BACKGROUND

On July 8, 2003, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2003-58 adopting the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges for the City of Moreno Valley's Electric Utility, or Moreno Valley Utility (MVU). Electric Rule 12 entitled "Rates and Optional Rates" of that document states that the rates to be charged by and paid to the City's utility for electric service will be the rates legally in effect and on file with the Electric Utility Division, Department of Public Works. At its meeting on December 9, 2003, the City Council approved Ordinances 650 and 651 providing for the establishment and adjustment of electric rates by resolution.

DISCUSSION

Consistent with Ordinances 650 and 651, the resolution considered in this action amends MVU's Electric Rates. A complete copy of the proposed *Electric Rates* document is available for review in the Public Works Department, Electric Utility Division office. To ensure the City's rates are just and reasonable and to ensure that the City's rates are set at a level sufficient to cover the utility's costs, it will be necessary for the City Council to approve an adjustment of the rates that MVU charges customers for service from time to time. Due to the structure of MVU's rates, the customer's usage will ultimately determine the impact of this proposed rate adjustment on their monthly bill.

For example, the proposed rate adjustment considered in this council action will affect a residential customer who uses 600 kWh in a month differently than a customer who uses 1000 kWh in a month. The proposed rate changes considered in the council action will result in an increase of MVU's rate schedules for both the summer season and winter season. Pursuant to MVU's rates, the summer season begins at 12:00 am on the first Sunday in June and continues until 12:00 am on the first Sunday in October. The winter season begins at 12:00 am on the first Sunday in October, and continues until 12:00 am on the first Sunday in June of the following year. In other words, there are four months in the summer season, and eight months in the winter season.

If the City Council approves the proposed rate adjustments, the impact to each class of customers is described in the tables below:

If approved by the City Council, these changes will become effective at 12:00 a.m. on November 28, 2012.

Pursuant to Section 5 of the Professional Services Agreement by and between the City of Moreno Valley and ENCO Utility Services Moreno Valley, LLC, the City is obligated to adjust its rates from time to time so that the City's electric rates remain roughly equivalent to the otherwise applicable investor owned utility rate schedules. This council action will true-up MVU's rates to comply with this obligation, and comply with State law. If adopted, the net impact upon MVU customers will be a reduction in rates.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve proposed resolution amending the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility as on file in the Electric Utility Division, Public Works Department. The amendment of the Electric Rates will allow the City's utility to recover its costs for service, and to offer competitive rates.
- 2. Do not approve proposed resolution amending the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility as on file in the Electric Utility Division, Public Works Department. This would restrict the City's utility in its ability to recover utility costs, and also its ability to offer competitive rates.

FISCAL IMPACT

As rates are adjusted, revenues will reflect the adjustments. Utility revenues are projected to decrease if the proposed changes are adopted by the City Council.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

REVENUE DIVERSIFICATION AND PRESERVATION:

The municipal electric utility will generate revenues to provide funding for City programs and services over time. These revenues will help achieve important financial goals of the City.

POSITIVE ENVIRONMENT:

The proposed rate adjustments ensures timely changes to the rates of the City's utility, and helps to create a positive environment for economic development within the community. The City of Moreno Valley will offer competitive rates and will help the City create new, well paying jobs.

WHEREAS, the City of Moreno Valley (the "City"), a municipal corporation, is authorized pursuant to Article XI, Section 9(a) of the California Constitution to establish, purchase, and operate public works to furnish its inhabitants with light, water, power, heat, transportation, or means of communication; and

WHEREAS, on June 26, 2001, the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley approved Resolution No. 2001-33 and, as amended by Resolution 2002-46, authorized the formation of a municipally owned utility for the purpose of providing electrical power, storm water, telephone telecommunications, cable TV, water, natural gas, and sanitary sewer; and

WHEREAS, on July 8, 2003, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2003-58 adopting the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges document for Moreno Valley Utility which states, in part, that the rates to be charged by and paid to the City for electric service will be the rates legally in effect and on file with the City Council; and

WHEREAS, there are sections of the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges document that contain rules which define the terms and conditions under which electric service will be provided to the customer; and

WHEREAS, there are rules, fees, charges, and rates associated with providing the services identified in the document. These rules, fees, charges, and rates are deemed necessary and equitable for services rendered and are required to fund in whole or in part, all of the services required to facilitate the delivery of electric distribution pursuant to the rules; and

WHEREAS, Urgency Ordinance No. 651 was adopted by the City Council on December 9, 2003, allowing for the adoption of rates by resolution.

Applying for the Medical Baseline Allocation

- 1. Request application from Moreno Valley Utility by telephone, mail or in person
- 2. Complete application.
- 3. The patient's physician will need to fill out the required information on the application and sign it certifying the medical need.
- 4. The customer can mail or bring the application to Moreno Valley Utility's offices
- 5. Once the application is reviewed and approved, the Medical Baseline Allocation will be effective on the next regular electric billing.
- 6. Applications must be renewed every two years.
- 7. Low Income Program A low-income assistance discount program is offered under this standard residential rate. To be considered for this discount, an application must be filed with Moreno Valley Utility. To be eligible for this discount, the income of the customer, including all members of the household, must meet the income levels of the program and can be no more than 200% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. Under this program a discount for qualified low-income residents of 20% is provided on monthly energy charges. Discount applies to energy charges only. The customer charge, public purpose charge, service fees and all taxes are calculated at the standard rates.

- 4. Maximum Demand: The maximum demand in any month shall be the measured maximum average kilowatt input, indicated or recorded by instruments to be supplied by the City, during any 15-minute metered interval in the month.
- 5. Voltage Discount: The monthly Facilities Related Demand Charge will be reduced by 23.3% for service delivered and metered at voltages of 4 kV through 12 kV. The energy charge will be reduced by \$.00074 per kWh for service delivered and metered at voltages of 2 kV through 12 kV.
- 6. Excess Transformer Capacity: Excess Transformer Capacity is the amount of transformer capacity requested by a customer in excess of that which the City would normally install to serve the customer's Maximum Demand. Excess Transformer Capacity shall be billed at the amount shown in the rates section above.
- 7. Power Factor Adjustment: When Maximum Demand has exceeded 200 kW for three consecutive months, kilovar metering will be installed as soon as practical, and thereafter, until the Maximum Demand has been less than 150 kW for twelve consecutive months, the billing will be adjusted each month for power factor.
 - a. Adjustment Rate:
 - i. For service delivered and metered at voltages 12 kV or less, the billing will be increased by \$0.27 per kilovar of maximum reactive demand.
 - b. Determining the Reactive Demand:
 - i. Service delivered and metered at voltages of 4 kV or greater:
 - 1. The maximum reactive demand shall be the highest measured maximum average kilovar demand indicated or recorded by metering during any 15-minute metered interval in the month. The kilovars shall be determined to

the nearest unit. A device will be installed on each kilovar meter to prevent reverse operation of the meter.

- ii. Services delivered and metered at voltages less than 4 kV:
 - For customers with metering used for billing that measures reactive demand, the maximum reactive demand shall be the highest measured maximum average kilovar demand indicated or recorded by metering during any 15-minute metered interval in the month. The kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A device will be installed on each kilovar meter to prevent reverse operation of the meter.
 - 2. For customers with metering used for billing that measures kilovar-hours instead of reactive demand, the kilovars of reactive demand shall be calculated by multiplying the kilowatts of measured maximum demand by the ratio of the kilovar-hours to the kilowatt-hours. Demands in kilowatts and kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A ratchet device will be installed on the kilovar-hour meter to prevent its reverse operation on leading power factors.

Should the applicant not commence using the street lighting in a bona fide manner within ninety (90) days after date of completion and installation of a street light or street lighting system requested by the applicant, the MVU will bill, and the applicant shall pay, the applicable lamp charge(s).
 - 5. Liability of Utility: MVU shall not, by taking action pursuant to its tariffs, be liable for any loss, damage, or injury, established or alleged, which may result, or be claimed to result, therefrom.

The Winter season begins at 12:00 a.m. on the first Sunday in October and continue until 12:00 a.m. on the first Sunday in June of the following year.
- 3. Voltage: Service will be supplied at one standard voltage.
- 4. Billing Demand: The Billing Demand shall be the kilowatts of Maximum Demand, determined to the nearest kW. The Billing Demand shall be the greater of the kilowatts of Maximum Demand recorded (or established for) the monthly billing period or 50% of the highest Maximum Demand established in the preceding eleven months (Ratcheted Demand).
- 5. Maximum Demand: The maximum demand in any month shall be the measured maximum average kilowatt input, indicated or recorded by instruments to be supplied by the City, during any 15-minute metered interval in the month.
- 6. Excess Transformer Capacity: Transformer Capacity is the amount of transformer capacity requested by a customer in excess of that which the City would normally install to serve the customer's Maximum Demand. Excess Transformer Capacity shall be billed at the amount shown in the rates section above.
 - 7. Power Factor Adjustment: The billing will be adjusted each month for power factor.

- a. Adjustment Rate: The customer's bill will be increased each month for the power factor \$0.27 per kilovar of maximum reactive demand.
- b. The maximum reactive demand shall be the highest measured maximum average kilovar demand indicated or recorded by metering during any 15 minute metered interval in the month. For customers with metering used for billing that measures kilovar-hours instead of reactive demand, the kilovars of reactive demand shall be calculated by multiplying the kilowatts of measured maximum demand by the ratio of the kilovar-hours to the kilowatt-hours. Demands in kilowatts and kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A device will be installed on the kilovar-hour meter to prevent its reverse operation on leading power factors.

SCHEDULE SE - SERVICE ESTABLISHMENT CHARGE

- 1. NEM customers will receive a credit for the surplus electricity supplied to MVU's system.
- 2. This credit will be applied to the customer's energy bill, to offset all or part of the costs associated with the energy that is consumed each month.
- 3. Residential accounts are billed once a year for "net" energy consumed or generated over the previous 12 months, if any.
- 4. Small business accounts served under the General Service Rate also qualify for annual billing.
- 5. Large business NEM accounts under the Large General Service Rate are billed monthly for their energy usage.
- 6. Net surplus energy is the amount of generated kilowatt-hours (kWh) energy that is exported to MVU's system that exceeds the amount that is received from MVU.
- 7. Any net surplus energy remaining at the end of the 12-month billing period (also called the "relevant period") will be given a monetary value known as the Net Surplus Compensation Rate (NSCR).
- 8. The NSCR value is established by MVU to reflect the costs MVU avoids in procuring power during the time period net surplus generators are likely to produce excess power.
- 9. Customers may choose to either roll over the monetary value of any net surplus energy to the next billing cycle, or receive payment for any net surplus energy at the end of your 12-month relevant period.
- 10. Customers will be billed monthly for nominal non-energy-related charges such as taxes.

SCHEDULE ED - ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ("ED") RATE

Applicability

Commercial or industrial end-use customers that would otherwise receive service under Electric Rate Schedule TOU-LGS (Time of Use-Large General Service) and meet certain criteria as established and adopted by resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley may take advantage of the ED rate as a New Customer or Expanded Load Customer. This ED rate is applicable to all or part of the services provided to New Customers and Expanded Load Customers, as such terms are defined herein.

- 1. A New Customer shall be a customer seeking to locate a new business or relocate an existing business (not currently located within the territory served by Moreno Valley Utility) within Moreno Valley Utility's service territory.
- 2. An Expanded Load Customer shall be an existing Moreno Valley Utility TOU-LGS customer that is adding new load to Moreno Valley by a minimum of 200 kW based upon the customer's past electrical demand as determined by Moreno Valley Utility. The expanded load can be at the customer's current site, or at a new site within the Moreno Valley Utility service territory. The ED rate will only be applied to the expanded load as determined in Section 5 below.
- 3. A New Customer shall meet the following criteria:
 - a. Targeted industries
 - i. Logistics/Distribution
 - ii. Medical/Healthcare
 - iii. Auto Dealerships
 - b. Building/Area size

i. Logistics/Distributionii. Medical/Healthcare500,000 sf minimum100,000 sf minimum

iii. Auto Dealerships 5 acres

c. Job Creation

i. Tier 1 Discount Rate
 ii. Tier 2 Discount Rate
 500 – 999 jobs

iii. Tier 3 Discount Rate greater than 1000 jobs iv. Tier 4 Discount Rate 350 jobs minimum

d. City Revenue Producer – either sales tax or use tax generation

i. Tier 1a Discount Rate

ii. Tier 4 Discount Rate \$40,000 annual minimum to the City

Territory

Within the entire territory served by the Moreno Valley Utility.

Character of Service

The service provided hereunder shall be alternating current with regulated frequency of 60 hertz, three-phase, or a combination single and three-phase served through one meter, at a standard voltage not to exceed 480 volts, or as may be specified by the Electric Division. To be eligible to participate all customers must have a demand meter.

Rates

Except as provided herein, or in the Economic Development Rate Agreement, all charges and provisions of the customer's otherwise applicable rate schedule shall apply. The applicable Energy Charge and Demand Charge under the customer's otherwise applicable rate schedule will be reduced as follows:

Special Conditions

- 1. <u>Term</u>: Economic Development Rate Agreements entered into under this Schedule shall be for a single six-year term, except for Tier 4, which shall be for a single twelve-year term.
- 2. <u>Approval</u>: Application of this Rate Schedule shall be subject to the approval of the City Manager or his designee, based on meeting the eligibility criteria outlined herein.
- 3. Agreement: The customer must sign a standard Moreno Valley Economic Development Rate Agreement in order for the rates under this Schedule to be applicable. In addition to the other terms of this Schedule, the Economic Development Rate Agreement shall require the customer to reimburse Moreno Valley for all rate reductions received under this Schedule, if the customer fails to maintain the required minimum load during the six-year term or twelve-year term of the Agreement.
- 4. Minimum Load: Customers qualifying under this Schedule as a New Customer with a projected minimum monthly electric demand of at least 500 kW or as an Expanded Load Customer under Applicability Sections 1 and 2 above, respectively, must agree to maintain a minimum level of load for six years for Tier 1/1a, Tier 2, and Tier 3 discounts, and twelve years for Tier 4 discount from the date service is first rendered under this Schedule as set forth in the Economic Development Rate Agreement.
- 5. <u>Base Period Usage</u>: Base Period Usage shall be established and agreed to in the Economic Development Rate Agreement for Expanded Load Customers.

Base Period Usage shall be the average monthly energy use and demand for the customer during the last three years of service to the customer, from the date ending the last payment period before the date of the Agreement. Expanded Load qualifying for the rate under this Schedule shall be measured as the difference between the new monthly, meter documented energy use and demand, and the Base Period Usage.

- 6. <u>State Mandated Public Purpose Program Charge</u>: All bills rendered under this Schedule shall be subject to the Public Purpose Program Charge as established by the City Council.
- 7. <u>Miscellaneous Fees and Charges</u>: Rates charged pursuant to this Schedule shall be subject to any Energy Users Taxes, Utility Users Taxes, and any other governmental taxes, duties, or fees which are applicable to Electric Service provided to Customer by the City of Moreno Valley. Rates are also subject to adjustment, as established by the City of Moreno Valley City Council in response to federal or state climate change laws, renewable portfolio standard or other mandated legislation. These adjustments may include but are not limited to charges to mitigate the impacts of greenhouse gas emissions or "green power" premiums.
- 8. <u>Expanded Load</u>: Expanded Load customers applying for this rate must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Utility that the expanded load is new to Moreno Valley.
- 9. Effective Date: The effective date of the Economic Development Rate Agreement shall commence within 12 months from the date of the City's approval, or the Agreement becomes null and void. The Agreement becomes effective upon execution by the parties, and the Economic Development Rate commences upon written notice by customer, and coincides with the customer's normal billing cycle.
- 10. <u>Reapplication</u>: Customers who have received service under the Economic Development Rate are eligible to reapply for the rate as an Expanded Load Customer 12 months after their current Economic Development Rate Agreement has expired, if they meet the criteria therefore.
- 11. <u>Restrictions</u>: Residential customers and federal, state or local government agencies are not eligible to apply for service under this Schedule.

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RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendation:

1. Approve Resolution No. 2012-92 authorizing the submittal of an application for the California Transportation Commission (CTC) State-Local Partnership Program (SLPP) grant for the requested amount of \$1.0 million for the Perris Boulevard Widening Project from Ironwood Avenue to Manzanita Avenue.

BACKGROUND

The California Transportation Commission (CTC) is accepting grant applications for the State-Local Partnership Program (SLPP). Proposition 1B Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006, authorized \$1.0 billion to be available for allocation by the CTC over a five-year period to eligible transportation projects. This Bond Act requires a dollar to dollar match of local funds, such as Transportation Uniform Mitigation Fees (TUMF) or Development Impact Fees (DIF). The CTC is accepting applications for shovel-ready projects for the SLPP grant through November 30, 2012.

Since the Planning, Environmental, Right of Way, and Design Phases of the Perris Boulevard Widening Project from Ironwood Avenue to Manzanita Avenue were completed in August 2011, the project is considered ready for construction (shovel-ready). The Project is on the regional TUMF network and qualifies for regional TUMF

program funding administered by the Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC). Currently, the regional TUMF funded Perris Boulevard Widening from Perris Valley Storm Drain Lateral "B" (southerly City limit) to Cactus Avenue is under construction and it is anticipated that it will be completed with at least \$1.0 million in cost savings, which can be applied as a local match for the Perris Boulevard Widening Project from Ironwood Avenue to Manzanita Avenue.

DISCUSSION

Perris Boulevard is an existing partially improved north-south arterial street between the limits of Ironwood Avenue and Manzanita Avenue in the City of Moreno Valley. The existing improvements vary in width consisting of a two-lane road with shoulders to areas that are fully built-out but striped for two lanes. This project will widen and improve a 1.2 mile long segment of Perris Boulevard between Ironwood Avenue and Manzanita Avenue to an arterial highway standard with a curb-to-curb width of 76-foot to 86-foot within a 100-foot to 110-foot right-of-way. The proposed Perris Boulevard improvements will include curb, gutter, storm drain, pavement, sidewalk, street lights, traffic signal, and traffic signal modifications, signing and striping, and related road improvements. In August 2011, right-of-way acquisition and the final Plans, Specifications, and Estimates were completed with a Mitigated Negative Declaration adopted earlier; therefore, this project is shovel-ready.

The purpose of this project is to not only complete a vital arterial link within the City that benefits Moreno Valley residents but also to benefit inter-county travel between Riverside and San Bernardino Counties because Perris Boulevard connects with the Reche Vista Drive - Reche Canyon Drive inter-county corridor between State Route 60 in Riverside County and the Interstate 10 freeway in San Bernardino County. It will increase mobility, improve air quality, improve drainage, and enhance safety by completing the missing sections of street improvements and create four continuous travel lanes. These improvements include turn lanes at intersections, a new traffic signal at Pico-Vista Way, modification of existing traffic signals within the project limits, and appurtenant drainage modifications.

The construction phase of the project is estimated to cost \$6.0 million. City staff will be preparing an application package seeking \$1.0 million and City Council is asked to approve the proposed Resolution so that the package may be submitted to the CTC. As part of the application process, the City must show that they are financially capable of funding the dollar to dollar match as required by the program. Therefore, staff is also requesting a City Council commitment of up to \$1.0 million in TUMF funds from the realized savings due to lower bids received for the other Perris Boulevard project that is currently under construction; subject to approval of the RCTC who is responsible for the allocation of regional TUMF monies.

The CTC will notify the City in March 2013 if the grant application is approved. If the City receives the \$1.0 million SLPP Grant, staff will immediately return to City Council to consider a funding plan for the project.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This alternative will allow a City application for \$1.0 million in State Grant monies for the Perris Boulevard Widening Project improvements.
- 2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This alternative will not allow a City application for \$1.0 million in State Grant monies for the Perris Boulevard Widening Project improvements.

FISCAL IMPACT

The requested funding for this project totals \$1.0 million. It is anticipated that \$1.0 million will be funded by SLPP grant monies and the required match of \$1.0 million will be available from TUMF savings in the other Perris Boulevard project, contingent on RCTC's concurrence to shift the funds into the Perris Boulevard Widening Project from Ironwood Avenue to Manzanita Avenue.

These funds for the Perris Boulevard Widening Project cannot be utilized for operational activities. There is no impact on the General Fund.

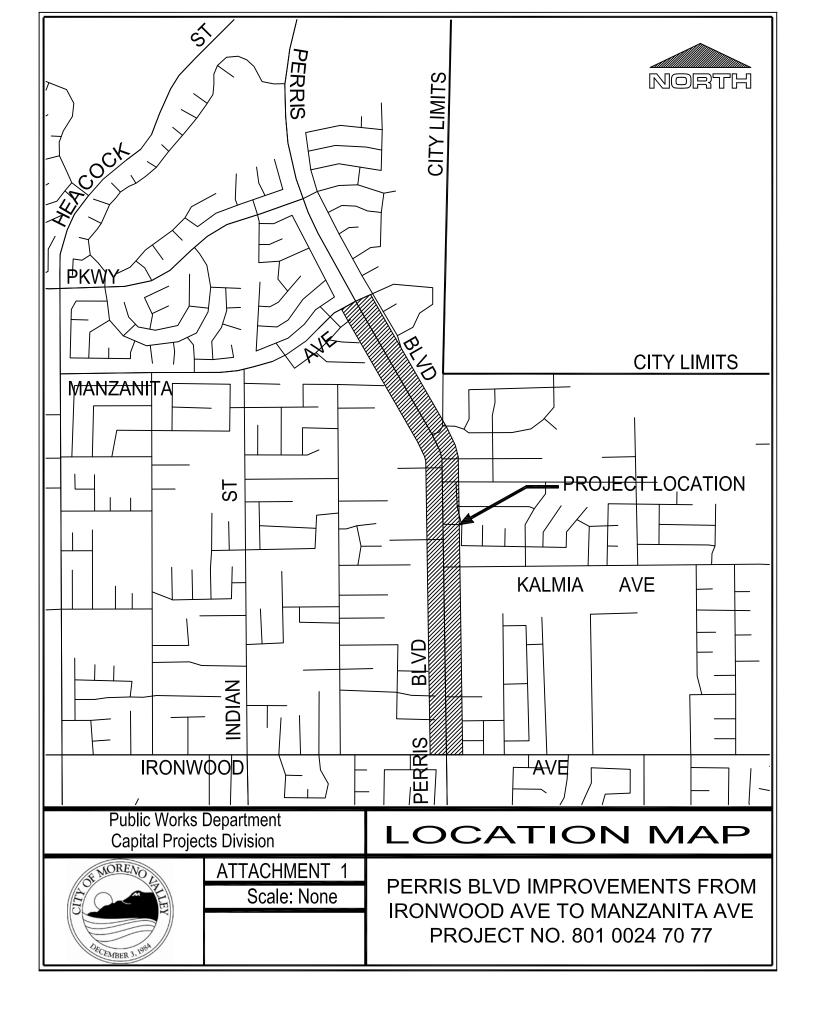

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, AUTHORIZING SUBMITTAL OF AN APPLICATION FOR FUNDS TO THE CALIFORNIA TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION FOR THE STATE-LOCAL PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM GRANT UNDER THE PROPOSITION 1B HIGHWAY SAFETY, TRAFFIC REDUCTION, AIR QUALITY, AND PORT SECURITY BOND ACT OF 2006 FOR THE PERRIS BOULEVARD WIDENING PROJECT FROM IRONWOOD AVENUE TO MANZANITA AVENUE PROJECT NO. 801 0024 70 77

WHEREAS, the California voters approved Proposition 1B Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006, which makes State-Local Partnership Program (SLPP) grant funds available to local agencies through the California Transportation Commission (CTC); and

WHEREAS, the CTC has established the procedures and criteria for nominating proposals; and

WHEREAS, the City of Moreno Valley (City) possesses authority to nominate projects funded using the State-Local Partnership Program funding and to finance, acquire, and construct the proposed project; and

WHEREAS, by formal action, the City Council authorizes the nomination of the Perris Boulevard Widening Project from Ironwood Avenue to Manzanita Avenue, including all understanding and assurances contained therein, and authorizes the Public Works Director/City Engineer or his/her designee to act in connection with the nomination and to provide such additional information as may be required; and

WHEREAS, the City will maintain and operate the property acquired, developed, rehabilitated, or restored for the life of the resultant infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the City approves the commitment of \$1,000,000 of Transportation Uniform Mitigation Fee (TUMF) Funds to provide a dollar to dollar match to the requested \$1,000,000 in SLPP funds; and

AND PURCHASE ORDER WITH LATITUDE GEOGRAPHICS GROUP, LTD. FOR GEOCORTEX ESSENTIALS WEB MAPPING SOFTWARE AND CONSULTANT IMPLEMENTATION SERVICES

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

- Authorize the City Manager to execute an agreement and purchase order with Latitude Geographics Group, Ltd. for costs not-to-exceed \$97,242.90 for the Geocortex Essentials Web Mapping software and consultant services, and first year support for the implementation of a new web mapping solution for the City's intranet and Internet sites: and
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to approve annual support, hosting, and update services payments as follows:

Year 1 - Included - No Charge

Year 2 - \$13,500

Year 3 - \$14,500

Annual maintenance costs will continue for the useful life of the system with authorization requested through the budget process.

BACKGROUND

In 2002, the City implemented a web mapping solution from MoosePoint Technology called GeoSmart.Net, which was built upon Esri's (Environmental Systems Research

Institute) ArcIMS platform. The mapping application which the City's GIS (Geographic Information Systems) group created, GIS Maps Online, provides Internet and intranet access to Moreno Valley's GIS maps and data. The functionality of the application allows users to look up a property by the assessor parcel number (APN), address, or tract number, generate notification mailings, view buffer maps, and print full property records. This tool provides significant time savings for many City departments and directly delivers a beneficial service to the public.

Basic functionality of GIS Maps Online allows users to perform the following functions:

- General Map: Users can interactively view and query all available GIS layers and aerial imagery. Users have the ability to easily research zoning, general plan, trash and street sweeping schedules, and locations of schools, parks, public facilities, as well as other GIS layers.
- Property Map: Users can search for property by APN or address. The parcel will display in the center of the screen, or if multiple records are found the user can scroll through and select a specific property. Once the property is selected, the user can overlay any combination of GIS layers and retrieve all available information for visible GIS layers.
- Notification: Users can query parcels within a user-specified distance resulting with a display of highlighted parcels and a down-loadable list. This is useful in order to prepare a list or mailing labels for notification of affected property owners.
- Map Creation and Printing: Users can create their own maps in portrait or landscape orientation and in various sizes from 8.5" x 11" to 11" x17". An Adobe PDF file is generated and can be printed, saved to disk, or emailed.

DISCUSSION

The City originally implemented MoosePoint Technology's GeoSmart.Net web mapping application in 2002. The application was built on Esri's ArcIMS platform, the industry standard at that time. With the acceptance of ArcGIS Server as the current industry standard, ArcIMS is no longer the recommended product for web map solutions. In July 2013, ArcIMS will cease to be supported by Esri and a new web map solution will have to be in place to continue the web mapping functionality that the City currently offers. Additionally, MoosePoint does not and will not support GeoSmart.Net on ArcGIS Server.

The City already has ArcGIS Server implemented and running in order to support the Web EOC (Emergency Operations Center) system. Staff recommends the acquisition of Latitude Geographics Group's Geocortex Essentials, which runs on the ArcGIS Server platform, to replace the current web mapping application. Geocortex Essentials is a proprietary product that provides superior functionality to the current application. Geocortex Essentials is configurable and allows staff to create custom web maps,

reports, and products to fit the City's needs. Like the current application, Geocortex Essentials can be integrated into existing City applications to facilitate business processes and workflows. With the ability to deploy web services (a method of communication between two devices over the World Wide Web) into various formats Geocortex Essentials allows web mapping to be more widely accessible on tablets and mobile devices.

Due to current workloads, staffing issues, and the desire to achieve the most value from the product, staff recommends use of consultant services to facilitate the migration to the new application and to maximize the functionality of the final product. Latitude Geographics Group, Ltd. will create map services to mirror existing functionality and will assist deployment of web maps to the City's intranet and Internet sites.

During negotiations for this contract, supplementary language was added to Section 14 limiting the indemnification for both the City and Latitude Geographics Group, Ltd. to a maximum liability of three times the contract value (Section 14 (c)). As protocol, the consultant would not enter an agreement with the City without that stated provision. Staff assessed the risks and took into account the following; the consultant will be working remotely and will not be on site for any part of the implementation, the consultant will be working on an isolated server that will not require access to other servers, and consultant staff have signed the appropriate policies (Network Remote Access Policy and the Computer Usage and Security Policy) required to access the City's network. From these factors, it was determined that there is very low risk to the City. The City Attorney reviewed the clause and approved the contract to form.

<u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

- 1. Authorize the City Manager to execute an agreement and purchase order with Latitude Geographics Group, Ltd. for Geocortex Essentials web mapping application software and consultant services, for costs not-to-exceed \$97,242.90. This alternative is recommended by staff.
- 2. Do not authorize the City Manager to execute an agreement and purchase order with Latitude Geographics Group, Ltd. for Geocortex Essentials web mapping application software and consulting services. This alternative is not recommended by staff, as the current platform running the mapping application is being phased out by both ESRI and MoosePoint, and will soon become unsupported.
- Provide staff with further direction.

FISCAL IMPACT

Cost for the proposed consultant agreement will not exceed \$79,455.90 and is available in the Technology Services Professional Services account (7210-30-39-25413-620299). Cost to acquire the software will not exceed \$17,787 and is available in the Technology Services Software Maintenance/Support/License account (7210-30-39-25413-625010).

SUMMARY

Council authorization is requested for the City Manager to approve the Consultant Services Agreement and purchase order with Latitude Geographics Group, Ltd. to install software and provide assistance with the migration of the web mapping application from ArcIMS to ArcGIS Server in the amount not-to-exceed \$97,242.90. The migration of the web mapping application to the ArcGIS Server platform is necessary due to new technology standards and the phase out of the existing application.

This Agreement is by and between the City of Moreno Valley, California, a municipal corporation, hereinafter described as "City," and <u>Latitude Geographics Group</u>, a (Ltd.) hereinafter described as "Consultant." This Agreement is made and entered into effective on the date the City signs this Agreement.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City has determined it is in the public interest to proceed with the work hereinafter described as "Project"; and

WHEREAS, the City has determined the Project involves the performance of professional and technical services of a temporary nature as more specifically described in Exhibit "A" (City's Request for Proposal) and Exhibit "B" (Consultant's Proposal) hereto; and

WHEREAS, the City does not have available employees to perform the services for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the City has requested the Consultant to perform such services for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Consultant is professionally qualified in California to perform the professional and technical services required for the Project;

THEREFORE, the City and the Consultant, for the consideration hereinafter described, mutually agree as follows:

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

The Project is described as the <u>Geocortex Essentials Web Mapping Development</u>.
 Project No. <u>JN 11/12-02</u>.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

- 2. The Consultant's scope of service is described on Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. In the event of a conflict, the City's Request for Proposal shall take precedence over the Consultant's Proposal.
- 3. The City's responsibility is described on Exhibit "C" attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

PAYMENT TERMS

4. The City agrees to pay the Consultant and the Consultant agrees to receive a "Not-to-Exceed" fee of \$79,455.90 in accordance with the payment terms provided on Exhibit "D" attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

TIME FOR PERFORMANCE

- The Consultant shall commence services upon receipt of written direction to proceed from the City.
- 6. The Consultant shall perform the work described on Exhibit "A" in accordance with the schedule set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated by this reference.
- 7. The Consultant and the City agree that the schedule in Paragraph 6 above represents their best estimates with respect to completion dates, and both the Consultant and the City acknowledge that it will not unreasonably withhold approval of the Consultant's requests for extensions of time in which to complete the work required of the Consultant hereunder.
- 8. The Consultant shall not be responsible for performance delays caused by others or delays beyond the Consultant's reasonable control, and such delays shall extend the time for

performance of the work by the Consultant. Delays caused by non-performance or unjustified delay in performance by a subconsultant of the Consultant are not considered to be beyond the Consultant's reasonable control.

- 9. (a) The Consultant agrees that the personnel, including the principal Project manager, and all subconsultants assigned to the Project by the Consultant, shall be subject to the prior approval of the City.
- (b) No change in subconsultants or key personnel shall be made by the Consultant without written prior approval of the City.

SPECIAL PROVISIONS

- 10. It is understood and agreed that the Consultant is, and at all times shall be, an independent contractor and nothing contained herein shall be construed as making the Consultant or any individual whose compensation for services is paid by the Consultant, an agent or employee of the City, or authorizing the Consultant to create or assume any obligation or liability for or on behalf of the City.
- 11. The Consultant may also retain or subcontract for the services of other necessary consultants with the prior written approval of the City. Payment for such services shall be the responsibility of the Consultant. Any and all subconsultants employed by the Consultant shall be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, except that the City shall have no obligation to pay any subconsultant for services rendered on the Project.
- 12. The Consultant and the City agree to use reasonable care and diligence to perform their respective services under this Agreement. Unless hereinafter specified, neither party shall be responsible for the services of the other or any subcontractor or sub-consultant employed by the other party.
 - 13. The Consultant shall comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws in the

performance of work under this Agreement.

- 14. (a) The Consultant agrees to indemnify, defend, and save the City, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority, and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), their officers, agents and employees harmless from any and all liability, claims, demands, damages, or injuries to any person, including injury to the Consultant's employees and all claims which arise from or are connected with the negligent performance of or failure to perform the work or other obligations of the Consultant under this Agreement, or are caused or claim to be caused by the negligent acts of the Consultant, its officers, agents or employees, or its subconsultant(s) or any person acting for the Consultant or under its control or direction; provided, however, that this indemnification and hold harmless shall not include claims arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City, the Housing Authority, and CSD, their officers, agents or employees.
- (b) The City agrees to indemnify, defend and save the Consultant and their officers, agents and employees harmless from any and all liability, claims, damages or injuries to any person, including injury to the City's and CSD's employees and all claims which arise from or are connected with the negligent performance or failure to perform the services or other obligations of the City under this Agreement, or are caused or claim to be caused by the negligent acts of the City, the Housing Authority and CSD, their officers, agents or employees, or its subcontractor(s) or any person acting for the City or under its control or direction; provided, however, that this indemnification and hold harmless shall not include any claims arising from the negligence or willful misconduct of the Consultant, its officers, agents, or employees.
- (c) The maximum liability to both parties under this agreement is a multiple of three (3) times the contract value. Nothing else in this agreement will be deemed to circumvent these limits.
 - 15. (a) The Consultant shall procure and maintain, at its sole expense, throughout

the term of this Agreement and any extension thereof, Professional Errors and Omission Insurance coverage in the form and substance and with carriers acceptable to the City. Such coverage limits shall not be less than \$1,000,000 per claim and aggregate.

(b) During the entire term of this Agreement, the Consultant agrees to procure and maintain General Liability Insurance in form and substance and with carriers acceptable to the City at its sole expense to protect against loss from liability imposed by law for damages on account of bodily injury, including death therefrom, suffered or alleged to be suffered by any person or persons whomever, resulting directly or indirectly from any act or activities of the Consultant its sub-consultant or any person acting for the Consultant or under its control or direction, and also to protect against loss from liability imposed by law for damages to any property of any persons caused directly or indirectly by or from acts or activities of the Consultant or its subconsultants, or any person acting for the Consultant or under its control or direction.

(c) Such General Liability Insurance shall be maintained in full force and effect throughout the terms of the Agreement and any extension thereof in the minimum limits provided below:

General Liability

Bodily Injury \$1,000,000 per occurrence

Property Damage \$ 500,000 per occurrence

A combined single limit policy with aggregate limits in the amount of \$2,000,000 will be considered equivalent to the above minimum limits.

(d) If the operation under this Agreement results in an increased or decreased risk in the opinion of the City Manager, then the Consultant agrees that the minimum limits hereinabove designated shall be changed accordingly upon request by the City Manager.

- (e) The Consultant shall procure and maintain, at its sole expense, and throughout the term of this Agreement and any extension thereof, Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance coverage for owned and non-owned automotive equipment operated on City premises. Such coverage limits shall not be less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit.
- (f) The Consultant shall procure and maintain, at its sole expense, Workers' Compensation Insurance in such amounts as will fully comply with the laws of the State of California and which shall indemnify, insure and provide legal defense for both the Consultant and the City, the Housing Authority and CSD against any loss, claim, or damage arising from any injuries or occupational diseases happening to any worker employed by the Consultant in the course of carrying out the Agreement.
- (g) The City of Moreno Valley, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority, and the Moreno Valley Community Services District, their officers, employees and agents shall be named as additional insured on all policies of insurance except errors and omissions and worker's compensation.
- (h) A Certificate of Insurance and appropriate additional insured endorsement evidencing the above insurance coverage shall be submitted to the City Clerk prior to the execution of this Agreement on behalf of the City.
- (i) The Certificate of Insurance or an appropriate binder shall bear an endorsement containing the following provisions:

"Solely as respect to services done by or on behalf of the named insured for the City of Moreno Valley, it is agreed that the City of Moreno Valley, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority, and the Moreno Valley Community Services District, their officers, employees and agents are included as additional insured under this general liability policy and the coverage(s)

provided shall be primary insurance and not contributing with any other insurance available to the City of Moreno Valley, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority, and the Moreno Valley Community Services District, its officers, employees and agents, under any third party liability policy."

- (j) Insurance companies providing insurance hereunder shall be rated (A minus: VII Admitted) or better in Best's Insurance Rating Guide and shall be legally licensed and qualified to conduct insurance business in the State of California.
- (k) The terms of the insurance policy or policies issued to provide the above insurance coverage shall not be amended to reduce the above required insurance limits and coverages nor shall such policies be canceled by the carrier without thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified or registered mail of amendment or cancellation to the City, except that cancellation for non-payment of premium shall require ten (10) days prior written notice by certified or registered mail. In the event the said insurance is canceled, the Consultant shall, prior to the cancellation date, submit to the City Clerk new evidence of insurance in the amounts established.
- 16. During the performance of this Agreement, the Consultant will not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, creed, color, national origin, sex, or age. The Consultant will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, religion, creed, color, national origin, sex, or age.
- 17. Consultant and subconsultants shall pay prevailing wage rates when required by the Labor Laws of the State of California.
- 18. (a) The Consultant shall deliver to Janice Nollar Senior GIS Analyst, fully completed and detailed project-related documents which shall become the property of the City.

The Consultant may retain, for its files, copies of any and all material, including drawings, documents, and specifications, produced by the Consultant in performance of this Agreement.

- (b) The Consultant shall be entitled to copies of all furnished materials for his files and his subconsultants, if any.
- (c) The City agrees to hold the Consultant free and harmless from any claim arising from any unauthorized use of computations, maps, and other documents prepared or provided by the Consultant under this Agreement, if used by the City on other work without the permission of the Consultant. Consultant acknowledges that Consultant work product produced under this agreement may be public record under State law.
- 19. (a) The City may terminate this Agreement without fault on the part of Consultant by giving at least ten (10) days written notice to the Consultant. The written notice shall specify the date of termination. Upon receipt of such notice, the Consultant may continue services on the project through the date of termination, provided that no service(s) shall be commenced or continued after receipt of the notice, which is not intended to protect the interest of the City. The City shall pay the Consultant within thirty (30) days after the date of termination for all non-objected to services performed by the Consultant in accordance herewith through the date of termination. Such termination may be effective immediately.
- (b) Either party may terminate this Agreement for cause. In the event the City terminates this Agreement for cause, the Consultant shall perform no further service(s) under the Agreement unless the notice of termination authorizes such further work.
- 20. This Agreement is binding upon the City and the Consultant and their successors and assigns. Except as otherwise provided herein, neither the City nor the Consultant shall assign, sublet, or transfer its interest in this Agreement or any part thereof without the prior written consent of the other.

- 21. A City representative shall be designated by the City and a Consultant representative shall be designated by the Consultant. The City representative and the Consultant representative shall be the primary contact person for each party regarding performance of this Agreement. The City representative shall cooperate with the Consultant, and the Consultant's representative shall cooperate with the City in all matters regarding this Agreement and in such a manner as will result in the performance of the services in a timely and expeditious fashion.
- 22. This Agreement represents the entire and integrated Agreement between the City and the Consultant, and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or Agreements, either written or oral. This Agreement may be modified or amended only by a subsequent written Agreement signed by both parties.
- 23. Where the payment terms provide for compensation on a time and materials basis, the Consultant shall maintain adequate records to permit inspection and audit of the Consultant's time and materials charges under this Agreement. The Consultant shall make such records available to the City at the Consultant's office during normal business hours upon reasonable notice. Nothing herein shall convert such records into public records. Except as may be otherwise required by law, such records will be available only to the City. Such records shall be maintained by the Consultant for three (3) years following completion of the services under this Agreement.
- 24. The City and the Consultant agree, that to the extent permitted by law, until final approval by the City, all data shall be treated as confidential and will not be released to third parties without the prior written consent of both parties.
- 25. The Consultant shall employ no City official or employee in the work performed pursuant to this Agreement. No officer or employee of the City shall have any financial interest in this Agreement in violation of federal, state, or local law.

26. All Plans, drawings, Specifications, reports, logs, and other documents prepared by the Consultant in its performance under this Agreement shall, upon completion of the project, be delivered to and be the property of the City, provided that the Consultant shall be entitled, at its own expense, to make copies thereof for its own use.

27. The laws of the State of California shall govern the rights, obligations, duties, and liabilities of the parties to this Agreement, and shall also govern the interpretation of this Agreement. Venue shall be vested in the Superior Court of the State of California, County of Riverside.

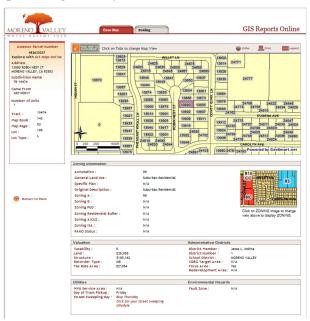


Figure 1 - As-Is Parcel Report

BACKGROUND

A resolution approved by the applicant's governing body is required to support the recent preliminary submittal of a CalRecycle Rubberized Pavement Grant Program application, as approved by the City Manager. Adoption of the proposed resolution will ensure that the City's recent application complies with grant requirements and this resolution will allow the City to submit for future CalRecycle grants for which the City is eligible over the next five years.

DISCUSSION

The rubberized pavement grant reimburses 40% of the differential cost between conventional asphalt concrete and rubberized asphalt concrete. The total grant amount request is \$75,400. If approved, funds will supplement City funds designated for the following resurfacing projects totaling 18,850 tons:

- Alessandro Boulevard From Oliver Street to Moreno Beach Drive
- Elsworth Street From Cactus Avenue to Business Center Drive
- Cottonwood Avenue From Indian Street to Kitching Street
- Eucalyptus Avenue From Kitching Street to Lasselle Street
- o Brodiaea Avenue From Heacock Street to Kitching Street
- Dracaea Avenue From Graham Street to Heacock Street
- Dracaea Avenue From Elsworth Street to Frederick Street
- Bay Avenue From Frederick Street to Graham Street
- o Bay Avenue From Perris Boulevard to Kitching Street
- o Frederick Street From Alessandro Boulevard to Sunnymead Boulevard
- Elder Avenue From Morrison Street to Nason Street

The California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) provides the Rubberized Pavement Grant Program to promote markets for recycled-content surfacing products derived from waste tires generated in California and decrease the adverse environmental impacts created by unlawful disposal and stockpiling of waste tires. Rubberized asphalt concrete is a proven road paving material that has been used in California since the 1970s. It is made by blending ground tire rubber with asphalt binder which is then mixed with conventional aggregate materials. Using recycled-content surfacing products derived from waste tires generated in California decreases the adverse environmental impacts created by unlawful disposal and stockpiling of waste tires.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Adopt the proposed resolution approving submittal of application(s) for all CalRecycle grants for which the City of Moreno Valley is eligible and designating authority to administer all such grants. This will ensure compliance with CalRecycle grant requirements related to the recent Rubberized Pavement Grant application and allow the City to submit for all CalRecycle grants for which the City is eligible over the next five years.
- 2. Do not adopt the proposed resolution approving submittal of application(s) for all CalRecycle grants for which the City of Moreno Valley is eligible and designating authority to administer such available grants. This may negatively impact the City's eligibility to have the City's recent Rubberized Pavement Grant application approved and receive grant funds from the Rubberized Pavement Grant Program.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is a potential grant revenue reimbursement for public road improvements for an estimated total grant award of \$75,400 for fiscal years 2013-14 and 2014-15.

THESE PAYMENTS

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

- 1. Waive the formal bidding requirements for technology annual maintenance payments.
- 2. Waive the insurance requirements for technology annual maintenance payments.
- 3. Authorize the City Manager to make technology annual maintenance payments to various vendors for an aggregate amount not-to-exceed \$835,929 during Fiscal Year 2012-13 according to the attached schedule (Attachment 1).

BACKGROUND

Consistent with the City's ongoing efforts towards fiscal transparency and accountability a schedule of technology related annual maintenance payments is presented for the City Council's approval. The City's Purchasing Policy (3.18, Section II) specifies the dollar limit over which purchases must be approved by the City Council. The initial technology purchases which require annual maintenance payments each received City Council approval if the purchase amount exceeded the amount specified in the purchasing policy. The annual maintenance payments, which are approved with the initial purchase, may continue beyond the original contract term if the technology continues to be used in the City. This authorization makes all such payments explicit

and transparent. The "right to use" most technology is contractually tied to the annual maintenance payments.

DISCUSSION

The City's Purchasing Ordinance allows for exceptions to the normal bidding process for materials, supplies, equipment, and services. Sections 3.12.080 and 3.12.250-270 recognize that the City's best interests are served by waiving formal bidding requirements under certain circumstances. The annual maintenance for Technology Services (TS) software, hardware, and off-site maintenance services fall into this category.

There are two reasons why TS annual maintenance payments are incongruent to bidding. Annual maintenance payments are negotiated or purchased as part of the initial equipment or service purchase, per the City's Purchasing Ordinance, but they are budgeted and paid each year. The City does not fund multi-year maintenance payments in advance when the equipment or service does not have a foreseeable termination date. It is not in the City's best interests to attempt to bid such payments annually.

Additionally, many vendors are the sole providers of the support for their products (e.g. software, hardware, and professional services). Many of these sole source providers do not sell directly to customers; they have outsourced all sales functions to Distributors. Thus, technology software, equipment, and maintenance services may appear to have multiple sources but that is an artifact of the manufacturer having outsourced its sales functions. Therefore, the vendors listed in the attached schedule (Attachment 1) should be declared sole source providers per Section 3.12.080 of the City's Purchasing Ordinance.

Waiving the normal insurance requirements for these payments is also requested for two reasons. The first reason is that applicable insurance requirements have already been met for the initial purchase of the software, equipment, and maintenance. Reoccurring payments should not trigger additional insurance requirements; although any insurance requirements necessary for the initial purchase will be kept current. In addition, annual maintenance payments are a continuation of existing software or equipment use, or maintenance services that do not involve vendors coming on-site. Furthermore, none of the vendors listed below stores assets or information for the City so there is no risk of them losing or damaging City assets. Thus the City's usual insurance requirements are not applicable to these payments.

<u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

- 1. Waive the formal bidding requirements for technology annual maintenance payments.
- 2. Waive the insurance requirements for technology annual maintenance payments.

- 3. Authorize the City Manager to make technology annual maintenance payments to various vendors for an aggregate amount not-to-exceed \$835,929 during Fiscal Year 2012-13 according to the attached schedule (Attachment 1).
- 4. Do not waive the formal bidding and insurance requirements nor authorize the technology annual maintenance payments. *This action would cause the City to cease using its communications, radio, and computer technology.*
- 5. Provide staff with further direction.

Staff recommends Alternative Nos. 1, 2 and 3.

FISCAL IMPACT

Funding for all technology annual maintenance payments is available in the Technology Services operating budget accounts (7210-30-39-25410-625010, 7210-30-39-25411-625010, 7210-30-39-25412-625010, and 7210-30-39-25413-625010) due to the City Council's approval of the FY 2012-13 budget.

SUMMARY

The right to continue to use technology is typically tied to the continuation of annual maintenance payments for that technology. While all technology purchases requiring City Council approval include annual maintenance costs, these costs may continue beyond the initial purchase contract term if the City continues to use the software. Therefore, the requested authorizations make such payments transparent to the City Council. Due to the unique requirements of technology annual maintenance payments, the requested authorizations also seek the City Council to waive the formal bidding and insurance requirements associated with these technology payments.

COAST THUNDER MEMORIAL DAY BIKE RUN

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Staff recommends that the City Council approve the City's participation in the 2013 West Coast Thunder Memorial Day Bike Run.

ADVISORY BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

The West Coast Thunder (WCT) Memorial Day Bike Run (Event) is an annual remembrance parade and fundraising event created by members of the Inland Empire chapter of the Harley Owners Group (H.O.G.®) benefitting the Riverside National Cemetery (RNC). To date, WCT has donated more than \$350,000 to the Riverside National Cemetery Support Committee. The following projects have been made possible due to WCT efforts:

- Construction of the National POW / MA Memorial dedicated in 2005.
- Repairs to the National Congressional Medal of Honor Memorial.
- Financial support to the RNC Memorial Honor Detail.
- Funding for the annual Concert for Heroes in July.
- Flower cones, flowers and American flags to honor indigent and unaccompanied or homeless veterans laid to rest.

The 2013 WCT Memorial Day Bike Run on May 27, 2013 will mark their 14th year honoring United States veterans. Since 2000, the Event has grown not only in the number of participating riders, but also in scope and in recognition and community participation. Having grown to more than 7,500 participants, the route has increased from a 10-mile route to a 41-mile route. The original route went from a starting point at Skip Fordyce Harley-Davidson on Indiana Avenue in Riverside for the ceremonial portion of the event, leaving precisely at 9:11 a.m. to travel to the RNC to pay their respects and/or participate in the RNC's Memorial Day celebration. The expanded route now includes a ride from Skip Fordyce and the RNC to Soboba Casino in San Jacinto for continued remembrance with an afternoon concert headlined by well-known music artists.

WCT has gained the support of several key sponsors including, but not limited to, the City of Riverside, K-FROG radio station, McDonald's, Skip Fordyce Harley-Davison, Stater Bros., The Press-Enterprise, and Walters Automotive Group. These sponsorships help to increase the donations to the RNC and provide for the continued expansion of the Event to include the concert. Additionally, community participation has grown each year. Families, friends, and patriots gather along the parade route to cheer and wave service flags as the motorcade passes. WCT has created a local tradition of honor and an outlet of pride for Americans in the Inland Empire to share.

DISCUSSION

WCT is proposing to divert its current parade route to include riding by escort through a portion of Moreno Valley. Considering Moreno Valley's military heritage and affinity, having the City of Moreno Valley included in the parade route would be a significant enhancement to the observance of Memorial Day for residents in Moreno Valley.

Traditionally, the City has held Memorial Day ceremonies on the established day of May 30 rather than the observed day which is the fourth Monday of May, therefore providing no organized remembrance event for residents on the observed day. Diverting the WCT parade from SR-60 to include portions of Moreno Valley along Sunnymead Boulevard would provide a meaningful activity for those who would like to share in honoring Veterans who have died. It would also provide a boost to retailers, restaurants, and hotels in the area.

The proposed WCT route change includes exiting SR-60 on to Sunnymead Boulevard from Frederick Street. Riders will travel on Sunnymead Boulevard to Heacock Street to re-enter SR-60. The inclusion of Moreno Valley city streets does not change the Event schedule which proposes having parade participants depart from Skip Fordyce Harley-Davidson in Riverside at precisely 9:11 a.m. While it is approximate, ride timing through Moreno Valley would begin between 10:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. The parade of the approximate 7,500 riders through Moreno Valley would last approximately 1 hour.

If approved, closure of Sunnymead Blvd. between Frederick and Heacock Streets would be necessary to accommodate the event. The street closure would be from approximately 9:00 a.m. to potentially as late as 1:00 p.m. While the traffic flow pattern

has not yet been finalized by the Moreno Valley Police Department, the street closure would affect all north and south bound traffic crossing Sunnymead Boulevard between Frederick and Heacock streets and all east and west bound traffic on Sunnymead Boulevard. Staff would also plan options for allowing spectators to access / leave the area. If the City Council approves, staff from Public Works / Transportation will coordinate the street closure application for future Council consideration. Moreno Valley Police Department will redirect normal officer and staff duties to accommodate the Event at no additional cost within the existing Law Enforcement Services Agreement.

City staff is considering additional local enhancements to the Event, which could include the installation of flags along the parade route. If the City Council supports the City's proposed participation in the 2013 West Coast Thunder Memorial Day Bike Run, the street closure application and additional Event enhancements will be brought back to City Council in spring 2013.

Staff will provide outreach to the affected businesses alerting them to the street closure and traffic diversion. The outreach will also invite businesses to take advantage of potential increased business as residents and visitors gather for the parade.

ALTERNATIVES

- Approve the City's participation in the 2013 West Coast Thunder Memorial Day Bike Run.
- 2. Not approve City's participation in the 2013 West Coast Thunder Memorial Day Bike Run.

DISCUSSION

The payment register has been revised to incorporate additional data while still using a standard format from the City's new LOGOS General Ledger system. This revised format provides the following:

- 1. Lists all issued checks and electronic fund transfers (EFT) for the month, thus eliminating the need for a separate fund transfer register;
- 2. Created two categories for all payments:
 - a. Category A: Checks/EFTs in the amount of \$25,000 or greater; and
 - b. Category B: Checks/EFTS under \$25,000;
- 3. If a vendor was issued a check/EFT in the amount of \$25,000 or greater, all checks issued to the vendor for the month are listed in Category A;
- 4. Lists all payments by vendor in alphabetical order;
- 5. Provides City and State information of vendor.

Staff continues to work on possible alternate sorting options and solutions as we become fully operational with the features of the new system.

FISCAL IMPACT

The disbursements itemized in the attached Payment Register are reflected in the FY 2012-13 budget. Therefore, there is no fiscal impact other than the expenditure of budgeted funds.

BACKGROUND

California Government Code Sections 53601 and 53646 establish the types of investments allowed, the governing restrictions on these investments, the third-party custodian arrangement for certain investments, and the reporting practices related to the portfolio for local agencies. The City's Investment Policy, adopted on April 24, 2012 is in full compliance with the requirements of both of the above-mentioned Code Sections.

DISCUSSION

The attached Quarterly Investment Report presents the City's cash and investments for the quarter that ended September 30, 2012. This is the first quarterly report submitted for the 2012-13 fiscal year and is in compliance with California Government Code Section 53646 regarding the reporting of detailed information on all securities, investments, and monies of the City, as well as the reporting of the market value of the investments held. All of the investments contained within the portfolio are in full compliance with the City's Investment Policy and Government Code Section 53601 as to the types of investments allowed. As stated in the attached report, there is more than adequate liquidity within the portfolio for the City to meet its budgeted expenditures over the next six months.

The City has used Chandler Asset Management as its professional portfolio manager since 2010. Chandler uses an active investment management approach. Utilizing an active approach, securities purchased by Chandler on the City's behalf are not necessarily held to maturity but may be actively traded based on market conditions and the City's investment goals. The City's cash flow requirements are evaluated on an ongoing basis, with short-term needs accommodated through the City's pooled investment funds with the State Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). LAIF is a pool of public funds managed by the State Treasurer of California, providing 24-hour liquidity while yielding a rate of return approximately equivalent to a one-year treasury bill. With the combined use of a conservative approach to evaluating cash flow needs and LAIF liquidity, the City will not have to liquidate securities at current market rates that are intended to be held for longer-term investment. This is especially important considering that the average maturity of the general portfolio is 2.16 years.

The investments managed by Chandler Asset Management totaled \$153,005,758 at par and achieved a Yield to Maturity (YTM) for September 2012 of 1.32%. This compares to a YTM in June 2012 of 1.31% and a YTM in September 2011 of 1.59%. In addition, the City maintained \$20,640,538 in the State Local Agency Investment Fund Pool (LAIF) with a YTM of 0.36%

In accordance with California Government Code Section 53646, the City is properly reporting investments of all bond proceeds and Deferred Compensation Plan funds. These funds are not managed by the City Treasurer as part of the pooled investment program and were not included in the City's investment reports prior to the current legislation. Bond proceeds are held and invested by a Trustee; Deferred Compensation Plan funds are held and invested by the respective plan administrators with the funds also placed in a trust separate from City funds.

FISCAL IMPACT

Current market rates continue to hover at or near all-time lows and based on comments by the Federal Reserve Board we do not expect this to change in the near future. This interest rate environment directly impacts the ability of the portfolio to generate income. The budget for fiscal year 2012-13 projected General Fund investment earnings totaling \$2.3 million. Year to date through September 2012 these revenues have totaled \$643,000.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

Revenue Diversification and Preservation. Develop a variety of City revenue sources and policies to create a stable revenue base and fiscal policies to support essential City services, regardless of economic climate.

SUMMARY

The attached Quarterly Investment Report presents the City's cash and investments for the quarter that ended September 30, 2012. This report is in compliance with California Government Code Section 53646 regarding the reporting of detailed information on all securities, investments, and monies of the City, as well as the reporting of the market value of the investments held. All of the investments contained within the portfolio are in full compliance with the City's Investment Policy and Government Code Section 53601 as to the types of investments allowed. It is recommended that the City Council receive and file the attached Quarterly Investment Report.

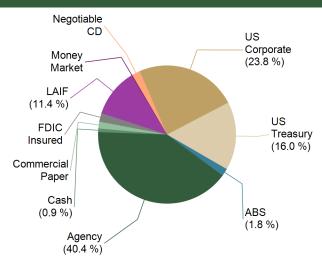

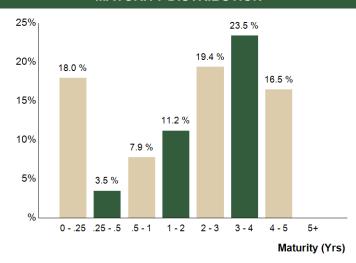

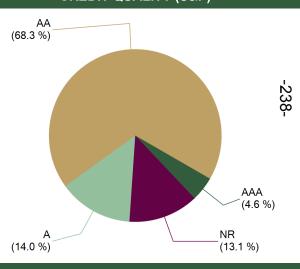
SECTOR ALLOCATION

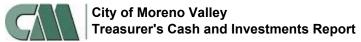


MATURITY DISTRIBUTION

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The U.S. Fiscal Cliff

Market Summary

The treasury yield curve steepened slightly in September, though overall treasury rates were little changed amidst a still sluggish domestic economic environment and an uncertain outlook for the global economy. Rates continue to be influenced by the Federal Reserve's accommodative monetary policy.

The domestic economy continues to grow at a slower than desired pace, though many investors are expecting that exceptionally easy monetary policy will help to fuel stronger GDP growth heading into next year. The outlook for the global economy remains uncertain as Europe still struggles to come up with a comprehensive long-term plan to contain the region's debt crisis, and unease about the U.S. potentially reaching a "fiscal cliff" at the end of this year is building. Payroll growth in the U.S. has been modest, with payrolls up 114,000 in September, and the unemployment rate remains elevated.

Over the past month, we believe financial markets have largely been influenced by the Fed's policy action, rather than economic fundamentals, as investors heed to the old adage "Don't fight the Fed." The Federal Open Market Committee left policy rates unchanged at its September meeting and announced additional economic stimulus measures in the form of "QE3" with plans to purchase additional agency mortgage-backed securities at a pace of \$40 billion per month for an open-ended period of time. The Fed also expects to keep the fed funds rate at an exceptionally low level through at least mid-2015. Overall, the Fed's actions are aimed at putting downward pressure on long-term interest rates, keeping mortgage rates low to help stimulate the housing market, and fueling stronger economic growth. The Fed lowered its economic growth forecast for the year, but raised its GDP forecasts for 2013 and 2014, largely reflecting the anticipated stimulative effects of QE3.

Economic Roundup

Consumer Prices

In August, overall CPI inflation rose to 1.7% on a year-over-year basis from 1.4% in July, driven by an increase in food and energy prices. The year-over-year Core CPI (CPI less food and energy) declined to 1.9% in August, from 2.1% in July. The core inflation rate is roughly in line with the Fed's inflation target of 2.0%.

Retail Sales

In August, Retail Sales rose 4.7% on a year-over-year basis. On a month-over-month basis, Retail Sales rose 0.9% in August, slightly higher than the consensus forecast. Consumer spending has rebounded from the depths of the recession, but recent activity has moderated. Elevated unemployment levels are likely restraining consumer spending.

Labor Markets

The September employment report showed that payrolls increased by 114,000, in line with the consensus estimate. The unemployment rate unexpectedly dropped to 7.8% in September from 8.1% in August, even with a slight uptick in the labor force. The household survey, which reports on the unemployment rate, is a smaller sample than the payroll survey and tends to be more volatile, which may suggest a statistical "fluke" and explain part of the unexpected decline. The employment report continues to reflect an overall slow pace of growth in the domestic economy.

Housing Starts

Data as of 9/30/12

Single-family housing starts rose 5.5% to 535,000 in August, following a 4.5% decline in July. The housing market appears to have stabilized and some data has surprised to the upside this year.

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Living on the Edge: The U.S. Fiscal Cliff

The U.S. economy has been growing at a substandard pace despite the myriad of efforts by the Federal Reserve to stimulate aggregate demand via traditional monetary policy, Operation Twist, and quantitative easing. Monetary policy is poised to remain highly accommodative for the foreseeable future. Fiscal policy, on the other hand, is poised to reverse course and tighten as the fiscal cliff approaches. The so-called "fiscal cliff" currently presents one of the greatest downside risks to our domestic economy, and many economists agree that it could push the U.S. back into recession. However, many investors are betting that policymakers will take action and put fiscal reform into place before it is too late. While concerns about the fiscal cliff continue to make headlines almost daily, there isn't much transparency about what the cliff is or what exactly will push us over the edge. What is the fiscal cliff?

Under current law, several U.S. tax breaks are set to expire and spending cuts are set to go into place at midnight on December 31, 2012. These include an expiration of Bush-era tax cuts (signed into law in 2001 and 2003, and extended for 2 years in 2010), an expiration of the temporary payroll tax holiday (passed in 2010 for one year and extended until January 1, 2013), along with \$1.2 trillion in mandatory government spending cuts over 10 years beginning in 2013 (which was part of last year's deal to raise the debt ceiling). In extended unemployment addition,

benefits are set to expire along with a number of tax deductions. In total, these changes are expected to cause federal spending to fall and federal taxes to rise by more than \$600 billion next year. This event has been dubbed the "fiscal cliff" because of the magnitude and joint timing of the changes. Spending cuts will affect a variety of government departments, but cuts to military spending will be particularly pronounced. According to a report by George Mason University's Center for Regional Analysis, roughly 277,000 public sector workers could lose their job due to government spending cuts tied to the fiscal cliff.

It is unclear whether or not policymakers will actually allow all of these tax cuts to expire or put all of the spending cuts into place. These decisions have been delayed until after the Presidential election. At this point, while both candidates have broadly outlined some of

their tax and spending plans, neither candidate seems to be providing specific guidance about how they would tackle the fiscal cliff. After the November election, we expect that there will be more clarity about future fiscal policy. However, the potential for ongoing gridlock in Congress could present a significant speed bump to reform.

The consensus view seems to be that regardless of who wins the upcoming presidential election next month, millions of Americans will see their tax bills increase after January 1st when the temporary payroll tax holiday ends. According to an article published in September by the New York Times, Payroll Tax Cut Is Unlikely to Survive Into Next Year, the expiration of the payroll tax holiday alone could reduce GDP by as much as 1%. Depending on the

actions that policymakers take, that may just be the tip of the iceberg. According to a recent study done by the Tax Policy Center, a typical middle class household would see its taxes go up by about \$2,000, if all of the tax breaks expire as scheduled at the end of the year. It is widely estimated that the fiscal cliff in its entirety could shave as much as 3-5% off U.S. GDP in 2013. A contraction in the economy of this magnitude is unprecedented in modern financial times, adding to the difficulty in economists and politicians ascertaining the impact to the U.S. job market and GDP growth. Considering that the consensus forecast calls for GDP growth of roughly

2% in 2013, the fiscal cliff has the potential to send the economy into negative territory (i.e., recession).

How policymakers address the fiscal cliff will have implications on the country's credit rating. Moody's has indicated that it may downgrade the U.S. credit rating from Aaa if Congress fails to produce a debt reduction plan, and currently has a negative outlook on the rating. The rating agency has said that it plans to wait until after the Presidential election to make a decision. Moody's said it will maintain the country's Aaa rating, but keep the outlook "negative" temporarily if "the method adopted to achieve debt stabilization involved a large, immediate fiscal shock" (i.e., the fiscal cliff). If the fiscal cliff doesn't come to fruition and there is no comprehensive debt reduction plan from Congress, Moody's would be likely to downgrade the U.S. rating by one notch. Recall that in August 2011, S&P downgraded the U.S. credit rating to

AA+ from AAA due to the country's growing fiscal debt. Policymakers are now charged with the task of balancing plans to reduce the deficit without stifling the economy and sending it back into a recession, a difficult task considering that domestic unemployment remains elevated and that the outlook for the global economy remains tenuous.

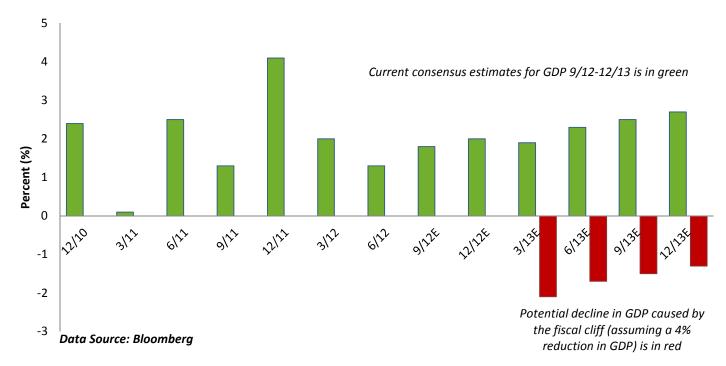
The lack of transparency on how policymakers will face the fiscal cliff presents a risk to the economy. We believe uncertainty about the fiscal cliff and the timing of potential fiscal reform is causing U.S. businesses to temporarily curtail their capital expenditures and delay hiring plans. According to a recent survey conducted by the Business Roundtable, a lobbying group of CEOs of top U.S. companies, including Honeywell and General Electric, the number of CEOs that plan to hire more employees in the next 6 months fell to 29% in the third quarter of this year from 36% in the second guarter. The number of CEOs that plan to increase capital spending also fell to 30% in the third quarter from 43% in the second quarter. Orders for core durable goods (durable goods excluding transportation equipment) fell 1.6% in the most recent report for the month of August, following a 1.3% decline in July and a

2.2% decline in June. Furthermore, public sector job uncertainty as well as the uncertainty for private sector workers who are tied to government spending may be dampening consumer spending and making individuals more reluctant to take on additional debt or purchase a house. Though the fiscal cliff is still a few months away, we believe ambiguity about fiscal policy is having a negative impact on the overall economy.

In our view, the upcoming fiscal cliff presents one of the greatest downside risks to our economy and has the potential to tip the U.S. back into recession, if policymakers aren't able to come up with a timely plan for fiscal reform. This comes at a time when the outlook for the global economy is poor, domestic economic data has been weaker than desired, the near-term outlook for GDP is low, and economic growth is largely being fueled by easy monetary policy.

- Approve the draft Cooperative Agreement for Sunnymead Master Drainage Plan Line B, Stage 3 (Heacock Channel) amongst Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District, March Joint Powers Authority and the City of Moreno Valley.
- 2. Authorize the Public Works Director/City Engineer, or his designee, to make modifications to the attached draft agreement subject to the approval of the City Attorney.
- 3. Authorize the City Manager to execute the final agreement subject to the approval of the City Attorney.
- 4. Once the Agreement has been executed by all parties, authorize the issuance of a purchase order to March Joint Powers Authority up to an amount not-to-exceed \$1,250,000.

BACKGROUND

On December 1, 2005, City Council authorized the Mayor to execute a Letter of Commitment to Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District (RCFC&WCD) for the City to participate in the funding of improvements necessary for the Sunnymead Master Drainage Plan - Line B, Stage 3, also known as the Heacock Channel-Stage 3.

The project is part of a multi-jurisdictional effort between March Joint Powers Authority (MJPA), RCFC&WCD, and the City. The City is using Master Plan Area Drainage Fees of \$1.25 million, collected by RCFC&WCD to fund the environmental and design phases, with MJPA taking administrative lead in the environmental and design phases. RCFC&WCD will construct the improvements as funds become available.

DISCUSSION

The channel, westerly of Heacock Street between Cactus Avenue and the new Lateral "A" bridge, currently functions poorly because it wasn't designed or constructed to handle the large drainage tributary area and it has a history of flooding during moderate to heavy storm events. Within the area, there are numerous single family homes, several commercial properties, a mobile home park, and Heacock Street itself that are subject to flooding. The channel is the first choice on the annual "Nomination of Flood Control Project" for fiscal year 2012/2013 submitted to RCFC&WCD to improve the storm drain channel.

The channel from Cactus Avenue to Heacock Bridge Line A design is approximately 9,800 linear feet of open channel improvements with the corresponding appurtenant structures. The channel consists of three phases:

- Phase 1: within the boundaries of the MJPA, approximately 3,575 feet (15.4% of total length)
- Phase 2: within the City limits, approximately 2,625 feet (42.2% of total length)
- Phase 3: within federally owned March Air Reserve Base (MARB), approximately 3,600 feet (42.4% of total length)

The proposed channel improvements include lined sidewalls, with or without a lined bottom depending on the environmental implications. The channel will provide flood control through the widening and deepening of the channel, as well as construction of facilities designed to safely convey the tributary flows to the improved channel and downstream to the new Heacock Bridge structure. This reduction in flooding benefits the local community, including surrounding residents, future businesses, and also allows MARB to better safeguard its equipment and infrastructure from flood waters to ensure that the military's readiness of this facility is not adversely affected.

MJPA and the City wish to work collaboratively with RCFC&WCD to facilitate a successful project within their jurisdiction. The Cooperative Agreement outlines the

specific roles and responsibilities of each of the parties during the project engineering and design, construction, and upon completion of the improvements. The preliminary design analysis will include all three phases to ensure proper vertical and horizontal alignment of the channel, while the final design for construction will only include Phase 1 and Phase 2. Current funding only allows for the completion of the environmental and design portion of Phase 1 and Phase 2. The construction of these Phases will be completed by RCFC&WCD as Area Drainage Fees for funding becomes available. Phase 3 design and construction will be completed at such time as MARB can fund their segment of the channel improvements.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve the actions as presented in this Staff Report. This alternative will allow for the successful collaboration between the jurisdictions and completion of necessary design plans and improvements.
- 2. Do not approve the actions as presented in this Staff Report. This alternative will not allow for the collaboration between the jurisdictions and therefore, will delay the completion of necessary design plans and increase the cost of ultimate improvements.

FISCAL IMPACT

This project is included in the approved Fiscal Year 2012/2013 CIP Budget. Funding for the project is allocated in the General City Capital Projects fund (Fund 3000) as part of Area Drainage Plan Fees paid to RCFC&WCD by developers within the Sunnymead Master Drainage Plan Area. A portion of the project is also funded with Gas Tax funds (Fund 2000). These funds have been allocated for Heacock Channel-Stage 3 improvements and cannot be utilized for operational activities.

Staff requests that City Council approve the draft Cooperative Agreement for Sunnymead Master Drainage Plan - Line B, Stage 3 (Heacock Channel) amongst Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District, March Joint Powers Authority and the City of Moreno Valley. City Council is also requested to authorize the Public Works Director/City Engineer, or his designee, to make modifications to the draft agreement. Once the Agreement has been executed by the City Manager and other parties, City Council is asked to authorize the issuance of a purchase order to March Joint Powers Authority up to an amount not-to-exceed \$1,250,000 for the project's environmental and design phases.

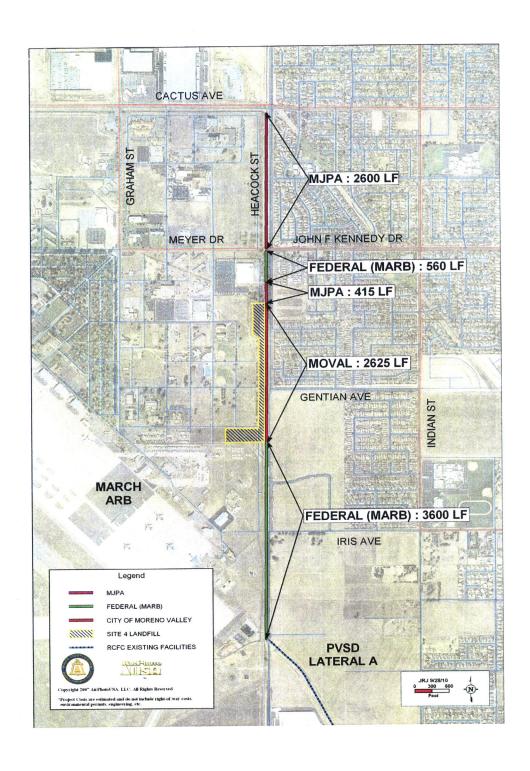

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COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

Sunnymead MDP – Line B, Stage 3 (Heacock Channel)
Project No. 4-0-00011

The RIVERSIDE COUNTY FLOOD CONTROL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT, hereinafter called "DISTRICT", the CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, hereinafter called "CITY", and the MARCH JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY, hereinafter called "MJPA", hereby agree as follows:

RECITALS

- A. DISTRICT, CITY and MJPA wish to work collaboratively to expedite the completion of a certain stormwater management facility identified in DISTRICT'S Sunnymead Master Drainage Plan (MDP) as Line B, hereinafter called "HEACOCK CHANNEL-STAGE 3", in order to provide necessary flood control and drainage to the adjacent area; and
- B. The HEACOCK CHANNEL-STAGE 3 consists of the following channel segments; (i) from Cactus Avenue southerly to the top of Site 4 Landfill, hereinafter called PHASE 1, (ii) from the top of Site 4 Landfill southerly to March Air Reserve Base's (MARB) Z-Street Channel located approximately 1,000 LF south of Gentian Avenue, hereinafter called PHASE 2, and (iii) from Z-Street Channel southerly to Perris Valley Channel Lateral A, hereinafter called PHASE 3, as collectively shown in concept in red on Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof. PHASE 1 and PHASE 2 are hereinafter collectively called "DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES"; and
- C. Associated with the construction of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES is the construction of certain inlet structures, certain catch basins, connector pipes and any other associated improvements located within CITY held easement or rights of way, hereinafter called "CITY APPURTENANCES"; and
 - D. Associated with the construction of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES

is the construction of certain inlet structures, certain catch basins, connector pipes and any other associated improvements located within MJPA held easements or rights of way, hereinafter called "MJPA APPURTENANCES"; and

- E. Together DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES, CITY

 APPURTENANCES and MJPA APPURTENANCES are hereinafter called "PROJECT"; and
- F. CITY has budgeted for and plans to fund all aspects of engineering design, including the preparation, processing, implementation and administration of all necessary environmental studies and documents, environmental regulatory permits, and any associated mitigation requirements for the construction, operation, and maintenance of PROJECT; and
- G. All parties recognize and acknowledge that the construction of PHASE 3 will likely be deferred until such time in the future that significant funding is secured from the March Air Reserve Base (MARB) and/or from alternate sources; and therefore, CITY will limit its funding of engineering design efforts on PHASE 3 to a preliminary design level analysis and report, hereinafter called PDR, one which is required only to properly define the vertical and horizontal alignments, channel geometry and hydraulics necessary to allow for the full functionality and near term construction of PHASE 1 and PHASE 2; and
- H. MJPA agrees to (i) administer a design contract, (ii) complete all necessary environmental studies and documents, (iii) secure all necessary environmental regulatory permits, and (iv) implement all mitigation required as part of the environmental and regulatory permitting processes for the construction, operation, and maintenance of PROJECT; and
- I. MJPA shall collect drainage fees from those developments within the MJPA jurisdiction and whose storm runoff is tributary to HEACOCK CHANNEL-STAGE 3, including the master developer of March LifeCare Campus, hereinafter called "DRAINAGE FEES". MJPA agrees to forward to DISTRICT any DRAINAGE FEES collected for the

purpose of constructing PROJECT under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

- J. MJPA has also conditioned the master developer of March LifeCare Campus to fund and construct an ultimate bridge structure at Meyer Drive, hereinafter called "BRIDGE". MJPA agrees to operate and maintain BRIDGE upon completion of construction. In the event that MJPA chooses to allow master developer, in lieu of constructing BRIDGE, to deposit funding for BRIDGE construction in advance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES construction, MJPA agrees to fully fund the construction of BRIDGE as a part of DISTRICT'S construction for PHASE 1. DISTRICT is willing to incorporate BRIDGE into its PHASE 1 construction contract provided that MJPA pays DISTRICT for the cost of constructing BRIDGE as set forth herein.
- K. CITY and MJPA agree to fund and secure respectively, all temporary construction easements and permanent rights of way or easements , necessary for the design, construction, operation, and maintenance of PROJECT; and
- L. CITY and MJPA agree to fund and secure respectively, all rights of way and easements, as may be necessary for all mitigation required as part of the environmental and regulatory permitting processes to offset any potential adverse impacts associated with the design, construction, operation, and maintenance of PROJECT; and
- M. DISTRICT agrees to construct DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES provided that (i) funding becomes available and is appropriately budgeted for and approved by DISTRICT'S Board of Supervisors, and (ii) CITY and MJPA comply with all applicable terms and conditions as set forth in this Agreement; and
- N. DISTRICT may choose to construct DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES either in segments or in its entirety depending upon the availability of funds; and
 - O. CITY and MJPA agree to accept ownership and responsibility for the

operation and maintenance of CITY APPURTENANCES and MJPA APPURTENANCES, respectively, upon completion of construction; and

- P. MJPA agree to accept ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of BRIDGE upon completion of construction; and
- Q. DISTRICT agrees to accept ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of PHASE 1, PHASE 2 as applicable, upon completion of construction for that particular segment of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES; and
- R. MJPA agrees to (i) administer a design contract, (ii) complete all necessary environmental studies and documents, (iii) secure all necessary environmental regulatory permits, and (iv) implement all mitigation required as part of the environmental and regulatory permitting processes for the construction, operation, and maintenance of PHASE 3 with funds from MARB or other sources.
- S. MJPA agrees to continue to negotiate with MARB regarding MARB'S financial participation in the design and construction of PHASE 3. In the event that MJPA is successful in their negotiations, MJPA agrees to forward to DISTRICT any funding received from MARB as a contribution for completion of that particular segment.
- T. DISTRICT, CITY and MJPA acknowledge it is in the best interest of the public to proceed with the construction of PROJECT at the earliest possible date.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto mutually agree as follows:

SECTION I

CITY shall:

1. Pursuant to California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), act as a Responsible Agency and, as such, will have the corresponding responsibility to fulfill the

obligations of a CEQA Responsible Agency with respect to PROJECT.

- 2. At its sole cost and expense, fund the cost for MJPA to prepare or cause to be prepared, PROJECT plans and specifications, hereinafter called "PROJECT IMPROVEMENT PLANS", including separate plans and specifications for PHASE 1 and PHASE 2, hereinafter called "PHASE 1 IMPROVEMENT PLANS" and "PHASE 2 IMPROVEMENT PLANS", respectively, in accordance with applicable CITY and DISTRICT standards and to submit to DISTRICT for review and approval.
- 3. At its sole cost and expense, fund the cost for MJPA to prepare or cause to be prepared PDR for PHASE 3
- 4.. Provide all necessary rights of way, easements, rights of entry and temporary construction easements as may be needed to construct, inspect, mitigate, operate and maintain PROJECT within the City's Jurisdiction.
- 5. At its sole cost and expense paid the cost to fund MJPA to secure or cause to be secured all necessary permits, approvals, licenses or agreements required by any Federal, State, or local resource or regulatory agencies pertaining to the construction, operation and maintenance of PROJECT. Such documents, hereinafter called "REGULATORY PERMITS", may include, but are not limited to, a Section 404 permit issued by US Army Corps of Engineers, a Section 401 Water Quality Certification and/or Waste Discharge Requirements issued by the California Regional Water Quality Control Board (CRWQCB) and/or State Water Resources Control Board, a Streambed Alteration Agreement issued by the California Department of Fish and Game.
- 6. Fund MJPA to implement or cause to be implemented all environmental mitigation required in association with the construction, operation and maintenance of PROJECT.

- 7. Fund MJPA to prepare or cause to be prepared all rights of way and easements documents deemed necessary by DISTRICT for the construction and operation and maintenance of PROJECT.
- 8. Provide DISTRICT, at the time of providing PROJECT IMPROVEMENT PLANS as set forth in Section I.2., and prior to DISTRICT'S solicitation of bids for the construction of PROJECT pursuant to Section III.7., with duly executed easement(s) to the public for flood control and drainage purposes, including ingress and egress, or grant deed(s) of fee title where appropriate, for the rights of way deemed necessary by DISTRICT for the construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of PROJECT. The easement(s) or grant deed(s) shall be in a form approved by DISTRICT and shall be executed by all legal and equitable owners of the property described in the easement(s) or grant deed(s).
- 9. At the time of recordation of the conveyance document(s) as set forth in Section I.8., furnish DISTRICT with policies of title insurance, each in the amount of not less than (i) fifty percent (50%) of the estimated fee value, as determined by DISTRICT, for each easement parcel to be conveyed to DISTRICT, or (ii) one hundred percent (100%) of the estimated fee value, as determined by DISTRICT, for each fee parcel to be conveyed to DISTRICT, guaranteeing DISTRICT'S interest in said property as being free and clear of all liens, encumbrances, assessments, easements, taxes and leases (recorded or unrecorded), except those which, in the sole discretion of DISTRICT, are deemed acceptable.
- 10. Grant DISTRICT, by execution of this Agreement, the right to construct, inspect, operate and maintain PROJECT within CITY owned rights of way or easements.
- 11. Order the relocation of all utilities installed by permit or franchise within CITY rights of way that are in conflict with PROJECT and which must be relocated at the utility company's expense.

- 12. At its sole cost and expense, conduct periodic inspections of PROJECT and/or BRIDGE construction, as applicable, for quality control purposes.
- 13. Upon completion of any segments of PROJECT construction and CITY'S receipt of DISTRICT'S Notice of Completion, assume ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of CITY APPURTENANCES.

SECTION II

MJPA shall:

- 1. Pursuant to CEQA, assume the sole Lead Agency role for preparation, circulation and adoption of all necessary and appropriate CEQA documents pertaining to the construction, operation and maintenance of PROJECT.
- 2. Prepare, or cause to be prepared, PROJECT IMPROVEMENT PLANS as set forth in Section I.2., in accordance with applicable CITY and DISTRICT standards, and submit to CITY and DISTRICT for their review and approval.
 - 3. Prepare or cause to be prepared the PDR for PHASE 3
- 4. Secure or cause to be secured easements, rights of entry and temporary construction easements as may be needed to construct, inspect, mitigate, operate and maintain PROJECT.
- 5. Secure or cause to be secured all REGULATORY PERMITS necessary for the construction, operation and maintenance of PROJECT.
- 6. Ensure copies of all REGULATORY PERMITS, including any subsequent renewal or amendments thereto, are provided to DISTRICT for review and approval prior to its final execution or acceptance by CITY or MJPA.
- 7. Implement or cause to be implemented all environmental mitigation required in association with the construction, operation and maintenance of PROJECT.

- 8. Prepare or cause to be prepared all right of way documents deemed necessary by DISTRICT for the construction and operation and maintenance of PROJECT.
- 9. Ensure DISTRICT is provided, at the time of providing IMPROVEMENT PLANS as set forth in Section II.2., and prior to DISTRICT'S soliciting of bids for the construction of PROJECT pursuant to Section III.7., with duly executed easement(s) to the public for flood control and drainage purposes, including ingress and egress, or grant deed(s) of fee title where appropriate, for the rights of way deemed necessary by DISTRICT for the construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of PROJECT. The easement(s) or grant deed(s) shall be in a form approved by DISTRICT and shall be executed by all legal and equitable owners of the property described in the easement(s) or grant deed(s).
- 10. At the time of recordation of the conveyance document(s) as set forth in Section II.8., furnish DISTRICT with policies of title insurance, each in the amount of not less than (i) fifty percent (50%) of the estimated fee value, as determined by DISTRICT, for each easement parcel to be conveyed to DISTRICT, or (ii) one hundred percent (100%) of the estimated fee value, as determined by DISTRICT, for each fee parcel to be conveyed to DISTRICT, guaranteeing DISTRICT'S interest in said property as being free and clear of all liens, encumbrances, assessments, easements, taxes and leases (recorded or unrecorded), except those which, in the sole discretion of DISTRICT, are deemed acceptable.
- 11. Grant DISTRICT, by execution of this Agreement, the right to construct, inspect, operate and maintain PROJECT within MJPA owned rights of way or easements.
- 12. Order the relocation of all utilities installed by permit or franchise within MJPA rights of way that are in conflict with PROJECT and which must be relocated at the utility company's expense.
 - 13. Endeavor to have PROJECT design completed, environmental documents

approved, and all necessary environmental permits, mitigation and rights of way secured within eighteen (18) months of execution of this Agreement.

- 14. Keep an accurate accounting of all costs associated with the PROJECT, in accordance with good accounting practices. MJPA shall submit no more then once a month for PROJECT invoice reimbursement with all necessary supporting documents, including detail invoices for labor and materials.
- 15. Agree, at its sole cost and expense, to cover its own administrative cost associated with the PROJECT.
- 16. Forward to DISTRICT any DRAINAGE FEES collected for the purposes of construction of PROJECT.
- 17. In the event that MJPA wishes to have DISTRICT construct BRIDGE as part of PHASE 1 construction;
 - (i) Submit a written request to DISTRICT (Attn: Design & Construction Division) regarding MJPA'S intent for DISTRICT to construct BRIDGE and provide all necessary documents for DISTRICT to construct BRIDGE as part of its PHASE 1 construction contract prior to DISTRICT advertising PHASE 1 for construction bids; and
 - (ii) Pay DISTRICT in the amount of 100% of bid price for BRIDGE construction, hereinafter called "INITIAL PAYMENT", upon thirty(30) days of receipt of DISTRICT invoice and bid documents; and
 - (iii) Pay DISTRICT for the difference between the final construction cost of BRIDGE and MJPA'S INITIAL PAYMENT as established in Section II.17.(ii) upon receipt of DISTRICT invoice as set forth in Section III.17; and

- (iv) Accept sole responsibility for ownership, operation and maintenance of BRIDGE upon (a) receipt of DISTRICT'S Notice of Completion of PHASE 1, and (b) receipt of reproducible copy of record drawing plans for BRIDGE.
- 18. Within thirty (30) days of receiving written notice of DISTRICT'S intent to advertise any phase of PROJECT for construction pursuant to Section III.6., forward to DISTRICT any funds collected from MARB as a contribution for completion of that particular phase of PROJECT.
- 19. Within thirty (30) days of receiving written notice of DISTRICT'S intent to advertise PHASE 1 for construction pursuant to Section III.6., forward to DISTRICT any DRAINAGE FEES collected for the purpose of constructing PHASE 1.
- 20. At its sole cost and expense, conduct periodic inspections of PROJECT and/or BRIDGE construction, as applicable, for quality control purposes.
- 21. Assume ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of MJPA APPURTENANCES upon (a) receipt of DISTRICT'S Notice of Completion of PROJECT or any phase thereof, and (b) receipt of reproducible copy of record drawing plans for PROJECT or any phase thereof.

SECTION III

DISTRICT shall:

- 1. Pursuant to CEQA, act as a Responsible Agency and, as such, will have the corresponding responsibility to fulfill the obligations of a CEQA Responsible Agency with respect to PROJECT.
- 2. At its sole cost and expense, review, comment and approve, as appropriate, all REGULATORY PERMITS, including any subsequent renewal or amendments thereto, prior

to final execution or acceptance by CITY and MJPA.

- 3. At its sole cost and expense, review, comment and approve, as appropriate, PROJECT IMPROVEMENT PLANS.
- 4. At its sole cost and expense, review, comment and approve, as appropriate, all rights of way documents necessary for the construction and operation and maintenance of PROJECT pursuant to Sections I.7 and II.8.
- 5. Record, or cause to be recorded, the easement(s) or grant deed(s) provided by CITY and/or MJPA pursuant to Sections I.8 and II.9.
- 6. Provide CITY and MJPA with written notice that DISTRICT intends to advertise the PROJECT or any phase thereof for construction within thirty (30) days.
- 7. Advertise, award and administer a public works construction contract(s) for PROJECT or any phase thereof at its sole discretion.
- 8. Provide CITY and MJPA with written notice that DISTRICT has awarded a construction contract for PROJECT, or any phase thereof.
- 9. Construct or cause to be constructed, PROJECT, or any phase thereof, pursuant to a DISTRICT administered public works construction contract, in accordance with PROJECT IMPROVEMENT PLANS approved by DISTRICT, CITY and MJPA.
- 10. Construct or cause to be constructed, BRIDGE as part of PHASE 1 provided MJPA'S written request, as set forth in Section II.15, allows adequate time for DISTRICT to incorporate BRIDGE plans and specifications into its PHASE 1 construction contract prior to DISTRICT advertising PHASE 1 for construction bids.
- 11. Invoice MJPA for INITIAL PAYMENT, at the time of providing written notice to MJPA of the award of a construction contract, as set forth in Section III.8, for one hundred percent (100%) of the construction bid price for BRIDGE in the event that DISTRICT

agrees to construct BRIDGE as part of its PHASE 1 construction contract.

- 12. Prior to commencing construction, schedule and conduct a pre-construction meeting between DISTRICT, DISTRICT'S construction manager, DISTRICT'S construction contractor(s), CITY and MJPA. DISTRICT shall notify CITY and MJPA at least twenty (20) days prior to conducting the pre-construction meeting.
- 13. Within two (2) weeks of completing construction, provide CITY and/or MJPA with written notice that construction is substantially complete and requesting that CITY and/or MJPA, as appropriate, conduct a final inspection of PROJECT, or any phase thereof, and BRIDGE, if applicable.
- 14. Upon completion of construction but prior to CITY and MJPA'S acceptance of CITY APPURTENANCES and MJPA APPURTENANCES, respectively, for ownership, operation and maintenance, provide CITY and MJPA with a copy of the Notice of Completion and a set of reproducible record drawings of CITY APPURTENANCES and MJPA APPURTENANCES, respectively.
- 15. Upon completion of BRIDGE construction but prior to MJPA'S acceptance of BRIDGE for ownership, operation and maintenance, provide MJPA with a copy of the Notice of Completion and a set of reproducible record drawings of BRIDGE.
- 16. Upon completion of construction of PROJECT, or any phase thereof, assume ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES or that particular phase thereof.
- 17. Invoice MJPA for remainder of BRIDGE construction cost, provided that the INITIAL PAYMENT is less than the final construction cost for BRIDGE. The invoice shall include a detailed breakdown of all costs, including but not limited to payment vouchers and other such documents as may be necessary, to establish the actual cost of construction.

SECTION IV

It is further mutually agreed:

- 1. Any financial contribution received by DISTRICT shall be used by DISTRICT solely for the purpose of constructing BRIDGE and/or PROJECT as set forth herein.
- 2. Except as otherwise provided herein, all construction work involved with PROJECT or any phase thereof shall be inspected by DISTRICT and shall not be deemed complete until approved and accepted as complete by DISTRICT.
- 3. CITY and MJPA personnel may observe and inspect all work being done on PROJECT, or any phase thereof, and BRIDGE, as applicable, but shall provide any comments to DISTRICT personnel who shall be solely responsible for all communications with its construction contractor(s).
- 4. In the event MJPA desires to include any additional work as part of the BRIDGE construction contract, MJPA shall submit a written request to DISTRICT describing the additional work desired and agree to pay DISTRICT for any agreed upon work requested. Payment for any additional work shall be based upon actual quantities of materials installed at the contract unit prices bid, or at the negotiated change order prices.
- 5. DISTRICT will, at its sole discretion, elect to construct PROJECT in phase(s) as funding becomes available and is appropriately budgeted.
- 6. CITY shall indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless DISTRICT, County of Riverside and MJPA (including their respective officers, districts, special districts, and departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents, representatives, independent contractors, and subcontractors) from any liabilities, claim, damage, proceeding or action, present or future, based upon, arising out of or in any way relating to CITY (including its officers, employees, agents, representatives,

independent contractors, and subcontractors) actual or alleged acts or omissions related to this Agreement, performance under this Agreement, or failure to comply with the requirements of this Agreement, including but not limited to: (a) property damage; (b) bodily injury or death; (c) payment of attorney's fees; and (d) any other element of any kind or nature whatsoever.

- 7. MJPA shall indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless DISTRICT, County of Riverside and CITY (including their respective officers, districts, special districts and departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents, representatives, independent contractors, and subcontractors) from any liabilities, claim, damage, proceeding or action, present or future, based upon, arising out of or in any way relating to MJPA (including its officers, employees, agents, representatives, independent contractors, and subcontractors) actual or alleged acts or omissions related to this Agreement, performance under this Agreement, or failure to comply with the requirements of this Agreement, including but not limited to: (a) property damage; (b) bodily injury or death; (c) payment of attorney's fees; and (d) any other element of any kind or nature whatsoever.
- 8. DISTRICT shall indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless CITY and MJPA (including its officers, employees, agents, representatives, independent contractors and subcontractors) from any liabilities, claim, damage, proceeding or action, present or future, based upon, arising out of or in any way relating to DISTRICT (including its officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents, representatives, independent contractors, and subcontractors) actual or alleged acts or omissions related to this Agreement, performance under this Agreement, or failure to comply with the requirements of this Agreement, including but not limited to: (a) property damage; (b) bodily injury or death; (c) payment of attorney's fees; and (d) any other element of any kind or nature whatsoever.
 - 9. Any notices sent or required to be sent to any party shall be mailed to the

Failure on the part of DISTRICT, CITY or MJPA to require from the other exact, full and complete compliance with any terms of this Agreement shall not be construed as in any manner changing the terms hereof, or stopping DISTRICT, CITY or MJPA from enforcement hereof.

- 15. This Agreement is intended by the parties hereto as their final expression with respect to the matters herein, and is a complete and exclusive statement of the terms and conditions thereof. This Agreement shall not be changed or modified except by the written consent of all parties hereto.
- 16. DISTRICT, CITY and MJPA each pledge to cooperate in regard to the operation and maintenance of their respective facilities as set forth herein and to discharge their respective maintenance responsibilities in an expeditious fashion so as to avoid the creation of any nuisance condition or undue maintenance impact upon the other's facilities.

BACKGROUND

On December 13, 2011, City Council approved a construction agreement with KIP, Incorporated (KIP) for the Heacock Street Bridge for Perris Valley Storm Drain (PVSD) Lateral "A" project which included the widening of the bridge to accommodate a 76' wide curb-to-curb arterial design for two vehicular travel lanes in each direction and related channel and roadway improvements.

DISCUSSION

The Heacock Street Bridge project is located on Heacock Street approximately 2,000 feet south of Iris Avenue. According to the Caltrans Structural Maintenance and Investigations Sufficiency Rating of Local Agency Bridges report of 2005, the existing Heacock Street Bridge was determined to be functionally obsolete and eligible for federal funding. The bridge was considered obsolete because the existing two lane bridge did not meet present standard street and seismic bridge design requirements, nor did it meet the City's General Plan Traffic Circulation for increased traffic demands requiring a four lane arterial design. The existing bridge did not have the capacity to convey a 100 year storm event per the County's Storm Drain Master Plan.

In 2002 the City applied for Federal funding under the Highway Bridge Replacement and Repair Program (HBRRP) to replace the existing bridge. The allocated federal HBRRP funding allowed for the necessary construction of improvements to meet current street, flood, and seismic design standards. The widened bridge joins the existing two-lane Heacock Street and will accommodate future Heacock Street Improvements as an arterial street per the City's General Plan Traffic Circulation element.

KIP completed the project construction on November 1, 2012 and opened the road for public access on said date. At the time of submission of this report, the final contract change order (CCO) had not been processed or approved by Caltrans for final payment, however it is anticipated that the final total construction cost will not exceed the approved purchase order amount of \$2,217,783. The project was completed on schedule and in accordance with the project's contract documents.

<u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

- 1. Authorize the recommendations as presented in this staff report. This alternative will allow payment to the Contractor and allow acceptance of the improvements into the City's maintained system.
- 2. Do not authorize the recommendations as presented in this staff report. This alternative will result in delaying payment to the Contractor, delaying acceptance

of the improvements into the City's maintained system, and incurring extra costs to the City.

FISCAL IMPACT

This project is federally funded. Caltrans allocated \$2,476,680 for the project - \$2,116,680 for the Construction phase plus \$360,000 for the Preliminary Engineering, Environmental, and Final Engineering Design phases. The City appropriated \$522,218 in local match that will be paid for with TUMF (Fund 3003) and Measure A (Fund 2001) funds. Federal funding reimbursement is restricted to the Heacock Street Bridge project and the City funding is restricted to capital improvements, and cannot be used for operational activities. There is no impact to the General Fund.

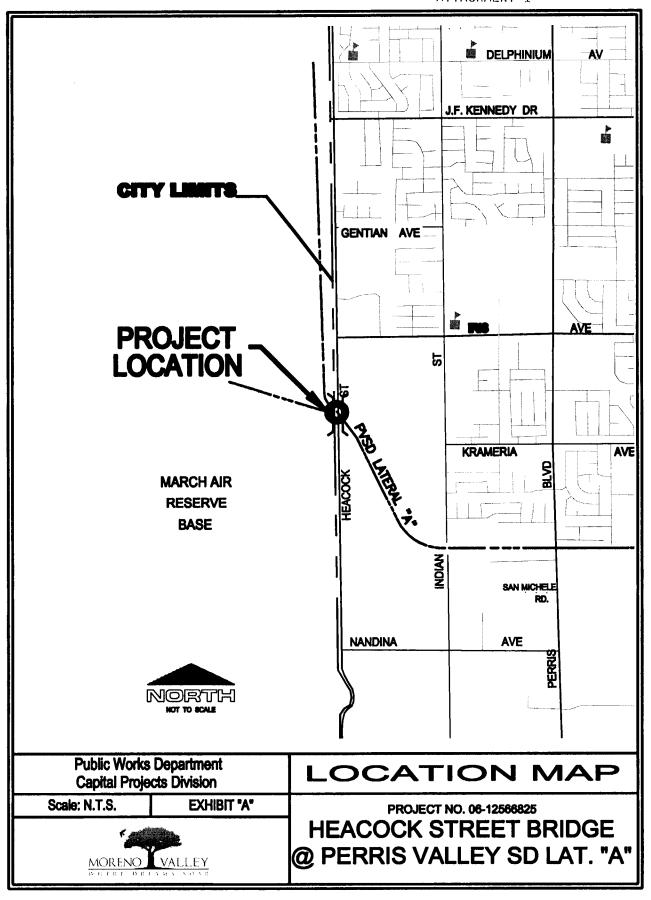

BACKGROUND

The City's permit parking program was established by ordinance in 2007. Typically, permit parking requests come from residents that are impacted by high schools, colleges, parks, and other uses that generate a large amount of off-site parking. The residents along St. Christopher Lane are being impacted by St. Christopher Church parishioners.

Residents have complained about their driveways being blocked, mailboxes being damaged, and trash being left behind. In response to this, the residents submitted a petition to the Public Works Department requesting implementation of permit parking in front of their residences. Implementing permit parking will allow residents to maintain

parking for guests, have uninterrupted access to their homes, and have parking space available for contractors/maintenance vehicles when service is needed.

St. Christopher Lane has nine residentially fronting homes on the south side. The street also serves as access to the additional parking lots located at the back of the Church. The north side of St. Christopher Lane will remain available for parking since it should not affect the residents on the south side. It should be noted that staff has identified four locations, three parking lots on site and an adjacent lot, where parking is available to parishioners.

DISCUSSION

Staff has reviewed this request and has determined that permit parking is appropriate for this location.

As part of the City's permit parking program, a petition must be submitted demonstrating a super majority vote of at least 60% of the residents showing approval of permit parking. Staff has received the petition and determined that eight of the ten signatures required (80% approval), which includes St. Christopher Church, have signed in support of permit parking on Saturdays and Sundays.

As part of this action, approximately 600 feet of the south side of St. Christopher Lane will be designated as a permit parking zone and will be signed as "No Parking except by Permit on Saturdays and Sundays." The implementation of permit parking will benefit the homeowners and will encourage Church parishioners to park within the available parking spaces on site and on the adjacent lots. The installation will allow homeowners to have uninterrupted access to parking in front of their homes which is greatly impacted by the Church parishioners.

<u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

- 1. Approve and adopt proposed resolution and direct staff to implement permit parking on St. Christopher Lane. Staff recommends this alternative to improve the condition for the residents.
- 2. Do not adopt proposed resolution, thereby not implementing permit parking on St. Christopher Lane. This alternative will not provide a remedy for the current parking problems experienced by the residents.
- Provide staff with further direction.

FISCAL IMPACT

The estimated annual cost to implement and maintain the permit parking on St. Christopher Lane will be borne by the Public Works typical annual signing and striping budget (Fund 125 Measure A).

ADVISORY BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

On March 27, 2007, the City Council authorized Resolution No. 2007-32 requiring the installation of Emergency Vehicle Pre-emption (EVP) equipment for all future traffic signals. At the time, the City had successfully retrofitted 19 signalized intersections with pre-emption equipment. Subsequently, the City has signalized approximately 25 intersections, all with EVP systems included.

In 2008, the City successfully applied for Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) funds for the deployment of Emergency Vehicle Pre-emption equipment at 117 existing signalized intersections. Although the City has more than 117 intersections in need of

retrofit, staff estimated that this number was the maximum that could be retrofitted for the HSIP maximum grant value of \$1 million. The City was subsequently notified that the application was successful, and was awarded the full amount of requested funding.

On June 8, 2010, the City Council ratified an agreement with the California Department of Transportation to commence preliminary engineering for this project.

Caltrans environmental staff has declared this project to be categorically excluded from federal environmental review under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), and City planning staff have concurred with the finding and declared that the project is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

An Emergency Vehicle Pre-emption (EVP) system allows for priority treatment of emergency vehicles, such as fire trucks and ambulances, at traffic signals. All such emergency vehicles are provided with strobe lights which flash light patterns that can be detected by the EVP system. Upon receipt of the appropriate strobe light signal, the traffic signal is programmed to terminate conflicting traffic movements so as to display green for the approaching emergency vehicle. The EVP system's primary benefits are a reduction in response time of between 14% and 23%, and an improvement in safety since emergency vehicles would normally enter intersections on green instead of on red.

DISCUSSION

Design and bid documents were completed in August 2012 by in-house staff, supplemented by Iteris Inc., a transportation engineering consulting firm with a specialty in advanced traffic management systems, who assisted in developing the systems engineering report and functional specifications. The engineer's estimate for the work was \$1,027,000. City staff advertised the project on July 10, 2012, and opened bids on August 30, 2012. Eleven bids were received as follows:

The lowest responsible bidder was determined by the Base Bid, as stipulated in the bidding documents. The apparent low bidder was found to be fully qualified to perform the work.

The City currently operates and maintains 44 systems manufactured and supported by GTT, which are marketed under the Opticom brand name. To date, the Opticombranded systems have performed flawlessly under all conditions. However, although this product is clearly suitable for use, City staff is open to considering alternatives so long as the City's specification is met or exceeded.

The two lowest bidders (Flatiron and DBX) proposed a system consisting of components from multiple manufacturers. The detector unit, which mounts on the traffic signal mast arm and detects strobe light signals, would be manufactured by Tomar Inc., and the discriminator unit, which provides the interface to the traffic signal controller, would be made by Emtrac Systems. This product combination is not in use anywhere in the world; Moreno Valley would be the first such deployment.

In the course of evaluating the Tomar/Emtrac Systems product, City staff has determined the following:

- Several public agencies report that Tomar detectors fail regularly, requiring a
 maintenance call to be placed to service the equipment. Although the product
 itself may be warrantied for several years, the labor entailed in performing
 replacement is not recoverable. Additionally, the system's public safety function
 requires that the system operate at the highest level with downtime due to
 component failures minimized.
- Emtrac Systems provided references for previous deployments. However, no other agencies use the Emtrac system with infrared detectors in the manner required by this contract.
- 3. To deter unauthorized access, the City's specifications require that the system be compatible with the City's encoding system. The vendor indicates they are compatible due to a recently expired patent held by GTT Systems. However, as the vendor has no systems deployed with the GTT encoding system and did not physically demonstrate compatibility in a timely manner, staff could not verify compatibility.
- 4. The specifications require commercial off-the-shelf equipment to be deployed; however, the vendor appears to be proposing a new product which has not yet been manufactured.
- 5. Since the proposed Tomar/Emtrac system is not deployed anywhere, the City asked for a field test to be performed at our facilities with the equipment that is proposed to be supplied. The vendor proposed to perform a test at the City's cost, either using equipment which differs from that which would be delivered, or using the proposed equipment on a date two months in the future. Although the terms of the testing plan were subsequently amended, staff was not confident that the test would have been successfully undertaken in a cooperative manner and so the testing invitation was rescinded. The manufacturer also made no

attempt to demonstrate suitability through other means, such as independent lab testing and certification.

Emergency vehicle pre-emption equipment is considered to be a critical system by both the Public Works Department and emergency service providers. Staff is highly concerned that the Tomar/Emtrac product would not perform satisfactorily. Due to the large quantity of systems to be deployed by this project, it is vital that the product's suitability be determined prior to award. In this case, not only does the product appear to be unsuitable, the product representative has been uncooperative in assisting to address staff's concerns. The manufacturer has insisted that staff accept its assurance that the product will conform to the specification, despite substantial contrary evidence obtained from references and from review of minimal product documentation.

Staff explored the option of rejecting the Tomar/Emtrac-related bids as non-responsive, but the bid package was found to contain discrepancies which were brought to light by multiple bidders. Additionally, multiple addenda did not fully address the discrepancies and introduced further uncertainties. Therefore, staff is recommending to reject all bids and readvertise the project, in accordance with Public Contract Code Section 20166. Prior to readvertising the project, the specifications would be revised to resolve the cited inconsistencies. The EVP product specification would continue to be verifiably consistent with the City's systems engineering report and open to multiple vendors.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff recommends this alternative as representing the best interests of the City.
- Provide alternate direction to Staff.

FISCAL IMPACT

This project is included in the Fiscal Year 2012/2013 Capital Improvements Project Budget and is funded using the Traffic Signals Development Impact Fee Fund (Fund 3302). These funds can only be used for traffic signal purposes. There is no impact to the General Fund. Upon completion of the project, the City will be reimbursed for 90% of the project cost from the Highway Safety Improvement Program.

The City of Moreno Valley originally applied for and received funding from the ASES Grant for FY 2006/07 through FY 2009/10. The grant was renewed for three additional years, through FY 2012/13. We are currently funded in the amount of \$4,559,850 to serve 3,377 students in after school programs at 43 school sites in the Moreno Valley (MVUSD) and Val Verde (VVUSD) Unified School Districts. We began partnering with THINK Together to operate all 43 sites in FY 2011/12.

DISCUSSION

The focus of the ASES grant is to provide literacy, academic enrichment, and safe, constructive alternatives for students kindergarten through grade nine at no cost to the participants. The school sites receiving grant funding were chosen based, in part, on the percentage of students eligible for free and reduced lunches. The program requirements are to operate after school a minimum of 15 hours per week and at least until 6:00 p.m., beginning immediately upon the conclusion of the regular school day; operate every regular school day during the school year; and offer a daily nutritious snack that meets the requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) National School Lunch Program for meal supplements. The program elements are an educational and literacy element and an educational enrichment element. educational and literacy element must include tutoring and/or homework assistance designed to help students meet state standards in one or more of the following core academic subjects: language arts, mathematics, history and social science, science, or computer training. The educational enrichment element must offer an array of additional services, programs, and activities that reinforce and complement the regular academic program of participating students to support positive youth development.

We plan to continue collaborating with THINK Together, MVUSD and VVUSD to improve the academic performance and scholastic success of students in the program by providing high-quality academic programming after school.

ALTERNATIVES

- Authorize the City Manager to renew and accept funding for the After School Education and Safety Grant (ASES) with the California Department of Education for fiscal years 2013 -2016. This will continue service to 3,377 students in the after school program.
- 2. Do not authorize the City Manager to renew and accept funding for the After School Education and Safety Grant (ASES) with the California Department of Education for fiscal years 2013 -2016. This will end the after school program and displace 3,377 students during the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. on school days.

FISCAL IMPACT

The proposed grant would fund all program expenditures at 100 percent through direct grant funding for the next three years. THINK Together will provide an amount of cash or in-kind local funds equal to not less than one-third of the total grant amount to meet the match requirement. **The grant funds are used for providing after school care and are restricted to this program.** There is no impact to the General Fund. Funds will be budgeted in the fund 2202 FY2013-14 through FY2015-16 Operating Budgets.

BACKGROUND

The City of Moreno Valley originally applied for and received funding from the Afterschool Education and Safety Grant for FY2006/07 through FY2009/10. The grant was renewed for three additional years, through FY2012/13. We are currently funded to serve 3,377 students in afterschool programs at 43 school sites in the Moreno Valley and Val Verde Unified School Districts. We began partnering with THINK Together to operate all 43 sites in FY2011/12. THINK Together would like to partner with the City of Moreno Valley along with Moreno Valley and Val Verde Unified School Districts in applying for additional funding through 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) to expand our programs.

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC) Program was authorized under the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act and amended by the passage of the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001. State and local accountability for student academic achievement was expanded and the importance of adopting scientifically-based research practices was emphasized.

The state has been given administrative responsibility for the disbursement of funding and for monitoring program outcomes. Program funding is used to support the development of community learning centers established by public schools, consortia of schools, community-based organizations (CBOs), and/or private schools, with the assistance of community partners. Community learning centers are centers that assist students in meeting state academic achievement standards by providing opportunities for academic and cultural enrichment opportunities to students and their families during nonschool hours or periods when school is not in session.

DISCUSSION

The California Department of Education posted a request for applications (RFA) for 21st Century Community Learning Center Programs. There are three program components for which 21st CCLC funding can be used through this RFA: After School Programs, Before School Programs, and Supplemental Programs. Core grants include funding for basic before and after school services; supplemental funding is for program services held at times other than before and after school, e.g., programs during vacation, weekends, intercession periods, and other out of school times.

Two optional grants are available on a competitive basis: Equitable Access and Family Literacy, as follows:

- An applicant may apply for optional grants of up to \$25,000 per school per year for ensuring equitable access to and participation in 21st CCLC programs based on the needs determined by the local community.
- An applicant may apply for optional grants of up to \$20,000 per school per year to provide family literacy services to support the adult family members of the students who will participate in the cohort 8 21st CCLC Program, based on the.

There are Fifteen Program Improvement schools in the Moreno Valley Unified School District (MVUSD) and 6 in the Val Verde Unified School District (VVUSD). All 23 sites are eligible for Supplemental Funding for program services held during vacation and other out of school time for a total of \$747,765 and additional Core Funding for a total of \$1,134,000. The Core Funding will enable us to serve 40 additional students at each eligible elementary school and 20 additional students at each eligible middle school. We will also be applying for \$460,000 in Optional Family Literacy and \$575,000 for Optional Equitable Access. In all we will be applying for \$2,916,765 in grant funds for FY2013-14.

Applicants awarded a grant will receive a five-year grant allocated in annual increments.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Authorize the City Manager to submit an application to the California Department of Education, for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant for FY 2013-14. This option will allow us to expand our services to the students and families of Moreno Valley.
- 2. Do not authorize the City Manager to submit an application to the California Department of Education for the 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant for FY 2012-13. This option will allow us to continue serving students at the current level of 3,377.

FISCAL IMPACT

We are requesting 2,916,765 in 21st Century Community Learning Centers Grant Funds for FY2013-14. The proposed grant would fund all program expenditures at 100 percent through direct grant funding. THINK Together will provide an amount of cash or in-kind local funds equal to not less than one-third of the total grant amount to meet the match requirement. The 21st CCLC grant funds are restricted for the establishment or expansion of Community Learning Centers. There is no impact to the General Fund. Funds will be budgeted in the fund 2202 FY2013-14 Operating Budget.

BACKGROUND

The City of Moreno Valley originally applied for and received funding from the ASES Grant for FY 2006/07 through FY 2009/10. The grant was renewed for three additional years, through FY 2012/13. In addition to that we applied for and received funding for FY2012/13 to serve an additional 177 students. We are currently funded to serve 3,377 students in after school programs at 43 school sites in the Moreno Valley and Val Verde Unified School Districts. We began partnering with THINK Together to operate all 43 sites in FY 2011/12.

DISCUSSION

THINK Together would like to partner with the City of Moreno Valley along with Moreno Valley Unified School District and Val Verde Unified School District in applying for additional funding through the ASES Program to add Vista Heights Middle school and increase funding for several program sites that are below the maximum funding level.

This funding will allow us to serve over five hundred additional low income students in our after school program. Our program provides a safe environment where students can go after school to get homework help, literacy and academic enrichment, physical activity and a nutritious snack.

<u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

- Authorize the City Manager to submit the grant application to the California Department of Education for the After School Education and Safety Grant for FY 2013-14. This option will allow us to serve five hundred additional students in the after school program.
- 2. Do not authorize the City Manager to submit the grant application to the California Department of Education for the After School Education and Safety Grant for FY 2013-14. This option will allow us to continue serving students at the current level of 3,377.

- 3. Receive and file with the City Clerk's office the Official Tally Sheet.
- 4. If approved, authorize and impose the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate to APN 478-430-031 and APN 292-280-032.

ADVISORY BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

To comply with the 1972 Federal Clean Water Act, Land Development, a division of the Community and Economic Development Department, conditions new development projects to participate in the appropriate NPDES regulatory rate to fund federally

mandated programs. The City Council adopted the residential regulatory rate on June 10, 2003, and the commercial/industrial regulatory rate on January 10, 2006.

The Conditions of Approval for APN 478-430-031 (proposed Farmers Market PA06-0173) and APN 292-280-032 (proposed Auto Repair Facility P12-031) require that a funding source be provided to help support the NPDES program. Approving the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate through a mail ballot proceeding shall fulfill these requirements.

DISCUSSION

In compliance with Proposition 218, which requires that any new or proposed increase in property-related assessments, fees, or charges be submitted to property owners for approval, mail ballot proceedings are being conducted to give the property owners of APN 478-430-031 and APN 292-280-032 (collectively the "Property Owners") the option to approve or oppose the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate. The Property Owners are given two opportunities to address the legislative body. These two opportunities are the Public Meetings which was held on November 13, 2012 and the Public Hearings on November 27, 2012, when the results of the ballot proceeding will be announced.

New development projects are subject to the current NPDES Permit requirements for stormwater management as mandated by the Federal Clean Water Act. Public agencies are to obtain Permits to discharge urban stormwater runoff from municipally owned drainage facilities, including streets, highways, storm drains, and flood control channels. If approved by the Property Owners, the City will annually inspect site design, source and treatment control Best Management Practices, monitor maintenance records for those on-site facilities, and perform annual inspections of the affected areas to ensure compliance with federally mandated NPDES Permit requirements, as administered by the State. Provided the mail ballots are approved, the City will also be authorized to levy the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate on the annual property tax bill or as a monthly charge on a utility bill.

ALTERNATIVES

- Conduct the Public Hearing, tabulate the ballots, verify, and accept the results of the mail ballot proceedings as identified on the Official Tally Sheet, receive and file with the City Clerk's office the Official Tally Sheet, and if approved, authorize and impose the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate to APN 478-430-031 (and any division thereof) and APN 292-280-032 (and any division thereof). This alternative will fulfill the 45-day noticing period and Public Hearing requirements as mandated by Proposition 218.
- 2. **Do not conduct the Public Hearing,** tabulate the ballots, verify, or accept the results of the mail ballot proceedings for APN 478-430-031 and APN 292-280-032. *This alternative would be contrary to Proposition 218 mandates.*

FISCAL IMPACT

For fiscal year (FY) 2012/13, the NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate is \$218 per parcel. Beginning in FY 2013/14, the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate shall be subject to an annual adjustment based on the percentage change calculated for the previous year in the Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County Regional Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, as published by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The NPDES rates collected from property owners support the current Permit programs and reduce the level of General Fund support necessary to remain in compliance with unfunded federal mandates, as administered by the State. Funds collected from the NPDES rates are restricted for use only within the Stormwater Management program.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

Advocacy

Management of the stormwater will ensure that water pollutants are discharged in compliance with federal mandates and City policies.

Revenue Diversification and Preservation

The NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate provide funding for program costs, which include maintenance and administration.

SUMMARY

The action before the City Council is to accept public testimony, tabulate the returned ballots, verify, and accept the results of the mail ballot proceedings for APN 478-430-031 and APN 292-280-032.

NOTIFICATION

The Property Owners were given the required 45-day noticing period to review the ballot documents. The documents included a notice to the property owner, map of the project area, the NPDES commercial/industrial rate schedule, ballot(s), instructions for marking and returning the ballot(s), and postage-paid envelopes for returning the ballot(s) to the City Clerk. (See Attachments 1 and 2.)

Newspaper advertising for the November 13, 2012, Public Meeting and November 27, 2012, Public Hearing was published in <u>The Press-Enterprise</u> on October 25, 2012. Additionally, the Public Hearing notification was published on November 8 and again on November 15, 2012.

Introduction

In November of 1996, California voters passed Proposition 218 ("The Right to Vote on Taxes Act"). As a result, any new or proposed increase in a property-related charge requires approval of the charge by the property owner of record. In compliance with Proposition 218 legislation, the City of Moreno Valley Special Districts Division is conducting a mail ballot proceeding to provide the owner of Assessor Parcel Number (APN) 478-430-031 the opportunity to express support or opposition for the approval of the NPDES regulatory rate and services and for inclusion into and approval of the annual charge for the CSD Zone M program.

Background

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

The City shall provide the services necessary to meet mandates of the Federal Clean Water Act. The current NPDES Permit, as administered by the State, regulates the volume and amount of pollutants in stormwater runoff from all development types. NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate provides financial support for inspecting site design, source and treatment control Best Management Practices, monitoring maintenance records for those on-site facilities, and performing annual inspections of the affected areas to ensure compliance with federally mandated NPDES Permit requirements, as administered by the State.

CSD Zone M Charge

The CSD was formed simultaneously with City incorporation and established Zones to allocate the costs of special benefit services to those parcels designated to receive selective programs. The CSD Zone M program provides ongoing maintenance to improved medians adjacent to commercial, industrial, and multifamily developments in designated areas of the City. Commercial, industrial, and multifamily developments along designated arterial streets are conditioned to participate in the improved median maintenance program in compliance with the Citywide Arterial Median Maintenance Policy approved by the CSD Board in March 2003 and revised in January 2006.

Services Provided

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

In compliance with the Federal Clean Water Act, the City of Moreno Valley shall annually inspect site design, source and treatment control Best Management Practices, verify monitoring and maintenance records for those on-site facilities, and perform annual inspections of the affected areas to ensure compliance with federally mandated NPDES Permit requirements, as administered by the State.

CSD Zone M Charge

Special Districts' staff manages private landscape maintenance firms to ensure that landscape preservation activities are completed on a regular schedule. The CSD Zone M annual charge was established to cover administration and service costs for the landscape maintenance. Services include, but are not limited to: trimming, pruning, fertilizing, replacing plant material(s) as necessary, litter removal, weed control, maintenance of the irrigation system, payment of water and electric utility charges, staff support, and other items necessary for the satisfactory maintenance of the landscaped medians.

How is the Amount of the Charge Determined?

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

Each fiscal year (FY), the City of Moreno Valley shall determine the type of services necessary to comply with NPDES Permit requirements and levy the rate applicable for that service. The rate levied shall not exceed the rate previously approved by the property owner.

CSD Zone M Charge

The annual CSD Zone M charge includes maintenance and administration costs. The CSD Zone M charge shall be proportionally adjusted if APN 478-430-031 is subdivided in the future. The charge levied shall not exceed the charge previously approved by the property owner.

Proposed Charge

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

For FY 2012/13, the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate is \$218 per parcel. The total amount of the NPDES rates levied for FY 2012/13 for the program as a whole was \$409,809.00.

CSD Zone M Charge

The CSD Zone M annual charge for FY 2012/13 is \$986.15 for the proposed Alessandro Blvd. median and \$1,592.10 for the proposed Redlands Blvd. median for a total Zone M charge of \$2,578.25. The total amount of the CSD Zone M charges levied for FY 2012/13 for the program as a whole was \$200,340.48.

Annual Adjustment

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

Beginning in FY 2013/14, the NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate shall be subject to an annual adjustment based on the percentage change calculated for the previous year in the Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County Regional Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, as published by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics (CPI).

CSD Zone M Charge

Beginning in FY 2013/14, the CSD Zone M charge shall be subject to an annual adjustment based on the percentage change calculated for the previous calendar year in the CPI.

Duration of the Charge

Upon approval of the NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate, the annual levy amount will be assessed to APN 478-430-031 (and any division thereof) and shall be placed on the Riverside County property tax bill or as a monthly charge on a utility bill. The CSD Zone M annual levy amount shall be assessed on the Riverside County property tax bill as planning of the Alessandro Blvd. and Redlands Blvd. medians occur. The NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial regulatory rate and the CSD Zone M charge will be levied each following year at the proposed rate, which may include an annual inflation adjustment.

Public Hearing

To provide information concerning this mail ballot proceeding the City/CSD has scheduled one (1) Public Meeting and one (1) Public Hearing, which will be held at the Moreno Valley City Hall Council Chamber located at 14177 Frederick Street, Moreno Valley.

Effect if Inclusion into and Approval of the Charges are Approved

Approval of the NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial maximum regulatory rate will be confirmed if the ballot is marked in favor of the NPDES rate. 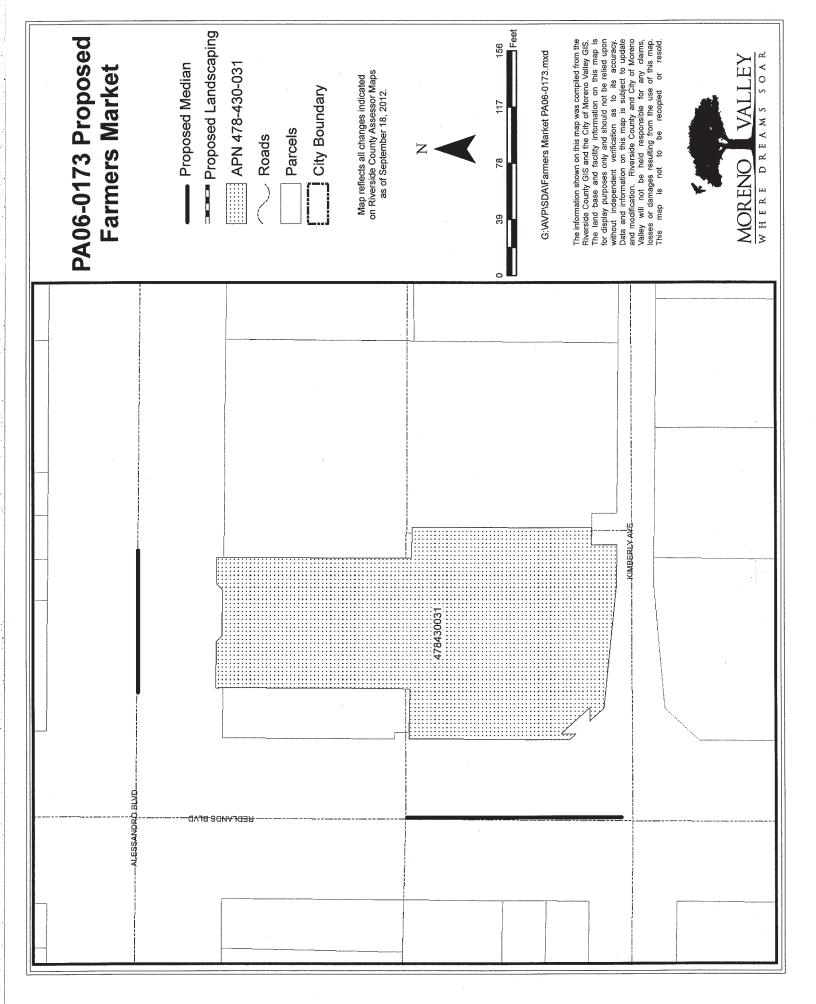

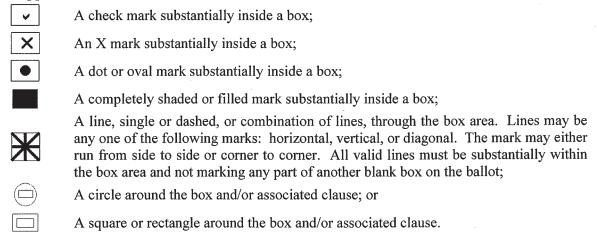

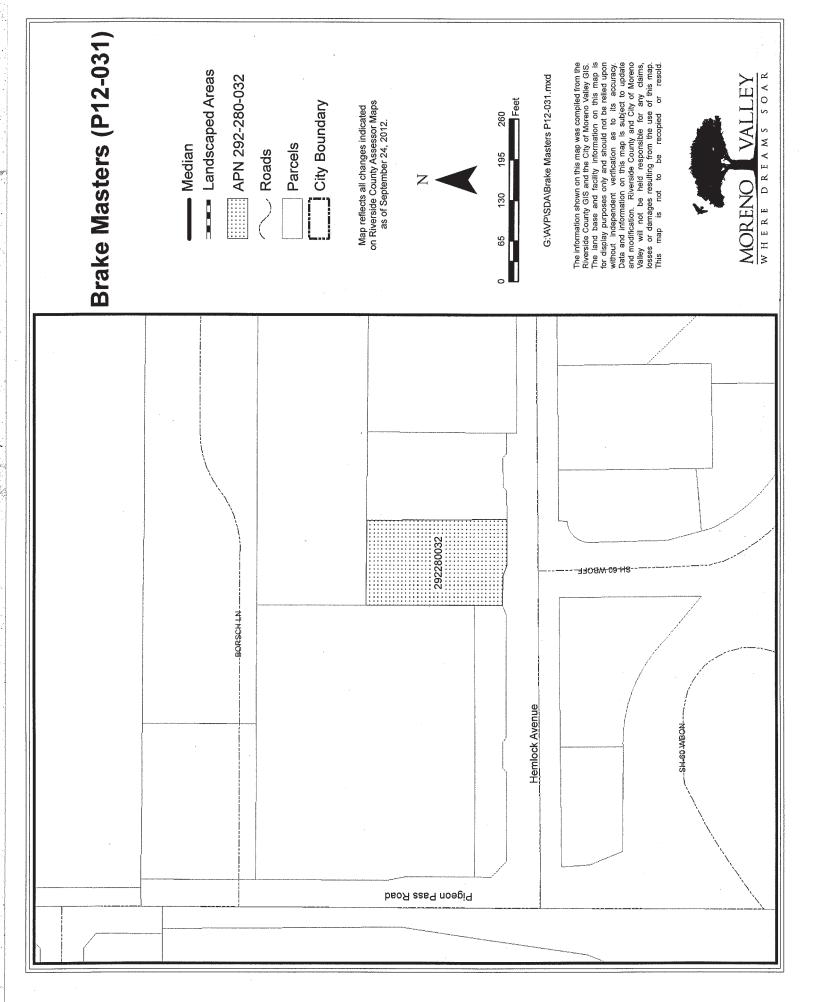

Recommendations: That the CSD:

- After conducting the Public Hearing and accepting public testimony, direct the Secretary of the CSD Board (City Clerk) to tabulate the CSD Zone M ballot for Assessor's Parcel Number (APN) 478-430-031;
- 2. Verify and accept the results of the mail ballot proceeding as identified on the Official Tally Sheet;
- 3. Receive and file with the City Clerk's office the Official Tally Sheet; and
- 4. If approved, authorize and impose the annual CSD Zone M (Commercial, Industrial, and Multifamily Improved Median Maintenance) charge to APN 478-430-031.

ADVISORY BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

N/A

BACKGROUND

The CSD was formed simultaneously with City incorporation in 1984. The designation of zones within the CSD was established to allocate the costs of special services to those parcels receiving the benefit. The City's Arterial Median Maintenance Policy, adopted by the CSD February 2003 and subsequently amended January 2006, requires

that certain commercial, industrial, and multifamily developments be conditioned to fund the maintenance of arterial medians.

The Conditions of Approval for APN 478-430-031 (proposed Farmers Market PA06-0173) require that a funding source be provided to help support the CSD Zone M program. Approving the CSD Zone M annual charge through a mail ballot proceeding shall fulfill this requirement.

DISCUSSION

In compliance with Proposition 218, which requires that any new or proposed increase in property-related assessments, fees, or charges be submitted to property owners for approval, a mail ballot proceeding is being conducted to give the property owner of APN 478-430-031 ("Property Owner") the option to approve or oppose the annual charge for the CSD Zone M program. The Property Owner is given two opportunities to address the legislative body. These two opportunities are the Public Meeting which was held on November 13, 2012 and the Public Hearing on November 27, 2012, when the results of the ballot proceeding will be announced.

Special Districts, a division of the Public Works Department, manages private landscape maintenance firms to ensure that landscape preservation activities are completed on a regular schedule. Landscape maintenance includes, but is not limited to mowing, trimming, pruning, fertilizing, replacing plant material(s) as necessary, litter removal, weed control, maintenance of the irrigation system, payment of water and electric utility charges, staff support, and other items necessary for the satisfactory maintenance of the landscaped medians. Approved CSD Zone M annual charges are levied on the property tax bill.

The CSD Zone M annual charge was estimated based on the parcel's front linear footage to Alessandro Blvd. and Redlands Blvd. Upon approval of the charge, APN 478-430-031 will be subject to the annual charge; however, the annual Zone M charge shall not be levied until such time as the planning of the median(s) begin. The CSD Zone M charge shall be proportionally adjusted if said APN is subdivided.

ALTERNATIVES

- Conduct the Public Hearing, tabulate the ballot, verify, and accept the results of the mail ballot proceeding as identified on the Official Tally Sheet, receive and file with the City Clerk's office the Official Tally Sheet, and if approved, authorize and impose the annual CSD Zone M charge to APN 478-430-031 (and any division thereof). This alternative will fulfill the 45-day noticing period and Public Hearing requirements as mandated by Proposition 218.
- 2. **Do not conduct the Public Hearing,** tabulate the ballot, verify, or accept the results of the mail ballot proceeding for APN 478-430-031. *This alternative would be contrary to Proposition 218 mandates.*

FISCAL IMPACT

For fiscal year (FY) 2012/13, the estimated CSD Zone M charge for APN 478-430-031 is \$2,578.25. Beginning in FY 2013/14, the CSD Zone M charge shall be subject to an annual adjustment based on the percentage change calculated for the previous year in the Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County Regional Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, as published by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The CSD Zone M annual charges, paid by the adjacent new developments, provides the necessary funding for the maintenance of landscaped medians within the CSD. The Property Owner is being balloted for maintenance costs of future medians that are planned to be constructed on Alessandro Blvd. and Redlands Blvd. The amount collected will reduce the General Fund obligation for maintenance for those medians. Collection of the CSD Zone M annual charges are restricted for use for the maintenance and administration of the improved medians within the CSD Zone M program.

CITY COUNCIL GOALS

Community Image, Neighborhood Pride, and Cleanliness

The Zone M program allows the CSD an opportunity to maintain the appearance of developed areas within the City.

Revenue Diversification and Preservation

The CSD Zone M annual charge provides funding for program costs, which include maintenance and administration.

SUMMARY

The action before the CSD Board is to accept public testimony, tabulate the returned ballot, verify, and accept the results of the mail ballot proceeding for APN 478-430-031.

NOTIFICATION

The Property Owner was given the required 45-day noticing period to review the ballot documents. The documents included a notice to the property owner, map of the project area, ballot, instructions for marking and returning the ballot, and postage-paid envelope for returning the ballot to the City Clerk. (See Attachment 1.)

Newspaper advertising for the November 13, 2012, Public Meeting and November 27, 2012, Public Hearing was published in <u>The Press-Enterprise</u> on October 25, 2012. Additionally, the Public Hearing notification was published on November 8 and again on November 15, 2012.

Introduction

In November of 1996, California voters passed Proposition 218 ("The Right to Vote on Taxes Act"). As a result, any new or proposed increase in a property-related charge requires approval of the charge by the property owner of record. In compliance with Proposition 218 legislation, the City of Moreno Valley Special Districts Division is conducting a mail ballot proceeding to provide the owner of Assessor Parcel Number (APN) 478-430-031 the opportunity to express support or opposition for the approval of the NPDES regulatory rate and services and for inclusion into and approval of the annual charge for the CSD Zone M program.

Background

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

The City shall provide the services necessary to meet mandates of the Federal Clean Water Act. The current NPDES Permit, as administered by the State, regulates the volume and amount of pollutants in stormwater runoff from all development types. NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate provides financial support for inspecting site design, source and treatment control Best Management Practices, monitoring maintenance records for those on-site facilities, and performing annual inspections of the affected areas to ensure compliance with federally mandated NPDES Permit requirements, as administered by the State.

CSD Zone M Charge

The CSD was formed simultaneously with City incorporation and established Zones to allocate the costs of special benefit services to those parcels designated to receive selective programs. The CSD Zone M program provides ongoing maintenance to improved medians adjacent to commercial, industrial, and multifamily developments in designated areas of the City. Commercial, industrial, and multifamily developments along designated arterial streets are conditioned to participate in the improved median maintenance program in compliance with the Citywide Arterial Median Maintenance Policy approved by the CSD Board in March 2003 and revised in January 2006.

Services Provided

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

In compliance with the Federal Clean Water Act, the City of Moreno Valley shall annually inspect site design, source and treatment control Best Management Practices, verify monitoring and maintenance records for those on-site facilities, and perform annual inspections of the affected areas to ensure compliance with federally mandated NPDES Permit requirements, as administered by the State.

CSD Zone M Charge

Special Districts' staff manages private landscape maintenance firms to ensure that landscape preservation activities are completed on a regular schedule. The CSD Zone M annual charge was established to cover administration and service costs for the landscape maintenance. Services include, but are not limited to: trimming, pruning, fertilizing, replacing plant material(s) as necessary, litter removal, weed control, maintenance of the irrigation system, payment of water and electric utility charges, staff support, and other items necessary for the satisfactory maintenance of the landscaped medians.

How is the Amount of the Charge Determined?

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

Each fiscal year (FY), the City of Moreno Valley shall determine the type of services necessary to comply with NPDES Permit requirements and levy the rate applicable for that service. The rate levied shall not exceed the rate previously approved by the property owner.

CSD Zone M Charge

The annual CSD Zone M charge includes maintenance and administration costs. The CSD Zone M charge shall be proportionally adjusted if APN 478-430-031 is subdivided in the future. The charge levied shall not exceed the charge previously approved by the property owner.

Proposed Charge

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

For FY 2012/13, the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate is \$218 per parcel. The total amount of the NPDES rates levied for FY 2012/13 for the program as a whole was \$409,809.00.

CSD Zone M Charge

The CSD Zone M annual charge for FY 2012/13 is \$986.15 for the proposed Alessandro Blvd. median and \$1,592.10 for the proposed Redlands Blvd. median for a total Zone M charge of \$2,578.25. The total amount of the CSD Zone M charges levied for FY 2012/13 for the program as a whole was \$200,340.48.

Annual Adjustment

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

Beginning in FY 2013/14, the NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate shall be subject to an annual adjustment based on the percentage change calculated for the previous year in the Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County Regional Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, as published by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics (CPI).

CSD Zone M Charge

Beginning in FY 2013/14, the CSD Zone M charge shall be subject to an annual adjustment based on the percentage change calculated for the previous calendar year in the CPI.

Duration of the Charge

Upon approval of the NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate, the annual levy amount will be assessed to APN 478-430-031 (and any division thereof) and shall be placed on the Riverside County property tax bill or as a monthly charge on a utility bill. The CSD Zone M annual levy amount shall be assessed on the Riverside County property tax bill as planning of the Alessandro Blvd. and Redlands Blvd. medians occur. The NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial regulatory rate and the CSD Zone M charge will be levied each following year at the proposed rate, which may include an annual inflation adjustment.

Public Hearing

To provide information concerning this mail ballot proceeding the City/CSD has scheduled one (1) Public Meeting and one (1) Public Hearing, which will be held at the Moreno Valley City Hall Council Chamber located at 14177 Frederick Street, Moreno Valley.

Effect if Inclusion into and Approval of the Charges are Approved

Approval of the NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial maximum regulatory rate will be confirmed if the ballot is marked in favor of the NPDES rate. Inclusion into the CSD Zone M program and approval of the annual charge will be confirmed if the ballot is marked in favor of the annual charge. Approving the NPDES maximum commercial/industrial regulatory rate and the CSD Zone M annual charge through a mail ballot proceeding shall fulfill the Conditions of Approval to provide a funding source for the NPDES and Zone M programs.

Effect if Inclusion into and Approval of the Charges are Not Approved

NPDES Maximum Commercial/Industrial Regulatory Rate

Not approving the NPDES commercial/industrial regulatory rate to meet federally mandated NPDES Permit requirements shall result in noncompliance with the Conditions of Approval. If the returned valid ballot is marked opposing the NPDES rate, then the rate will not be levied on the property tax bill.

CSD Zone M Charge

If the returned valid ballot is marked opposing the CSD Zone M annual charge, then the annual charge will not be levied on the property tax bill and noncompliance of the Conditions of Approval shall result.

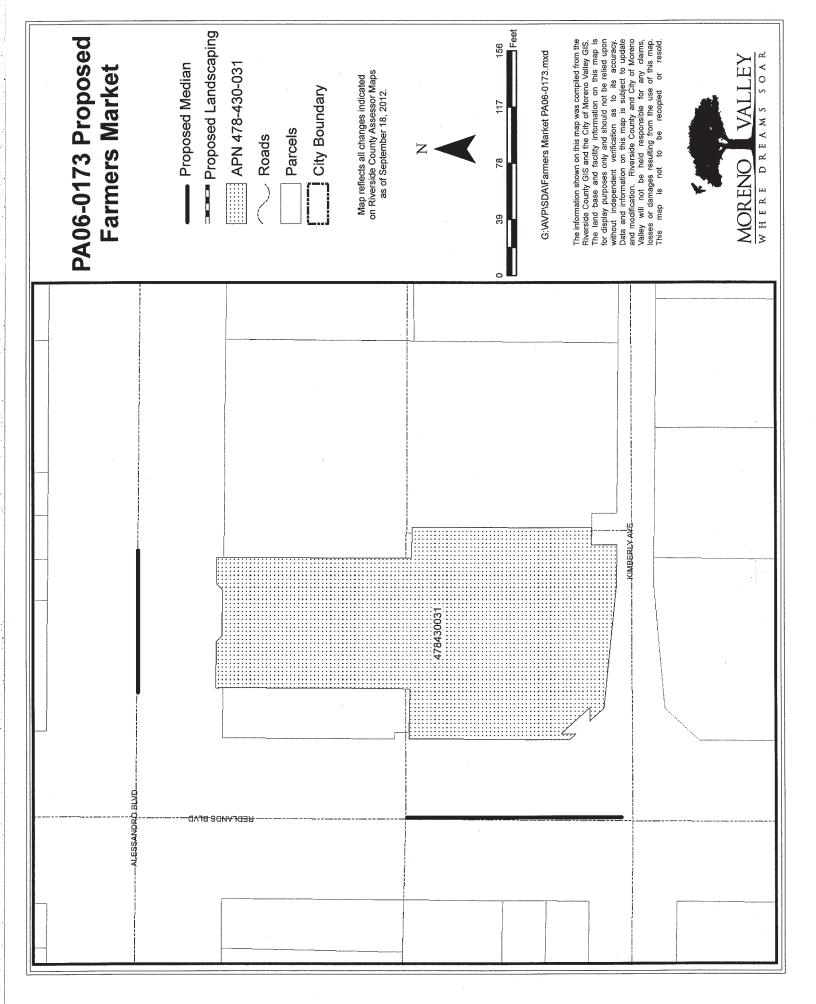

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendation:

1. Staff recommends that the City Council adopt a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the Nason Street Improvements from Cactus Avenue to Fir Avenue, Project 801 0001 70 77, in that mitigation measures included in the Initial Study and ultimately incorporated into the project construction specifications will reduce all potential environmental impacts to an acceptable level.

ADVISORY BOARD/COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION

N/A

BACKGROUND

The City Council authorized the addition of the Nason Street Project from Cactus Avenue to Fir Avenue in the FY 2011-12 CIP and the appropriation of up to \$15 million in California Communities Gas Tax Revenue Certificates of Participation (COPS), Series 2011B (TRIP – Total Road Improvement Program) monies for the project. On July 26, 2011, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2011-81 approving the sale, execution, and delivery of not more than \$20 million in principal amount of COPS monies. These improvements are integral elements of the Economic Development Action Plan focused on building a medical corridor to facilitate and attract development and create jobs for Moreno Valley residents.

On August 23, 2012, the Planning Commission approved Resolution No. 2012-22, adopting a Negative Declaration and approving PA12-0026, a General Plan Amendment to revise the City Circulation Plan. The revision to the City's Circulation Plan changed the classification of Nason Street from Alessandro Boulevard to Dracaea Avenue (previously Arterial with 100 foot right of way and 76 foot roadway width) and Nason Street from Dracaea Avenue to Fir Avenue (previously 4-Lane Divided Arterial with 110 foot right of way and 86 foot roadway width) to 4-Lane Divided Arterial, Augmented Parkway with 120 foot right of way and 86 foot roadway width on the Circulation Element.

On September 25, 2012, the City Council held a public hearing regarding the proposed General Plan Amendment. Resolution No. 2012-79, adopting a Negative Declaration and approving the General Plan Amendment, was approved at this meeting.

DISCUSSION

The Nason Street Improvement Project proposes to construct improvements along Nason Street from Cactus Avenue to Fir Avenue for a 4-Lane Divided Arterial, Augmented Parkway with 120 foot right of way and 86 foot roadway width. The improvements will include curb and gutter, sidewalk, street lights, drainage facilities, and undergrounding of overhead utilities. Traffic signal improvements will be constructed at Fir Avenue, Eucalyptus Avenue, Dracaea Avenue, Cottonwood Avenue, and Alessandro Boulevard. A new traffic signal at Medical Center will also be completed. A 24" EMWD water line, on Nason Street from Dracaea Avenue to Cottonwood Avenue and on Cottonwood Avenue from Nason Street to 1,300 feet to the west, may be incorporated into the project. At intersections, including Fir Avenue, Dracaea Avenue, Cottonwood Avenue, and Alessandro Boulevard, there will be improvements from approximately 200 to 600 feet on each side of Nason Street.

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Section 15070 (Title 14 – California Code of Regulations), states that a Negative Declaration (ND) or a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) may be prepared for a project when the Initial Study indicates that no significant effect on the environment will result from project implementation or when mitigation measures as described in the Initial Study are incorporated in the project implementation.

Based on the findings of the Initial Study prepared for the project by the City's Planning Division, staff has determined, in compliance with CEQA and the City's Rules to Implement CEQA, that preparation of a MND is recommended for the street widening project on Nason Street from Cactus Avenue to Fir Avenue in that mitigation measures included in the Initial Study and ultimately incorporated into the project construction specifications will reduce all potential environmental impacts to an acceptable level.

On June 27, 2012, a Public Information meeting was held to obtain input from residents and business owners affected by the Nason Street from Cactus Avenue to Fir Avenue project. On October 4, 2012, a notice was published in the Press Enterprise describing the project and advising the public of the preparation of a MND, notice of time and place

where the environmental documents could be inspected, and notice that the City Council would consider approval of a MND for the project (or appropriate modifications or alternatives to the project) on the date of this meeting. The notice and the applicable reference documents were also posted to the City's website, were made available for review at the Planning Division and the City Library, and emailed to the attendees of record of the June 2012 Public Information meeting. The notice advised that written comments could be submitted to the City prior to October 25, 2012 or verbal comments could be given at this meeting. No written comments were received by the October 25, 2012 deadline.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. By motion authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report.

 This action will allow staff to finalize the design and acquire necessary right of way for the project.
- 2. Do not authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This action will delay the finalization of the design, will delay the necessary right of way acquisition, and ultimately delay the construction of this essential project.

FISCAL IMPACT

Adopting the MND does not impact the General Fund. The City of Moreno Valley will fund the design and construction of the project with the proceeds from the California Communities Gas Tax Revenue Certificates of Participation (COPS), Series 2011B (TRIP – Total Road Improvement Program) in the amount of \$15 Million. There is no fiscal impact to the City's General Fund.

A portion of the overall segment (Nason Street from Alessandro Boulevard to Fir Avenue) is eligible for approximately \$10 million of Transportation Uniform Mitigation Fee (TUMF) reimbursement. The City can seek reimbursement of TUMF funds in the future as funds become available.

The proposal includes street improvements to Nason Street from Cactus Avenue for a 4-lane Divided Arterial, Augmented Parkway with 120' right-of-way and 86 feet of roadway width. The project improvements will include curb and gutter, sidewalk, street lights, drainage facilities, and may include undergrounding of overhead utilities. There would also be traffic signal modification at Fir Avenue, Eucalyptus Avenue, Dracaea Avenue, Cottonwood Avenue, and Alessandro Boulevard. A new traffic signal at the Medical Center will also be completed. A primary objective of the project is to provide roadway capacity enhancement. A 24" wide EMWD water line will likely be incorporated into the project. It is anticipated that this water line will be within the Nason street section, and also extend 1300 lineal feet on the Cottonwood Avenue street section, west of Nason Street. At east-west intersections of several streets, including Fir Avenue, Dracaea Avenue, Cottonwood Avenue, and Alessandro Boulevard, there will be improvements and widening from approximately 200 to 600 feet on each side of Nason Street.

8. Surrounding Land Uses and Setting: (Briefly describe the project's surroundings)

The area is surrounded by a mix of developed and undeveloped properties, which are primarily single-family residential. On the southerly end of the project limits, northwesterly of Cactus Avenue and Nason

An Air Quality and Greenhouse Gas Emissions Impact Analysis by BonTerra Consultants (June 2012) addressed whether the project would have any potential impacts on the South Coast Air Quality District's Air Quality Management Plan. "The two principal criteria for conformance with the AQMP are (1) whether the project will result in an increase in the frequency or severity of existing air quality violations, cause or contribute to new violations, or delay timely attainment of air quality standards and (2) whether the project will exceed the assumptions in the AQMP (SCAQMD 1993). Project implementation would contribute emissions of PM10, PM2.5, and the O3 precursors VOC and NOx to the area during short-term project construction. As described above, projected pollutant emissions during construction would be less than the significance criteria. The long-term project emissions would be less than existing emissions. Therefore, the project would not result in an increase in the frequency or severity of existing air quality violations; would not cause or contribute to new violations; and would not delay timely attainment of air quality standards. The assumptions in the AQMPs are related to development and anticipated increases in emissions related to increases in vehicle miles traveled (VMT) and stationary sources. The proposed project would not increase VMT or add stationary sources. The proposed project would conform to the applicable SCAQMD AQMPs". (BonTerra study, page 23)

The proposed alignment is consistent with the alignment of Nason Street to the north. The proposed project would not conflict with or obstruct implementation of the Air Quality Management Plan. Grading would balance cut and fill on the site. No direct or indirect impacts are anticipated.

The following measure (although not required to reduce an impact to a level of insignificance) will be incorporated into the Mitigation Monitoring Program to ensure compliance.

MM-1 Demolition and grading for the project shall be performed in compliance with SCAQMD Rule 403, Fugitive Dust. Contractor compliance with Rule 403 requirements shall be mandated in the contractor's specifications and shall include the measures listed below.

- Land disturbance shall be minimized to the extent feasible. Grading activities shall be limited to the disturbance of no more than five acres in the course of one day.
- Haul trucks shall be covered when loaded with fill.
- Paved streets shall be swept at least once per day where there is evidence of dirt that has been carried onto the roadway.
- Watering trucks shall be used to minimize dust. Watering should be sufficient to confine dust plumes to the project work areas. Active, disturbed areas shall have water applied to them three times daily.
- For disturbed surfaces that will not be re-vegetated and that will be left inactive for four or more days, a chemical stabilizer shall be applied pursuant to the manufacturer's instruction.
- For unpaved roads, chemical stabilizers shall be applied or the roads shall be watered once per hour during active operation.
- Vehicle speed on unpaved roads shall be limited to 15 miles per hour.
- For open storage piles that will remain on site for two or more days, water shall be applied once per hour, or coverings shall be installed.
- For paved road track-out, all haul vehicles shall be covered or shall comply with the vehicle freeboard requirements of Section 23114 of the *California Vehicle Code* for both public and private roads. During high wind conditions (i.e., wind speeds in excess of 25 miles per hour), all earth-moving activities shall cease or water shall be applied to soil not more than 15 minutes prior to disturbing such soil.

The BonTerra study shows that Construction mass emissions of criteria pollutants would be less than the SCAQMD CEQA significance thresholds. On-site construction emissions would not exceed SCAQMD emissions thresholds related to local concentration limits. Operational emissions would be decreased. Construction and operational emissions would be less than significant.

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ORDINANCE NO. 855

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, ADDING CHAPTER 11.85 TO THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY MUNICIPAL CODE, RELATING TO CRIME FREE MULTI-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL HOUSING.

The City Council of the City of Moreno Valley does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. MUNICIPAL CODE ADDED:

1.1 Chapter 11.85 of the Moreno Valley Municipal Code is hereby added to read as follows:

"Section 11.85.010 – Findings and Purpose

Residents in multi-family residential rental housing are frequently victimized when the facility in which they live is unsafe. Proper maintenance of these facilities can reduce criminal activity and improve the safety of residents. The purpose of this Chapter is to require the owner or operator of certain multi-family residential rental housing facilities in the City of Moreno Valley to obtain a crime free certification for the facility by having the facility inspected, submit to training and having each tenant of the facility enter into a lease addendum promising not to commit or allow the commission of criminal activity on the leased premises.

Section 11.85.020 – Crime Free Multi-Family Housing Certification

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person in the City of Moreno Valley to rent a residential dwelling unit that meets the threshold requirements of paragraph (B) of this subsection, unless a Crime Free Multi-Family Housing Certification has been issued by the Moreno Valley Police Department and has been properly maintained for the location of issuance.
- B. The Crime Free Multi-Family Housing Certification requirement shall only apply to residential housing facilities that contain more than one (1) residential dwelling unit on a single parcel and that have generated at least ten (10) calls for service to the Moreno Valley Police Department within any ninety (90) day period. Additionally, the Certification requirement shall also apply to residential rental housing facilities that have a disproportionately higher number of calls for service, as measured by at least 25% higher calls for service when compared to two (2) similar residential rental housing facilities in any ninety (90) day period.

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- C. When the threshold set forth in subsection (B) has been exceeded, the Police Department shall provide Notice to the facility of the requirement to obtain Certification and to immediately cease the rental of any additional units until an application for Certification has been submitted. Thereafter, the facility may continue in the rental of units unless the application has been denied, rejected, revoked or voided as incomplete. Notice shall be served by Certified Mail to the facility's office mailing address and additionally by electronic means, if provided.
- D. This Chapter shall not apply to any state licensed group home or facility which is operating under and governed by state or federal rules and regulations.

Section 11.85.030 – Appeals

- A. A person may appeal a Notice determining the requirement for Certification by submitting a request for a hearing, in writing, to the City Manager. A request for a hearing must be received within fourteen (14) days after Notice was served. Failure to timely request a hearing constitutes a waiver of the right to contest the Notice and requirement for Certification.
- B. The following issues may be contested in an appeal:
 - 1. Whether or not a violation enforceable under this Chapter occurred,
 - 2. Whether the person charged is responsible for the violation,
 - 3. The dates when the violation occurred,
 - 4. Whether or not the threshold for Certification required under Section 11.85.020(B) has been met.
- C. Within fourteen (14) days after the City Manager receives a timely request for a hearing, he shall schedule a hearing before a neutral hearing officer designated by the City Manager and provide notice of the date and time of such hearing to the person requesting the hearing.

Section 11.85.040 – Hearing Procedures

- A. Every witness testifying shall take an oath or make an affirmation. The hearing officer is authorized to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and conduct the hearing.
- B. At the time of the hearing, the hearing officer shall hear testimony of all competent persons desiring to testify and review all documents, photographs or other evidence.
- C. The hearing officer has the authority to determine the relevance of any evidence and to exclude unduly repetitious and cumulative evidence or testimony and may consider hearsay evidence.

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- D. If the appellant fails to attend the hearing, the hearing will be terminated and a final determination shall be entered in favor of the City.
- E. The hearing shall be conducted in English. The appellant may provide an interpreter at their own expense.
- F. At the conclusion of the hearing, the hearing officer shall make a determination upholding the decision of the City or overruling the decision of the City. The appellant shall be served a written notice of the hearing officer's decision within ten (10) days or within such time as the hearing officer has determined is reasonable.
- G. The decision of the hearing officer is final.

Section 11.85.050 – Application for Certification

- A. Application for a Crime Free Multi-Family Housing Certification shall be made in the name of the owner of the premises to be rented and submitted to the Moreno Valley Police Department on forms provided by the Police Department. The application shall identify the location of the property; name, address and telephone number of the owner; name, address and 24-hour telephone number(s) of the manager or custodian of the property; the owner's agent for service of process; and such other information as may be required by the Police Department. The applicant shall pay a fee, as adopted by resolution of the City Council, to the City for Payment must be made in full prior to Certification. All fees obtained for Certification shall be used to fund the implementation of this Chapter. There shall be no fee imposed upon applicants that voluntarily seek certification and do not meet the thresholds for Certification set forth in Section 11.85.020(B).
- B. A Crime free Multi-Family Housing Certification shall be issued for a period of one year. Certification shall expire twelve (12) months after issuance, unless previously removed. The Certification shall not be transferrable. Each new owner or manager of the rental facility must obtain a new Certification unless either the manager or owner who already completed the Certification is still retained.
- C. Application for renewal shall be made in the same manner as for a new Certification. Applicants for renewal shall pay a fee, as adopted by resolution of the City Council, to the City. Applicants shall be required to renew their Certification every year until calls for service have been reduced below the threshold set forth in Section 11.85.020(B) for at least one year from the date of Certification. There shall be no fee imposed upon applicants that voluntarily seek certification and do not meet the thresholds for Certification set forth in Section 11.85.020(B).

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D. The Moreno Valley Police Department shall promptly act to complete the Certification of all applicants and may reject any application for which the applicant has not attended the required seminar, consented to an inspection of the facility or submitted complete documentation.

Section 11.85.060 – Inspection

No Crime Free Multi-Family Housing Certification shall be issued or renewed unless the dwelling unit(s), and common area(s) in connection with which Certification is sought, are found after inspection to meet all state and local laws and regulations. Rental dwelling units that change ownership shall be required to be inspected before a new Certification may be issued, unless either the manager or owner who already completed Certification is still retained. The owner will be provided with an inspection report describing any condition which constitutes a violation of any applicable law or regulation, and shall be afforded a reasonable opportunity to correct any such conditions. In the event that more than two (2) follow-up inspections are required in order for the Police Department to determine compliance, the applicant shall pay an additional inspection fee as set established by Resolution for Code Enforcement reinspections. Payment must be made prior to any re-inspection or Certification.

Section 11.85.070 - Seminar

All persons applying for a Crime Free Multi-Family Housing Certification, including all persons administering, managing or controlling the operation of any residential rental housing facilities required to obtain Certification shall attend a seminar, administered by the Police Department, prior to Certification. The seminar may be attended after the application has been submitted. A certificate of attendance at a seminar shall be valid for three (3) years for the individual attending the seminar.

Section 11.85.080 - Lease Addendum

- A. All facilities required to obtain Certification shall include a "Crime Free Lease Addendum", in a form provided by the City, providing that tenants shall not engage in illegal, nuisance or criminal activity on the premises, as part of their rental agreement.
- B. It shall be unlawful for any person to intentionally allow any tenant to occupy a residential rental property in violation of any provision of the "Crime Free Lease Addendum" required by this Chapter.
- C. The Crime Free Lease Addendum shall be substantially in the following form:

"In consideration of the execution or renewal of a lease of the dwelling unit identified in the lease, Owner and Tenant agree as follows:

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Tenant, any member's of tenant's household or a guest or other person under the tenant's control shall not:

- 1. Engage in any nuisance activity as defined in Civil Code Sections 3479 and 3480, or under Chapter 6.04 of the Moreno Valley Municipal Code, any criminal activity, including drug-related criminal activity, on or near the said premises. "Drug-related Criminal Activity" means the illegal manufacture, sale, use, possession, distribution, or possession with the intent to manufacture, sell, distribute, or use of a controlled substance as defined in Section 201 of the Controlled Substances Act (21 U.S.C. 802.
- 2. Engage in any act intended to facilitate nuisance or criminal activity.
- Permit the dwelling unit to be used for, or to facilitate nuisance or criminal activity, including drug-related criminal activity, regardless of whether the individual engaging in such activity is a member of the household, or a guest.
- 4. Engage in the unlawful manufacturing, selling, using, storing, keeping, or giving of a controlled substance as defined in Health & Safety Code Section 11350, et seq., at any locations, whether on or near the dwelling unit, premises or otherwise.
- 5. Engage in any illegal activity, including prostitution as defined in Penal Code Section 647)b); criminal street gang activity as defined in Penal code Section 186.20 et seq., assault and battery as prohibited in Penal Code Section 240; burglary as prohibited in Penal Code Section 459; the unlawful use and discharge of firearms as prohibited in Penal Code Section 245; sexual offenses as prohibited in Penal Code Section 269 and 288; or any breach of the lease agreement that otherwise jeopardizes the health, safety and welfare of the landlord, his agent or any other tenant or involving imminent or actual serious property damage.

Violation of the above provisions shall be a material and irreparable violation of the lease and good cause for immediate termination of tenancy. A single violation of any of the provisions of this addendum shall be deemed a serious violation and a material and irreparable breach of compliance with the lease. It is understood that a single violation shall be good cause for termination of the lease. Unless otherwise provided by law, proof of violation shall not require a criminal conviction, but shall be by a preponderance of the evidence."

Section 11.85.090 – Posting of Signage

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If the owner does not reside on the premises of any residential multi-family rental housing facility in the City, a notice, stating the name and address of the owner, or the name and address of his agent, shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the premises.

Section 11.85.100 – Removal of Certification

If a residential multi-family rental facility is found through inspection by any police, fire, code or building official to be in violation of any law or regulation, reasonable notice shall be provided to the facility to correct such substandard conditions. If the corrections are not made within the time specified in the notice, the Certification shall be removed without further notice.

Section 11.85.110 – Effect on Existing Certifications

Existing housing facilities that have current Certification by the Police Department under the voluntary program shall not be required to renew those Certifications until they expire. If no such date of expiration is set forth on a voluntary Certification, that Certification shall expire one (1) year from the date this Ordinance is adopted.

Section 11.85.120 – Penalties

- A. A violation of this Chapter shall constitute a criminal offense punishable as set forth in Chapter 1.01 of this Code.
- B. A violation of this Chapter may be enforced through the issuance of Civil Citations as set forth in Chapter 1.10 of this Code.
- C. A violation of this Chapter may be enforced through a civil action filed by the City for injunctive relief, abatement, forfeiture and/or receivership.
- D. A violation of this Chapter may result in a civil penalty which may be assessed in any civil action not to exceed \$2,500.00 per violation for each and every day the violation continues to exist.
- E. The remedies set forth above are cumulative."

SECTION 2. EFFECT OF ENACTMENT:

Except as specifically provided herein, nothing contained in this ordinance shall be deemed to modify or supersede any prior enactment of the City Council which addresses the same subject addressed herein.

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NOTICE OF ADOPTION:
