conditions, uses and activities declared to be public nuisances is not intended to be exclusive and additional conditions, uses or activities may be declared by the city council by amendment of this chapter or any other means authorized by law.
- D. Violations of this chapter shall be treated as strict liability offenses regardless of intent. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.040 Declaration of nuisances.

It is unlawful and is declared a nuisance for any responsible person in the city to maintain or allow another to maintain, or fail to maintain any of the following conditions:

- A. Buildings, structures, facilities, equipment, devices or improvements:
- 1. Maintained in violation of any provision of any comprehensive or uniform building, plumbing, electrical, housing, mechanical or fire code as adopted by the city or enacted by the state of California and codified in the California State Codes or within the California Code of Regulations;

- 2. Maintained in violation of any provision of Title 9 of this code, including, but not limited to, prohibited uses, setback violations, development standards and sign regulations;
- 3. Which have been abandoned, vacated, boarded up, partially destroyed, or left in a state of partial construction or repair for a period exceeding ninety (90) days, or and have become accessible to unauthorized persons including, but not limited to, juveniles, vagrants or persons engaged in illegal, hazardous, drug or gang activity;
- 4. Which have become defective, unsightly, or in such a condition of deterioration or disrepair as the same may cause depreciation of the property values to surrounding properties;
- 5. Upon which the condition of the exterior coating has become so deteriorated as to permit decay, excessive checking, cracking, dry rot, termite infestation, broken windows or warping;
- 6. With graffiti or other words, lettering or drawings not otherwise permitted by the provisions of this code, state or federal law on visible or exterior surfaces;
- 7. Without a connection to a sewer disposal system or sanitary sewer if occupied or with any leaking seeping sewage;
- 8. Without a connection to a permanent electrical service if occupied and such service is available within three hundred (300) feet of the occupied building or structure.
- 9. Without hot water, running water, adequate heating, and electricity if occupied;
- 10. Constructed in violation of any state or local law or regulation relating to the condition, use or maintenance of buildings.
- B. Outdoor storage or maintenance of the following:

- 1. Abandoned, damaged or broken equipment, machinery, household items or appliances;
- 2. Refuse, rubbish, scrap metal, appliances, shopping carts, wood, plant cuttings, broken or discarded furniture or household equipment, junk, trash or debris, parts, cans, boxes or containers;
- 3. Garbage or trash containers stored in a manner so as to be visible from public rights-of-way, except when in places of collections and at times for collection as permitted in this code;
- 4. Any hazardous substance or wasfe product, including, but not limited to biological material, oil, gasoline, automotive fluids, and household chemicals not lawfully stored or which has been discharged, released, placed or deposited upon any premises or onto any public property;
- 5. Construction materials, equipment or machinery in any front yard, front setback or driveway in a residential zone;
- 6. Any materials that are stored or stacked in a manner in which the materials could be discharged into a storm drain system.
- C. Landscaping, vegetation, or improved or unimproved property in any of the following conditions:
- 1. Property, including any sidewalks and parkways adjacent thereto, containing weeds, dry grasses, dead trees, dead shrubs, or any other material which bears seeds of a wingy or downy nature or which by reason of their size, manner of growth or location, constitute a fire hazard or a threat to public health, or containing weeds, vegetation, grasses, trees or shrubs, including, but not limited to sagebrush, chaparral, and Russian Thistle (tumbleweed) which, when dry, will in reasonable

6.04.040 Abatement.

All or any part of any real property, or buildings or structure located thereon, found to constitute a public nuisance as provided in this chapter, shall be abated by rehabilitation, repair, removal or demolition pursuant to the procedures set forth in this chapter. (Ord. 363 § 1.3 (part), 1992)

6.04.050 Authorization for city manager.

The city manager is authorized to adminis-

probability constitute a fire hazard or be blown onto adjoining property by prevailing winds;

- 2. Containing stagnant or standing water, refuse, rubbish, offal, excrement or other waste materials which emit an odor.
- 3. Unimproved surfaces of front and visible side yards not completely landscaped and covered with any combination of ground cover consisting of live plant materials, decorative rock, redwood bark, and/or mulch as long as such covering is consistent with any existing land use approvals, permits, entitlements, contracts or environmental document relating to the property;
- 4. Trees and shrubs containing dead or fallen limbs or branches that may present a safety hazard;
- 5. Trees or shrubs which are overgrown or contain limbs or branches that restrict, impede or obstruct the use of or obscure the visibility of pedestrians or drivers using the public right-of-ways, easements, sidewalks or roadways;
- 6. Overgrown vegetation likely to harbor vermin, insects or rodents of any kind;
- 7. Not conforming to any requirement set forth in any zoning or land use approval, permit, entitlement, contract or environmental document relating to the property.
- D. Vehicles stored, parked, used or maintained in any of the following manners:
- 1. To allow or perform the maintenance, repair, restoration, painting, body work or dismantling of any vehicle, equipment or parts thereof on the exterior portion of any residential property. This prohibition shall not apply to work specifically authorized by state or local law or regulation, and shall not apply to minor repair or maintenance of vehicles which are registered to the person residing on

the property and such repairs or maintenance are not conducted outside for longer than seventy-two (72) consecutive hours;

- 2. Parked or stored on unimproved surfaces;
- 3. Encroaching onto or over any pedestrian pathway or sidewalk or which restrict, impede or obstruct the use of or obscure the visibility of pedestrians or drivers using the public right-of-ways, easements, sidewalks or roadways;
- 4. With accumulations of debris, leaves, weeds or other materials in the areas around and under the vehicle;
- 5. As residential living space or occupancy, including, but not limited to, sleeping, cooking, dining, or bathing.
- 6. Inoperable, abandoned, wrecked, or dismantled vehicles or parts thereof not stored entirely within an enclosed building;
- E. Property containing any of the following:
- 1. Wells, swimming pools, spas, ponds or excavations containing water or any other liquid in excess of twenty four (24) inches in depth at any point and exceeding five thousand (5,000) gallons in capacity which are unfenced or otherwise unprotected with a barrier at least five (5) feet in height;
- 2. Any device, equipment, instrument, vehicle, machinery or animal which creates a loud or unusual noise in violation of Chapter 11.80 of this code;
- 3. Any hazard to the public obstructing the use of or obscuring the visibility of pedestrians or drivers using the public right-of-ways, easements, sidewalks or roadways, including, but not limited to, walls, fences, shrubs, trees, vehicles or structures;
- Walkways, driveways, parking lots and other improved surfaces in a deteriorated or

unsafe condition or with fading required striping or markings;

- 5. An infestation of termites, insects, vermin, rodents or other pests;
- 6. The display or placement upon any fence, wall, tree, bush or any other structure, or portion thereof, of any linens, rugs, fabrics, nylon, or any other item of clothing or similar items except upon a recognized clothes line facility not located in the front yard.
 - 7. Any attractive nuisance;
- 8. Any condition which creates a detriment or hazard to the public health, safety or general welfare as to constitute a public nuisance as defined by California Civil Code Section 3480, California Health & Safety Code Section 11570, California Penal Code Section 11225, or California Government Code Section 39561. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.050 Abatement.

All or any part of any real property, or building or structure located thereon, found to constitute a public nuisance as provided in this chapter, shall be abated by rehabilitation, repair, removal or demolition pursuant to the procedures set forth in this chapter. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.060 Authorization for city manager.

The city manager is authorized to administer and enforce the provisions of this chapter. The city manager may appoint and authorize one or more members of the city staff to act as his designee to administer or enforce this chapter. In the context of this chapter, the phrase "city manager" includes each and all persons designated by the city manager to assist in the administration and enforcement

of this chapter, as limited by the terms of the delegation. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.070 Authority to inspect.

- A. Enforcement officers are authorized to enter upon any property or premises within the city to ascertain whether or not a nuisance as defined in this chapter exists, and to make any examination and surveys as may be necessary in the performance of their enforcement duties.
- B. Inspections may include the taking of measurements, photographs, samples or other physical evidence.
- C. All inspections will be made only after having been given consent to inspect from a responsible person or after having obtained an administrative inspection warrant pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure Section 1822.50 et seq.
- D. Inspections of exterior conditions of property may be made from public property or from the private property of another with consent without obtaining a warrant or the consent of the occupant of the observed property. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.080 Notification of nuisance.

- A. When the city manager or authorized representative thereof determines that any condition on property within the city constitutes a nuisance as declared in Section 6.04.040, such person shall give written notice to abate to responsible person(s), as identified on public records or tax rolls, ordering the abatement of said nuisance.
- B. The notice to abate shall contain the following information:
- 1. The name of the record owner of the property;

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- 2. The date of the inspection;
- 3. The date of the violation(s);
- 4. The street address, assessor's parcel number or other definite description of the location where the violation(s) exist;
 - 5. The code sections violated;
- 6. A description of the condition of the property creating the nuisance;
- 7. A list of necessary corrections to bring the property into compliance;
- 8. A reasonable time limit for correction based upon the nature of the nuisance;
- 9. A reference to the potential consequences for failure to abate the nuisance by the specified time period;
- 10. An order prohibiting the continuation or repeated occurrence of the nuisance;
- 11. The name and signature of the enforcement officer; and,
 - 12. Notice of the right to appeal.
- C. Notice required by this chapter may be served in any of the following manners:
- 1. Personal service on the responsible person;
- 2. Regular mail addressed to the responsible person, at the address shown on the last available assessment roll, or as otherwise known and posting in a conspicuous place on the premises or abutting the right-of-way;
- 3. Insertion of a legal advertisement at least once a week for a period of two weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the city. The newspaper advertisement shall be a general notice that property in the city has been posted and contain a general statement of the effect of such postings.
- D. Failure of any person to receive a copy of any notice issued pursuant to this chapter shall not affect the validity of any proceedings or actions taken under this chapter.

E. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed or interpreted to require the issuance of a notice to abate as a prerequisite to the issuance of an administrative citation or the filing of any civil action or criminal complaint. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.090 Appeals.

- A. Within ten (10) days from the date of serving the notice to abate, the person to whom notice was given may file an appeal of the nuisance finding to the city manager. Such appeal shall be in writing and shall identify the property subject to the notice to abate.
- B. Failure to file a timely appeal shall constitute a waiver of all rights to an administrative appeal hearing and adjudication of the notice to abate or any portion thereof.
- C. The city manager shall then appoint a hearing officer to hear the appeal, which hearing officer may not be an employee of the city.
- D. Notice of the date and time of the hearing shall be given in writing. The date of the hearing shall be no sooner than five (5) days from the date when the notice of the hearing is given to the appellant and to the enforcement officer.
- E. The hearing shall be conducted within twenty (20) days from the filing of the appeal or at such later date as may be agreed to by both appellant and the city.
- F. At the time of the hearing, the hearing officer shall hear testimony of all competent persons desiring to testify and review all documents, photographs or other evidence respecting the condition constituting the nuisance.
- G. The hearing officer has the authority to determine the relevance of any evidence and

to exclude unduly repetitious and cumulative evidence or testimony and may consider hearsay evidence.

- H. If the appellant fails to attend the hearing, the hearing will proceed without the appellant and he or she will be deemed to have waived his or her rights to present evidence or testimony at the hearing.
- I. At the conclusion of the hearing, the hearing officer shall determine whether or not a nuisance exists. If a determination is made supporting the finding of a nuisance, the appellant shall be served a written notice of the hearing officer's decision pursuant to 6.04.080(C), directing the abatement of the nuisance within ten (10) days or within such time as the hearing officer has determined is reasonable.
- J. The decision of the hearing officer is final. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.100 Abatement by city.

If the nuisance is not completely abated by the owner, as directed, within the time set forth above, the city manager may cause the same to be abated by city personnel or private contract, and entry upon the premises is expressly authorized for such persons. Consent must be obtained from a responsible person(s) prior to entering private property to perform an abatement, or an administrative inspection or abatement warrant must be obtained as required by law. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.110 Emergency abatement.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, whenever the city manager determines that any real property or any building, structure or condition thereon is dangerous or constitutes an immediate threat to public health or safety, the city manager may, without being required to observe the provisions of this chapter with reference to abatement procedures and notice, immediately and forthwith abate such public nuisance. Where such condition and the abatement is immediately required, the city manager shall prepare a statement of costs in respect thereto, and the provisions of Sections 6.04.120 and 6.04.130 shall apply. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.120 Abatement costs.

A. Whenever any person creating, causing, committing or maintaining a public nuisance, as referred to in this chapter or in Section 1.01.250 of this code, or other public nuisance, as defined under state law or other ordinance or regulation, has been given notice, by or on behalf of the city attorney, enforcement officer, or by any other city officer, employee or policing agent authorized to give such notice, to abate such nuisance or cease and desist from continuing such nuisance or violation of law, and such person who was given notice fails, refuses or neglects to comply with the notice within the time specified therein, or if such a time is not specified, then within a time reasonably sufficient to enable such compliance, such noncomplying person shall be liable to the city for any and all costs and expenses to the city involved in thereafter abating the nuisance and in obtaining compliance with or enforcing the law as referred to or encompassed in the notice.

B. Costs and expenses, as referred to in subsection A of this section may include, but are not limited to, any and all direct costs and expenses related to such things as personnel salaries and benefits, operational overhead, rent, interest, fees for experts or consultants,

(Moreno Valley 8-08)

research fees, legal costs or expenses, including, but not limited to, procedures associated with collecting moneys due hereunder.

- C. In any action, administrative proceeding, or special proceeding to abate a nuisance, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recovery of attorney's fees. The recovery of attorney's fees is limited solely to causes of action directly associated with the abatement of a public nuisance. In no action, administrative hearing, or special proceeding shall an award of attorney's fees to a prevailing party exceed the amount of reasonable attorney's fees incurred by the city in the action or proceeding. Such attorney's fees shall be recoverable as costs of abatement.
- D. Upon the completion of any abatement pursuant to this chapter, the city manager shall cause a statement of the costs thereof to be prepared for submission to the city council. The city manager shall set a time and place for the city council to receive and consider the statement of costs, and shall serve upon the responsible person(s) a copy of the statement of costs and a notice of the time and place at which the city council will receive and consider the statement of costs. Service shall be in the same manner as set forth in Section 6.04.080(C).
- E. The costs of abatement of a nuisance, as confirmed by resolution of the city council, shall constitute a special assessment against the property to which it relates, and after its recording, as thus made and confirmed, the same shall constitute a lien on the property in the amount of such assessment. After the confirmation of the statement, a copy thereof shall be recorded in the official records of Riverside County and shall be transmitted to the assessor and tax collector of the county of Riverside by the city clerk. Whereupon it

- shall be the duty of the assessor and tax collector to add the amount of such assessment, or assessments, to the next regular bills of taxes levied against the respective lot or parcel of land, and thereafter the amount shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as ordinary real property taxes are collected, and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure for foreclosure and sale in the case of delinquency as provided for ordinary real property taxes.
- F. At the time and place set for receiving and considering the statement of costs, the city council shall hear and pass upon the statement together with any objections or protests raised by any of the persons liable to be assessed for the cost of abating the nuisance. Thereupon, the city council may make any such revision, correction or modification to the statement of costs as it may deem appropriate, after which the statement as submitted, or as revised, corrected or modified, shall be confirmed by resolution. Such hearing may be continued from time to time. The decision of the city council shall be final.
- G. The provisions of this section shall also apply to any responsible person who received a notice, as specified therein, and thereafter the nuisance or violation was abated, but such person subsequently allowed or was responsible for recurrence of the nuisance or violation.
- H. In any action or proceeding involving a violation of any provision of this chapter, the city attorney, in his or her sole discretion and as part of settlement negotiations, may reduce, eliminate or waive any fines, fees, penalties or interest incurred pursuant to this chapter. Any determination or decision of the city attorney in this regard shall be final and

conclusive and shall not be subject to appeal as prescribed in Chapter 2.02 of this code.

I. Moneys due to the city pursuant to this section may be recovered in an appropriate civil action. Alternatively, such liability may be enforced by special assessment proceedings against the parcel of land upon which the nuisance existed, which proceedings may be conducted in a manner substantively similar to proceedings described in Sections 39574, et seq. of the government code of the state relating to weed abatement assessments. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.130 Alternatives.

Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed to prevent the city from commencing a criminal action, civil action or other judicial or administrative proceeding to abate the alleged nuisance or to obtain any other appropriate remedy in addition to, as an alternative to, or in conjunction with the procedures authorized by this chapter. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends the City Council:

- Approve the Justice Assistance Grant funding of an additional School Resource Officer position at Rancho Verde High School and adopt Resolution No. 2010-97 authorizing the acceptance of the grant.
- Approve the Memo of Understanding (MOU) between the city of Moreno Valley and the Val Verde Unified School District (VVUSD) for the 2010/2011 school year.
- 3. Approve the third amended contract between the city of Moreno Valley and County of Riverside approving the one SRO position.
- 4. Authorize the appropriation to the General Fund amount awarded in the grant in the amount of \$500,000 to fund one SRO position for a period of three (3) years. The project and award period will be from August 1, 2010 through July 31, 2013. There will be no matching funds required.

ADVISORY BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

On February 20, 2009, the City of Moreno Valley and City Council member, Richard A. Stewart requested earmark funding from Congresswoman Mary Bono Mack's office. The request was an attempt to combat homegrown gangs within the city. After receiving information to continue into the application process, Chief of Police John Anderson was instructed by City Council to process a grant application through the Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs' Assistance.

BACKGROUND

Traditionally, Moreno Valley gangs have been defined by their geographical boundaries within the city limits. A change from traditional turf gangs has created new gangs that integrate throughout the city. These gangs now claim the city limit boundaries as their territory, which has caused rival gangs to come into conflict. This has created a rise in violence between the gangs in public areas and within the schools. Rancho Verde High School is on the southern most border of the City of Moreno Valley. Its school population is comprised of not only students from Moreno Valley but also includes students that reside in the city of Perris. With this intermingled student population, new gangs have formed on the south end of the city that also involves criminal activity from both cities. With the lack of a SRO at Rancho Verde High School, the basic identification of the numerous newly formed gangs has gone unchecked. Further, the identification of the gang members has been virtually impossible.

DISCUSSION

As of recent, there has been an influx of gang related violence. The Police Department has noticed over the past six months an increase in gang violence between gang members of different ethnic groups. This, coupled with traditional gang narcotic activity that leads to violence has presented a spike in gang issues. The current issues consist of four gang homicides this year, an increase in drive-by shootings, some of which resulted in serious injuries, carjackings, and robberies involving suspected gang members.

One example of an effort to combat these issues of late, the Moreno Valley Police Department conducted "Operation Safe Parks" which resulted in numerous arrests varying from illicit narcotic activity to misdemeanor warrant services, and completing field interviews on more than eighty known gang members.

SOLUTION:

The ultimate success of any gang team is the identification of the gang and its participants. Due to fiscal constraints, the Val Verde Unified School District does not have assigned School Resource Officers. The result has been homegrown gangs have been able to flourish at Rancho Verde High School and the south end of Moreno Valley. The assignment of a SRO at that school site will not only curb crime at that school site but will aide in the identification of gang activity in this residential area. Additionally, because of the remote location of Rancho Verde High School, it is often difficult to respond to the school's area because of heavy school related traffic. An officer prepositioned on the south end of the city will serve for a quick response if and when an after school altercation occurs. By placing an officer at Rancho Verde High School criminal activity could be averted by the presence of a uniformed officer. With the

assignment of a full-time officer, the final objective would be to greatly enhance a safe, secure and peaceful learning environment.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve recommendation from staff for the requested position.
- 2. Provide staff with additional direction.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no impact on the General Fund. The 2010 Justice Assistance Grants (JAG) funding would cover the whole cost. The award period of the grant is for the period of August 1, 2010 through July 31, 2013

Due to the latest illicit increase in gang activity and violence occurring in public places and within our school system, the potential for this violence to continue to rise and impact our communities is a true threat. Therefore, this additional School Resource Officer position will be used as an effort to curb gang violence and enhance the quality of life in our communities. The Moreno Valley Police Department is a pro-active police department. By approving the requested increase staffing, this will provide coverage to one of the cities most challenging high schools and surrounding community and will serve to provide comprehensive gang identification and suppression.

Categorical Exclusion for City of Moreno Valley

The Edward Byrne Memorial Discretionary Grants Program helps local communities improve the capacity of local justice systems and provides for national support efforts. Awards under this program will be used to effectively plan, manage, and allocate resources to encourage information sharing to reduce the incidence of crime and drug abuse, to provide responsive law enforcement services to enhance local courts, and to enhance local corrections and offender reentry.

None of the following activities will be conducted whether under the Office of Justice Programs federal action or a related third party action:

- (1) New construction.
- (2) Renovation or remodeling of a property either (a) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places or (b) located within a 100-year flood plain.
- (3) A renovation which will change the basic prior use of a facility or significantly change its size.
- (4) Research and technology whose anticipated and future application could be expected to have an effect on the environment.
- (5) Implementation of a program involving the use of chemicals.

Consequently, the subject federal action meets the Office of Justice Programs' criteria for a categorical exclusion as contained in paragraph 4(b) of Appendix D to Part 61 of the Code of Federal Regulations. Additionally, the proposed action is neither a phase nor a segment of a project which when reviewed in its entirety would not meet the criteria for a categorical exclusion.

Congratulations on your recent award. In establishing financial assistance programs, Congress linked the receipt of Federal funding to compliance with Federal civil rights laws. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice is responsible for ensuring that recipients of financial aid from OJP, its component offices and bureaus, the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) comply with applicable Federal civil rights statutes and regulations. We at OCR are available to help you and your organization meet the civil rights requirements that come with Justice Department funding.

Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs

As you know, Federal laws prohibit recipients of financial assistance from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded programs or activities, not only in respect to employment practices but also in the delivery of services or benefits. Federal law also prohibits funded programs or activities from discriminating on the basis of age in the delivery of services or benefits.

Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals

In accordance with Department of Justice Guidance pertaining to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, recipients of Federal financial assistance must take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP). For more information on the civil rights responsibilities that recipients have in providing language services to LEP individuals, please see the website at http://www.lep.gov.

Ensuring Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations

The Department of Justice has published a regulation specifically pertaining to the funding of faith-based organizations. In general, the regulation, Participation in Justice Department Programs by Religious Organizations; Providing for Equal Treatment of all Justice Department Program Participants, and known as the Equal Treatment Regulation 28 C.F.R. part 38, requires State Administering Agencies to treat these organizations the same as any other applicant or recipient. The regulation prohibits State Administering Agencies from making award or grant administration decisions on the basis of an organization's religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors.

The regulation also prohibits faith-based organizations from using financial assistance from the Department of Justice to fund inherently religious activities. While faith-based organizations can engage in non-funded inherently religious activities, they must be held separately from the Department of Justice funded program, and customers or beneficiaries cannot be compelled to participate in them. The Equal Treatment Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs funded by the Department of Justice are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion. For more information on the regulation, please see OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/etfbo.htm.

State Administering Agencies and faith-based organizations should also note that the Safe Streets Act, as amended; the Victims of Crime Act, as amended; and the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act, as amended, contain prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of religion in employment. Despite these nondiscrimination provisions, the Justice Department has concluded that the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) is reasonably construed, on a case-by-case basis, to require that its funding agencies permit faith-based organizations applying for funding under the applicable program statutes both to receive DOJ funds and to continue considering religion when hiring staff, even if the statute that authorizes the funding program generally forbids considering of religion in employment decisions by grantees.

Questions about the regulation or the application of RFRA to the statutes that prohibit discrimination in employment may be directed to this Office.



Enforcing Civil Rights Laws

All recipients of Federal financial assistance, regardless of the particular funding source, the amount of the grant award, or the number of employees in the workforce, are subject to the prohibitions against unlawful discrimination. Accordingly, OCR investigates recipients that are the subject of discrimination complaints from both individuals and groups. In addition, based on regulatory criteria, OCR selects a number of recipients each year for compliance reviews, audits that require recipients to submit data showing that they are providing services equitably to all segments of their service population and that their employment practices meet equal employment opportunity standards.

Complying with the Safe Streets Act or Program Requirements

In addition to these general prohibitions, an organization which is a recipient of financial assistance subject to the nondiscrimination provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act (Safe Streets Act) of 1968, 42 U.S.C. § 3789d(c), or other Federal grant program requirements, must meet two additional requirements:(1) complying with Federal regulations pertaining to the development of an Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP), 28 C.F.R. § 42.301-.308, and (2) submitting to OCR Findings of Discrimination (see 28 C.F.R. §§ 42.205(5) or 31.202(5)).

1) Meeting the EEOP Requirement

In accordance with Federal regulations, Assurance No. 6 in the Standard Assurances, COPS Assurance No. 8.B, or certain Federal grant program requirements, your organization must comply with the following EEOP reporting requirements:

If your organization has received an award for \$500,000 or more and has 50 or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare an EEOP and submit it to OCR for review within 60 days from the date of this letter. For assistance in developing an EEOP, please consult OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm. You may also request technical assistance from an EEOP specialist at OCR by dialing (202) 616-3208.

If your organization received an award between \$25,000 and \$500,000 and has 50 or more employees, your organization still has to prepare an EEOP, but it does not have to submit the EEOP to OCR for review. Instead, your organization has to maintain the EEOP on file and make it available for review on request. In addition, your organization has to complete Section B of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

If your organization received an award for less than \$25,000; or if your organization has less than 50 employees, regardless of the amount of the award; or if your organization is a medical institution, educational institution, nonprofit organization or Indian tribe, then your organization is exempt from the EEOP requirement. However, your organization must complete Section A of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

2) Submitting Findings of Discrimination

In the event a Federal or State court or Federal or State administrative agency makes an adverse finding of discrimination against your organization after a due process hearing, on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex, your organization must submit a copy of the finding to OCR for review.

Ensuring the Compliance of Subrecipients

If your organization makes subawards to other agencies, you are responsible for assuring that subrecipients also comply with all of the applicable Federal civil rights laws, including the requirements pertaining to developing and submitting an EEOP, reporting Findings of Discrimination, and providing language services to LEP persons. State agencies that make subawards must have in place standard grant assurances and review procedures to demonstrate that they are effectively monitoring the civil rights compliance of subrecipients.

The City of Moreno Valley will prevent and combat juvenile delinquency, substance abuse, and violence in relation to gang activity in areas near Rancho Verde High School. Because of the remote location of the school, response times to criminal activity have been delayed, resulting in growing concerns among school administrators and the community. Through the grant, the Moreno Valley Police Department will fund a full time school resource officer who will provide law enforcement services for incidents involving students on or around the school campus. Overtime costs associated with policing of after school events will also be NCA/NCF

Statement of the Problem

The City of Moreno Valley is a fast growing multi-cultural community with a host of problems that are central to its school system. The city currently has two separate school districts, Moreno Valley Unified School District and Val Verde Unified School District. Within these two school districts there are five conventional high schools, two alternative education high schools, and eight middle schools. The Moreno Valley Unified School District has a full compliment of School Resource Officers that are able to monitor and maintain the district's school sites. The Val Verde Unified School District, with one of the city's largest high schools (Rancho Verde High School) and two middle schools, does not have an assigned officer to monitor the school's daily activity. To further exacerbate the problem, the school is situated on the city's southern most border. The street where the school is situated is a wide street capable of handling large volumes of traffic. At the cities border, the road narrows and creates a "choke point" causing major traffic congestion in front of the school. The congestion makes it near impossible for a patrol deputy to quickly respond to the school as an emergency situation arises.

Rancho Verde High School is located within the city limits of Moreno Valley and is bordered by the City of Perris to its south. The school's student population is diverse, with the majority of its students from the City of Perris. Because of the diverse population and its remote location, a multitude of problems could be quickly averted and monitored by the assignment of a full time School Resource Officer.

While the City of Moreno Valley continues to grow, part of the developing problem has become "homegrown" gangs. While some homegrown gangs do exist in Moreno Valley, the City

experiences a phenomenon in which gang members from other jurisdictions move into our community and network with members of other gangs with which they would typically be at odds. The Moreno Valley Police Department (MVPD) has identified most of the gangs in our city as well as many of the individual gang members. The police department estimates that there are currently 10 local gangs, with about 500 members in the community, and as many as 1,000 gang members from other jurisdictions.

The Perris Police Department has similar gang affiliation estimates for their city. Their department estimates five different pronounced gangs with an approximate membership base of 450. The number, though relatively close to the MVPD numbers, is amplified by the fact that the Perris area has half the population and assigned law enforcement strength.

Two of the most pronounced gangs have grown from the area near Rancho Verde High School. With the lack of law enforcement presence at Rancho Verde High School, the MVPD lacks the ability to monitor the new emerging gang activity. Furthermore, the two groups have grown virtually unchecked with the members largely unidentified. The two gangs, one comprised of Black male juveniles and one comprised of Hispanic male juveniles, have become an increasing force within the city. Not only do the two groups actively oppose each other, they have become a tremendous source of activity as they continue to grow and gain power. The two gangs continue to struggle with the gangs currently in place within the city's confines in an attempt to gain strength and power. With the presence of a School Resource Officer at Rancho Verde High School, the identification of the membership will not only serve to stem the growth of the groups, but will also serve to directly confront the criminal behavior.

The City of Perris, south of the city limits of Moreno Valley, has its own gang activity. With the emergence of the two dominate gangs at Rancho Verde High School; four juvenile homicides have resulted from the rival gang activity, directly attributed to the two new gangs from the south end of Moreno Valley. All of these recent homicides have gone unsolved at this time.

Because of the location of Rancho Verde High School, when criminal activity presents itself at or around the school site, there is an extended response time from the Moreno Valley Police Department. Often times, a crime will go unreported and uninvestigated because of the response time to the school site. An example of this fact from the 2009/10 school year, Moreno Valley Unified School District school resource officers have handled between 400 and 600 calls for service, per officer, during this school year. Rancho Verde High School has generated less than 100 calls for service this school year.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The goal of this project is to prevent and combat juvenile delinquency, reduce violence, gang involvement, alcohol, tobacco, and drug abuse to the students and staff at Rancho Verde High School with one full time presence of a Deputy Sheriff/Police Officer as a School Resource Officer (SRO). This Deputy/SRO will provide law enforcement services for incidents involving violations for criminal code violations occurring on or around the school campus where students are involved.

By placing an officer at Rancho Verde High School criminal activity could be averted by the presence of a uniformed officer. With the assignment of a full-time officer, the final objective would be to greatly enhance a safe, secure and peaceful learning environment.

PROGRAM EVALUATION

The Moreno Valley Police Department currently has a large School Resource Unit (SRU). Within the unit, there are currently nine School Resource Officers (SRO) and one Youth Accountability Team (YAT) officer. The current SRO's are assigned to and funded by the Moreno Valley Unified School District. The additional SRO we are proposing, will work at Rancho Verde High School, a school within the Val Verde Unified School District. This school district has no School Resources Officers currently assigned and no funding available to bring them to the school district.

With an already well established Moreno Valley Police Department School Resource Unit, the data collection process is already in place. On a daily basis an SRO will make numerous contacts with subjects in and around the school's campus. These contacts are monitored in the form of generating a call for service to assist in statistical gathering. These contacts are documented in the form of a written log. On a weekly basis, the SRO will turn in statistics that culminate the week's activities. This information is then placed into a database whereby the numbers or activity can be easily monitored and retrieved.

It is anticipated the numbers will be initially high due to the lack of a presence in the past. However, with the regular presence and ongoing mentoring on the officer's behalf, improvement in the form of lower statistical data is anticipated.

The data normally monitored is as follows:

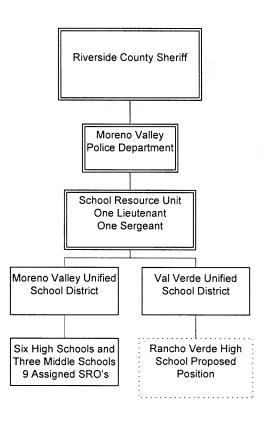
- a. Students Counseled
- b. Daytime Curfew Violations
- c. Weapons Recovered (firearms, knives, brass knuckles, etc.)
- d. Drug and Alcohol violations (to include possession of tobacco products)
- e. Fights
- f. Miscellaneous calls for service (criminal violations)
- g. Traffic Violations

In addition to the items listed above, documentation on gang participation is monitored. The City of Moreno Valley has recently instituted the Gang Intervention for Teens (GIFT) program. With the assistance of the MVPD School Resources Unit, information is gathered by SRO's regarding the identification of gang members and associates. The GIFT program identifies and coordinates an officer response to an identified gang participant's home as part of a diversion program. While at the home, the family is notified of their child's affiliation with a gang. The GIFT program attempts to divert the child's gang activity by informing the family of alternatives and soliciting their involvement.. In some cases, the GIFT program has made the parents aware and has shown the family how to identify key indicators to their child's participation when they may have otherwise gone unaware.

Although there is an awareness of gang activity at Rancho Verde High School, without the services of a School Resource Officer, many gang members have gone unidentified. In many cases, simple identification with a gang acts as a diversion from the behavior. As initial implementation of the gang member identification process, statistical numbers will grow. When the initial numbers are gathered, a base line will be established. It has been proven that simple identification tends to stem gang activity.

PROJECT MANAGEMENT STRUCTURE

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department provides law enforcement services to the City of Moreno Valley under contractual agreement between the City and the County of Riverside. Furthermore, the Riverside County Sheriff's Office provides nine officers/deputies acting as School Resource Officers to the Moreno Valley Unified School District through a contractual agreement.

ORGANIZATIONAL CAPABILITY

The City of Moreno Valley and the Moreno Valley Police Department have entered into a collaborative effort to locate, apply for, and eventually receive millions of dollars in various local, state and federal grants. As a result, the City and the Moreno Valley Police Department have applied for, been awarded, and managed funds from numerous local, state, and federal agencies. The grants, again in a collaborative effort, are monitored and managed between the city and the police department. The City and the Moreno Valley Police Department collaboratively monitor expenditures, disbursement, and reimbursement of funds. The Moreno Valley Police Department is currently managing approximately \$1,138,105.00 in grants, funding 9 separate law enforcement programs. The Moreno Valley Police Department provides the resources by means of equipment and manpower to properly administer the grant as required by each grant's particular needs. In the case of this particular grant, the City will allocate funds as required to subsidize the School Resource Officer (SRO) at Rancho Verde High School. The SRO will be a fully trained deputy sheriff. He/she will receive school specific training by means of California Police Officer Standardized Training (POST) for a School Resource Officer. The SRO will attend School Resource Officer Training and will attend the California School Resource Officer Training on an annual basis to receive training updates on current trends in juvenile delinquency and related SRO functions.

The School Resource Officer supervisor (Sergeant) will monitor the SRO's daily activity and assimilate applicable statistics to ensure proactive law enforcement at the school site. Further, the SRO's activities will provide a safe learning environment for the staff and students on

campus. The SRO supervisor will gather and maintain time and mileage statistics to ensure cost

effective expenditures of grant funds.

COORDINATION WITH STATE ADMINISTRATIVE AGENCY

This application is not subject to review by the state, therefore no coordination has been

completed to date.

BUDGET AND BUDGET NARRATIVE

The Moreno Valley Police Department is proposing the addition of a full time School Resource

Officer at Rancho Verde High School. The change in population in the school's district and the

increased call volume in the area necessitates the acquisition of this new position. The current

school population at Rancho Verde High School is 3200 students and is expected to grow to

approximately 3700 students during the 2010/2011 school year. The goal of having an assigned

full time School Resource Officer is to provide law enforcement services to the campus. This

will include enforcement and intervention of increased gang activity and juvenile delinquency at

the school site and surrounding area. An on site officer will be able to identify, investigate and

resolve most of the juvenile behaviors.

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department provides law enforcement services to the City of

Moreno Valley under contractual agreement between the City and the County of Riverside.

Furthermore, the Riverside County Sheriff's Office through the City of Moreno Valley provides

officers/deputies to the school district through a contractual agreement. The current contract rate

for a sworn Deputy Sheriff is \$67.77 per hour. The assigned School Resource Officer will work

1440 hours during the normal school year, for a period of three school years. The assigned

School Resource Officer will work with the school at various extracurricular events, not limited to, but including football games, basketball games, miscellaneous school activities and graduations. Because of the schools remote location, diverse population, and volume of subjects in the audience, a team of deputies is required for large events such as football games and graduations. Driven by current policies and procedures within the Moreno Valley Police Department, five officers and one sergeant are required for these large events. In this light, an overtime deputy will be billed at a rate of \$54.39 per overtime hour, and a sergeant will be billed at \$80.02 per overtime hour.

The personnel cost of the sworn School Resource Officer is based on FY10/11 rates plus anticipated increases of 5% per year for the three year grant period. (See below for anticipated estimates).

The FY 2010 Congressionally Selected Awards Program will contribute \$427,892.74 toward the salary cost of the School Resource Officer for a period of three years. Other expenses included within this amount will include mileage and training. Mileage expenses are estimated at 30 miles per day for 180 school days at \$.88 per mile x 3 years = \$14,256.00. An estimated training budget has been established of \$2600.00 for the SRO's attendance to the POST certified School Resource Officer Academy, the California School Resource Officer Training seminar, and miscellaneous drug, alcohol, and gang training as they are announced.

Because of the contractual agreement between the County and the City, the City of Moreno Valley provides sworn deputies as School Resource Officers to the school districts.

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One 1440 hour Deputy Sheriff/Police Officer will serve as a School Resource Officer and will provide law enforcement services for incidents involving violations for criminal code violations occurring on the Rancho Verde High School campus and its surrounding area.

MATCHING FUNDS

Applicants for the FY 2009 Congressionally Selected Awards are not required to provide matching funds.

BUDGET DETAIL WORKSHEET

A. Personnel -

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department provides law enforcement services to the City of Moreno Valley under contractual agreement between the City and the County of Riverside. Furthermore, the Riverside County Sheriff's Office through the City of Moreno Valley provides officers/deputies to the school district through a contractual agreement. The current contract rate for a sworn Deputy Sheriff is \$67.77 per hour. The assigned School Resource Officer will work 1440 hours during the normal school year, for a period of three school years.

The personnel cost of the sworn School Resource Officer is based on FY10/11 rates plus anticipated increases of 5% per year for the three year grant period. (See below for anticipated estimates).

The FY 2010 Congressionally Selected Awards Program will contribute \$323,049.00 toward the salary cost of the School Resource Officer for a period of three years. Other expenses not included within this amount will include mileage and training. Mileage expenses are estimated at 30 miles per day for 180 school days at \$.88 per mile x 3 years = \$14,256.00. An estimated training budget has been established of \$2600.00 for the SRO's attendance to the POST certified School Resource Officer Academy, the California School Resource Officer Training seminar, and miscellaneous drug, alcohol, and gang training as they are announced. The SRO will attend other classes as they become available.

Because of the contractual agreement between the County and the City, the City of Moreno Valley provides sworn deputies as School Resource Officers to the school districts.

One 1440 hour Deputy Sheriff/Police Officer will serve as a School Resource Officer and

will provide law enforcement services for incidents involving violations for criminal code violations occurring on the Rancho Verde High School campus and its surrounding area.

PROJECTED PLAN OVERTIME

Because of the nature of the student population at Rancho Verde High School a large amount of proactive police presence will be required. Often times, a shift adjustment can be made to enable the special enforcement activity. Further, many investigations and arrest go beyond the normal duty day. The student population has risen to a point where a police officer's presence is mandatory to assure a safe learning environment. If a shift adjustment is made, the assigned school resource officer will be away from the campus allowing the possibility for criminal activity to emerge. While a police officer is away, gangs are allowed to assemble and conduct some form of criminal activity at the end of the school day. In order to combat any criminal

activity, we are proposing the allocation of a predetermined amount of program overtime so the assigned officer can adequately patrol his school site and surrounding area.

The Moreno Valley Police Department works diligently to identify the gang population in the city and at a particular school site. After a gang member or associate is identified, a visit to the subjects home to speak with his or her parents. These visits are conducted during the evening time, well after the normal school day, when the subjects parents or guardians are at home. Our city has shown the home visits are productive in suppressing gang affiliation and activity at or around a school site. As gang members are identified, the number of home visits will increase.

For the reasons mentioned above, we are asking for 150 hours of program overtime to allow for the gang intervention and proactive police activity in the area of the school.

The current contract rate for a sworn Deputy Sheriff is \$67.77 per hour. In this rate all benefits are charged and included; commonly referred to as the supported rate. An overtime deputy will be billed at a rate of \$54.39 per overtime hour based on the non-supported rate. The year to year cost takes in account the anticipated increases of 5% per year for the three year grant period. The computations are as follows:

The assigned School Resource Officer will work with the school at various extracurricular events, not limited to, but including football games, basketball games, miscellaneous school activities and graduations. Because of the schools remote location, diverse population, and volume of subjects in the audience, a team of deputies is required for large events such as football games and graduations. Driven by current policies and procedures within the Moreno Valley Police Department, five officers and one sergeant are required for these large events. In this light, an overtime deputy will be billed at the non-supported rate of \$54.39 per overtime hour, and a sergeant will be billed at the non-supported rate of \$80.02 per overtime hour. By contractual agreement, when an officer works overtime, he or she will be paid "time and a half" per hour.

C. Travel –

As part of the training process for the School Resource Officer assigned to Rancho Verde High School, it is imperative for the officer to maintain knowledge of the current trends within a school setting. In doing so, attendance to various training classes and seminars will be required. Because of the proximity to the Moreno Valley Police Department to the Riverside County Sheriff's Academy (Ben Clark Training Center (BCTC), overnight lodging and travel expenses are non-existent. However, because of the fluctuating requirements of BCTC, I have provided examples of classes that the selected SRO will attend upon availability and set a projected budget accordingly.

As part of the expenses that will be incurred by funding the officer at Rancho Verde High School will be the day-to-day transportation cost. The officer must leave the Moreno Valley Police Department and proceed to and from the school. Additional mileage will be incurred for routine activity near the school site. Mileage expenses are estimated at 30 miles per day for 180 school days at \$.88 per mile x 3 years = \$14,256.00.

The selected School Resource Officer and one additional officer/supervisor will attend the School Violence Conference and the Legal and Liability Issues for Schools Update class in

Las Vegas, NV on an annual basis. The two classes are conducted consecutively and will be conducted over a period of one week per year. The mileage cost for this class is listed below. 27 Events x 16 x \$.88 per mile x 10 miles (round trip) = \$3802.00 x 3 years = \$11,405.00 (Note: .88 cents per mile is the standard reimbursement cost Riverside County charges the City of Moreno Valley (a contract city) for use of the county's vehicles. The .88 cents covers vehicle leasing, all maintenance, and fuel costs.)

D. Equipment –

Rancho Verde High School is the city's most remote high school, nearly six miles from the Moreno Valley Police Department. Equipment replacement during a school function is difficult because of the extended distance. For this reason, we are requesting 12 Honeywell Handheld Radio Batteries ($12 \times 100.00 = 1.200.00$) and individual charging systems ($12 \times 145.00 = 1.740.00$) for each School Resource Officer that may respond to this location depending on the individual incident.

As part of the on-going gang identification and enforcement activities, the Moreno Valley Police Department School Resource Officers are constantly making contact with gang members. As part of the required documentation efforts, we are requesting 12 CopVu Wearable Camera Systems with the associated documentation and hardware (12 Camera Systems x \$800.00 = \$9,600.00) for the entire School Resource Officer Unit. Further, we are requesting 12 digital camera, (12 x \$200.00 = \$2,400.00) with adequate memory cards (8gb) (12 x \$2.00 = \$624.00) to assist in thorough documentation during investigations.

In order to adequately download and store the data acquired from the CopVu cameras and the requested digital cameras, we are requesting 1, 2Tb external storage device. (1 x 20.00 = 220.00)

Because the remote location of Rancho Verde High School, students will rely on darkness hide themselves after creating a disturbance during evening activities. Rancho Verde High School is in an area where many large fields and steep mountainsides are present. When a situation arises where public safety becomes an issue, the perpetrators simply disappear into the darkness. To combat the night time activity, we are requesting 1 set of nighttime binoculars. $(1 \times \$2,500.00 = \$2500.00)$

Rancho Verde High School is currently expecting and increased enrollment to approximately 3700 students. With the increased student population, administrative office space is at a premium. In order for the newly funded School Resource Officer to maintain his ability to produce the required reports and associated documentation, we are requesting a laptop computer for his use during his or her workday. $(1 \times 1,900.00 = 1,900.00)$

The total equipment expenditure requested is \$20,244.00. After the additional 8.75% state tax, the amount will be \$22,017.00.

CITY OF MORENO VALLEY AND VAL VERDE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Amendment No. 1 – 2010 / 2011 School Year

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is made and entered into by and between the Val Verde Unified School District (hereinafter referred to as the "District") and the City of Moreno Valley (hereinafter referred to as the "City"), to continue to promote and organizational partnership with the mutual goal of jointly implementing the School Resource Officer (SRO) Program.

NOW THEREFORE, it is agreed by and between the parties as follows:

- 1. The City shall provide to the District, during the days school is in session, one trained police officer, on a full-time basis, with the equipment normally provided for his/her use by the Police Department of the City, for assignment to the School District, for the purpose of acting in the role of a School Resource Officer. The primary locations of these Police Officers/School Resource Officers will be at the Rancho Verde High School. The primary role of these Police/School Resource Officers will be the improvement and strengthening law enforcement presence and inculcating in the students, faculty, and staff affection, respect, and understanding of the role of law enforcement in society.
- 2. The Police/School Resource Officers shall work in cooperation with the respective site Administrator(s)/Principal(s) for the purpose of enforcing school regulations, California State statutes containing penal and regulatory sections, and protecting school property and persons thereon. Each Police/School Resource Officer shall dedicate his/her time and efforts to issues and incidents involving the District's property, students, faculty, and staff, wherever they may be located. The police officer's work hours shall generally coincide with the school operation hours. When or where a crime occurs, the police officer shall take appropriate legal measures in reference thereto, without interference from any District official, faculty, staff, student, parent, or other person claiming to have an interest therein. The Police/School Resource Officer shall work in cooperation with the District's Superintendent and his or her designee, site principal, faculty, and staff to establish programs, duties, responsibilities, and priorities. Each Police/School Resource Officer shall act under the control and supervision of the City's Chief of Police, or his/her designate.
- 3. The Police/School Resource Officers shall remain in contact, either by radio, telephone, or cellular telephone with the District or school site officials. If a Police/School Resource Officer is unable to respond to a school emergency, the District or school site shall contact the Police Department, through the 9-1-1

- emergency system and a patrol operations unit(s) will respond to the emergency, pending the arrival of the assigned Police/School Resource Officer.
- 4. The City of Moreno Valley will pay for the services of one Police/School Resource Officer located at Rancho Verde High School. The Police/School Resource Officers will be paid as based on the contract agreement between the Riverside County Sheriff's Department and the City of Moreno Valley.
- 5. Should the District sponsor or hold any activity, beyond normal school hours, which requires security, such as school dances, sporting events, etc., the District shall contact the Moreno Valley Police Department, in writing, for security personnel, with the Police Department or other private security organization, as a separate measure, beyond this agreement. Any costs for such event security is included within the services described in this Agreement.
- 6. During the term of this Agreement, the District shall indemnify, hold the City, its officers and employees harmless, and defend the City from any and all claims, demands or liability arising from the alleged acts or omissions by the District and its officers, agents or employees during those times when said officers or agents are acting under the terms of this Agreement. The City shall indemnify, hold the District, its officers and employees harmless, and defend the District from any and all claims, demands or liability arising from alleged acts or omissions by the City, its officers, agents or employees during when such officers or agents are acting under terms of this Agreement.
- 7. This Agreement may be amended at any time by the mutual consent of the parties hereto and may be terminated by either upon sixty (60) day written notice to the other of its intention to do so. In the event this Agreement is terminated, the cost shall be prorated on the basis of one-tenth per month of the actual services performed hereunder.
- 8. The term of this Agreement shall be for the 2010 2011 School Year. The agreement may be extended an additional <u>year</u>, by the mutual agreement of the City of Moreno Valley and the Val Verde Unified School District. Prior to the extension hereof, the City of Moreno Valley shall determine what adjustments shall be made to the compensation set forth in Section 4 in order for the City to recover its costs and shall so inform the Val Verde Unified School District. If agreeable to both parties, then the agreement may be extended as provided herein.
- 9. The District will supply office space, furniture, telephone, cellular telephone, office supplies, and other assistance necessary to the officers to perform their duties under this Agreement. The officer's site shall be located at the Rancho Verde High School and designated for the School Resource Officer. The office space may be shared with other law enforcement (probation and district attorney) thus allowing for criminal/confidential investigations, interviews and other related police work to be completed in a sequestered atmosphere.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council:

- 1. Approve the Administrative Services Agreement (Agreement) for the CSA-152 Program with Riverside County.
- 2. Authorize the Mayor to execute the Agreement.
- 3. Direct the City Clerk to transmit the Agreement to Riverside County.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

Not Applicable

BACKGROUND

In 1987, Congress enacted Section 319 of the Clean Water Act 9 (CWA) and established a national program to control non-point sources of water pollution. Non-point source pollution consists of the contamination that storm water picks up from the streets, yards, fields and parking lots. Under Section 319, States are to address this pollution by developing non-point source management programs to control non-point source pollution and by implementing the management programs.

This program is called the NPDES program. The City of Moreno Valley has obtained a discharge permit from the Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) to release storm water into various drainage channels and washes throughout our community. Our permit requires us to implement Best Management Practices (BMPs) within our community which reduces pollutants entering our stream channels. Among those BMPs are: public education, material disposal and recycling programs, spill prevention and clean-up programs, illegal dumping controls, illicit connection controls, storm drain inspections, and street and storm drain maintenance. Failure by the City to enforce our NPDES permit will result in violation of State and Federal laws. The CWA provides for penalties of up to \$32,500 per day for non-compliance and or civil and criminal penalties. This is a federally mandated program administered by the State. There has been neither Federal nor State monies allocated to local agencies to address these requirements.

Riverside County has formed CSA-152 as a means to recover NPDES program costs through property assessments.

On December 21, 1993, the City of Moreno Valley, along with several other Riverside County cities, was annexed into CSA-152. The purpose of the annexation was to provide the City with a funding mechanism for the federally and state mandated storm water clean-up programs.

On February 22, 1994 the City executed the current Agreement for the CSA-152 program. The Agreement stipulates responsibilities of each party as well as associated costs for Riverside County services. The Agreement does not have an expiration date.

DISCUSSION

Riverside County's legal counselor has requested participating agencies in CSA-152 execute a new Agreement for CSA-152. The new Agreement stipulates responsibilities of the City and County for program administration as well as establishing a five year expiration term.

Services eligible for CSA-152 funding include public education, material disposal and recycling programs, spill prevention and clean-up programs, illegal dumping controls, illicit connection controls, storm drain inspections, street sweeping and storm drain maintenance.

ALTERNATIVES

 Approve that the City Council approve the Agreement, authorize the Mayor to execute the Agreement and direct the City Clerk to transmit the Agreement to Riverside County. Also, this provides continued partial program funding from CSA-152. Do not approve that the City Council approve the Agreement, authorize the Mayor to execute the Agreement and direct the City Clerk to transmit the Agreement to Riverside County. Approval of this alternative will interrupt NPDES program funding from CSA-152.

FISCAL IMPACT

The recommended action tonight will meet the Riverside County's request and assist in the funding the NPDES storm water programs.

Approval of the Agreement will ensure that the city continues to receive its legally authorized funds from this source.

The CSA-152 levy collected from property owners support current NPDES permit programs and reduce the level of General Fund support necessary to remain in compliance with unfunded federal mandates, as administered by the State. Funds collected from the CSA-152 annual levy are restricted for use only within the Storm Water Management Program.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

The recommended action furthers City Council goals by:

 Revenue Diversification and Preservation. It maintains a revenue source for a federally mandated program.

SUMMARY

CSA-152 revenues provide partial funding for the NPDES program. The Agreement between Riverside County and the City allows the City to participate in CSA-152. To ensure CSA-152 funding is secured, staff is recommending Council approve the attached Agreement for CSA-152.

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ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES AGREEMENT FOR CSA 152 NPDES PROGRAM BETWEEN

RIVERSIDE COUNTY AND CITY OF MORENO VALLEY

This Agreement, entered into as of this _____ day of _____ 2010 by the COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, hereinafter called "COUNTY," and the CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, hereinafter called "CITY," establishes the responsibilities and obligations of each party concerning the management and financing of COUNTY SERVICE AREA 152 NATIONAL POLLUTANT DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM (NPDES), hereinafter called "CSA 152."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Congress in 1987 added Section 402(p) to the Federal Clean Water Act (CWA) [33 U.S.C. 1342(p)]; and,

WHEREAS, Section 402(p) requires certain municipalities, construction and industrial facilities to obtain a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit before discharging stormwater into the waters of the United States; and,

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CITY have obtained or will obtain a municipal NPDES Permit for each of the three watersheds of the County; and,

WHEREAS, COUNTY has formed CSA 152 to finance a portion of its programs and obligations associated with the municipal NPDES Permits and individual General NPDES Permits; and,

WHEREAS, cooperation between COUNTY and CITY in the administration and implementation of the NPDES Permits is in the best interests of COUNTY and CITY; and,

WHEREAS, CITY was formally annexed into CSA 152 by COUNTY Resolution No. 93-454 on December 21, 1993; and,

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CITY are to perform certain duties prescribed in this Agreement that will benefit all parties;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

- DELEGATION OF RESPONSIBILITIES. The responsibilities of each party shall be as follows:
 - a. CITY shall assume the responsibilities and meet the requirements of CSA
 152 administration for CITY by:
 - i. Providing additions to previous year's tax roll (if any) to be placed on the upcoming fiscal year tax roll.
 - ii. Providing agenda item approving Benefit Assessment Unit (BAU)Levy and CITY'S CSA 152 budget for each fiscal year.
 - iii. Notify COUNTY of any changes to Tax Rate Area of individual parcels to be placed on Tax Roll.
 - iv. Research parcels that were rejected from list of Assessor Parcel Numbers (APNs) submitted to County.
 - v. Notify COUNTY of any corrections to rejected parcels to be placed on Tax Roll prior to Auditor Controllers deadline for submittal of APNs.
 - vi. Submit to COUNTY requests for reimbursement of actual expenditures incurred under provision of approved CITY CSA 152 budget.
 - b. COUNTY shall assume the responsibilities and meet the requirements of CSA 152 administration for COUNTY and CITY by:
 - Forwarding of APNs received from CITY to Auditor Controller to be placed on Tax Roll.
 - ii. Notify CITY of any rejected parcels.

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- iii. Forward CITY'S corrections of rejected parcels to Auditor Controller.
- iv. Provide spreadsheet of CSA 152 assessments placed on tax roll and fiscal year financial summary.
- v. Collect assessment for CSA 152 on behalf of CITY.
- vi. Reimburse CITY for actual expenditures incurred under provision of approved CITY CSA 152 budget.
- FEES AND PAYMENT. COUNTY shall administer CSA 152 for the benefit of COUNTY and CITY. COUNTY shall charge six (6%) percent of new CITY CSA 152 annual revenue for administration.
- TERM OF AGREEMENT. The term of this Agreement shall commence on the date the last duly authorized representative of COUNTY or CITY executes it.
 The term of the Agreement shall be five (5) years.
- 4. WITHDRAWAL FROM AGREEMENT. Either Party may terminate this Agreement thirty (30) days after submitting written notice to other party. In the event termination becomes effective, termination shall constitute forfeiture by the terminating Party of its share of costs and administrative fees paid as described in Section 2 of this Agreement up to the effective date of termination. The terminating Party shall be responsible for all lawfully assessed penalties as a consequence of termination.
- 5. AMENDMENTS TO THE AGREEMENT. This Agreement may be amended by mutual consent of the parties to the Agreement. No amendment to this Agreement shall be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the duly authorized representatives of the parties.
- GOVERNING LAW. This Agreement will be governed and construed in accordance with laws of the United States and the State of California. If any provision or provisions of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid, illegal, or

- unenforceable, the validity, legality, and enforceability of the remaining provisions shall not in any way be affected or impaired hereby.
- 7. CONSENT TO BREACH NOT A WAIVER. No term or provision hereof shall be deemed waived and no breach excused, unless such a waiver or consent is in writing and signed by the Party so waiving or consenting. Any consent by any Party to, or waiver of, a breach by the other Party, whether expressed or implied, shall not constitute consent to, waiver of, or excuse for any other different or subsequent breach.
- APPLICABILITY OF PRIOR AGREEMENTS. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter; all CSA 152 prior agreement, representations, statement, negotiations, and understandings are superseded hereby.
- HOLD HARMLESS. Each Party shall indemnify and hold harmless the other
 party from liability or damages resulting from its own acts or omissions including
 those of its officers or employees in the performance of this Agreement.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the proposed resolution (Resolution No. 2010-88) authorizing the Public Works Director/City Engineer to approve partial security reductions of the public improvement securities and accept the partial public improvements as complete, but not into the City maintained system.

ADVISORY BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

Not applicable.

BACKGROUND

As stated in the Subdivision Map Act (SMA), Section 66499.7, the legislative body (the City) may provide for the partial release of the security upon the partial performance of the act or the acceptance of the work as it progresses. Partial reductions will only be considered in accordance with the provisions of the Public Improvement Agreement, City standards and City policy number LDD 2010-01.

A reduction in the Faithful Performance security will not be deemed to be an accepted by the City for completed public improvements, and the risk of loss or damage to the improvements and the obligation to maintain the improvements shall remain the sole responsibility of the developer until all required public improvements have been accepted by the City and all other required improvements have been fully completed in accordance with the plans and specifications for the project.

DISCUSSION

Public Works/Land Development staff currently processes partial security reductions through Council approval. This is primarily an administrative function. By granting the Public Works Director/City Engineer the authority to reduce the security, the City will be able to provide security reductions to the developer in a more efficient and timely manner.

Partial security reductions will only reduce the Faithful Performance security provided to guarantee the construction of the public improvements. Faithful performance securities ensure the construction of public improvements. The Material and Labor security will not be reduced until all of the public improvements are 100% complete and accepted by the City. Reduction in security will only occur when the Developer has met the following guidelines:

- 1. Security reduction is requested in writing;
- Submit to Land Development for review and approval a revised Engineer's Cost Estimate for the remaining improvements, signed and stamped by the developer's Engineer;
- 3. Reduction amount is in accordance with the Public Improvement Agreement and/or the City standards and City policies;
- 4. Payment of partial reduction fee based off the current fee schedule;
- 5. Verification by City inspector of completeness of the improvements;
- 6. Clearances received from appropriate City departments;
- 7. Schedule for remaining improvements is submitted to City staff.

When the public improvements have been constructed to 100% completion, the public improvements will be submitted for Council approval and acceptance into the City's maintained street system. When approved, the remaining improvement security will be released less 10% of the total value of the project for the 12-month warranty period. No security will be exonerated until improvements are accepted into the City's street maintained system.

The City has agreed to allow for more than one partial reduction on certain projects or in accordance with the specific details noted in the Public Improvement Agreement. Partial security reductions are granted on a percentage completion basis and the value of those improvements may be unique to each individual project. Therefore, the request to provide the Public Works Director/City Engineer the authority to perform the partial reductions is without limits to either the value of the improvements or the number of reductions granted in any given period.

In addition, Council will be notified by e-mail in advance of processing any requests for partial release of security. A report will be placed on the agenda at a regular City Council meeting each month identifying partial releases of security by Tract/Parcel number or project number, the amount of the original security, the amount of any partial reduction of security and the remaining amount of security.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve the proposed resolution authorizing the Public Works Director/City Engineer to approve partial security reductions of the public improvement securities and accept the partial public improvements as complete, but not into the City maintained system.
- 2. Do not approve the proposed resolution authorizing the Public Works Director/City Engineer to approve partial security reductions of the public improvement securities and accept the partial public improvements as complete, but not into the City maintained system. All partial reductions will continue to be processed through City Council and could delay release of funds to developers.

PARTIAL REDUCTION OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT SECURITY POLICY

#LDD 2010-01

PURPOSE

To provide a streamlined process for the approval of partial reductions for the Faithful Performance security for Public Improvements that adheres to the guidelines set forth in the Subdivision Map Act.

POLICY

The City's policy is based on the goal of providing the best customer service to developers, while maintaining the City's best interest. The City's policy is to provide the opportunity for partial release of the Faithful Performance security for public improvements upon partial performance of the work as it progresses. All time constraints listed in this policy refer to calendar days.

This policy does not reflect the City's policy/practice of releasing grading securities, erosion control securities, or any other type of security submitted to the City. This policy is specific to securities guaranteeing construction of the required public improvements that are executed through an Agreement for Public Improvements.

PARTIAL REDUCTION

- As stated in the Subdivision Map Act, Chapter 5, Section 66499.7, the legislative body (the City) may provide for the partial release of the security upon the partial performance of the act or the acceptance of the work as it progresses.
 - The following guidelines pertain to a partial reduction that is approved prior to 100% completion of the public improvements.
 - The Developer must request the Security reduction in writing.
 - Submit a revised Engineer's Cost Estimate for the remaining improvements, signed and stamped by the developer's Engineer to Land Development for review and approval.
 - Schedule for remaining improvements must be submitted to City staff.
 - Reduction amount is in accordance with the Public Improvement Agreement.
 - The partial reduction may be a percentage of the original security amount or a specified lump sum dollar amount approved by the Public Works Director/City Engineer or designee.
 - The reduction will only reduce the Faithful Performance security.
 - Verification by City Inspector of completeness of the public improvements.
 - Clearances received from appropriate City departments.
 - Each partial security reduction will require the payment of the Partial Security Reduction Fee per the current Fee Schedule. (Currently listed as the Partial Bond Reduction Fee.)

CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS, TITLE 24, INCORPORATING THE LATEST EDITIONS OF THE MODEL

CODES WITH AMENDMENTS

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council introduce Ordinance No. 816 amending Title 8, of the City of Moreno Valley Municipal Code by amending Chapter 8.14, repealing and replacing Chapters 8.20, 8.22, 8.24, 8.26, 8.36 and adding Chapter 8.23 and adopting, as modified, the California Building Standards Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24; incorporating the 2009 International Building Code, 2009 Uniform Mechanical Code, the 2009 International Residential Code, the 2009 Uniform Plumbing Code, the 2009 International Fire Code, and the 2008 National Electrical Code; and adopting other regulations relating to Building and Fire Prevention requirements.

ADVISORY BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

Not applicable.

BACKGROUND

The California Building Standards Commission is mandated by Health and Safety Code Section 18928 to adopt the most recent editions of applicable model codes within one year of the date of publication. In July of 2010, the California Building Standards Commission adopted the California amended versions of the International and Uniform Model Codes as published by the International Code Council (ICC) and the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials (IAPMO).

DISCUSSION

Due to the fact that there are numerous Model Codes with literally thousands of changes, both grammatical and technical, staff has not listed the changes in this Staff Report. However, listed below are highlights of some of the new regulations.

- All new residential construction will now be required to install fire sprinklers to provide enhanced fire projection within the home.
- The State of California is implementing a new Green Building Code that will apply to all construction within the state.
- Additions to existing buildings of 1500 square feet or more, or 1/3 of the existing floor area that result in a building over 3600 square feet will require the installation of fire sprinklers throughout.
- All new buildings in excess of 3600 square feet will require the installation of fire sprinklers.

Adopting the California Building Standards Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24 as amended will not only provide consistency for the existing development within the City of Moreno Valley, but also for future development within the City.

Staff has met with the development community to inform them of the proposed amendments.

ALTERNATIVES

California Building Standards are applicable to all occupancies throughout California, whether or not the local government takes affirmative action to adopt those California Building Standards (Health and Safety Code, §§ 17950 and 18938 (b)).

FISCAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

Public Safety

Provide a safe and secure environment for people and property in the community, control the number and severity of fire and hazardous material incidents, and provide protection for citizens who live, work and visit the City of Moreno Valley.

Positive Environment

Create a positive environment for the development of Moreno Valley's future.

SUMMARY

The adoption of the 2010 California Building Standards Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24 as amended will ensure that minimum building standards are implemented to safeguard life, limb, health, property and public welfare by regulating and controlling the design, construction, quality of materials, use and occupancy, location and maintenance of all buildings and structures within the City of Moreno Valley.

ORDINANCE NO. 816

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING TITLE 8, OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY MUNICIPAL CODE BY AMENDING CHAPTER 8.14, REPEALING AND REPLACING CHAPTERS 8.20, 8.22, 8.24, 8.26, 8.36, AND ADDING CHAPTER 8.23 AND ADOPTING, AS MODIFIED, THE CALIFORNIA BUILDING STANDARDS CODE. CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS, TITLE 24: INCORPORATING THE 2009 INTERNATIONAL BUILDING CODE, THE 2009 UNIFORM MECHANICAL CODE, THE 2009 INTERNATIONAL RESIDENTIAL CODE, THE 2009 UNIFORM PLUMBING CODE, THE 2009 INTERNATIONAL FIRE CODE, AND THE 2008 NATIONAL ELECTRICAL CODE: AND ADOPTING OTHER REGULATIONS RELATING TO BUILDING AND FIRE PREVENTION REQUIREMENTS.

The City Council of the City of Moreno Valley does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. PRIOR ENACTMENTS REPEALED:

1.1 All prior enactments of the City, which are in conflict with this Ordinance, are hereby repealed, effective upon the date on which this Ordinance becomes effective and operative.

SECTION 2. CONTINUING EFFECT:

- 2.1 Notwithstanding Section 1.1 of the Ordinance, and solely for the purposes of this Section 2.1, this Ordinance shall be construed as a continuation of said prior enactments as the same may have been heretofore amended from time to time, and compliance therewith prior to the effective date hereof shall be deemed to be compliance with this Ordinance unless provided otherwise herein.
- 2.2 Except as specifically or by necessary implication required to the contrary by this Ordinance, no right or entitlement granted, or obligation imposed, or action or proceeding commenced or taken pursuant to a prior resolution or ordinance repealed or modified hereby shall be deemed to be invalidated, waived, terminated or otherwise affected by the enactment hereof.

SECTION 3. EFFECT OF ENACTMENT:

3.1 Except as specifically provided herein, nothing contained in this ordinance shall be deemed to modify or supersede any prior enactment of the City Council which addresses the same subject addressed herein.

SECTION 4. FINDINGS:

- 4.1 The International Code Council is a private organization which has been in existence for at least three (3) years.
- 4.2 The 2009 International Building Code, the 2009 International Fire Code, the California Building Standards Code, and the International Fire Code Standards published by said organization, are a nationally recognized compilation of proposed rules, regulations, and standards of said organization.
- 4.3 The International Building Code and the International Fire Code have been printed and published as a code in book form within the meaning of Section 50022.2 et seq., of the California Government Code and said code has been adopted and amended by the California Building Standards Commission into the California Code of Regulations (CCR) as Title 24, 2010 edition.
- 4.4 That one (1) copy of the 2010 California Building Code based on the 2009 International Building Code and one (1) copy of the 2010 California Fire Code based on the 2009 International Fire Code have been on file for use and examination by the public in the office of the Building Official prior to adoption of this Ordinance.
- 4.5 That the sections of the International Building Code and California Building Code Standards may be referred to by the same number used in said published compilation preceded by the words "City of Moreno Valley International Building Code Section" or "International Building Code Section" or "Building Code Section". Said amendments to the California Building Standards Code under the California Building Code shall be referred to in the same manner as listed above for ease of application.
- 4.6 That the sections of the International Fire Code and International Fire Code Standards may be referred to by the same number used in said published compilation preceded by the words "City of Moreno Valley International Fire Code Section" or "International Fire Code Section" or "Fire Code Section". Said amendments to the California Building Standards Code under the California Fire Code shall be referred to in the same manner as listed above for ease of application.
- 4.7 Pursuant to Section(s) 17958.5(a) and (b) as well as Section 17958.7 of the California Health and Safety Code, the Section contained herein shall be submitted as the "Findings of Need" with regard to the specific International Building Code and International Fire Code Ordinance Amendments adopted by the City of Moreno Valley and addressed herein in this Ordinance. That the additional requirements and standards herein are necessary to properly protect the health, safety and welfare of the existing and future residents as well as workers of the City of Moreno Valley. Under the provisions of Section 17958.7 of the Health and Safety Code, local amendments shall be based on climatic, geographical, or topographical conditions. The "Findings of Need" contained herein shall address each of these situations and shall present the local situation which singularly or in combination cause the established amendments to be adopted. Each such modification is identified as to which each such finding refers.

- 4.7.1 Life Safety: That the additional requirements and standard established herein are needed to properly protect the health, safety, life and limb, and welfare of existing and future residents, workers and guests of the City of Moreno Valley. (Finding 1 refers to amendments made to the International Building Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24 as specified in this Ordinance).
- 4.7.2 That these changes and modifications to the standards published in the International Building Code and International Fire Code are reasonably necessary because of local climatic, geological, and topographical conditions. The following are hereby adopted as non-inclusive specific findings in respect to such local conditions and refer to amendments made to the International Building Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, and International Fire Code as more particularly set forth below.

Climatic Conditions:

- 4.7.2.1 The City of Moreno Valley receives relatively low amounts of precipitation, low humidity and high temperatures. Such climate conditions are conducive to the spread of fire (Information from the University of California, Riverside, Meteorological Weather Station). This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to 304.1.2; 318; 319; 320; 321; 321.1; 322; 323; 324; 3301.2; 3301.3 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.
- 4.7.2.2 Strong winds, commonly referred to as the Santa Ana Winds, have reached speeds up to 57 miles per hour in Moreno Valley during various months of past years. Damage that can occur during such winds includes the creation of highly flammable conditions of brush, downed trees, utility poles, utility circuits, and power line (Wind speeds documented at March Air Reserve Base). This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to Chapter 1, Division II, Section 105.2 of the California Building Code, 2010 edition and to Chapter 1, Division II, Section R105.2 of the California Residential Code, 2010 edition. This finding also refers to and supports modifications or changes to 304.1.2; 318; 319; 320; 321; 321.1; 322; 323; 324; 606.8; 606.10.2; 608.1; 608.10; 610.1; 3301.2; 3301.3; 4906.3; 4908; 4909 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.
- 4.7.2.3 Other areas within the City of Moreno Valley are subject to landslides, wind erosion, blown sand, flooding and wildfires. This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to Chapter 1, Division II, Section 105.2 of the California Building Code, 2010 edition and to Chapter 1, Division II, Section R105.2 and Section 405.1 of the California Residential Code, 2010 edition. This finding also refers to and supports modifications or changes to 304.1.2; 318; 319; 320; 321; 321.1; 322; 323; 324; 3301.2; 3301.3; 4906.3; 4908; 4909 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.

Geological:

4.7.2.4 Within the city limits of Moreno Valley, there are two (2) earthquake faults; the San Jacinto Fault and the Casa Loma Fault. There are also other faults in the immediate adjacent areas. In the event of a severe earthquake, these

faults present the potential for catastrophic damage including fire, damage to roadways, and other impairments of emergency apparatus (Fault information from California Division of Mines and Geology). This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to Chapter 1, Division II, Section 105.2 of the California Building Code, 2010 edition and to Chapter 1, Division II, Section R105.2 and Chapter 4, Section 403.1.3 and Section 405.1 of the California Residential Code, 2010 edition.

- 4.7.2.5 There is a lack of fire hydrants and water supply to new construction hillside areas in the City of Moreno Valley. This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to Sections 304.1.2; 318; 319; 320; 321; 321.1; 322; 323; 324; 502.1; 503.1; 503.1.1; 503.1.4; 503.2.1; 503.2.2; 503.2.7; 901.3.1; 901.6; 903.2.10.1.1; 903.2; 903.4; 903.4.3; 905.3.11; 907.2.19.1; 9.12.2.1; 914.5; 4906.3; 4908; 4909 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.
- 4.7.2.6 In Moreno Valley there are known areas where the radio coverage is insufficient to ensure the life safety of emergency personnel due to the mountainous and hilly terrain at the City's northern and eastern boundaries. These areas include the Reche Vista area, the Hidden Springs area near Box Springs Mountain, and the entrance to San Timoteo Canyon off of both Moreno Beach Boulevard and Redlands Boulevard near the northern City limits. This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to Sections 508.1.1; 508.1.2; 510.1.1 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.

Topographical:

- 4.7.2.7 Development has occurred and continues to occur in Moreno Valley at a rapid pace. Traffic congestion occurs during certain peak business hours, weekends, and on holidays along main thoroughfares such as Sunnymead Blvd, Perris Blvd., Alessandro Blvd., Heacock St., Pigeon Pass/Frederick St., and at some points along Indian St. and Cactus Ave. (Information provided by the Transportation Engineering Division of the Public Works Department). This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to 502.1; 503.1; 503.1.1; 503.1.4; 503.2.1; 503.2.2; 503.2.7 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.
- 4.7.2.8 The distance between fire stations, and the response time in our City compared to the time when flashover generally occurs creates a need for on-site fire suppression capability in all structures, and also the need for specific turning radius and turnaround requirements for fire apparatus. This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to Sections 502.1; 503.1; 503.1.1; 503.1.4; 503.2.1; 503.2.2; 503.2.7; 606.8; 606.10.2; 608.1; 608.10; 610.1; 901.3.1; 901.6; 903.2.10.1.1; 903.2; 903.4; 903.4.3; 905.3.11; 907.2.19.1; 907.4.1; 9.12.2.1; 914.5 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.
- 4.7.2.9 Moreno Valley has a number of different water companies serving the area, with varying capacity to deliver water flows for fire suppression purposes. This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to

Sections 507.1; 507.2.1; 507.5.7; 901.3.1; 901.6; 903.2.10.1.1; 903.2; 903.4; 903.4.3; 905.3.11; 907.2.19.1 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.

- 4.7.2.10 In order to accommodate fire equipment during emergency response, we find that fire apparatus roads, grades, turning radius and turnaround dimensions are required as set forth. This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to Sections 502.1; 503.1; 503.1.1; 503.1.4; 503.2.1; 503.2.2; 503.2.7 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.
- 4.7.2.11 Radio communications and ability to access a breathing air supply can be hindered by topographical features in Moreno Valley as well as building design which can include subterranean structures. It is vital to ensure there is adequate radio coverage and breathing air throughout the City for the life safety of the emergency response personnel. This finding refers to and supports modifications or changes to Sections 508.1.1; 508.1.2; 510.1.1; 511 of the California Fire Code, 2010 edition.

SECTION 5. MUNICIPAL CODE AMENDED:

Expiration. Every permit issued under the provisions of this code shall expire by limitation and become null and void if the work authorized by such permit is not commenced within one-hundred and eighty (180) days from the date of such permit, or if the work authorized by such permit is suspended or abandoned at any time after the work is commenced for a period of one-hundred and eighty (180) days. Before such work can be recommenced, a new permit must be first be obtained.

Ordinance No. Date Adopted:

A permittee holding an unexpired permit shall be permitted to apply for an extension of the time within which work may be commenced under that permit when the permittee is unable to commence work within the time required by this section for good and satisfactory reasons. The City shall have the authority to extend the time for action by the permittee for a period not exceeding one —hundred and eighty (180) days upon written request by the permittee showing that circumstances beyond the control of said permittee have prevented action from being taken.

Expiration of Plan Review. Applications for which no permit is issued within one-hundred and eighty (180) days following the date of application shall expire by limitation, and plans and other data submitted for review shall by permitted to be returned to the applicant or destroyed by the City. The City shall be permitted to extend the time for action by the applicant for a period not to exceed one-hundred and eighty (180) days upon request by the applicant showing that circumstances beyond the control of the applicant have prevented action from being taken. No application shall be extended more than once.

- a. Weathering may require a higher strength concrete or grade of masonry than necessary to satisfy the structural requirements of this code. The weathering column shall be filled in with the weathering index (i.e., "negligible," "moderate" or "severe") for concrete as determined from the Weathering Probability Map [Figure R301.2(3)]. The grade of masonry units shall be determined from ASTM C 34, C 55, C 62, C 73, C 90, C 129, C 145, C 216 or C 652.
- b. The frost line depth may require deeper footings than indicated in Figure R403.1(1). The jurisdiction shall fill in the frost line depth column with the minimum depth of footing below finish grade.
- c. The jurisdiction shall fill in this part of the table to indicate the need for protection depending on whether there has been a history of local subterranean termite damage.
- d. The jurisdiction shall fill in this part of the table with the wind speed from the basic wind speed map [Figure R30I.2(4)]. Wind exposure category shall be determined on a site-specific basis in accordance with Section R301.2.1.4.

- h. In accordance with Sections R905.2.7.1, R905.4.3.1, R905.5.3.1, R905.6.3.1, R905.7.3.1 and R905.8.3.1, where there has been a history of local damage from the effects of ice damming, the jurisdiction shall fill in this part of the table with "YES." Otherwise, the jurisdiction shall fill in this part of the table with "NO."
- i. The jurisdiction shall fill in this part of the table with the 100-year return period air freezing index (BF-days) from Figure R403.3(2) or from the l00-year (99%) value on the National Climatic Data Center data table "Air Freezing Index- USA Method (Base 32°)" at www.ncdc.noaa.gov/fpsf.html.-
- j. The jurisdiction shall fill in this part of the table with the mean annual temperature from the National Climatic Data Center data table "Air Freezing Index-USA Method (Base 32°F)" at www.ncdc.noaa.gov/fpsf.html.
- k. In accordance with Section R301.2.1.5, where there is local historical data documenting structural damage to buildings due to topographic wind speed-up effects, the jurisdiction shall fill in this part of the table with "YES." Otherwise, the jurisdiction shall indicate "NO" in this part of the table.
- G. Chapter 4, Section R403.1.3 is modified by deleting the exception for masonry stem walls:
 - In Seismic Design Categories D_0 , D_1 and D_2 masonry stem walls without solid grout and vertical reinforcing are not permitted.
 - Exception: In detached one- and two-family dwellings which are three stories or less in height and constructed with stud bearing walls, plain concrete footings without longitudinal reinforcement supporting walls and isolated plain concrete footings supporting columns or pedestals are permitted.
- H. Chapter 4, Section R405.1 is modified to delete the exception as follows:

Every permit issued under the provisions of this code shall expire by limitation and become null and void if the work authorized by such permit is not commenced within one-hundred and eighty (180) days from the date of such permit, or if the work authorized by such permit is suspended or abandoned at any time after the work is commenced for a period of one-hundred and eighty (180) days. Before such work can be recommenced, a new permit must first be obtained.

A permittee holding an unexpired permit shall be permitted to apply for an extension of the time within which work may be commenced under that permit when the permittee is unable to commence work within the time required by this section for good and satisfactory reasons. The City shall have the authority to extend the time for action by the permittee for a period not exceeding one —hundred and eighty (180) days upon written request by the permittee showing that circumstances beyond the control of said permittee have prevented action from being taken.

Expiration of Plan Review. Applications for which no permit is issued within one-hundred and eighty (180) days following the date of application shall expire by limitation, and plans and other data submitted for review shall by permitted to be returned to the applicant or destroyed by the City. The City shall be permitted to extend the time for action by the applicant for a period not to exceed one-hundred and eighty (180) days upon request by the applicant showing that circumstances beyond the control of the applicant have prevented action from being taken. No application shall be extended more than once.

8.36.020 Adoption of the International Fire Code

A. The City Council of the City of Moreno Valley hereby adopts as amended, the 2009 Edition of the International Fire Code, California Fire Code 2010 Edition, California Code of Regulations Title 24 Part 9, Appendices Chapter 4, A, B, BB, C, CC, E, F, G, and H, the California Fire Code Standards and the body of code in its entirety,

[&]quot;Corporation Counsel" shall mean the city attorney.

[&]quot;NFPA" shall mean National Fire Protection Association.

[&]quot;Municipality" shall mean the City of Moreno Valley.

with the exception of appendix D, I, and J of the California Fire Code as compiled and adopted by the International Code Council.

8.36.030 California Fire Code Administration & Definitions

A. Section 101.4 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 101.4 Severability. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions of this ordinance, it being expressly declared that this ordinance and each section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause and phrase thereof would have been adopted, irrespective of the fact that one or more other section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

B. Section 103.4 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 103.4 Liability. Any liability against the County of Riverside or any officer or employee shall be as provided for in California Government Code and case law.

Fire suppression, investigation and rescue or emergency medical costs are recoverable in accordance with California Health and Safety Code Sections 13009 and 13009.1.

Any person who negligently or intentionally, or in violation of law, causes an emergency response, including but not limited to, a traffic accident or spill of toxic or flammable fluids or chemicals, is liable for the costs of securing such emergency, including those costs set out in Government Code Section 53150, et seq. Any expense incurred by the fire department for securing such an emergency situation shall constitute a debt of such person and shall be collectable by the County of Riverside, or political subdivision thereof if incorporated, in the same manner as in the case of an obligation under contract, expressed or implied.

C. Section 104.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended at the end of existing paragraph to read as follows:

Section 104.1 Authority of the Fire Chief and the Fire Department. The chief is authorized to administer, interpret and enforce the California Fire Code. Under the chief's direction, the Riverside County Fire Department is authorized to enforce all ordinances of the County of Riverside pertaining to:

- (1) The prevention of fires.
- (2) The suppression or extinguishment of dangerous or hazardous fires.
- (3) The storage, use and handling of hazardous materials.
- (4) The installation and maintenance of automatic, manual and other private fire alarm systems and fire extinguishing equipment.

- (5) The maintenance and regulation of fire escapes.
- (6) The maintenance of fire protection and the elimination of fire hazards on land and in buildings, structures and other property, including those under construction.
- (7) The maintenance of means of egress.
- (8) The investigation of the cause, origin and circumstance of fire and unauthorized releases of hazardous materials.
- D. Section 104.1.1 of the California Fire Code is herby added to read as follows:

Section 104.1.1 Authority of the Fire Chief. The chief is hereby given the authority to officially determine and publicly announce the closure of any hazardous fire area or portion thereof. However, any closure by the chief for a period of more than fifteen (15) days must be approved by the City Council within fifteen (15) days of the chief's original order of closure. No person shall go in or be upon any hazardous fire area, except upon the public roadways and inhabited areas therein during such time as the area is closed to entry. This section shall not prohibit residents or owners of private property within any closed area, or their invitees, from going in or being upon their lands. This section does not apply to any entry, in the course of duty by a peace officer or any other duly authorized public officer, member of any fire department, Riverside County Fire Department or member of the U.S. Forest Service or California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection nor does this section apply to National Forest Land in any respect. During periods of closure, the chief shall erect and maintain at all entrances to the closed area sufficient signs giving adequate notice of closure.

E. Section 104.3.2 of the California Fire Code is hereby added to read as follows:

Section 104.3.2 Fire Department Personnel and Peace Officers (1) The chief and his or her designees are authorized and directed to enforce all applicable State fire laws and the provisions of this code and he shall perform such related duties as may be fixed by the City Council, and for such purposes, he or she shall have the power of a peace officer.

- (2) The chief is authorized to administer, interpret and enforce this code. Under the chief's direction, the fire department is authorized to enforce all ordinances of the jurisdiction pertaining to:
 - (a) The prevention of fires,
 - (b) The suppression or extinguishment of dangerous or hazardous fires,
 - (c) The storage, use and handling of hazardous materials,
 - (d) The installation and maintenance of automatic, manual and other private fire alarm systems and fire extinguishing equipment,
 - (e) The maintenance and regulation of fire escapes,

- (f) The maintenance of fire protection and the elimination of fire hazards on land and in buildings, structures and other property, including those under construction.
- (g) The maintenance of means of egress, and
- (h) The investigation of the cause, origin and circumstance of fire and unauthorized releases of hazardous materials.
- (3) The following persons are hereby authorized to interpret and enforce the provisions of this Code (except as provided in Section 101.4) and to make arrests and issue citations as authorized by law:
 - 1. The Unit Chief and peace officers and public officers of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection.
 - 2. The Fire Chief, Peace Officers and Public Officers of the Riverside County Fire Department.
 - 3. The City Fire Marshal and members of the Moreno Valley Fire Prevention Bureau.
 - 4. The Riverside County Sheriff and any Deputy Sheriff.
 - 5. The Police Chief and any Police Officer of any city served by the County Fire department.
 - 6. Officers of the California Highway Patrol.
 - 7. Peace Officers of the California Department of Parks and Recreation.
 - 8. The law enforcement officers of the Federal Bureau of Land management.
- F. Section 105.6.14 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **105.6.14 Explosives.** An operating permit is required for the manufacture, storage, handling, sale or use of any quantity of explosive material, fireworks or pyrotechnic special effects. The determination of the Fire Chief with concurrence of Sheriff, or Chief of Police, shall be obtained and is final. The chief may impose conditions and procedures as to protect the public health and safety based upon the pyrotechnic or blasting operation. The chief, shall provide the pyrotechnic operator or blaster with the additional conditions or procedures in writing and the operator/blaster shall comply with them until the permit expires or the Sheriff is satisfied they are no longer required and cancels the additional requirements.

The blaster shall permit the chief or his designee, to inspect the pyrotechnic/blast site, blast materials, explosives or explosive storage magazines at any reasonable time.

G. Section 105.6.30 of the California Fire Code is herby amended to read as follows:

105.6.30 Open burning An operational permit shall be required for the kindling or maintaining of an open fire or a fire on any public street, alley, road or other public or private ground. In instructions and stipulations of the permit shall be adhered to.

Exception: Recreational Fires

H. The following definitions of Section 202 of the California Fire Code are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 202 General Definitions

HAZARDOUS FIRE AREA is land other than state designated fire hazard severity zone (FHSZ) and/or local designated FHSZ which is covered with grass, brush, or dense vegetation, whether privately or publicly owned, which is so situated or is of such inaccessible location that a fire originating upon such land would present an abnormally difficult job of suppression or would result in great and unusual damage through fire or resulting erosion. Such areas are designated on the maps entitled "Hazardous Fire Areas of Moreno Valley" on file in the office of the city clerk and in the office of the fire chief.

8.36.040 General Precautions Against Fire

Chapter 3 General Precautions Against Fire is adopted in its entirety with the following amendments:

- A. **Section 304.1.2 (7) Vegetation** is hereby revised by adding Section "(E)" as follows:
 - (E) MVFD Vegetation Management Guideline.
- B. **Section 318 Fuel Modification Requirements for New Construction** is hereby added as follows:
 - **318 Fuel Modification Requirements for New Construction.** All new buildings to be built or installed in areas containing combustible vegetation shall comply with the following:
 - 1. Preliminary fuel modification plans shall be submitted to and approved by the fire code official concurrent with the submittal for approval of any tentative map.
 - 2. Final fuel modification plans shall be submitted to and approved by the fire code official prior to the issuance of a grading permit.
 - 3. The fuel modification plans shall meet the criteria set forth in the Fuel Modification Section of the Moreno Valley Fire Department Vegetation Management Guideline.

- 4. The fuel modification plan may be altered if conditions change. Any alterations to the fuel modification areas shall have prior approval by the fire code official.
- 5. All elements of the fuel modification plan shall be maintained in accordance with the approved plan and are subject to the enforcement process outlined in the Fire Code.
- C. Section 319 Clearance of brush or vegetation growth from roadways is hereby added as follows:

319 Clearance of brush or vegetation growth from roadways. The fire code official is authorized to cause areas within 10 feet (3048 mm) on each side of portions of highways and private streets which are improved, designed or ordinarily used for vehicular traffic, to be cleared of flammable vegetation and other combustible growth. Measurement shall be from the flow-line or the end of the improved edge of the roadway surfaces.

Exception: Single specimens of trees, ornamental shrubbery or cultivated ground cover such as green grass, ivy, succulents or similar plants used as ground covers, provided that they do not form a means of readily transmitting fire.

D. Section 320 Unusual Circumstances is hereby added as follows:

320 Unusual circumstances. The fire code official may suspend enforcement of the vegetation management requirements and require reasonable alternative measures designed to advance the purpose of this code if determined that in any specific case that any of the following conditions exist:

- Difficult terrain.
- 2 Danger of erosion.
- 3 Presence of plants included in any state and federal resources agencies, California Native Plant Society and county-approved list of wildlife, plants, rare, endangered and/or threatened species.
- 4 Stands or groves of trees or heritage trees.
- 5 Other unusual circumstances that make strict compliance with the clearance of vegetation provisions undesirable or impractical.

E. Section 321 Use of Equipment is hereby added as follows:

321 Use of equipment. Except as otherwise provided in this section, no person shall use, operate, or cause to be operated, in, upon or adjoining any hazardous fire area any internal combustion engine which uses hydrocarbon fuels, unless the engine is equipped with a spark arrester as defined in Section 321.1 maintained in effective working order, or the engine is constructed, equipped and maintained for the prevention of fire.

Exception:

- 1. Engines used to provide motor power for trucks, truck tractors, buses, and passenger vehicles, except motorcycles, are not subject to this section if the exhaust system is equipped with a muffler as defined in the Vehicle Code of the State of California.
- 2. Turbocharged engines are not subject to this section if all exhausted gases pass through the rotating turbine wheel, there is no exhaust bypass to the atmosphere, and the turbocharger is in good mechanical condition
- F. **Section 321.1 Spark Arrestors** is hereby added as follows:
- **321.1 Spark arrestors.** Spark arrestors shall comply with the following:
- 1. A spark arrester is a device constructed of nonflammable material specifically for the purpose of removing and retaining carbon and other flammable particles over 0.0232 of an inch (0.58 mm) in size from the exhaust flow of an internal combustion engine that uses hydrocarbon fuels or which is qualified and rated by the United States Forest Service.
- 2. Spark arresters affixed to the exhaust system of engines or vehicles subject to Section 321 shall not be placed or mounted in such a manner as to allow flames or heat from the exhaust system to ignite any flammable material.
- G. Section 322 Restricted Entry is hereby added as follows:
- **322 Restricted Entry.** The fire chief shall determine and publicly announce when hazardous fire areas shall be closed to entry and when such areas shall again be opened to entry. Entry on and occupation of hazardous fire areas, except public roadways, inhabited areas or established trails and camp sites which have not been closed during such time when the hazardous fire area is closed to entry, is prohibited.

Exception:

- 1. Residents and owners of private property within hazardous fire areas and their invitees and guests going to or being upon their lands.
- 2. Entry, in the course of duty, by peace or police officers, and other duly authorized public officers, members of a fire department and members of the United States Forest Service.
- H. **Section 323 Trespassing on posted property** is hereby added as follows:

- **323 Trespassing on posted property.** When the fire chief determines that a specific area within a hazardous fire area presents an exceptional and continuing fire danger because of the density of natural growth, difficulty of terrain, proximity to structures or accessibility to the public, such areas shall be closed until changed conditions warrant termination of closure. Such areas shall be posted as hereinafter provided.
 - Signs. Approved signs prohibiting entry by unauthorized persons and referring to applicable fire code chapters shall be placed on every closed area.
 - 2. Trespassing. Entering and remaining within areas closed and posted is prohibited.

Exception: Owners and occupiers of private or public property within closed and posted areas, their guests or invitees, and local, state and federal public officers and their authorized agents acting in the course of duty.

I. Section 324 Outdoor fires is hereby added as follows:

324 Outdoor fires. Outdoor fires shall not be built, ignited or maintained in or upon hazardous fire areas, except by permit from the fire code official.

Exception: Outdoor fires within habited premises or designated campsites where such fires are built in a permanent barbecue, portable barbecue, outdoor fireplace, incinerator or grill and are a minimum of 30 feet (9144 mm) from a grass, grain, brush, or forest-covered area. Permanent barbecues, portable barbecues, outdoor fireplaces or grills shall not be used for the disposal of rubbish, trash or combustible waste material.

8.36.050 Emergency Planning and Preparedness

8.36.060 Fire Service Feature

Chapter 5 Fire Service Features is adopted in its entirety with the following amendments:

A. The following definitions of Section 502.1 of the California Fire Code are hereby amended to read as follows:

FIRE APPARATUS ACCESS ROAD. A road that provides fire apparatus access from a fire station to a facility, building or portion thereof. This is a general term inclusive of all other terms such as public street, private street, parking lot lane and access roadway.

FIRE LANE. A road or other passageway developed to allow the passage of fire apparatus. A fire lane is not necessarily intended for vehicular traffic other than fire apparatus. A fire lane shall be distinguished from a fire apparatus access road in that a fire lane shall be the road or passage that is located directly adjacent to the exterior walls and main entrance of the building.

- B. Section 503.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **503.1 Where required.** Fire apparatus access roads shall be provided and maintained in accordance with Section 503.1.1 through 503.1.3. The fire chief or his/her designee shall be the only authority authorized to designate fire lanes.
- C. Section 503.1.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - **503.1.1 Exception**. Remove item #3 from the Exception clause.
- D. Section 503.1.4 of the California Fire Code is hereby added to read as follows:
- **503.1.4 Other obstructions to access.** When other obstructions are installed that cause the distances from an approved fire department access road or exceed the maximum distance allowed in Section 503, the fire chief or his/her designee is authorized to require additional fire protection as specified in Section 901.4.3.
- E. Section 503.2.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **503.2.1 Fire Lane Dimensions.** Fire lanes shall have an unobstructed width of not less than 24 feet when the height of a building does not exceed 35 feet. Buildings with heights in excess of 35 feet will require an unobstructed fire lane to be at least 30 feet in width. All roof height dimensions shall be measured on a vertical plane from the lowest level of vehicular access to the highest point of the roofs edge, or to the top of the parapet, whichever is higher.
- F. Section 503.2.2 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **503.2.2 Authority.** The fire code official shall have the authority to modify the minimum fire lane access widths where they are inadequate for fire or rescue operations, or otherwise modify the conditions when the minimum fire lane access

widths are not practical. The fire code official is authorized to approve alternate, methods, and materials as means of mitigating practical difficulties and require additional fire protection where applicable as specified in Section 901.4.3.

- G. Section 503.2.7 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **503.2.7 Grade.** The grade of the fire apparatus access road shall be within the limits established by the fire chief or his/her designee based on the fire department's apparatus, however, no grade will exceed twelve (12) percent. Grade transitions shall not exceed Moreno Valley Fire Department apparatus maximum approach and departure angles as determined by the fire chief or his/her designee.
- H. Section 503.3 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to add the following information at the end of the first paragraph:

Fire apparatus access lanes and roads shall be identified by curbs painted red on both the top and face along the entire length of the fire apparatus access road. Where no curb exists or a rolled curb is installed, a six (6) inch wide red strip or approved posted signs applied the full length of the fire apparatus access road shall be installed.

Exception: On school grounds to be implemented as approved by the fire chief or his/her designee.

I. Section 507.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to add the following information at the end of the first paragraph:

An approved permanent water supply capable of supplying the required fire flow for fire protection, shall be provided by the developer prior to the commencement of construction to all premises upon which buildings or portion of buildings are hereafter constructed or moved into or within the jurisdiction. Water supplies for fire protection and hydrants shall be in accordance with Appendix B and C.

- J. Section 507.2.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **507.2.1 Private fire service mains.** Private fire service mains and appurtenances shall be installed in accordance with NFPA 24, and the applicable provisions of NFPA 13, Chapter 10.
 - K. Section 508.5.7 is hereby added to the California Fire Code:
- **507.5.7 Fire hydrant size and outlets.** Fire hydrant size and outlets shall be required as determined by the fire code official
- 1. Residential Standard one (1) four (4) inch outlet, and one (1) two and one half (2 $\frac{1}{2}$) inch outlet.

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- 2. Super Hydrant Standard one (1) four (4) inch outlet, and two (2) two and one half (2 $\frac{1}{2}$) inch outlet.
- 3. Super Hydrant Enhanced two (2) four (4) inch outlet, and one (1) two and one half (2 $\frac{1}{2}$) inch outlet.
- L. Section 508.1.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **508.1.1 Location and access** The fire command center shall be located adjacent to the main lobby and shall be accessible from fire department vehicular access or as approved by the fire code official. The room shall have direct access from the building exterior at the lowest level of fire department access
- M. Section 508.1.2 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **508.1.2 Separation** The fire command center shall be separated from the remainder of the building by not less than a two (2) hour fire barrier constructed and in accordance with Section 707 of the California Building Code, or horizontal assembly constructed in accordance with section 712 of the California Building Code, or both.
 - N. Section 508.1.6 is hereby added to the California Fire Code:
- **508.1.6 Fire command center identification.** The fire command center shall be identified by permanent easily visible sign stating "Fire Dept. Command Center", located on the door to the fire command center.
 - O. Section 510.1.1 is hereby added to the California Fire Code:
- **510.1.1** The appropriate Communications and Technology Units that support the Moreno Valley Fire Department and the Moreno Valley Police Department, at the time the building permit is issued, shall determine the frequency range or ranges that must be supported. For the purpose of this Section, adequate radio coverage shall constitute a successful communications test between the building and the communications centers for all appropriate emergency service providers for the building.
 - P. Section 511 is hereby added to the California Fire Code:
- 511 Fire breathing apparatus air systems. All buildings having floors used for human occupancy located 75 feet or more above or below the lowest level of fire department vehicular access shall be equipped with an approved breathing apparatus air refilling system. Such systems shall provide an adequate pressurized air supply through permanent piping system for the replenishment of self contained breathing apparatus carried by fire suppression, rescue and other personnel in the performance of their duties. Location and specification of access stations, and the installation of such breathing apparatus air refilling system shall be made in accordance with the requirements and standards of the Fire Chief.

Chapter 6 Building Service and Systems is adopted in its entirety with the following amendments

- A. **Section 606.8 Refrigerant Detector** is hereby amended as follows:
- **606.8 Refrigerant Detector**. Machinery rooms shall contain a refrigerant detector with an audible and visual alarm. The detector, or a sampling tube that draws air to the detector, shall be located in an area where refrigerant from a leak will concentrate. The alarm shall be actuated at a value not greater than the corresponding TLV-TWA values shown in the California Mechanical Code for the refrigerant classification. Detectors and alarms shall be placed in approved locations. Emergency shutoff shall also be automatically activated when the concentration of refrigerant vapor exceeds 25 percent of LFL. The detector shall transmit a signal to an approved location.
- B. **Section 606.10.1.2 Manual Operation** is hereby amended as follows:
- **606.10.2 Manual operation**. When required by the fire code official, automatic crossover valves shall be capable of manual operation. The manual valves shall be located in an approved location immediately outside of the machinery room, in a secure metal box or equivalent and marked as Emergency Controls.
- C. **Section 608.1 Scope** is hereby amended as follows:
- **608.1 Scope**. Stationary storage battery systems having an electrolyte capacity of more than 50 gallons (189 L) for flooded lead acid, nickel cadmium (Ni-Cd) and valve-regulated lead acid (VRLA), or 1,000 pounds (454 kg) for lithium-ion and lithium metal polymer, used for facility standby power, emergency power or, uninterrupted power supplies, shall comply with this section and Table 608.1. Indoor charging of electric carts/cars with more than 50 gallons (189 L) shall comply with Section 608.10,
- D. **Section 608.10 Indoor charging of electric carts/cars** is hereby added as follows:
 - **608.10 Indoor charging of electric carts/cars.** Indoor charging of electric carts/cars where the combined volume of all electric/cars battery electrolyte exceeds 50 gallons shall comply with following:
 - 1. Spill control and neutralization shall be provided and comply with Section 608.5.
 - 2. Room ventilation shall be provided and comply with Section 608.6.1
 - 3. Signage shall be provided and comply with Section 608.7
 - 4. Smoke detection shall be provided and comply with Section 907.2

E. Section 610 Photovoltaic Systems is hereby added as follows:

SECTION 610 - PHOTOVOLTAIC SYSTEMS

Section 610.1 General is hereby added as follows:

610.1 Manual operation. Photovoltaic systems shall comply with the Moreno Valley Fire Department Guideline for Fire Safety Elements of Solar Photovoltaic Systems.

8.36.100 Fire Protection Systems

Chapter 9 Fire Protection Systems is adopted in its entirety with the following amendments

A. Section 901.3.1 is hereby added to the California Fire Code:

901.3.1 Modifications. No person shall remove or modify any fire protection system installed or maintained under the provisions of the California Fire Code without approval by the fire marshal and the building official.

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- B. Section 901.6 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **901.6 Inspection, testing and maintenance.** Fire detection, alarm and extinguishing systems shall be maintained in an operative condition at all times, and shall be replaced or repaired where defective. It shall be the responsibility of the owner to ensure that these requirements are met. Non required fire protection systems and equipment shall be inspected, tested and maintained or removed. Prior to the removal of any fire protection system approval shall be obtained from the fire marshal or building official.
- C. Section 903.2.10.1.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **903.2.10.1.1 Opening dimension and access.** Openings shall have a minimum dimension of not less than 36 inches (762 mm). Such openings shall be accessible to the fire department from the exterior and shall not be obstructed in a manner that the fire fighter or rescue cannot be accomplished from the exterior.
 - D. Section 903.2 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended as follows:
 - **903.2 Where required**. Approved automatic sprinkler systems in buildings and structures shall be provided when one of the following conditions exists
 - 1. New buildings: Notwithstanding any applicable provisions of Sections 903.2.1 through 903.2.12, an automatic fire-extinguishing system shall also be installed in all occupancies when the total building area exceeds 3,600 square feet (465 m²) as defined in Section 202, regardless of fire areas or allowable area.
 - Exception: Group R-3 occupancies. Group R-3 occupancies shall comply with Section 903.2.8.
 - 2. Existing Buildings: Notwithstanding any applicable provisions of this code, an automatic sprinkler system shall be provided in an existing building when an addition occurs and when one of the following conditions exists:
 - a. When an addition is 33% or more of the existing building area, and the resulting building area exceeds 3,600 square feet (465 m²) as defined in Section 202; or
 - b. When an addition exceeds 1500 square feet (186 m²) and the resulting building area exceeds 3,600 square feet (465 m²) as defined in Section 202.

- E. Section 903.4 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **903.4 Sprinkler Monitoring and alarms.** All valves controlling the water supply for automatic sprinkler systems, fire pumps, booster pumps, water supply tanks, water levels and temperatures, critical air pressures, and water-flow switches on all sprinkler systems shall be electrically supervised in accordance with NFPA 72, regardless of the number of sprinklers in 13 and 13R systems.

Exception:

- Automatic sprinkler systems protecting one- and two-family dwellings.
- 2. Limited area systems serving fewer than 20 sprinklers.
- Automatic sprinkler systems installed in accordance with NFPA 13R where a common supply main is used to supply both domestic water and the automatic sprinkler system, and a separate shutoff valve for the automatic sprinkler system is not provided.
- 4. Jockey pump control valves that are sealed or locked in the open position.
- 5. Control valves to commercial kitchen hoods, paint spray booths or dip tanks that are sealed or locked in the open position.
- 6. Valves controlling the fuel supply to fire pump engines that are sealed or locked in the open position.
- 7. Trim valves to pressure switches in dry, preaction and deluge sprinkler systems that are sealed or locked in the open position.
- F. Section 903.4.3 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **903.4.3 Floor control valves.** Approved supervised indication control valves shall be provided at the point of connection to the riser on each floor in buildings five (5) or more stories in height unless otherwise approved by the fire chief or his/her designee. Valve locations will be determined and approved by the fire chief or his/her designee.
 - G. Section 905.3.11 is hereby added to the California Fire Code:
- **905.3.11 High-rise building fire department connections.** Two (2), four (4) way, fire department connections serving single or combination systems shall be separated from each other and located at opposite sides of the building or as determined by the fire chief or his/her designee. At least one (1) of the fire department connections shall be connected to risers above a riser isolation valve.
- H. Section 907.2.19.1 of the California Fire code is hereby added to read as follows:

- **907.2.19.1 Underground buildings.** All underground buildings shall be equipped throughout with a manual fire alarm system, including an emergency voice/alarm communication system installed in accordance with Section 907.2.12.3
 - I. Section 907.4.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended as follows:
- 907.4.1 Duct smoke detectors. Smoke detectors installed in ducts shall be listed for the air velocity, temperature and humidity present in the duct. Duct smoke detectors shall be connected to the building's fire alarm control unit when a fire alarm system is installed. Activation of a duct smoke detector shall initiate a visible and audible supervisory signal at a constantly attended location and shall perform the intended fire safety function in accordance with this code and the California Mechanical Code. Duct smoke detectors shall not be used as a substitute for required open area detection.

Exception:

- In occupancies not required to be equipped with a fire alarm system, actuation of a smoke detector shall activate a visible and an audible signal in an approved location. Smoke detector trouble conditions shall activate a visible or audible signal in an approved location and shall be identified as air duct detector trouble.
- J. Section 910.3.2.2 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended as follows:
 - **910.3.2.2 Sprinklered Buildings.** Where installed in buildings equipped with an approved automatic sprinkler system, smoke and heat vents shall be designed to operate automatically by actuation of a heat-responsive device rated at least 100° F above the operating temperature of the sprinkler, unless otherwise approved.
- K. Section 912.2.1 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:
- **9.12.2.1 Visible locations.** Fire department connections shall be located on the front access side of buildings, fully visible and recognizable from the street or nearest point of fire department vehicle access or as otherwise approved by the fire chief or his/her designee. The location of fire department connections shall be approved and installed as follows:
- 1. Within 40 feet of an approved roadway or driveway and arranged so that hose lines can be readily attached to the inlets without interference from any nearby objects including buildings, fences, posts, plantings, or other fire department connections or otherwise approved by the fire chief or his/her designee.
 - 2. Within 50 feet of an approved hydrant.
- 3. So that the inlet height shall not be less than 18 inches or more than 48 inches above grade.

- 4. Guard posts or other approved means shall be required to protect fire department inlet connections from vehicular damage.
- L. Section 914.5 of the California Fire Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

914.5 Underground and windowless buildings. Underground buildings shall comply with sections 914.5.1 through 914.5.6 and windowless buildings with a total floor area that exceeds 5000 square feet shall comply with Section 914.5.2 through 914.5.6.

Exception: This section shall not apply to one and two-family residential dwellings.

Exception – Fireworks 1.4G and fireworks 1.3G may be part of an electrically fired public display when permitted and conducted by a licensed pyrotechnic operator

B. **Section 3301.3 Seizure of Fireworks** is hereby added as follows:

3301.3 Seizure of Fireworks. The fire chief shall have the authority to seize, take, remove all fireworks stored, sold, offered for sale, used or handled in violation of the provisions of Title 19 CCR, Chapter 6. Any seizure or removal

pursuant to this section shall be in compliance with all applicable statutory, constitutional, and decisional law.

C. **Section 3308.1 General** is hereby amended as follows:

3308.1 GENERAL. Outdoor fireworks displays, use of pyrotechnics before proximity audience and pyrotechnic special effects in theatrical, and group entertainment productions, shall comply with California Code of Regulations, Title 19, Division 1, Chapter 6 – Fireworks, the Moreno Valley Fire Department Guideline for Public Fireworks Displays, and with the conditions of the permit as approved by the fire code official.

8.36.350 Flammable and Combustible Liquids

- C. Section 4909 Explosives and Blasting is hereby added as follows:

4909 Explosives and Blasting. Explosives shall not be possessed, kept, stored, sold, offered for sale, given away, used, discharged, transported or disposed of within wildland-urban interface areas, or hazardous fire areas except by permit from the fire code official.

The city council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more subsection, subdivision, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, or phrases be declared unconstitutional, invalid, or ineffective.

SECTION 7. NOTICE OF ADOPTION:

Within fifteen days after the date of adoption hereof, the City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and cause it to be posted in three public places within the city.
