2. Authorize submittal of the RCTC Measure A Local Streets and Roads CIP and MOE for the RCTC Measure A Local Funds Program, FY 2014/15 - 2018/19.
3. Authorize staff to submit an amended five-year plan to RCTC if changes are made by City Council to the listed Measure A projects as part of the upcoming FY 2014/15 budget approval process

## BACKGROUND

The Riverside County Transportation Commission Ordinance No. 02-001, as enacted pursuant to the provisions of Division 25 of the Public Utilities Code, specifies that local cities and counties must submit an annual Five-Year CIP to receive Measure A funds. RCTC requires local agencies to submit their FY 2014/15 - 2018/19 Five Year CIP for

Measure A by May 12, 2014. The program is subject to amendment after review and approval by RCTC. The City of Moreno Valley has received Measure A funds (local sales tax) for expenditures on local streets since November 1989.

## DISCUSSION

Measure A is a major funding source for transportation infrastructure improvements. The City is scheduled to receive $\$ 3,354,000$ in Measure A revenue by FY 2013/14 yearend and $\$ 3,586,000$ in funding for FY 2014/15.

RCTC requires all local jurisdictions to submit an annual five-year CIP for continued receipt of Measure A Local Streets and Roads funds. As required by RCTC, the attached tables include the actual FY 2013/14 Measure A budget approved by Council, as well any budget appropriation adjustments during the fiscal year. Additional tables include proposed projects for FY 2014/15 and planned projects for FY 2015/16 through FY 2018/19. The listed projects are consistent with the City's Capital Improvement Program. All identified projects meet the criteria for Measure A funding. The annual debt service obligations in the Measure A fund considerably impact the availability of this revenue source for construction of new CIP projects in future years.

The projects are included in the Measure A Five-Year CIP to satisfy RCTC Ordinance No. 02-001. Although RCTC requires this information by May 12, 2014, the City Council may make any changes to the list of projects as part of the City's annual CIP budget approval process. City staff can forward the amended Measure A project list to RCTC once the City's budget is approved.

RCTC Ordinance No. 02-001 also requires the City to provide an executed MOE Certification Statement indicating that Measure A funds will not replace local discretionary funds used for the City's transportation issues, but will be in addition to the City's funds for transportation purposes. The MOE base year amount, approved by the RCTC at its July 2011 meeting, is $\$ 1,459,153$. The MOE requirement is met by the Public Works Department General Fund operating budgets and by a contribution from the General Fund to the Gas Tax Fund.

## ALTERNATIVES

1. Approve the City of Moreno Valley's Five-Year Measure A Local Streets and Roads CIP and MOE for the RCTC Measure A Local Funds Program, FY 2014/15 - 2018/19, authorize submittal of the RCTC Measure A Local Streets and Roads CIP and MOE for the RCTC Measure A Local Funds Program, FY 2014/15-2018/19, and authorize staff to submit an amended five-year plan to RCTC if changes are made by City Council to the listed Measure A projects as part of the upcoming FY 2014/15 CIP budget approval process. This alternative allows the City to continue receiving Measure A revenue annually to fund significant roadway and other transportation related infrastructure improvements.
2. Do not approve the City of Moreno Valley's Five-Year Measure A Local Streets and Roads CIP and MOE for the RCTC Measure A Local Funds Program FY 2014/15 - 2018/19. This alternative eliminates Measure A funding for the City, significantly affecting the ability to deliver critical CIP projects.

## FISCAL IMPACT

The timely approval and submittal of the Five-Year CIP by May 12, 2014, ensures continued receipt of Measure A funds for FY 2014/15. City staff can forward an amended Measure A project list to RCTC once City Council approves the FY 14/15 City CIP budget. Measure A funds can only be used for transportation related projects.

## CITY COUNCIL GOALS

PUBLIC FACILITIES AND CAPITAL PROJECTS:
Ensure that needed public facilities, roadway improvements, and other infrastructure improvements are constructed and maintained.

## SUMMARY

The City of Moreno Valley is required to submit an annual Five-Year CIP for Measure A projects and a MOE certification for continued receipt of Measure A funds.

1. Authorize the submission of a grant application for the TIGER Discretionary Grants Program to the U.S. Department of Transportation.

## SUMMARY

This report requests that the City Council authorize the Public Works Department to submit an application for a TIGER grant to fund improvements to Heacock Street and the Heacock Channel (Cactus Avenue to Perris Valley Storm Drain Lateral A).

## DISCUSSION

On March 3, 2014, the Federal government issued notice announcing the availability of funding and requesting proposals for the U. S. Department of Transportation's National Infrastructure Investments. The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2014 (Pub. L. 11376, January 17, 2014) ("FY 2014 Appropriations Act") appropriated $\$ 600$ million to be awarded by the Department of Transportation ("DOT") for National Infrastructure Investments. This program is more commonly referred to as "TIGER Discretionary Grants". As with previous rounds of TIGER, funds for the FY 2014 TIGER program are to be awarded on a competitive basis for projects that will have a significant impact on the Nation, a metropolitan area, or a region. Primary selection criteria include existing
conditions of the project facilities, economic competitiveness, livability, environmental sustainability, safety, and project readiness. Based upon the Federal notice, project readiness is a critical selection component and is often referred to as "shovel ready." For a project to be considered for TIGER funding, it must be ready for construction by June 2016 including all environmental clearances mandated by the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA).

TIGER grant application packages are due to the Federal government by April 28, 2014. The City is currently pursuing funding opportunities for projects that meet the intent of the TIGER Discretionary Grant program.

After considering all the requirements of the program, staff is recommending to submit a grant application for the following project:

- Street improvements to Heacock Street and flood control channel improvements to the Heacock Channel from Cactus Avenue to the Perris Valley Storm Drain Lateral A.

The grant application will be tailored and submitted to the U.S. DOT such that the City of Moreno Valley would be the lead agency implementing the project where the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District (RCFCWCD), the March Air Reserve Base, and March Joint Powers Authority could be co-applicants in order to reflect a multi-agency collaborative project. This project is anticipated to be shovel ready by the June 2016 timeframe established by the grant program.

## ALTERNATIVES

1. Authorize the submission of a grant application for the TIGER Discretionary Grants Program. Staff recommends this action so that a grant application can be submitted to the Federal government before the April 28, 2014 deadline.
2. Do not authorize the submission of a grant application for the TIGER Discretionary Grants Program. If such authority is not granted, the City will not submit a grant application for the TIGER Discretionary Grants Program to the Federal government.

## FISCAL IMPACT

All applications for projects within urban areas to the TIGER Discretionary Grants Program require a commitment of 20 percent matching funding from the agency submitting the application. The estimated total project cost is $\$ 25,000,000$. Heacock Street improvements are estimated at $\$ 5,000,000$ and Heacock Channel improvements are estimated at $\$ 20,000,000$. The matching funding amount is estimated at $\$ 5,000,000$ for the project. RCFCWCD anticipates contributing approximately $\$ 4,000,000$ for the Heacock Channel improvements. The remaining matching funding of $\$ 1,000,000$ would come from available Gas Tax (Fund 2000), Measure A (Fund 2001), and/or TUMF Capital Project funds (Fund 3003). These City funds may be used
only to implement transportation related programs. If a project is selected for the TIGER Program, an Agreement between the City and FHWA (acting on behalf of the U.S. DOT) would have to be executed. The Agreement would require consideration and approval by the City Council. There is no impact to the General Fund with this action.

## RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

1. Award the construction contract to All American Asphalt, P.O. Box 2229, Corona, California 92878, the lowest responsible bidder, for the Cycle 1 Citywide Pavement Resurfacing.
2. Authorize the City Manager to execute a contract with All American Asphalt.
3. Authorize the issuance of a Purchase Order to All American Asphalt in the amount of $\$ 4,244,152.00$ ( $\$ 3,858,320.00$ bid amount plus $10 \%$ contingency) when the contract has been signed by all parties.
4. Authorize the Public Works Director/City Engineer to execute any subsequent related minor change orders to the contract with All American Asphalt up to, but not exceeding, the $10 \%$ contingency amount of $\$ 385,832.00$, subject to the approval of the City Attorney.
5. Authorize the Public Works Director/City Engineer to record the Notice of Completion once he determines the work is complete, accept the improvements into the City's maintained system, and release the retention to All American Asphalt, if no claims are filed against the project.
6. Authorize the appropriation of $\$ 699,224$ as expense in the Capital Projects Reimbursements fund (Fund 3008) for the construction phase of the Cycle 1 Citywide Pavement Resurfacing project.

## SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of a contract to All American Asphalt for the construction of the Cycle 1 Citywide Pavement Resurfacing project. The project is funded with the proceeds from the California Communities Gas Tax Revenue Certificates of Participation, Series 2001B, Total Road Improvement Program (TRIP) and Measure A Funds (Fund 2001) and has been approved in the Fiscal Year 2013/2014 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). In addition, Staff also recommends the authorization of an expense appropriation of $\$ 669,224$ in the Capital Projects Reimbursements fund to provide sufficient budget for the construction of these needed improvements.

## DISCUSSION

On July 26, 2011, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2011-81 approving the sale, execution, and delivery of not more than $\$ 20$ million in principal amount of the TRIP for the City street improvements. As part of the adoption of the FY 2013-2014 Capital Improvement Plan Budget, the City Council has authorized the appropriation of $\$ 3$ million of TRIP proceeds for the Citywide Pavement Resurfacing project to resurface various arterial and collector street segments.

The Planning Division of the Community and Economic Development Department determined on January 27, 2014 that this project qualifies for a Class 1 Categorical Exemption as defined in Section 15301C of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and Section 4.6B of the City's Rules and Procedures for implementation of CEQA.

This project involves the pavement resurfacing which includes the reconstruction of existing access ramps within the paving limits and the reestablishment of traffic striping for various street segments. As identified in the Bidding Documents, the project includes the Base Bid and various Alternate Bids to maximize the utilization of the available project's budget depending on the results from the bid opening.

- Base Bid: (recommended for awarding to contractor) includes pavement resurfacing of Dracaea Avenue from Elsworth Street to Frederick Street, Bay Avenue from Frederick Street to Graham Street, Alessandro Boulevard from Frederick Street to Indian Street and from Oliver Street to Moreno Beach Drive. Base Bid does not include reestablishment of traffic striping on Dracaea Avenue.
- Alternate Bid A-1: (recommended for awarding to contractor) includes the installation of raised crosswalk on Dracaea Avenue at the Aqueduct Bike Trail crossing and the reestablishment of traffic striping on Dracaea Avenue.
- Alternate Bid A-2: (not recommended for awarding to contractor) includes the installation of said raised crosswalk on Dracaea Avenue, installation of an interim traffic calming device/traffic circle at the intersection of Dracaea Avenue and Pan Am Boulevard, and new striping layout on Dracaea Avenue to accommodate the traffic circle.
- Alternate Bid B: (recommended for awarding to contractor) includes pavement resurfacing of Cottonwood Avenue from Indian Street to Perris Boulevard.
- Alternate Bid C: (recommended for awarding to contractor) includes pavement resurfacing of Cottonwood Avenue from Perris Boulevard to Kitching Street.
- Alternate Bid D: (recommended for awarding to contractor) includes pavement resurfacing of Dracaea Avenue from Graham Street to Heacock Street.
- Alternate Bid E: (recommended for awarding to contractor) provides pavement widening for a short segment of south side of Alessandro Boulevard between Perris Boulevard and Apple Blossom Lane.
- Alternate Bid F: (not recommended for awarding to contractor) includes the installation of said raised crosswalk on Dracaea Avenue, installation of a permanent traffic calming device/traffic circle at the intersection of Dracaea Avenue and Pan Am Boulevard, and new striping layout on Dracaea Avenue to accommodate the traffic circle.

The Notice Inviting Bids was advertised for the subject project and formal bidding procedures have been followed in conformance with the Public Contract Code. The City Clerk opened bids at 10:15 a.m. on March 13, 2014 for the subject project. Five (5) bids were received as follows:

The lowest responsible bidder was determined by comparing the cumulative total Bid Prices for Base Bid and Alternate A-1, B, C, D and E Bid items as stipulated in the Bidding Documents. Staff has reviewed the bid by All American Asphalt and finds it to be the lowest responsible bidder in possession of a valid license and bid bond. No outstanding issues were identified through review of the references submitted by All American Asphalt in their bid. Based on the amount of available funding, the need to construct the improvements, and the favorable bid received, staff recommends the City Council to award the Base Bid and Alternate Bids A-1, B, C, D and E to All American Asphalt for this project. This project provides safety enhancement for drivers with a new pavement surface and for pedestrians with ADA compliance access ramps while extending the service life of the streets.

## ALTERNATIVES

1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This alternative will facilitate the timely construction of needed improvements.
2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This alternative will delay the construction of needed improvements.

## FISCAL IMPACT

This project is included in the Fiscal Year 2013/2014 CIP. The proceeds from TRIP in combination with the remaining Measure A funds for the project, and the proposed expense appropriation will provide sufficient funding for the construction of this project. There is no impact to the General Fund.

All American Asphalt's bid amount for the Base Bid plus Alternates $A-1, B, C, D$ and $E$ is $\$ 3,858,320.00$. Staff is recommending that the City Council issue a Purchase Order to All American Asphalt for $\$ 4,244,152.00$ which includes a $10 \%$ contingency of $\$ 385,832.00$. The contingency is added to the account for any unforeseen subsurface conditions encountered during construction which may result in changes in costs. Unforeseen conditions may include unsuitable soils, unknown or shallow conflicting utilities, or hazardous wastes which need to be properly processed and removed. At the completion of the project, any remaining project budget balance will be saved for future pavement resurfacing projects.

THIS Agreement, effective as of the date signed by the City of Moreno Valley by and between the City of Moreno Valley, a municipal corporation, County of Riverside, State of California, hereinafter called the "City" and All American Asphalt, hereinafter called the "Contractor."

That the City and the Contractor for the consideration hereinafter named, agree as follows:

1. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS. The Contract Documents consist of the following, which are incorporated herein by this reference:
A. Governmental approvals, including, but not limited to, permits required for the Work
B. Any and all Contract Change Orders issued after execution of this Agreement
C. This Agreement
D. Addenda No. $\qquad$ inclusive, issued prior to the opening of the Bids
E. City Special Provisions, including the General Provisions and Technical Provisions
F. Standard Specifications for Public Works Construction ("Greenbook") - latest edition in effect at the Bid Deadline, as modified by the City Special Provisions
G. Reference Specifications/Reference Documents
H. Project Plans
I. City Standard Plans
J. Caltrans Standard Plans
K. EMWD Standard Plans
L. The bound Bidding Documents
M. Contractor's Certificates of Insurance and Additional Insured Endorsements
N. Contractor's Bidder's Proposal and Subcontractor Listing

In the event of conflict between any of the Contract Documents, the provisions placing a more stringent requirement on the Contractor shall prevail. The Contractor shall provide the better quality or greater quantity of Work and/or materials unless otherwise directed by City in writing. In the event none of the Contract Documents place a more stringent requirement or greater burden on the Contractor, the controlling provision shall be that which is found in the document with higher precedence in accordance with the above order of precedence.
2. REFERENCE DOCUMENTS. The following Reference Documents are not considered Contract Documents and were provided to the Contractor for informational purposes:

3. SCOPE OF WORK. The Contractor shall perform and provide all materials, tools, equipment, labor, and services necessary to complete the Work described in the Contract Documents, except as otherwise provided in the Plans, Standard Specifications, or City Special Provisions to be the responsibility of others.

## 4. PAYMENT.

4.1. Contract Price and Basis for Payment. In consideration for the Contractor's full, complete, timely, and faithful performance of the Work required by the Contract Documents, the City shall pay Contractor for the actual quantity of Work required under the Bid Items awarded by the City performed in accordance with the lump sum prices and unit prices for Bid Items and Alternate Bid Items, if any, set forth the Bidder's Proposal submitted with the Bid. The sum of the unit prices and lump sum prices for the Base Bid Items and Alternate Bid Items, if any, awarded by the City is Three Million Eight Hundred Fifty Eight Thousand Three Hundred Twenty Dollars $(\$ 3,858,320.00)$ ("Contract Price"). The Alternate Bid Items selected by the City and included in the Contract are: A$1, B, C, D$ and $E$. It is understood and agreed that the quantities set forth in the Bidder's Proposal for which unit prices are fixed are estimates only and that City will pay and Contractor will accept, as full payment for these items of work, the unit prices set forth in the Bidder's Proposal multiplied by the actual number of units performed, constructed, or completed as directed by the City Engineer.
4.2. Payment Procedures. Based upon applications for payment submitted by the Contractor to the City, the City shall make payments to the Contractor in accordance with Article 9 of the Standard Specifications, as modified by Article 9 of the City Special Provisions.

## 5. CONTRACT TIME.

A. Contract Time. The Contract Time shall be determined in accordance with the following:

B. Initial Notice to Proceed. After the Agreement has been fully executed by the Contractor and the City, the City shall issue the "Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements." The date specified in the Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements constitutes the date of commencement of the Contract Time of 130 Working Days for Base Bid plus Alternate Bids ("A-1", "B" to "E"). The Contract Time includes the time necessary to fulfill preconstruction requirements, and to complete construction of the Project (except as adjusted by subsequent Change Orders).

The Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements shall further specify that Contractor must complete the preconstruction requirements within ten (10) Working Days after the date of commencement of the Contract Time; this duration is part of the Contract Time.

Preconstruction requirements include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Submitting and obtaining approval of Traffic Control Plans
- Submitting and obtaining approval of the Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP)/Water Pollution Control Plan (WPCP)
- Submitting and obtaining approval of critical required submittals (e.g. mix designs for asphalt concrete and Portland cement concrete, traffic striping materials, loop detector materials)
- Installation of the approved Project Identification Signs
- Obtaining an approved no fee Encroachment Permit
- Notifying all agencies, schools, utilities, businesses, residents, etc., as outlined in the Bidding Documents

If the City's issuance of a Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements is delayed due to Contractor's failure to return the fully executed Agreement and insurance and bond documents within ten (10) Working Days after Contract award, then Contractor agrees to the deduction of one (1) Working Day from the number of days to complete the Project for every Working Day of delay in the City's receipt of said documents. This right is in addition to and does not affect the City's right to demand forfeiture of Contractor's Bid Security if Contractor persistently delays in providing the required documentation.
C. Notice to Proceed with Construction. After all preconstruction requirements are met and materials have been ordered in accordance with the Notice to Proceed to Fulfill Preconstruction Requirements, the City shall issue the "Notice to Proceed with Construction," at which time the Contractor shall diligently prosecute the Work, including corrective items of Work, day to day thereafter, within the remaining Contract Time.

## 6. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES AND CONTROL OF WORK

6.1. Liquidated Damages. The Contractor and City (collectively, the "Parties") have agreed to liquidate damages with respect to Contractor's failure to fulfill the preconstruction requirements, and/or failure to complete the Work within the Contract Time. The Parties intend for the liquidated damages set forth herein to apply to this Contract as set forth in Government Code Section 53069.85. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that the liquidated damages are intended to compensate the City solely for Contractor's failure to meet the deadline for completion of the Work and will not excuse Contractor from liability from any other breach, including any failure of the Work to conform to the requirements of the Contract Documents.

In the event that Contractor fails to fulfill the preconstruction requirements and/or fails to complete the Work within the Contract Time, Contractor agrees to pay the City $\$ 500.00$ per Calendar day that completion of the Work is delayed beyond the Contract Time, as adjusted by Contract Change Orders. The Contractor will not be assessed liquidated damages for delays occasioned by the failure of the City or of the owner of a utility to provide for the removal or relocation of utility facilities.

The Contractor and City acknowledge and agree that the foregoing liquidated damages have been set based on an evaluation of damages that the City will incur in the event of late completion of the Work. The Contractor and City acknowledge and agree that the amount of such damages are impossible to ascertain as of the date of execution hereof and have agreed to such liquidated damages to fix the City's damages and to avoid later disputes. It is understood and agreed by Contractor that liquidated damages payable pursuant to this Agreement are not a penalty and that such amounts are not manifestly unreasonable under the circumstances existing as of the date of execution of this Agreement.

It is further mutually agreed that the City will have the right to deduct liquidated damages against progress payments or retainage and that the City will issue a Change Order or Construction Change Directive and reduce the Contract Price accordingly. In the event the remaining unpaid Contract Price is insufficient to cover the full amount of liquidated damages, Contractor shall pay the difference to the City.
6.2. Any work completed by the Contractor after the issuance of a Stop Work Notice by the City shall be rejected and/or removed and replaced as specified in Section 2-11 of the Special Provisions.
6.3. Owner is Exempt from Liability for Early Completion Delay Damages. While the Contractor may schedule completion of all of the Work, or portions thereof, earlier than the Contract Time, the Owner is exempt from liability for and the Contractor will not be entitled to an adjustment of the Contract Sum or to any additional costs, damages, including, but not limited to, claims for extended general conditions costs, home office overhead, jobsite overhead, and management or administrative costs, or compensation whatsoever, for use of float time or for Contractor's inability to complete the Work earlier than the Contract Time for any reason whatsoever, including but not limited to, delay cause by Owner or other Excusable Compensable Delay. See Section 6-6 of the Standard Specifications and City Special Provisions regarding compensation for delays.

## 7. INSURANCE.

7.1. General. The Contractor shall procure and maintain at its sole expense and throughout the term of this Agreement, any extension thereof, Commercial General Liability, Automobile Liability, and Workers' Compensation Insurance with such coverage limits as described herein.
7.2. Additional Insured Endorsements. The Contractor shall cause the insurance required by the Contract Document to include the City of Moreno Valley, the City Council and each member thereof, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority (MVHA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and their respective officials, employees, commission members, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers and representatives as an additional insureds. For the Commercial General Liability coverage, said parties shall be named as additional insureds utilizing either:

1. Insurance Services Office ("ISO") Additional Insured endorsement CG 20 10 (11/85); or
2. ISO Additional Insured endorsement CG 2010 (10/01) and Additional Insured Completed Operations endorsement CG 2037 (10/01); or
3. Substitute endorsements providing equivalent coverage, approved by the City.

The endorsements shall be signed by a person authorized by the insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to such additional insureds. Coverage for such additional insureds does not extend to liability to the extent prohibited by Insurance Code Section 11580.4.
7.3. Waivers of Subrogation. All policies of insurance required by the Contract Documents shall include or be endorsed to provide a waiver by the insurers of any rights of recovery
or subrogation that the insurers may have at any time against the City of Moreno Valley, the City Council and each member thereof, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority (MVHA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and their respective officials, employees, commission members, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers and representatives.
7.4. Primary Coverage. All policies and endorsements shall stipulate that the Contractor's (and the Subcontractors') insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the City of Moreno Valley, the City Council and each member thereof, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority (MVHA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and their respective officials, employees, commission members, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers and representatives, and shall be excess of the Contractor's (and its Subcontractors') insurance and shall not contribute with it.
7.5. Coverage Applies Separately to Each Insured and Additional Insured. Coverage shall state that the Contractor's (and its Subcontractors') insurance shall apply separately to each insured or additional insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability. Coverage shall apply to any claim or suit brought by an additional insured against a named insured or other insured.
7.6. Self-Insurance. Any self-insurance (including deductibles or self-insured retention in excess of $\$ 50,000$ ) in lieu of liability insurance must be declared by Contractor and approved by the City in writing prior to execution of the Agreement. The City's approval of self-insurance, if any, is within the City's sole discretion and is subject to the following conditions:

1. Contractor must, at all times during the term of the Agreement and for a period of at least one (1) year after completion of the Project, and any extension of the one-year correction guarantee period in accordance with Section 6-8.1 of the City Special Provisions, maintain and upon Owner's reasonable request provide evidence of:
(a) Contractor's "net worth" (defined as "total assets" [defined as all items of value owned by the Contractor including tangible items such as cash, land, personal property and equipment and intangible items such as copyrights and business goodwill]) minus total outside liabilities must be reflected in a financial statement for the prior fiscal year reflecting sufficient income and budget for Contractor to afford at least one loss in an amount equal to the amount of self-insurance;
(b) financial statements showing that Contractor has funds set aside/budgeted to finance the self-insured fund (i.e., Contractor has a program that fulfills functions that a primary insurer would fill; and
(c) a claims procedure that identifies how a claim is supposed to be tendered to reach the financing provided by the self-insured fund.
2. If at any time after such self-insurance has been approved Contractor fails to meet the financial thresholds or otherwise fails to comply with the provisions set forth in this Paragraph 7, at the option of the City:
(a) the Contractor shall immediately obtain and thereafter maintain the third party insurance required under this Paragraph 7 and otherwise on the terms required above; or
(b) the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retention as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers; or
(c) the Contractor shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigation, claim administration, and defense expenses.
7.7. Insurer Financial Rating. Insurance companies providing insurance hereunder shall be rated $\mathrm{A}-\mathrm{VII}$ or better in Best's Insurance Rating Guide and shall be legally licensed and qualified to conduct insurance business in the State of California.
7.8. Notices to City of Cancellation or Changes. Each insurance policy described in this Paragraph 7 shall contain a provision or be endorsed to state that coverage will not be cancelled without thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified or registered mail to the City (this obligation may be satisfied in the alternative by requiring such notice to be provided by Contractor's insurance broker and set forth on its Certificate of Insurance provided to the City), except that cancellation for non-payment of premium shall require (10) days prior written notice by certified or registered mail. If an insurance carrier cancels any policy or elects not to renew any policy required to be maintained by Contractor pursuant to the Contract Documents, Contractor agrees to give written notice to the City at the address indicated on the first page of the Agreement. Contractor agrees to provide the same notice of cancellation and non-renewal to the City that is required by such policy(ies) to be provided to the First Named Insured under such policy(ies). Contractor shall provide confirmation that the required policies have been renewed not less than seven (7) days prior to the expiration of existing coverages and shall deliver renewal or replacement policies, certificates and endorsements to the City Clerk within fourteen (14) days of the expiration of existing coverages. Contractor agrees that upon receipt of any notice of cancellation or alteration of the policies, Contractor shall procure within five (5) days, other policies of insurance similar in all respects to the policy or policies to be cancelled or altered. Contractor shall furnish to the City Clerk copies of any endorsements that are subsequently issued amending coverage or limits within fourteen (14) days of the amendment.
7.9. Commercial General Liability. Coverage shall be written on an ISO Commercial General Liability "occurrence" form CG 0001 (10/01 or later edition) or equivalent form approved by the City for coverage on an occurrence basis. The insurance shall cover liability, including, but not limited to, that arising from premises operations, stop gap liability, independent contractors, products-completed operations, personal injury, advertising injury, and liability assumed under an insured contract. The policy shall be endorsed to provide the Aggregate Per Project Endorsement ISO form CG 2503 (11/85). Coverage shall contain no contractors' limitation or other endorsement limiting the scope of coverage for liability arising from pollution, explosion, collapse, or underground ( $\mathrm{x}, \mathrm{c}, \mathrm{u}$ ) property damage. Contractor shall provide Products/Completed Operations coverage to be maintained continuously for a minimum of one (1) year after Final Acceptance of the Work, and any extension of the one-year correction guarantee period in accordance with Section 6-8.1 of the City Special Provisions.

Contractor shall maintain Commercial General Liability insurance with the following minimum limits: $\$ 1,000,000$ per occurrence / \$2,000,000 aggregate / \$2,000,000 products-completed operations.
7.10. Business Automobile Liability. Coverage shall be written on ISO form CA 0001 (12/93 or later edition) or a substitute form providing equivalent coverage for owned, hired, leased and non-owned vehicles, whether scheduled or not, with $\$ 1,000,000$ combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage. If necessary, the policy shall be endorsed to provide contractual liability coverage.
7.11. Workers' Compensation. Contractor shall comply with the applicable sections of the California Labor Code concerning workers' compensation for injuries on the job. Compliance is accomplished in one of the following manners:

1. Provide copy of permissive self-insurance certificate approved by the State of California; or
2. Secure and maintain in force a policy of workers' compensation insurance with statutory limits and Employer's Liability Insurance with a minimal limit of $\$ 1,000,000$ per accident; or
3. Provide a "waiver" form certifying that no employees subject to the Labor Code's Workers' Compensation provision will be used in performance of this Contract.
7.12. Subcontractors' Insurance. The Contractor shall include all Subcontractors as insureds under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and endorsements for each Subcontractor. All coverages for Subcontractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated herein.
4. BONDS. The Contractor shall furnish a satisfactory Performance Bond meeting all statutory requirements of the State of California on the form provided by the City. The bond shall be furnished as a guarantee of the faithful performance of the requirements of the Contact Documents as may be amended from time to time, including, but not limited to, liability for delays and damages (both direct and consequential) to the City and the City's Separate Contractors and consultants, warranties, guarantees, and indemnity obligations, in an amount that shall remain equal to one hundred percent ( $100 \%$ ) of the Contract Price.

The Contractor shall furnish a satisfactory Labor and Materials Payment Bond meeting all statutory requirements of the State of California on the form provided by the City in an amount that shall remain equal to one hundred percent (100\%) of the Contract Price to secure payment of all claims, demands, stop notices, or charges of the State of California, of material suppliers, mechanics, or laborers employed by the Contractor or by any Subcontractor, or any person, form, or entity eligible to file a stop notice with respect to the Work.

All bonds shall be executed by a California-admitted surety insurer. Bonds issued by a Californiaadmitted surety insurer listed on the latest version of the U.S Department of Treasury Circular 570 shall be deemed accepted unless specifically rejected by the City. Bonds issued by sureties not listed in Treasury Circular 570 must be accompanied by all documents enumerated in California Code of Civil Procedure Section 995.660(a). The bonds shall bear the same date as the Contract. The attorney-in-fact who executes the required bonds on behalf of the surety shall affix thereto a certified and current copy of the power of attorney. In the event of changes that increase the Contract Price, the amount of each bond shall be deemed to increase and at all times remain equal to the Contract Price. The signatures shall be acknowledged by a notary public. Every bond must display the surety's bond number and incorporate the Contract for construction of the Work by reference. The terms of the bonds shall provide that the surety agrees that no change, extension of time, alteration, or modification of the Contract Documents or the Work to be performed thereunder
shall in any way affect its obligations and shall waive notice of any such change, extension of time, alteration, or modification of the Contract Documents. The surety further agrees that it is obligated under the bonds to any successor, grantee, or assignee of the City.

Upon the request of any person or entity appearing to be a potential beneficiary of bonds covering payment of obligations arising under the Contract, the Contractor shall promptly furnish a copy of the bonds or shall authorize a copy to be furnished.

Should any bond become insufficient, or should any of the sureties, in the opinion of the City, become non-responsible or unacceptable, the Contractor shall, within ten (10) Calendar Days after receiving notice from the City, provide written documentation to the Satisfaction of the City that Contractor has secured new or additional sureties for the bonds; otherwise the Contractor shall be in default of the Contract. No further payments shall be deemed due or will be made under Contract until a new surety(ies) qualifies and is accepted by the City.

Contractor agrees that the Labor and Materials Payment Bond and Faithful Performance Bond attached to this Agreement are for reference purposes only, and shall not be considered a part of this Agreement. Contractor further agrees that said bonds are separate obligations of the Contractor and its surety, and that any attorney's fee provision contained in any payment bond or performance bond shall not apply to this Agreement. In the event there is any litigation between the parties arising from the breach of this Agreement, each party will bear its own attorneys' fees in the litigation.
9. RECORDS. The Contractor and its Subcontractors shall maintain and keep books, payrolls, invoices of materials, and Project records current, and shall record all transactions pertaining to the Contract in accordance with generally acceptable accounting principles. Said books and records shall be made available to the City of Moreno Valley, Riverside County, the State of California, the Federal Government, and to any authorized representative thereof for purposes of audit and inspection at all reasonable times and places. All such books, payrolls, invoices of materials, and records shall be retained for at least three (3) years after Final Acceptance.

## 10. INDEMNIFICATION.

10.1. General. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor assumes liability for and agrees, at the Contractor's sole cost and expense, to promptly and fully indemnify, protect, hold harmless and defend (even if the allegations are false, fraudulent, or groundless), the City of Moreno Valley, its City Council, the Moreno Valley Housing Authority (MVHA), and the Moreno Valley Community Services District (CSD), and all of their respective officials, officers, directors, employees, commission members, representatives and agents ("Indemnitees"), from and against any and all claims, allegations, actions, suits, arbitrations, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, or other legal proceeds, causes of action, demands, costs, judgments, liens, stop notices, penalties, liabilities, damages, losses, anticipated losses of revenues, and expenses (including, but not limited to, any fees of accountants, attorneys, experts or other professionals, or investigation expenses), or losses of any kind or nature whatsoever, whether actual, threatened or alleged, arising out of, resulting from, or in any way (either directly or indirectly), related to the Work, the Project or any breach of the Contract by Contractor or any of its officers, agents, employees, Subcontractors, Sub-subcontractors, or any person performing any of the Work, pursuant to a direct or indirect contract with the Contractor ("Indemnity Claims"). Such Indemnity Claims include, but are not limited to, claims for:
A. Any activity on or use of the City's premises or facilities;
B. Any liability incurred due to Contractor acting outside the scope of its authority pursuant to the Contract, whether or not caused in part by an Indemnified Party;
C. The failure of Contractor or the Work to comply with any Applicable Law, permit or orders;
D. Any misrepresentation, misstatement or omission with respect to any statement made in the Contract Documents or any document furnished by the Contractor in connection therewith;
E. Any breach of any duty, obligation or requirement under the Contract Documents, including, but not limited to any breach of Contractor's warranties, representations or agreements set forth in the Contract Documents;
F. Any failure to coordinate the Work with City's Separate Contractors;
G. Any failure to provide notice to any party as required under the Contract Documents;
H. Any failure to act in such a manner as to protect the Project from loss, cost, expense or liability;
I. Bodily or personal injury, emotional injury, sickness or disease, or death at any time to any persons including without limitation employees of Contractor;
J. Damage or injury to real property or personal property, equipment and materials (including, but without limitation, property under the care and custody of the Contractor or the City) sustained by any person or persons (including, but not limited to, companies, corporations, utility company or property owner, Contractor and its employees or agents, and members of the general public);
K. Any liability imposed by Applicable Law including, but not limited to criminal or civil fines or penalties;
L. Any dangerous, hazardous, unsafe or defective condition of, in or on the Site, of any nature whatsoever, which may exist by reason of any act, omission, neglect, or any use or occupation of the Site by Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, or Subcontractors;
M. Any operation conducted upon or any use or occupation of the Site by Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, or Subcontractors under or pursuant to the provisions of the Contract or otherwise;
N. Any acts, errors, omission or negligence of Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, or Subcontractors;
O. Infringement of any patent rights, licenses, copyrights or intellectual property which may be brought against the Contractor or Owner arising out of Contractor's Work, for which the Contractor is responsible; and
P. Any and all claims against the City seeking compensation for labor performed or materials used or furnished to be used in the Work or alleged to have been furnished on the Project, including all incidental or consequential damages resulting to the City from such claims.
10.2. Effect of Indemnitees' Active Negligence. Contractor's obligations to indemnify and hold the Indemnitees harmless exclude only such portion of any Indemnity Claim which is attributable to the active negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnitee, provided such active negligence or willful misconduct is determined by agreement of the parties or by findings of a court of competent jurisdiction. In instances where an Indemnitee's active negligence accounts for only a percentage of the liability for the Indemnity Claim involved, the obligation of Contractor will be for that entire percentage of liability for the Indemnity Claim not attributable to the active negligence or
willful misconduct of the Indemnitee(s). Such obligation shall not be construed to negate, abridge or otherwise reduce any other right or obligation of indemnity which would otherwise exist as to any party or person described in this Paragraph 11. Subject to the limits set forth herein, the Contractor, at its own expense, shall satisfy any resulting judgment that may be rendered against any Indemnitee resulting from an Indemnity Claim. The Indemnitees shall be consulted with regard to any proposed settlement.
10.3. Independent Defense Obligation. The duty of the Contractor to indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnitees includes the separate and independent duty to defend the Indemnitees, which duty arises immediately upon receipt by Contractor of the tender of any Indemnity Claim from an Indemnitee. The Contractor's obligation to defend the Indemnitee(s) shall be at Contractor's sole expense, and not be excused because of the Contractor's inability to evaluate liability or because the Contractor evaluates liability and determines that the Contractor is not liable. This duty to defend shall apply whether or not an Indemnity Claim has merit or is meritless, or which involves claims or allegations that any or all of the Indemnitees were actively, passively, or concurrently negligent, or which otherwise asserts that the Indemnitees are responsible, in whole or in part, for any Indemnity Claim. The Contractor shall respond within thirty (30) Calendar Days to the tender of any Indemnity Claim for defense and/or indemnity by an Indemnitee, unless the Indemnitee agrees in writing to an extension of this time. The defense provided to the Indemnitees by Contractor shall be by well qualified, adequately insured and experienced legal counsel acceptable to the City.
10.4. Intent of Parties Regarding Scope of Indemnity. It is the intent of the parties that the Contractor and its Subcontractors of all tiers shall provide the Indemnitees with the broadest defense and indemnity permitted by Applicable Law. In the event that any of the defense, indemnity or hold harmless provisions in the Contract Documents are found to be ambiguous, or in conflict with one another, it is the parties' intent that the broadest and most expansive interpretation in favor of providing defense and/or indemnity to the Indemnitees be given effect.
10.5. Waiver of Indemnity Rights Against Indemnitees. With respect to third party claims against the Contractor, to the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor waives any and all rights to any type of express or implied indemnity against the Indemnitees.
10.6. Subcontractor Requirements. In addition to the requirements set forth hereinabove, Contractor shall ensure, by written subcontract agreement, that each of Contractor's Subcontractors of every tier shall protect, defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnitees with respect to Indemnity Claims arising out of, in connection with, or in any way related to each such Subcontractors' Work on the Project in the same manner in which Contractor is required to protect, defend, indemnify and hold the Indemnitees harmless. In the event Contractor fails to obtain such defense and indemnity obligations from others as required herein, Contractor agrees to be fully responsible to the Indemnitees according to the terms of this Paragraph 11.
10.7. No Limitation or Waiver of Rights. Contractor's obligations under this Paragraph 11 are in addition to any other rights or remedies which the Indemnitees may have under the law or under the Contract Documents. Contractor's indemnification and defense obligations set forth in this Paragraph 11 are separate and independent from the insurance provisions set forth in the Contract Documents, and do not limit, in any way, the applicability, scope, or obligations set forth in such insurance provisions. The purchase of insurance by the Contractor with respect to the obligations required herein shall in no event be construed as fulfillment or discharge of such obligations. In any and all claims against the Indemnitees by any employee of the Contractor, any Subcontractor, any supplier of the Contractor or Subcontractors, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, the obligations under
this Paragraph 11 shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation or benefits payable by or for the Contractor or any Subcontractor or any supplier of either of them, under workers' or workmen's compensation acts, disability benefit acts or other employee benefit acts. Failure of the City to monitor compliance with these requirements imposes no additional obligations on the City and will in no way act as a waiver of any rights hereunder.
10.8. Withholding to Secure Obligations. In the event an Indemnity Claim arises prior to final payment to Contractor, the City may, in its sole discretion, reserve, retain or apply any monies due Contractor for the purpose of resolving such Indemnity Claims; provided, however, the City may release such funds if the Contractor provides the City with reasonable assurances of protection of the Indemnitees' interests. The City shall, in its sole discretion, determine whether such assurances are reasonable.
10.9. Survival of Indemnity Obligations. Contractor's obligations under this Paragraph 11 are binding on Contractor's and its Subcontractors' successors, heirs and assigns and shall survive the completion of the Work or termination of the Contractor's performance of the Work.
11. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS. The Parties bind themselves, their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns the covenants, agreements and obligations contained in the Contract Documents. The Contractor shall not, either voluntarily or by action of law, assign any right or obligation of the Contractor under the Contract Documents without prior written consent of the City.

## SUMMARY

Rasmussen Brothers Construction Company has completed the Public Safety Building Ballistic Glass Project. The City Council is requested to direct the Administrative Services Director to accept the work as complete, direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion, and authorize the Chief Financial Officer/City Treasurer to release the retention to Rasmussen Brothers Construction Company of 40441 Gavilan Mountain Road, CA 92028.

## DISCUSSION

On June 25, 2012, the City Council approved the spending plan for the Ballistic Resistant Glass project in the Moreno Valley Police Department lobby. The initial $\$ 184,283.00$ spending plan consisted of $\$ 84,283.00$ in asset forfeiture funds and $\$ 100,000.00$ from fiscal year 2011/2012 Moreno Valley Police Department operational savings. Following City Council approval of the spending plan T.R. design was contracted to create the architectural design and engineering for the project. $\$ 17,905.00$ of the approved $\$ 184,283.00$ was encumbered for project design costs. The resulting design and engineering plans were used in the formal bidding process. As a result of the formal bidding process, City Council awarded the construction contract to Rasmussen Brothers Construction, Inc. (RBC).

## ALTERNATIVES

1. Accept the work as complete for the Public Safety Building Ballistic Glass Project by Rasmussen Brothers Construction Inc., 40441 Gavilan Mountain Road, Fallbrook, CA 92028.
2. Direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion within ten (10) calendars days at the office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, as required by Section 3093 of the California Civil Code.
3. Authorize the Administrative Services Director to accept the work as complete for the Public Safety Building Ballistic Glass Project, constructed by Rasmussen Brothers Construction Company, Inc. and authorize the Chief Financial Officer/City Treasurer to release the retention to Rasmussen Brothers Construction Company, Inc. thirty-five (35) calendar days after the date of recordation of the Notice of Completion, if no claims are filed against the project.
4. Do not accept the work as complete for the Public Safety Building Ballistic Glass Project, constructed by Rasmussen Brothers Construction Company, Inc., do not direct the City Clerk to record the Notice of Completion within ten (10) calendars days at the office of the County Recorder of Riverside County, as required by Section 3093 of the California Civil Code, and do not authorize the Chief Financial Officer/City Treasurer to release the retention to Rasmussen Brothers Construction Company, Inc., within thirty-five (35) calendar days after the date of recordation of the Notice of Completion, if no claims are filed against the project, and provide staff with further direction.

The Planning Commission of the City of Moreno Valley approved this project on October 12, 2011 and the amended plot plan (P13-111) was approved by the City Council on February 25, 2014. Tentative Parcel Map No. 32607 (PA09-0022) is a one parcel subdivision. The developer proposes to construct an 800,430 square-foot warehouse distribution facility. The project site is located on the north side of Eucalyptus Avenue (formerly Fir Avenue) just west of Redlands Boulevard.

## DISCUSSION

AI California, LLC, the developer of this project, has completed an Agreement for Public Improvements. The developer agrees to perform and complete all of the required public improvements within twenty-four (24) months of the date the agreement is executed. The public improvements include, but are not limited to: asphalt, base, curb, gutter, sidewalk, street lights, striping, signage, landscaping, traffic signals, water and sewer, storm drain, drainage structures, traffic signal interconnect and a multi-use trail, The City Engineer may execute any future amendments to the agreement, subject to City Attorney approval, if the required public improvements are not completed within said timeframe.

Parcel Map No. 32607 is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative map. The developer has requested that the map be approved for recordation. The Conditions of Approval for this project require that the developer provide surety for the required improvements. Public improvements are to be constructed along Redlands Boulevard and Eucalyptus Avenue, south of the State Route 60 Freeway.

Accompanying the agreement is a Faithful Performance bond in the amount of $\$ 5,855,000$ and a Material and Labor bond in the amount of $\$ 2,927,500$ issued by Travelers Casualty and Surety Company of America.

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# AGREEMENT FOR PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS FOR <br> PROJECT NO. PA09-0022 (PM 36207) 

This Agreement, made and entered into by and between the City of Moreno Valley, State of California, hereinafter called City, and Al California, LLC., herein after called Developer, on the date the City signs this agreement.

## WITNESSETH:

FIRST: Developer, for and in consideration of the approval by the City of the final map of that certain land division, or that certain other land development project, known as PA09-0022 (PM 36207) agrees, at Developer's own expense, to furnish all labor, equipment and material necessary, and within TWENTY-FOUR (24) months from the date this Agreement is executed, to perform and complete in a good and workmanlike manner, all of the required improvements in accordance with those improvement plans for said project which have been approved by the City Engineer, and are on file in the office of the City Engineer, and to do all work incidental thereto in accordance with the standards set forth in City ordinances and regulations, and pay all costs of engineering necessary in connection therewith, which are expressly made a part of this Agreement. All of the above required work shall be done under the inspection of and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and shall not be deemed complete until approved and accepted as complete by the City. Developer further agrees to guarantee the required improvements for a period of one year following acceptance by the City and during this one year period to repair and replace, to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, any defective work or labor done or defective materials furnished. Developer shall complete the improvements described in this paragraph pursuant to Section 66462, Government Code. Developer shall also complete any offsite improvements required as a condition of approval and with plans approved by the City Engineer at such time as the City acquires an interest in the land which will permit the improvements to be made, and the Developer waives the 120 day time limitation set forth in Section 66462.5, Government Code.

Security to guarantee the performance of this agreement shall be in the following amounts:
Faithful Performance security shall be in the sum of FIVE MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED FIFTY FIVE THOUSAND AND NO/100 Dollars ( ${ }^{* * * *} \$ 5,855,000,00^{* * *}$ ). The estimated cost of said work and improvements, pursuant to the Preliminary Estimate of Cost labeled Exhibit A attached hereto.

Labor and Material security shall be in the sum of TWO MILLION NINE HUNDRED TWENTY SEVEN THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED AND NO/100 Dollars ( $\left.{ }^{* * *} \$ 2,927,500.00^{* * *}\right)$. The estimated cost securing payment of labor and materials is fifty (50) percent of the total cost estimate of the improvements.
Developer further agrees to guarantee the required improvements for a period of one year following acceptance by the City and during this one year period to repair and replace, to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, any defective work or labor done or defective materials furnished. Upon entering the warranty period, the City shall retain ten percent of the original faithful performance security. Developer reserves the right to substitute the form of security, in accordance with the Moreno Valley Municipal Code, at any time during the term of this agreement, subject to approval of the City Engineer and City Attorney.
SECOND: Developer agrees to file with City, prior to the date this Agreement is executed, a good and sufficient improvement security in an amount not less than the estimated cost of the work and improvements for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and good and sufficient security for payment of labor and materials in the amount prescribed by City ordinances and regulations to secure the claims to which reference is made in Title 15 (commencing with Section 3082) of Part 4 of Division 3 of the Civil Code of the State of California. Developer agrees to renew each and every said bond or bonds with good and sufficient sureties or increase the amounts of said bond or bonds, or both, within ten (10) days after being notified by the City Engineer that the sureties or amounts are insufficient. Notwithstanding any other provision herein, if Developer fails to take such action as is necessary to comply with said notice, he shall be in default of this Agreement unless all required improvements are completed within ninety ( 90 ) days of the date on which
the City Engineer notified the Developer of the insufficiency of said bonds. Developer reserves the right to
substitute the form of security in accordance with the City's Municipal Code at anytime during the term of this agreement, subject to approval by the City Engineer and City Attorney.

THIRD: Developer agrees to pay to the City the actual cost of such inspection of the works and improvements as may be required by the City Engineer. Developer further agrees that, if suit is brought upon this Agreement or any bond guaranteeing the completion of the required improvements, all costs and reasonable expenses and fees incurred by the City in successfully enforcing such obligations shall be paid by Developer and guaranteed by the surety in addition to the face amount of the security, including reasonable attorney's fees, and that, upon entry of judgment, such costs, expenses and fees shall be taxed as costs and included in any judgment rendered.

FOURTH: City shall not, nor shall any officer or employee of City, except for its or their sole negligence, be liable or responsible for any accident, loss or damage happening or occurring to the works specified in this Agreement prior to the completion and approval thereof, nor shall City or any officer or employee thereof, be liable for any persons or property injured by reason of the nature of the work, or by reason of the acts or omissions of Developer, his agents or employees, in the performance of the work, and all of said liabilities are assumed by Developer. Developer agrees to protect, defend and hold harmless City and the officers and employees thereof from all loss, liability or claim because of, or arising out of the acts or omissions of Developer, his agents and employees, in the performance of this Agreement, or arising out of the use of any patent or patented article in the performance of this Agreement.

FIFTH: The Developer hereby grants to the City and/or to any authorized agent or employee of the City, the irrevocable permission to enter upon the lands of the above-referenced land division for the purpose of completing the improvements. This permission shall terminate in the event that the Developer has completed the work within the time specified or any extension thereof granted by the City.

SIXTH: Developer agrees at all times, up to the completion and acceptance of the improvements by the City, to give good and adequate warning to the traveling public of each and every dangerous condition caused by the construction of the improvements, and to protect the traveling public from such defective or dangerous conditions. The Developer shall keep all traveled ways that are a part of, or affected by the construction of this project free and clear of mud, dirt and debris and shall provide twice monthly street sweeping service. A copy of the contract for street sweeping service shall be provided to the City. The Developer's obligation under this provision shall be secured by the bonds securing performance of this Agreement.

SEVENTH: The Developer, his agents and employees, shall give notice to the City Engineer at least 48 hours before beginning any work and shall furnish said City Engineer all reasonable facilities for obtaining full information with respect to the progress and manner of work.

EIGHTH: If the Developer, or his agents or employees, neglects, refuses, or fails to prosecute the work with such diligence as to insure its completion within the specified time, or within such extensions of time as have been granted by the City, or if the Developer violates, neglects, refuses, or fails to perform satisfactorily any of the provisions of the plans and specifications, he shall be in default of this Agreement and notice in writing of such default shall be served upon him. The City Council shall have the power, on recommendation by the City Engineer, to terminate all rights of the Developer because of such default. The determination by the City Engineer of the question as to whether any of the terms of the Agreement or specifications have been violated, or have not been performed satisfactorily, shall be conclusive upon the Developer, and any and all parties who may have any interest in the Agreement or any portion thereof. The foregoing provisions of this section shall be in addition to all other rights and remedies available to the City under law.

NINTH: It is further agreed by and between the parties hereto, including the surety or sureties on the bonds securing this Agreement that, in the event it is deemed necessary to extend the time of completion of the work contemplated to be done under this Agreement, extensions of time may be granted by the City from time to time, either at its own option, or upon request of Developer, and such extensions shall in no way affect the validity of this Agreement or release the surety or sureties on said bonds, Developer further agrees to maintain the aforesaid bonds in full force and effect during the terms of this Agreement, including any extensions of time as may be granted therein.

TENTH: It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto that if any part, term or provision of this Agreement is by the courts held to be unlawful and void, the validity of the remaining portions shall not be affected and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be construed and enforced as if the Agreement did not contain the particular part, term or provision held to be invalid.

## RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

1. Approve the Cooperative Agreement with the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District (the District) and AI California, LLC for the Moreno Master Drainage Plan Line F-2, Stage 2 and Line F-16, Stage 1 associated with the Aldi Distribution Facility.
2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the Cooperative Agreement.
3. Direct the City Clerk to forward the signed Cooperative Agreement to the District.

## SUMMARY

As a condition of approval of PA09-0022, the City requires the developer to construct certain storm drain facilities in order to provide flood protection and drainage as a result of the developer's planned development. The Cooperative Agreement is the District's mechanism by which the District, the City, and the developer coordinate the construction and maintenance of master storm drain facilities. The required facilities for
this project include construction of approximately 1,900 lineal feet of underground storm drain system within the City right-of-way of Redlands Boulevard and Eucalyptus Avenue, which once accepted, will be the District's drainage facilities. The City's drainage facilities will consist of riprap trapezoidal channel, inlets, catch basins, laterals and connector pipes within City right-of-way.

## DISCUSSION

The Planning Commission of the City of Moreno Valley approved this project on October 12, 2011 and the amended plot plan (P13-111) was approved by the City Council on February 25, 2014. Tentative Parcel Map No. 32607 (PA09-0022) is a one parcel subdivision. The developer proposes to construct an 800,430 square-foot warehouse distribution facility. The project site is located on the north side of Eucalyptus Avenue (formerly Fir Avenue) west of Redlands Boulevard.

The Developer will be responsible for the design and construction of the project improvements. The Developer will prepare plans and specifications in accordance with the District's and the City's standards and submit improvement plans to the District and the City for review and approval. The District is willing to review the plans and specifications, provide inspection for the construction, and accept ownership and responsibility for the maintenance of the District's drainage facilities, if the developer meets all requirements of the agreement. The City is willing to review the plans and specifications, provide inspection for the construction, and accept ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the City's drainage facilities, if the developer meets all requirements of the agreement. The City will also consent to hold a Faithful Performance bond and Material and Labor bond for both the District's Drainage Facility and the City's Drainage Facility.

The improvements were bonded by the Developer and have been submitted to City Council for approval as part of the parcel map approval and Agreement for Public Improvements for PA09-0022 (PM 36207) on April 22, 2014. The storm drain portion of the bonds will be held by the City until completion of the storm drain and acceptance of the storm drain improvements by the District and City Council.

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## ATTACHMENT 1



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COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT
Moreno Master Drainage Plan - Line F-2, Stage 2 and Line F-16, Stage 1
Project Nos. 4-0-00400-02 and 4-0-00401-01
Parcel Map No. 36207
The Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District, hereinafter called "DISTRICT", the City of Moreno Valley, hereinafter called "CITY", and AI California LLC, a Delaware limited liability company, hereinafter called "DEVELOPER", hereby agree as follows:

## RECITALS

A. DEVELOPER has submitted for approval Parcel Map No. 36207 located in the City of Moreno Valley. As a condition of approval for Parcel Map No. 36207, DEVELOPER must construct certain flood control facilities in order to provide flood protection and drainage for DEVELOPER'S planned development; and
B. These certain flood control facilities include a segment of DISTRICT'S Moreno Master Drainage Plan (MDP) Lines F-2 and F-16. Lines F-2 and F-16 are formerly known as Lines D-1 and D-3, respectively, in the DISTRICT'S Moreno MDP adopted on October 1980; and
C. The legal description of Parcel Map No. 36207 is provided in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof; and
D. The required flood control facilities, all as shown in District Drawing No. 4-1068, include construction of: i) approximately 120 lineal feet of riprap trapezoidal channel, hereinafter called "CHANNEL", as shown in concept in red on Exhibit "B" attached hereto and made a part hereof; ii) approximately 550 lineal feet of underground storm drain mainline and its associated transition structure, hereinafter called "LINE F-2", as shown in concept in blue on Exhibit "B"; and, iii) approximately 1, 350 lineal feet of underground storm drain mainline,
hereinafter called "LINE F-16", as shown in concept in yellow on Exhibit "B". Together, LINE F-2 and LINE F-16 are hereinafter called "DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES"; and
E. Associated with the construction of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES is the construction of certain underground storm drain laterals that are 36 -inches or less in diameter, grouted riprap features, inlets, catch basins and connector pipes located within CITY held easements or rights of way, hereinafter called "APPURTENANCES". Together, CHANNEL and APPURTENANCES are hereinafter called "CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES". Together, DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES and CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES are hereinafter called "PROJECT"; and
F. DEVELOPER and CITY desire DISTRICT to accept ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES. Therefore, DISTRICT must review and approve DEVELOPER'S plans and specifications for PROJECT and subsequently inspect the construction of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES; and
G. DEVELOPER and DISTRICT desire CITY to accept ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES. Therefore, CITY must review and approve DEVELOPER'S plans and specifications for PROJECT and subsequently inspect the construction of CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto mutually agree as follows:

## SECTION I

## DEVELOPER shall:

1. Prepare PROJECT plans and specifications, hereinafter called "IMPROVEMENT PLANS", in accordance with applicable DISTRICT and CITY standards, and submit to DISTRICT and CITY for their respective review and approval.
2. Continue to pay DISTRICT, within thirty (30) days after receipt of periodic billings from DISTRICT, any and all such amounts as are deemed reasonably necessary by DISTRICT to cover DISTRICT'S costs associated with the review of IMPROVEMENT PLANS, review and approval of rights of way and conveyance documents, and with the processing and administration of this Agreement.
3. Deposit with CITY, any and all such amounts as are deemed reasonably necessary by CITY to cover CITY'S costs associated with the review of IMPROVEMENT PLANS, review and approval of all rights of way and conveyance documents, and with the processing and administration of this Agreement.
4. Deposit with DISTRICT (Attention: Business Office - Accounts Receivable), at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of PROJECT construction as set forth in Section I.9. herein, the estimated cost of providing construction inspection for DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES, in an amount as determined and approved by DISTRICT in accordance with Ordinance Nos. 671 and 749 of the County of Riverside, including any amendments thereto, based upon the bonded value of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES. If at any time the costs exceed the deposit or are anticipated by DISTRICT to exceed the deposit with DISTRICT, DEVELOPER shall pay such additional amount(s), as deemed reasonably necessary by DISTRICT to complete inspection of PROJECT, within thirty (30) days after receipt of billing from DISTRICT.
5. Deposit with CITY (Attention: Public Works/Land Development), at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of PROJECT construction as set forth in Section 1.9., the estimated cost of providing construction inspection in an amount as determined and approved by CITY in accordance with the City Code and Fee Resolution of CITY, including any amendments thereto.
6. Secure, at its sole cost and expense, all necessary licenses, agreements, permits and rights of entry as may be needed for the construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of PROJECT. DEVELOPER shall furnish DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.9., with sufficient evidence of DEVELOPER having secured such necessary licenses, agreements, permits and rights of entry, as determined and approved by DISTRICT.
7. Furnish DISTRICT with copies of all permits, approvals or agreements required by any Federal, State or local resource and/or regulatory agency for the construction, operation and maintenance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES. Such documents include but are not limited to those issued by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, California Regional Water Quality Control Board, California State Department of Fish and Game, and State Water Resources Control Board.
8. Provide CITY, prior to providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.9., with a faithful performance bond in the amount of one hundred percent ( $100 \%$ ) of the estimated cost for construction of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES as determined by DISTRICT and a material and labor payment bond in the amount of fifty percent ( $50 \%$ ) of the estimated cost for construction of the DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES as determined by DISTRICT. The surety, amount and form of the bonds, shall be subject to approval of DISTRICT and CITY. The bonds shall remain in full force and effect until DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES are accepted by DISTRICT as complete; at which time the faithful performance bond amount may be reduced to ten percent ( $10 \%$ ) for a period of one year to guarantee against any defective work, and the Material and Labor security will be released after a period of ninety (90) days if there are no liens against the project for payment of materials or labor.
9. Notify DISTRICT in writing (Attention: Administrative Services Section), at least twenty (20) days prior to the start of construction of PROJECT. Construction shall not begin on any element of PROJECT, for any reason whatsoever, until DISTRICT has issued to DEVELOPER a written Notice to Proceed authorizing DEVELOPER to commence construction of PROJECT.
10. Grant DISTRICT and CITY, by execution of this Agreement, the right to enter upon DEVELOPER'S property where necessary and convenient for the purpose of gaining access to, and performing inspection service for, the construction of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES and CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES, respectively, as set forth herein.
11. Obtain and provide DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction of PROJECT as set forth in Section I.9., with duly executed Irrevocable Offers(s) of Dedication to the public for flood control and drainage purposes, including ingress and egress, for the rights of way deemed necessary by DISTRICT for the construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES, as shown in concept in blue on Exhibit " C " attached hereto and made a part hereof. The Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication shall be in a form approved by DISTRICT and shall be executed by all legal and equitable owners of the property described in the offer(s).
12. Furnish DISTRICT, when submitting the Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication as set forth in Section I.11., with Preliminary Reports on Title dated not more than thirty (30) days prior to date of submission of all the property described in the Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication.
13. Fumish DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.9., with a complete list of all contractors and subcontractors to be performing work on DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES, including the
corresponding license number and license classification of each. At such time, DEVELOPER shall further identify in writing its designated superintendent for PROJECT construction.
14. Furnish DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.9., a construction schedule which shall show the order and dates in which DEVELOPER or DEVELOPER'S contractor proposes to carry on the various parts of work, including estimated start and completion dates. As construction of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES progresses, DEVELOPER shall update said construction schedule as requested by DISTRICT.
15. Furnish DISTRICT with final mylar PROJECT plans and assign their ownership to DISTRICT prior to the start of PROJECT construction.
16. Not permit any change to or modification of DISTRICT and CITY approved IMPROVEMENT PLANS without the prior written permission and consent of DISTRICT and CITY.
17. Comply with all Cal/OSHA safety regulations including regulations concerning confined space and maintain a safe working environment for DEVELOPER, CITY and DISTRICT employees on the site.
18. Furnish DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.9., a confined space entry procedure specific to PROJECT. The procedure shall comply with requirements contained in California Code of Regulations, Title 8, Section 5158, Other Confined Space Operations, Section 5157, Permit Required Confined Space and District Confined Space Procedures, SOM-18. The procedure shall be reviewed and approved by DISTRICT prior to the issuance of a Notice to Proceed.
19. During the construction period of PROJECT, provide Workers' Compensation Insurance in an amount required by law. A certificate of said insurance policy
shall be provided to DISTRICT and CITY at the time of providing written notice pursuant to Section I.9.
20. Commencing on the date notice is given pursuant to Section I.9., and continuing until DISTRICT accepts DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES and CITY accepts CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES for operation and maintenance:
(a) Provide and maintain or cause its contractor(s) to provide and maintain comprehensive liability insurance coverage which shall protect DEVELOPER from claims for damages for personal injury, including accidental and wrongful death, as well as from claims for property damage which may arise from DEVELOPER'S construction of PROJECT or the performance of its obligations hereunder, whether such construction or performance be by DEVELOPER, by any of its contractors, subcontractors, or by anyone employed directly or indirectly by any of them. Such insurance shall name DISTRICT, the County of Riverside and CITY as additional insureds with respect to this Agreement and the obligations of DEVELOPER hereunder. Such insurance shall provide for limits of not less than two million dollars $(\$ 2,000,000)$ per occurrence.
(b) Cause its insurance carrier(s) or its contractor's insurance carrier(s), who shall be authorized by the California Department of Insurance to transact the business of insurance in the State of Califormia, to furnish DISTRICT and CITY at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.9., with certificate(s) of insurance and applicable policy endorsements showing that such insurance is in full force and effect and that DISTRICT, the County of Riverside and CITY are
named as additional insureds with respect to this Agreement and the obligations of DEVELOPER hereunder. Further, said certificate(s) shall state that the issuing company shall give DISTRICT, the County of Riverside and CITY sixty (60) days written notice in the event of any cancellation, termination, non-renewal or reduction in coverage of the policies evidenced by the certificate(s). In the event cancellation, termination, non-renewal or reduction of coverage, DEVELOPER shall forthwith, secure replacement insurance meeting the provisions of this paragraph.

Failure to maintain the insurance required by this paragraph shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement and shall authorize and constitute authority for DISTRICT, at its sole discretion, to proceed to perform the remaining work pursuant to Section IV.3.
21. Construct or cause to be constructed, PROJECT at DEVELOPER'S sole cost and expense, in accordance with DISTRICT and CITY approved IMPROVEMENT PLANS.
22. Within two (2) weeks of completing PROIECT construction, provide DISTRICT with written notice (Attention: Contract Administration Section) that PROJECT construction is substantially complete and requesting that DISTRICT conduct a final inspection of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES.
23. Upon completion of PROJECT construction, and upon acceptance by CITY of all street rights of way deemed necessary by DISTRICT and CITY for the operation and maintenance of PROJECT, but prior to DISTRICT acceptance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES for ownership, operation and maintenance, convey, or cause to be conveyed to

DISTRICT flood control easement(s), including ingress and egress, in a form approved by DISTRICT, for the rights of way as shown in concept in blue on Exhibit " C ".
24. At the time of recordation of the conveyance document(s) as set forth in Section I.23., furnish DISTRICT with policies of title insurance, each in the amount of not less than fifty percent ( $50 \%$ ) of the estimated fee value, as determined by DISTRICT, for each easement parcel to be conveyed to DISTRICT, guaranteeing DISTRICT'S interest in said property as being free and clear of all liens, encumbrances, assessments, easements, taxes and leases (recorded or unrecorded), except those which, in the sole discretion of DISTRICT, are deemed acceptable.
25. Accept ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of PROJECT until such time as DISTRICT accepts ownership and responsibility for operation and maintenance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES and CITY accepts ownership and responsibility for operation and maintenance of CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES. Further, it is mutually understood by the parties hereto that prior to DISTRICT acceptance of ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES, PROJECT shall be in a satisfactorily maintained condition as solely determined by DISTRICT. If, subsequent to the inspection and, in the sole discretion of DISTRICT, DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES are not in an acceptable condition, corrections will be made at sole expense of DEVELOPER.
26. Pay, if suit is brought upon this Agreement or any bond guaranteeing the completion of PROJECT, all costs and reasonable expenses and fees, including reasonable attorneys' fees, and acknowledge that, upon entry of judgment, all such costs, expenses and fees shall be computed as costs and included in any judgment rendered.
27. Upon completion of PROJECT construction, but prior to DISTRICT acceptance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES for ownership, operation and maintenance, provide or cause its civil engineer of record or construction civil engineer of record, duly registered in the State of California, to provide DISTRICT with a redlined "record drawings" copy of PROJECT plans. After DISTRICT approval of the redlined "record drawings", DEVELOPER'S engineer shall schedule with DISTRICT a time to transfer the redlined changes onto DISTRICT'S original mylars at DISTRICT'S office, after which the engineer shall review, stamp and sign the original PROJECT engineering plans "record drawings".
28. Ensure that all work performed pursuant to this Agreement by DEVELOPER, its agents or contractors is done in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations, including but not limited to all applicable provisions of the Labor Code, Business and Professions Code, and Water Code. DEVELOPER shall be solely responsible for all costs associated with compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

## SECTION II

## DISTRICT shall:

1. Review and approve IMPROVEMENT PLANS prior to the start of PROJECT construction.
2. Provide CITY an opportunity to review and approve IMPROVEMENT PLANS prior to DISTRICT'S final approval.
3. Upon execution of this Agreement, record or cause to be recorded, a copy of this Agreement in the Official Records of the Riverside County Recorder.
4. Record or cause to be recorded, the Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication provided by DEVELOPER pursuant to Section I.11.
5. Inspect DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES construction.
6. Keep an accurate accounting of all DISTRICT costs associated with review and approval of IMPROVEMENT PLANS, the review and approval of right of way and conveyance documents and the processing and administration of this Agreement.
7. Keep an accurate accounting of all DISTRICT construction inspection costs, and within forty-five (45) days after DISTRICT acceptance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES as being complete, submit a final cost statement to DEVELOPER. If the deposit, as set forth in Section I.4., exceeds such costs, DISTRICT shall reimburse DEVELOPER the excess amount within sixty (60) days after DISTRICT acceptance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES as being complete.
8. Accept ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES upon (i) DISTRICT inspection of DISTRICT FACILITIES in accordance with Section I.22., (ii) DISTRICT acceptance of PROJECT construction as being complete, (iii) DISTRICT receipt of stamped and signed "record drawings" of PROJECT plans, as set forth in Section 1.27., (iv) recordation of all conveyance documents described in Section I.23., (v) CITY acceptance of all necessary street rights of way as deemed necessary by DISTRICT and CITY for the operation and maintenance of PROJECT, (vi) CITY acceptance of CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES for ownership, operation, and maintenance, and (vii) DISTRICT'S sole determination that DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES are in a satisfactorily maintained condition.
9. Provide CITY with a reproducible duplicate copy of "record drawings" PROJECT plans upon DISTRICT acceptance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES as being complete.

## SECTION III

CITY shall:

1. Review and approve IMPROVEMENT PLANS prior to the start of PROJECT construction.
2. Accept the CITY and DISTRICT approved faithful performance and payment bonds submitted by DEVELOPER as set forth in Section I.8., and hold said bonds as provided herein.
3. Inspect construction of CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES.
4. Consent, by execution of this Agreement, to the recording of any Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication furnished by DEVELOPER pursuant to this Agreement.
5. As requested by DISTRICT, accept the Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication as set forth herein, and any other outstanding offers of dedication necessary for the construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES, and, convey sufficient rights of way to DISTRICT to allow DISTRICT to construct, inspect, operate and maintain DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES.
6. Grant DISTRICT, by execution of this Agreement, the right to construct, inspect, operate and maintain DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES within CITY rights of way.
7. Accept ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES upon DISTRICT acceptance of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES as being complete.
8. Upon DISTRICT acceptance of PROJECT construction as being complete, accept sole responsibility for the adjustment of all PROJECT manhole rings and covers located within CITY rights of way which must be performed at such time(s) that the finished grade along and above the underground portions of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES are
improved, repaired, replaced or changed. It being further understood and agreed that any such adjustments shall be performed at no cost to DISTRICT.

## SECTION IV

It is further mutually agreed:

1. All work involved with DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES shall be inspected by DISTRICT and shall not be deemed complete until approved and accepted in writing as complete by DISTRICT.
2. CITY and DEVELOPER personnel may observe and inspect all work being done on PROIECT, but shall provide any comments to DISTRICT personnel who shall be solely responsible for all quality control communications with DEVELOPER'S contractor(s) during the construction of PROJECT.
3. DEVELOPER shall complete construction of PROJECT within twelve (12) consecutive months after execution of this Agreement and within one hundred eighty (180) consecutive working days after commencing work on PROJECT. It is expressly understood that since time is of the essence in this Agreement, failure of DEVELOPER to perform the work within the agreed upon time shall constitute authority for DISTRICT to perform the remaining work and require DEVELOPER'S surety to pay to CITY the penal sum of any and all bonds. In which case, CITY shall subsequently reimburse DISTRICT for DISTRICT costs incurred.
4. DEVELOPER shall not request DISTRICT to accept any portion or portions of DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES or CITY to accept any portion or portions of CITY DRAINAGE FACILITIES prior to the completion of PROJECT construction.
5. DISTRICT shall endeavor to issue DEVELOPER a Notice to Proceed within twenty (20) days of receipt of DEVELOPER'S complete written notice as set forth in

Section I.9.; however, DISTRICT'S construction inspection staff is limited and, therefore, the issuance of a Notice to Proceed is subject to staff availability.

In the event DEVELOPER wishes to expedite issuance of a Notice to Proceed, DEVELOPER may elect to furnish an independent qualified construction inspector at DEVELOPER'S sole cost and expense. DEVELOPER shall furnish appropriate documentation of the individual's credentials and experience to DISTRICT for review and, if appropriate, approval. DISTRICT shall review the individual's qualifications and experience, upon approval thereof, said individual, hereinafter called "DEPUTY INSPECTOR", shall be authorized to act on DISTRICT'S behalf on all DISTRICT DRAINAGE FACILITIES construction and quality control matters. If DEVELOPER'S initial construction inspection deposit furnished pursuant to Section I.4. exceeds ten thousand dollars $(\$ 10,000)$, DISTRICT shall refund to DEVELOPER up to eighty percent ( $80 \%$ ) of DEVELOPER'S initial inspection deposit within forty-five (45) days of DISTRICT'S approval of DEPUTY INSPECTOR; however, a minimum balance of ten thousand dollars $(\$ 10,000)$ shall be retained on account.
6. PROJECT construction work shall be on a five (5) day, forty (40) hour work week with no work on Saturdays, Sundays or DISTRICT designated legal holidays, unless otherwise approved in writing by DISTRICT. If DEVELOPER feels it is necessary to work more than the normal forty (40) hour work week or on holidays, DEVELOPER shall make a written request for permission from DISTRICT to work the additional hours. The request shall be submitted to DISTRICT at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the requested additional work hours and state the reasons for the overtime and the specific time frames required. The decision of granting permission for overtime work shall be made by DISTRICT at its sole discretion and shall be final. If permission is granted by DISTRICT, DEVELOPER will be charged the cost incurred at the overtime rates for additional inspection time required in
connection with the overtime work in accordance with Ordinance Nos. 671 and 749, including any amendments thereto, of the County of Riverside.
7. DEVELOPER shall indemnify and hold harmless DISTRICT, County of Riverside, and CITY (including their agencies, districts, special districts and departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives) from any liability, claim, damage, proceeding or action, present or future, based upon, arising out of or in any way relating to DEVELOPER'S (including its officers, employees, subcontractors and agents) actual or alleged acts or omissions related to this Agreement, performance under this Agreement, or failure to comply with the requirements of this Agreement, including but not limited to: (a) property damage; (b) bodily injury or death; (c) liability or damage pursuant to Article I, Section 19 of the California Constitution, the Fifth Amendment of the United States Constitution or any other law, ordinance or regulation caused by the diversion of waters from the natural drainage patterns or the discharge of drainage within or from PROJECT; or (d) any other element of any kind or nature whatsoever.

DEVELOPER shall defend, at its sole expense, including all costs and fees (including but not limited to attorney fees, cost of investigation, defense and settlements or awards), DISTRICT, County of Riverside and CITY (including their agencies, districts, special districts and departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives) in any claim proceeding or action for which indemnification is required.

With respect to any of DEVELOPER'S indemnification requirements, DEVELOPER shall, at its sole cost, have the right to use counsel of their own choice and shall have the right to adjust, settle, compromise any such claim, proceeding or action without the prior consent of DISTRICT, County of Riverside and CITY; provided, however, that any such
adjustment, settlement or compromise in no manner whatsoever limits or circumscribes DEVELOPER'S indemnification obligations to DISTRICT, County of Riverside or CITY.

DEVELOPER'S indemnification obligations shall be satisfied when DEVELOPER has provided to DISTRICT, County of Riverside and CITY the appropriate form of dismissal (or similar document) relieving DISTRICT, County of Riverside or CITY from any liability for the claim, proceeding or action involved.

The specified insurance limits required in this Agreement shall in no way limit or circumscribe DEVELOPER'S obligations to indemnify and hold harmless DISTRICT, County of Riverside and CITY from third party claims.

In the event there is conflict between this section and California Civil Code Section 2782, this section shall be interpreted to comply with California Civil Code Section 2782. Such interpretation shall not relieve the DEVELOPER from indemnifying DISTRICT, County of Riverside or CITY to the fullest extent allowed by law.
8. Any waiver by DISTRICT or by CITY of any breach of any one or more of the terms of this Agreement shall not be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent or other breach of the same or of any other term hereof. Failure on the part of DISTRICT or CITY to require exact, full and complete compliance with any terms of this Agreement shall not be construed as in any manner changing the terms hereof, or estopping DISTRICT or CITY from enforcement hereof.

## RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations: That the City Council:

1. Conduct a second public hearing to review draft redistricting plans for the Councilmanic districts in the City of Moreno Valley and accept public comments.

## SUMMARY/DISCUSSION

On April 8, 2014 the City Council conducted the first public hearing regarding Councilmanic redistricting. Justin Levitt, Vice-President of National Demographic Incorporation (NDC) reviewed three (3) draft redistricting plans for the Councilmanic districts in the City of Moreno Valley.

## A brief overview of draft maps submitted by NDC

Draft A map divides the city into quadrants. This plan keeps the area north of SR 60 and west of Lassalle in one district. It also keeps the southern areas south of Cactus currently in District 4 together, united with the remainder of Moreno Valley Ranch.

Draft B map reflects the demographics of the city by uniting areas with similar attributes, such as income, rental units, and percent with children at home. Areas 2 and 3 include those neighborhoods with more children and rental units, while Areas 1 and 4 have a higher proportion of single-family homes. The areas east of Lassalle are divided at SR 60 so the eastern part of the city is divided into two districts.

Draft C map uses the current district boundaries, but aligns the districts to major roads. The area north of SR 60 is kept in one district except the small area immediately north south of Ironwood Avenue between Frederick Street and Perris Boulevard. The Moreno Valley Ranch area is united in Area 3.

A Moreno Valley resident submitted two (2) draft maps and discussed in detail the criteria utilized for his maps submitted for Council consideration. The citizen addressed the following criteria in his maps: communities of interest, historical data, compactness and contiguity and population growth.

During the April 8, 2014 public hearing, public comments were received orally and in writing.

A second redistricting Citizens' Community meeting at the Senior Center on April 16, 2014 will give citizens the opportunity to submit drawn plans for consideration at the April 22, 2014 public hearing. The redistricting process will be explained to the citizens of Moreno Valley and the on-line redistricting tool will be demonstrated by Justin Levitt, Vice-President of NDC.

A third public hearing will be held on May 13, 2014. Elections Code 21601.1 states that the Council must hold at least one public hearing on any proposal to adjust boundaries of a district prior to a public hearing at which the Council votes to approve or defeat the proposal.

Citizens are encouraged to be part of the redistricting process, submit their plans and comments orally or in writing at any public hearing. Contact information for the consultant and the City Clerk are posted on the City's web-site. Public paper kits are available on the City's website and at the City Clerk's office. The paper kits allow citizens that do not have access to a computer to manually draw maps.

## ALTERNATIVES

California statutes require a second public hearing held. There are no alternative in order to comply with applicable state law.

## FISCAL IMPACT

Costs for the consultant work to develop revised City Council districts are estimated at approximately $\$ 30,000$ based on the City's previous redistricting process. Updated projections will be developed as the scope of work is refined. The Chief Financial Officer has been authorized to make appropriation changes as may be required for these specialized services. This expenditure has been included in the mid-year budget.

## RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations: That the City Council:

1. Conduct a public hearing and accept public testimony on delinquent nuisance abatement accounts.
2. Adopt Resolution No. 2014-31. A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley, California, Confirming Statements of Costs against Real Property located in the City of Moreno Valley, for Abatements of Public Nuisances and direction that said Statements of Costs Constitute a Lien upon Said properties.
3. Approve placing the submitted Property Assessment List of delinquent nuisance abatement accounts on the Fiscal Year (FY) 2014/2015 Riverside County property tax roll for collection.
4. Direct the City Clerk to file with the Riverside County Assessor's office a certified copy of Resolution No. 2014-31 and the Property Assessment List as required by Section 6.04.120 of the City of Moreno Valley Municipal Code.

## SUMMARY

In 2013, the Fire Prevention Bureau performed public nuisance abatements to remove hazardous and other nuisance conditions from vacant parcels in the City. After having been served with a "Notice to Abate" and given a reasonable time for compliance, the property owners failed to voluntarily abate the conditions.

This report recommends that the City Council convene a Public Hearing and consider staff recommendations to adopt the proposed resolution of the City of Moreno Valley, confirming assessments on certain real properties and approve placing the submitted Property Assessment List of delinquent nuisance abatement accounts on the Fiscal Year 2014/2015 Riverside County property tax roll for collection.

## DISCUSSION

In April of each year, the Fire Prevention Bureau sends each vacant parcel owner as identified by the last equalized assessment roll a Weed and Nuisance Abatement letter. This letter states that all weeds, dry vegetation, rubble, junk, trash, debris, objects, discarded auto bodies, parts and other waste matter upon the premises is a public nuisance and must be abated per Moreno Valley Municipal Code 6.04 by April15.

After April 15, each vacant parcel in Moreno Valley is inspected to determine if the property owner has voluntarily complied with the request in the letter. If the parcel is non-compliant, a notice of violation is then mailed to the property owner advising them that they have 10 days to perform the required abatement. The property is then reinspected for compliance. Should the vacant parcel still require the removal of all weeds, dry vegetation, rubble, junk, trash, debris, objects, discarded auto bodies, parts and other waste matter, then a final notice of violation is mailed to the property owner giving the parcel owner 7 additional days to comply.

Once the period of time has passed as identified in the final notice, then per Municipal Code 6.04 the property is scheduled for abatement by city contractor. This section of the municipal code also allows for recovery of costs associated with said abatements.

The Property Assessment List for general nuisance and weed abatements is hereby submitted for review and consideration by the City Council. A statement of costs was mailed to the legal owner of record for each property requiring abatement action. The County of Riverside equalized tax assessment roll was utilized to determine property ownership. A summary of each abatement is included in the statement of costs, along with the owner's name(s), property description, and the cost for the abatement action. A copy of the statement of costs shall remain on file in the Fire Prevention Bureau.

The Property Assessment List is a current listing of unpaid abatement costs incurred during 2013. Costs approved by the City Council Resolution will result in a special assessment and will become a levy on the FY 2014/2015 tax bill if not paid directly to the City by July 1, 2014. The Notices of Special Assessment will be recorded at the Riverside County Recorder's Office following approval by the City Council.

## ALTERNATIVES

1. Approve and authorize the recommended action as presented in this staff report. This alternative will facilitate cost recovery for those costs incurred by the City for
the abatement of public nuisance and hazard reduction work performed as outlined in the attached Property Assessment List.
2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. This will result in cost for contract abatement work being absorbed by the City for all costs that remain unpaid by the property owners.

## FISCAL IMPACT

Adoption of the resolution would facilitate cost recovery for those costs incurred by the City for public nuisance and hazard reduction work performed as outlined in the Property Assessment List that is attached to the resolution as Exhibit A.

As detailed in the Property Assessment List, the costs incurred by the City for contractual abatements are outlined below. An additional $\$ 13.80$ Special Districts Administration (S.D.A.) fixed charge will be added for each parcel at the time the assessment is placed on the County of Riverside Tax Roll for FY 2014/2015.

The Property Assessment List, as approved by City Council, is subject to amendment as necessary to reflect any payments subsequently received from property owners. Costs not paid in full by July 1, 2014, will be processed as special assessments and cost recovery will occur through the payment of taxes. The Statement of Costs and Notices of Special Assessment for each property shall remain on file in the Fire Prevention Bureau. If payment, or partial payment, is received from property owners, that portion of the Exhibit(s) will be revised as appropriate.

## CITY COUNCIL GOALS

Public Safety. Provide a safe and secure environment for the people and property in the community, control the number and severity of fire and hazardous material incidents, and provide protection for citizens who live, work, and visit the City of Moreno Valley.

## NOTIFICATION

Moreno Valley Municipal Code Section 6.04.060 - Notification of Nuisance provides that written notice of nuisance conditions may be given to property owners in the following manner:

By regular mail addressed to the owner or person in charge and control of the property; at the address shown on the last available equalized assessment roll of the County of Riverside; or as otherwise known, by posting a "Notice to Abate" on the property where the nuisance condition(s) exists thereby allowing ten days to comply.

Notification of weed abatement conditions was specifically met by:

1. Mailing a "Notice to Abate" to property owners by regular mail.
2. Telephone contact with property owners, when possible (i.e., phone number on file).

Furthermore, a "Notice of Public Hearing" was published on April 2, 2014 and April 9, 2014, in The Press Enterprise in accordance with Section 6066 of the Government Code. A public posting of Council's action will also be done in accordance with section 6066 of the Government Code. In addition, the Fire Prevention Bureau mailed a Statement of Cost to each property owner in March 2014 indicating the amount owed for the nuisance abatement services performed by the City as well as the date of the City Council meeting at which this Public Hearing would occur. An official list of the submitted delinquent accounts was submitted to Special Districts and indicates the maximum charges which can be placed on the property tax roll for FY 2014/2015.

## RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations: That the City Council:

1. Receive and file the Monthly Report: Moreno Valley Animal Shelter Adoption Rate for the period of March 1, 2014 to March 31, 2014.

## SUMMARY

The City Council has challenged staff to increase adoptions and decrease the euthanasia rate at the Moreno Valley Animal Shelter. Ongoing evaluation of programs and services, along with increasing public awareness will remain key elements to our success in increasing adoptions of homeless pets from our shelter.

## DISCUSSION

As a follow up to the December 18, 2012 City Council Study Session on Animal Shelter operations, Mayor Owings asked that monthly staff reports be prepared to keep the public informed of the City's progress and the ongoing need to increase pet adoptions and other programs to reduce the number of homeless animals euthanized.

The March 2014 report reveals a Placement (Return to Owners, Transfers and Adoptions) Rate of $62 \%$, representing an increase over last year's Placement Rate by $11 \%$. Other factors which are noteworthy include:

- The number of dogs taken in at the Shelter during March 2014 declined by 13\% as compared to March 2013;
- The placement rate for dogs (adoptions, return to owners \& transfers) during March 2014 increased by 13\% as compared to March 2013;
- The number of dog adoptions during March 2014 increased by $22 \%$ as compared to March 2013;
- The number of dogs euthanized decreased in March 2014 by $37 \%$ when compared to March 2013;
- The number of cats taken in at the Shelter during March 2014 decreased by 3\% as compared to March 2013;
- The number of cat adoptions increased in March 2014 by 13\% as compared to March 2013;
- The placement rate for cats (adoptions, return to owners \& transfers) during March 2014 increased by 7\% as compared to March 2013;
- The number of cats euthanized had a decrease in March 2014 by 8\% as compared to March 2013;
- Other live animal species received in March 2014 included 6 birds ( 2 chickens, 1 songbird, 1 dove, 1 pigeon \& 1 seagull) 1 guinea pig, 1 ferret, 4 rabbits, 2 snakes, 2 bats and 1 turtle.

## SUMMARY/DISCUSSION

On April 9, 2013, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 863 (Chapter 2.25 of the Moreno Valley Municipal Code) establishing the Utilities Commission. Applications were
accepted by the City Clerk's Office to fill the positions on the newly established commission through December 5, 2013.

On March 11, 2014, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 873, amending Sections 2.25.010 and 2.25.020 of Title 2 of the City of Moreno Valley Municipal Code increasing the number of Utilities Commission members from three to five.

The Commission shall consist of five city council-appointed members serving without compensation, and appointed in the manner and for the terms prescribed in Sections 2.04.060 and 2.06.010, respectively, of this code, except that the terms of the members first appointed to the utilities commission shall be set by lot, with one member serving for one year after the effective date of their appointment, two other members serving for two years after the effective date of their appointment, and the two remaining members serving for three years after the effective date of their appointment. Thereafter, all terms shall be for three years and shall expire three years after the effective date of the appointment; provided, however, that the term of an appointment made to fill an unexpired term shall be for the unexpired balance of such term.

At least two members of the Utilities Commission must be Moreno Valley Utility customers. Of the two members that are Moreno Valley Utility customers, one member must be a business customer of Moreno Valley Utility (MVU). It is not required that the utilities commission members be a resident of the City of Moreno Valley. All members shall each have the ability to evaluate utility issues.

## CITY COUNCIL GOALS

The commission shall have the general power and duty to act in an advisory capacity to the city council and staff in all matters pertaining to Moreno Valley Utility, pertaining to other utility services such as water, sewer, gas, and the investor-owned electric utility serving parts of the city, and in addition, the commission shall have the following particular powers and duties: review the budget for the Moreno Valley Utility during the process of its preparation and make recommendations with respect thereto to the City Council, review and make recommendations on all MVU capital improvements which require City Council approval, review and make recommendations to the City Council regarding rates for Moreno Valley Utility, and respond to requests and concerns of the public relating to utility issues.

Choosing not to fill a vacancy on the above-mentioned commission would result in decreased participation from residents. This option is not consistent with the City Council goal of creating a positive environment for the development of Moreno Valley's future. Therefore, staff recommends that the City Council make the recommended appointment.
